A country with large natural resources and with a population of around 70 million (estimated in the absence of a census for over 30 years), the DRC was ranked last on the Human Development Index (DH/2011) by the United Nations Programme for Development.

It's a scandal! and Belgians should ask themselves what is going on in the heads of the Congolese as they left the Belgian Congo in the top spot on all levels. And the children of the immediate post-independence period still remember that in the lessons of economic geography, the country was mentioned, either at the top of the world, or squarely among the first.

Cocoa, rubber, coffee, palm oil, etc.., were among the agricultural wealth. Copper, Cobalt, Gold, Diamonds, etc. were cited as mineral wealth. All this does exist in the DRC and coltan must be added! Yet the country is 183rd of 183.

The CDCC, with its operational plan, thinks it would take less than 4 years if this plan were applied rigorously, so that the country stands up and goes to the front. Four years! less than the term of a President of the Republic! But there is no hope, for the election for which candidates are campaigning is a photocopy of previous times. People who could save the country are not running because they are without means to make themselves known and carry on a campaign. It is like the country is bewitched, people who see clearly have no means to express themselves.

Their plans are not heard. Organizations that can help do not penetrate the programs presented to them. All this will contribute to the worsening situation of the Congolese.

Who will help the DR Congo? That is the question, but the CDCC, at least, has constructive ideas that can salvage things, but it lacks the resources and voice.
