

## Equal Pay for Equal Work

- B.C. government policy treats Native Courtworkers differently than other workers who do similar work. It's time to fix this injustice!
- Native Courtworkers are paid much less than public workers doing similar work – \$31,800 compared to \$45,100 for a comparable classification.
