# 2012 CONGRESSIONAL SCORECARD

## 112<sup>TH</sup> CONGRESS

The Arab American Institute has compiled this Scorecard to catalogue the voting record of the 112<sup>th</sup> Congress on issues of importance to the Arab American community. Listed actions include bill proposals, enacted legislation, and Dear Colleague letters, along with additional special legislative considerations.

Though not comprehensive, and though no member of Congress can be judged fairly by any single action, this guide provides a general profile of Congressional behavior that we hope will help Arab Americans better understand the actions taken by their representatives on these issues.

We have attempted to provide a snapshot of legislation concerning many of the primary issues concerning Arab Americans.

For the Senate, we included 10 items: 2 on the Arab Spring, 1 on Palestine, 2 on Syria, 3 regarding civil liberties, and 2 for immigration reform.

In the House, we included 13 items: 2 on the Arab Spring, 2 on Palestine, 1 on Syria, 4 regarding civil liberties, 1 for immigration reform, and 3 for tolerance/equality.

We encourage you to use this Scorecard to stay informed on the voting records of your Congressional representatives.

AAI will soon be releasing an online database of Congressional votes recorded by previous editions of Scorecard, going back over a decade. ## **Online**

You will be prompted to select from a list of your representatives, and to enter your name and contact information. The action page will include sample letters and issue briefs to assist you. It's a quick, easy, and highly effective way to make your voice heard.

## **Letters**

If you would like to write a personalized letter, please keep the following tips in mind:

- Keep the letter concise, polite, and to-the-point
- Note the name and number of a particular piece of legislation in the letter
- Follow up with a phone call a week or two after sending your letter

Because postal service to the US Congress is significantly slowed by security protocols, we strongly recommend that you contact your representatives by phone, fax, or e-mail.

Fax and e-mail addresses can be found on the representatives' websites, or in the Handbook of the 112th Congress, available at no charge to all AAI Sustaining Members.

## **Phone Calls**

Personal phone calls are a common and easy means of communicating with your member's office. Please keep the following phone tips in mind:

- Ask to speak to the relevant legislative assistant or caseworker
- Always be polite
- Follow up with a letter reiterating your concerns

## Personal Visits

A personal visit is the most effective way of communicating with your representatives, and can take place in your home state or in Washington, DC. Here are some useful tips:

- Schedule a meeting with your members of Congress for three to five local Arab American community leaders. Members have very busy schedules even while in recess, and going in as a small group of prominent local leaders rather than individually both demonstrates the seriousness of your meeting request and maximizes the members' time. Call the office or send a letter outlining what issues you would like to discuss and who will be attending the meeting.
- Whether you're requesting a meeting in Washington, DC or in a field office, you may be scheduled to meet with a Congressional staff member. Staffers have considerable influence on their bosses, who rely on them for information and briefings, and also have a strong background in and understanding of the issues. Treat a meeting with a staff member as you would a meeting with your member of Congress.
- E-mail or fax an issue brief or a short agenda for your meeting. This lets your members of Congress know what concerns you have, gives their staff time to do any necessary research, and lets them know that you respect their schedules and plan to keep the meeting brief.

After the visit, send an email thanking the member for his/her time. Emphasize that you appreciate your representatives taking time to listen to your views and concerns, and that you look forward to continued cooperation between the member of Congress and the Arab American community in his/her district. Include a brief summary of the issues discussed and your views.

### **Arab Spring**

***Two years after the first demonstrations in Tunisia, the Arab Spring has become increasingly complex, and at times violent. Despite the many setbacks faced by people in Tunisia, Egypt, Syria, and Bahrain, many members of Congress sympathized with the democratic aspirations of the uprisings, and authored a number of positive bills to demonstrate their support.***

**1. Senator John Kerry (D-MA)** introduced *S.RES.372* recognizing the importance of the United States-Egypt relationship and urging the government of Egypt to protect civil liberties and cease intimidation and prosecution of civil society workers and democratic activists. The bill affirms Washington's desire to maintain strong bilateral relations with the new democratically-elected government of Egypt and its commitment to support an Egyptian democracy that supports free speech and civil society. Similarly, **Senator James Inhofe (R-OK)** introduced *S.RES.150* calling for the protection of religious minority rights and freedoms in the Arab world and in support of all Egyptians' inalienable rights, including the right to practice religion freely. For supporting the Egyptian people and working to strengthen the relationship between the U.S. and the Arab world, all 8 sponsors and co-sponsors receive a (+).

**2. Senator Rand Paul (R-KY)** introduced *S.3576*, a bill to eliminate U.S. assistance to Libya, Egypt, and Pakistan in the wake of the embassy attacks on September 11, 2012. The proposed legislation stated that "no amounts may be obligated or expended to provide any direct United States assistance, loan guarantee, or debt relief," to any of the aforementioned countries, despite the pivotal role that foreign aid plays in maintaining stability and protecting US interests. The 10 Senators who voted for the bill receive a (-), and the 81 Senators who voted down the bill receive a (+).

### **Palestine**

***2012 saw little progress in the Israeli-Palestinian peace process. After negotiations broke down at the end of 2010, talks stalled while the Palestinian Authority (PA) struggled to maintain its legitimacy, and Israel continued to build illegal settlements in the occupied West Bank. After the PA's failed attempts in 2011 to form a unity government with Hamas and its delayed bid for statehood at the United Nations, some members of Congress have continued their one-sided criticism of Palestine, while others tried to get both sides back on the path to peace, before it's too late.***

**3. Senator Dean Heller (R-NV)** introduced *S.1622*, the *Jerusalem Embassy and Recognition Act*, calling for the recognition of Jerusalem as the capital of Israel, and for the relocation of the United States Embassy in Israel to Jerusalem. The bill asserts that Jerusalem must

remain an undivided city and that every citizen of the country of Israel should have the right to reside in any part of an undivided Jerusalem. For ignoring the rights of the Palestinian residents of Jerusalem, and the widely-recognized importance of leaving the final status of Jerusalem to be determined in peace negotiations, Sen. Heller and the bill's 5 co-sponsors receive a (-).

### **Syria**

***One year ago, Syrians took to the streets amid an atmosphere of self-assurance and optimism as ossified regimes collapsed all around them. That initial optimism has vanished as the uprising has struggled to maintain momentum against brutal repression and international paralysis. Many prominent U.S. policymakers have repeatedly called for more direct military intervention, using NATO's intervention in Libya as a model. We have included a number of bills on Syria to provide a snapshot of members' opinions on the issue, but due to the complex nature of the crisis and varying levels of support for U.S. involvement in Syria, we did not assign a positive or negative value to any bills, except for Senator Durbin's support for Temporary Protected Status.***

**4. Senator Robert Casey Jr. (D-PA)** introduced *S.RES.435* calling for democratic change in Syria and denouncing the violence inflicted on the Syrian people by the current regime. Sen. Casey also introduced *S.3498*, requesting the US government to provide humanitarian assistance to the Syrian people and appoint a Special Envoy for Syria. **Senator Ron Wyden (D-OR)** introduced *S.RES.391* condemning violence committed by the Assad regime in Syria against journalists and reiterating the importance of freedom of the press in Syria. **Senator Joseph Lieberman (I-CT)** introduced *S.RES.180*, a resolution expressing support for peaceful demonstrations and universal freedoms in Syria, and condemning the human rights violations committed by the Assad regime. **Senator Richard Blumenthal (D-CT)** introduced *S.RES.428*, condemning the Syrian government of Bashar Al-Assad and accusing the government of Syria of crimes against humanity. All 40 sponsors and co-sponsors of these bills receive a (\*).

**5. Senator Richard Durbin (D-IL)** and five other Senators authored a letter to President Obama urging him to implement Temporary Protected Status (TPS) for Syrian nationals currently residing in the United States. The Senators directly addressed the many benefits and protections afforded by TPS for those who fear violence on their return to their home country, while succinctly explaining that TPS does not change long-term immigration status or threaten the security and interests of the United States. For standing up for the safety and well-being of the Syrian people, the six signatories of the letter receive a (+).



### *Civil Rights and Civil Liberties*

*Since the enactment of the USA PATRIOT Act in 2001, we have witnessed a steady deterioration of our civil liberties, particularly with regard to the Arab American and American Muslim communities. Warrantless wiretapping, unlawful search and seizure, and blatant racial profiling continue to mar our national conscience, and undermine our effectiveness against the real threats that exist at home and abroad. Though many members of Congress perpetuated this decline, some took a principled stand to restore some of our lost liberties, and sought to establish policies that make our country safe while protecting the civil liberties enshrined in our Constitution.*

**6. Senator Lindsey Graham (R-SC)** introduced *S.553, the Detention of Unprivileged Enemy Belligerents Act*, reaffirming the authority of the president to detain enemy belligerents in connection with the continuing armed conflict, regardless of place of capture, until the conflict is declared over. The act limits the application of habeas corpus available for detainees considered to be unprivileged enemy belligerents, or those not protected under Article 4 of the Geneva Convention. For denying individuals the right of due process or fair trial, Sen. Graham and the bill's 4 co-sponsors receive a (-).

**7. Senator Benjamin Cardin (D-MD)** sponsored *S.1670, the End Racial Profiling Act*. The bill explicitly prohibits racial profiling by any law enforcement agent and delineates a set of policies that are aimed at eliminating racial profiling, including stringent regulations on the process of collecting data in compliance with Section 401 Attorney General's Office regulations, and training programs for federal law enforcement agents. For supporting the equitable enforcement of the law and the elimination of racial profiling Sen. Benjamin Cardin (D-MD) and the bill's 16 co-sponsors receive a (+).

**8. Senator Mark Udall (D-CO)**, along with twelve other Senators, sent a letter to the Director of National Intelligence James Clapper calling on him to provide answers about the implications of an extension of the FISA Amendment Act, particularly Section 702 of the Act that authorizes the government to collect the communications of people without a warrant. The letter asks for transparency in government operations that could directly affect the rights of law-abiding United States citizens. For affirming the need to understand the full implications of the government's surveillance program, Sen. Udall and the 12 co-signers of the letter receive a (+).

### *Immigration*

*2012 saw little movement toward passing comprehensive and fair immigration reform. As a group with a sizable immigrant population, the Arab American community has a significant stake in these issues and supports efforts to address immigration reform comprehensively, including*

*the creation of a path for undocumented immigrants to gain U.S. citizenship, while promoting a humane culture of immigration enforcement based on rule of law.*

**9. Senator Chuck Grassley (D-IA)** authored a letter to President Obama expressing concern over the announcement that the Department of Homeland Security will grant deferred action to illegal immigrants in the United States who came to the country at an early age, and allow them to receive work authorization. The letter challenges the legality of the president's directive, and calls on the president to prosecute all undocumented immigrants regardless of the reasons behind their immigration. For working against a more humane immigration policy, Sen. Grassley and the bill's 20 co-signers receive a (-).

**10. Senator Charles Schumer (D-NY)** introduced *S. 3553, the Benefits to Research and American Innovation through Nationality Statutes Act of 2012*. The bill aims to amend the *Immigration and Nationality Act* to enhance national security while promoting job creation, innovation, investment, and research in the United States. Similarly, **Senator Lamar Alexander (R-TN)** introduced *S. 3192, the SMART Jobs Act*, which aims to amend the *Immigration and Nationality Act* by establishing an F-4 non-immigrant visa for foreign nationals pursuing an advanced degree in mathematics, engineering, technology, or the physical sciences in the United States. **Senator Jerry Moran (R-KS)** introduced *S.3217, the Startup Act 2.0*, which relaxes the immigration restrictions on up to 50,000 resident aliens who have earned a master's or doctoral degree in a science, technology, or engineering field. The authors of these bills, and their nine co-sponsors receive a (+) for encouraging the world's best and brightest to immigrate.

### *Arab Spring*

*Two years after the first demonstrations in Tunisia, the Arab Spring has become increasingly complex, and at times violent. Despite the many setbacks faced by people in Tunisia, Egypt, Syria, and Bahrain, many members of Congress sympathized with the democratic aspirations of the uprisings, and authored a number of positive bills to demonstrate their support.*

**1. Rep. Trent Franks (R-AZ)** introduced *H.RES.732*, “Calling for the protection of the rights and freedoms of religious minorities in the Arab world.” The bill is aimed at guaranteeing religious minority rights in Arab countries experiencing democratic transitions and condemns attacks on all religious minorities. For standing up for religious equality, Rep. Franks and the 38 co-sponsors receive a (+).

**2. Rep. Jim McDermott (D-WA)** authored a letter urging the King of Bahrain to pardon medical doctors who have been detained for caring for injured protestors. The letter reiterates previous statements about the government’s treatment of its protestors and the continuing crackdown against peaceful demonstrations. For honoring the neutrality of medical practitioners, Rep. McDermott and the letter’s 23 other co-signers receive a (+).

### *Palestine*

*2012 saw little progress in the Israeli-Palestinian peace process. After negotiations broke down at the end of 2010, talks stalled while the Palestinian Authority (PA) struggled to maintain its legitimacy, and Israel continued to build illegal settlements in the occupied West Bank. After the PA’s failed attempts in 2011 to form a unity government with Hamas, and its delayed bid for statehood at the United Nations, some members of Congress have continued their one-sided criticism of Palestine, while others tried to get both sides back on the path to peace.*

**3. Rep. Steve Cohen (D-TN)** authored a letter to President Obama entitled “Reaffirm U.S. Support for a Two-State Solution,” in which he urges stronger leadership on the issue and attacks “U.S. equivocation on support for the emergence of a Palestinian state” which “plays into the hands of violent extremists who feed off of the false belief that peace is not possible.” For supporting the right of the Palestinian people to a state, Cohen and the letter’s 23 co-signers receive a (+).

**4. Rep. Edward R. Royce (R-CA)** introduced *H.R.5303*, the *Palestinian Peace Promotion and Anti-Incitement Act*, which claims that the Palestinian Authority has not lived up to its agreements with Israel and should do more to pressure the Palestinian people to accept Israeli-dictated peace initiatives. It also amends the *Foreign Assistance Act of 1961* to prohibit financial assistance to the PA. For their one-sided pandering, Rep. Royce and the bill’s 30 co-sponsors receive a (-).

### *Syria*

*One year ago, Syrians took to the streets amid an atmosphere of self-assurance and optimism as ossified regimes collapsed all around them. That initial optimism has vanished as the uprising has struggled to maintain momentum against brutal repression and international paralysis. Many prominent U.S. policymakers have repeatedly called for more direct military intervention, using NATO’s intervention in Libya as a model. We have included a number of bills on Syria to provide a snapshot of members’ opinions on the issue, but due to the complex nature of the crisis and varying levels of support for U.S. involvement in Syria, we did not assign a positive or negative value to any bills.*

**5. Rep. Steve Israel (D-NY)** introduced *H.RES.687* calling for Syrian President Bashar Al-Assad to be tried before the International Criminal Court for “crimes against humanity.”

**Rep. Keith Ellison (D-MN)** introduced *H.RES.549* calling for democratic change in Syria, and urging the president to support a democratic transition. **Rep. Laura Richardson (D-CA)** introduced *H.RES.742* condemning Russia for providing weapons to the Assad regime. **Rep. Adam Schiff (D-CA)** introduced *H.RES.629* condemning violence committed by the regime against journalists. **Rep. Gus Bilirakis (R-FL)** introduced *H.RES.763* condemning the targeting of vulnerable minority faith communities in Syria and calling for the US government to prioritize their safety. All sponsors and co-sponsors receive a (\*).

### *Civil Liberties*

*Since the enactment of the USA PATRIOT Act in 2001, we have witnessed a steady deterioration of our civil liberties, particularly with regard to the Arab American and American Muslim communities. Warrantless wiretapping, unlawful search and seizure, and blatant racial profiling continue to mar our national conscience, and undermine our effectiveness against the real threats that exist at home and abroad. Though many members of Congress perpetuated this decline, others took a principled stand to restore some of our lost liberties, and sought to establish policies that make our country safe while protecting the civil liberties enshrined in our Constitution.*

**6. Rep. Lamar Smith (R-TX)** introduced *H.R.5949*, the *FISA Amendment Act Reauthorization Act of 2012* which extends the *FISA Amendments Act of 2008* (FAA) to December 31, 2017. The FAA amended the *Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act* to allow for broad surveillance of American citizens’ telephone and electronic communications without warrants, or even suspicion of wrongdoing. No information about the massive surveillance program is available to the public, and little is known about the parameters of what is allowed by the FAA, even among members of Congress. The 301 members of Congress who voted for the reauthorization receive a (-), and the 118 members who voted against it receive a (-).



**7. Rep. Adam Smith (D-WA)** introduced *H.R.4192*, the *Due Process and Military Detention Amendments Act*, to amend the *National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2012* to provide for the trial of persons detained in the United States pursuant to the Authorization for Use of Military Force, and to repeal the requirement for military custody. The bill ensures that all individuals detained in the United States receive trial proceedings with due process as guaranteed in the Constitution. Rep. Smith and the bill's 65 co-sponsors receive a (+). Sponsors and co-sponsors of the efforts to remove the practice of indefinite military detention from the NDAA, including **Rep. Ron Paul's (R-TX)** bill, *H.R.3676*, and **Rep. John Garamendi's (D-CA)** *Due Process Guarantee Act*, also receive a (+).

**8. Rep. Rush D. Holt (D-NJ)** introduced *H.AMDT 1087*, an appropriations bill amendment that would have prohibited federal funds from going to police departments that use ethnic or religious profiling. The amendment would have stripped the NYPD and other police departments using similar tactics of the federal grants they receive each year. The racial profiling program used by the NYPD has not only assaulted the civil liberties of innocent New Yorkers, but has also failed to lead to a single tangible counterterrorism lead. The 193 members of Congress who voted for the Holt Resolution receive a (+), and the 232 members who voted against it receive a (-).

**9. Rep. Jerrold Nadler (D-NY)** introduced *H.R.4011*, the *American Anti-Torture Act of 2012*, to prevent the use of interrogation techniques not authorized in the United States Army Field Manual on Human Intelligence Collector Operations, and to guarantee protection for people in criminal or immigration proceedings detained in the United States. For standing up against barbaric and ineffective interrogation techniques, Rep. Nadler and the bill's other 21 co-sponsors receive a (+).

### **Immigration**

**2012 saw little movement toward passing comprehensive and fair immigration reform. As a group with a sizable immigrant population, the Arab American community has a significant stake in these issues and supports efforts to address immigration reform comprehensively, including the creation of a path for undocumented immigrants to gain U.S. citizenship, while promoting a humane culture of immigration enforcement based on rule of law.**

**10. Rep. Benjamin Quayle (R-AZ)** introduced *H.R.5953*, the *Prohibiting Back-Door Amnesty Act*, which aims to eliminate practical use of prosecutorial discretion, an important component of responsible immigration policy. Prosecutorial discretion ensures that limited immigration resources are not being wasted on children or peaceful, law-abiding residents. Rep. Quayle's bill aims to ensure that all immigration violations—from children who had no control over the decision to immigrate to hardened

criminals—are treated equally. Rep. Quayle and the bill's 41 other co-sponsors receive a (-).

### **Intolerance**

***This election year heralded another round of rampant Islamophobia and anti-Arab sentiment, in which numerous politicians encouraged bigotry and racism for their own political gain. But it was also a year of inspiring solidarity with Arab, Muslim, and South Asian communities, as many members of Congress stood up for these communities as an integral part of the American cultural fabric.***

**11. Rep. Eddie Bernice Johnson (D-TX)** introduced *H.RES.728*, "recognizing the commencement of Ramadan, the Islamic holy month of fasting and spiritual renewal, and commending Muslims in the United States and throughout the world for their faith." The bill demonstrates solidarity with and support for members of the American Muslim community. Rep. Johnson and the 25 other co-sponsors receive a (+).

**12. Rep. Nick Rahall II (D-WV)** introduced *H.RES.608: Honoring the life and work of Arab-American writer Ameen Rihani*, which celebrates the 100th anniversary of the publication of the first Arab-American novel *The Book of Khalid*. The bill refers to the book as "an important record of Arab immigration to the 'Little Syria' community of Lower Manhattan and today is a powerful example of the potential of the United States to inspire the Arab world in its democratic aspirations." Rep. Rahall and the bill's 9 co-sponsors receive a (+).

**13. Rep. Michele Bachmann (R-MN)** penned a letter to the Inspectors General of the Departments of State, Justice, Defense, and Homeland Security, calling for an investigation on whether "influence operations conducted by individuals and organizations associated with the Muslim Brotherhood" have "had an impact on the federal government's national security policies." The letter attacks a number of Arab and Muslim civil servants by name, including Huma Abedin, Deputy Chief of Staff to Secretary of State Hilary Clinton. For her blatant appropriation of Islamophobia for political gain, Bachmann and the letter's 4 co-sponsors receive a (-). Meanwhile, **Rep. Keith Ellison (D-MN)** and **Rep. Chris Murphy (D-CT)** authored a letter attacking the decision by Lowe's to pull advertisements from The Learning Channel's "All-American Muslim" as antithetical to American values. The letter calls for the company to stand up against bigotry and intolerance, and Ellison, Murphy, and the letter's 9 co-signers receive a (+).
