



This is because the ACT does not have the constitutional capacity to permit euthanasia or the assisting of a person to terminate his or her life. In 1997, the Commonwealth Government enacted legislation which removed the power of the ACT Legislative Assembly to make laws permitting, or having the effect of permitting, assisted death or euthanasia. For ACT residents and the Assembly to consider any proposal to allow euthanasia, the Commonwealth Parliament must remove this prohibition. In September 2014 Labor members supported a motion in the ACT Legislative Assembly calling on the Prime Minister of Australia to act to repeal this limitation on the law-making ability of the ACT. This remains the position of the ACT Labor Party. A genuine discussion about dying and end of life options is something our community is ready for, and needs to have. 


