
Options for Sudbury Street

As one of the more technically challenging areas of the route, we are asking for your input to inform the short and long-term options through the sections of Sudbury Street between Queen Street West and King Street West:

Section	Existing Condition	Short-term Option	Long-term Option
Queen Street West to Abell Street		Off-street bike trail and sidewalk along south boulevard	
Abell Street to Dovercourt Road		Two-way cycle track (separated by a physical barrier from traffic lanes) and sidewalk along south side of the road	Feasibility of a cycling facility adjacent to rail corridor
Dovercourt Road to King Street West		Shared lane road markings (Sharrows)	Feasibility of a cycling facility adjacent to rail corridor and behind the town homes located on the south side of the street

Background and Study Area

The study is nearing completion and with extensive public consultation, a continuous multi-use trail with identified connections to surrounding communities has been developed. A combination of city streets and rail corridors with bridge crossings over existing streets are part of the route. The Study is being carried out in accordance with the requirements of a Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) Schedule 'C' process and provides opportunities for public input at key stages.
