Support for multicultural communities

A re-elected ACT Labor government will deliver new initiatives to support inclusion among our multicultural communities, in particular responding to employment and English language needs.

Refugee and asylum seeker job pathway program

This program will build on the Work Experience Support Program (WESP) and associated initiatives such as the refugee Community of Practice which brought together the Canberra Business Chamber, Migrant and Refugee Settlement Service, Multicultural Youth Services and other agencies.

The \$1.2 million job support package includes:

- Targeted support and job matching for refugees and asylum seekers seeking employment opportunities in the ACT, building on a pilot program commenced in 2016
- Resources to foster closer relationships between the ACT business community, government and refugee and settlement service providers.

Further support for English language programs

Labor will invest an additional \$208,000 for English language programs in the ACT.

This further investment is based on extensive community consultation as part of a recent language policy review and responds to a significant number of ACT residents who don't speak English according to the last census.

We want to make the Canberra we love even better and that means giving Canberrans from every community the chance be involved in all aspects of life in our city. ACT Labor's vision is of a strong, confident and inclusive city.
