10 REASONS WHY WALLABY SCRUB ROAD SHOULD BE KEPT OPEN

- 1. **Emergency services access:** if the road is destroyed for coal mining, it will put people at risk by increasing the time for emergency responses from the Rural Fire Service and the Ambulance Service.
- 2. **Used by 1100 drivers per day:** the road saves 20 minutes on a journey to Muswellbrook and beyond, and is a shortcut for other local trips. More than 2,500 people have signed a petition to keep the road open.
- 3. An underground mine extension is viable: Yancoal the company buying the mine is a specialist in underground mining. If the company chooses to do so, they could build their mine expansion underground, preserving the road.
- 4. **Health risk:** there is no way of meeting new pollution standards without reducing open cut mining. Mt Thorley Warkworth is already in the top 5 polluters in NSW.¹ Asking them to reduce particle pollution by rehabilitating their disused pits and conducting the rest of their mining underground is reasonable.
- 5. Saving WSR will not cost jobs: There would be continuation of jobs with the final rehabilitation of the major area of the site and jobs both in the underground operation and the finalisation of the open-cut.
- Road closure will cost local community \$20.3 million: A study by The Australia Institute found that closing Wallaby Scrub Road will impose substantial costs on the community, estimated by Rio Tinto's economists at up to \$20.3M.
- 7. Part of the Heritage-listed Great North Road: Wallaby Scrub Road forms part of the Great North Road, which holds both State and Federal Heritage Status.
- 8. Saving the road means saving Bulga: A decision from Yancoal, supported by Council to mine underground, would be a win for all parties including the community, mine workers, and heritage and ecological values. It would put to rest the seven-year-long battle over the expansion of this mine, saving the villages of Bulga and Milbrodale from the advancing impacts of an open cut.
- 9. **Aboriginal artefacts and heritage:** preserving WSR would prevent loss of aboriginal artefacts and heritage.
- 10. Saving critically endangered Warkworth Sands Woodland & endangered species: Retaining WSR would also preserve some of the now critically endangered Warkworth Sands Woodland. It would also prevent the destruction of other endangered species in the proposed mine site area.
