Matthew Barciak and his partner, Shane Strebchuk, happen to walk by Central Memorial Park when they noticed a sign for Park Central.

We strive to strengthen the Beltline through local events and cultural programming while improving our neighbourhoods through planning, public consultation, community building and advocacy.



Gearing up for the 2nd Street SW Cycle Track

Construction set to begin this summer.

After multiple rounds of public engagement and two years of planning, the City of Calgary is set to begin construction on the highly anticipated 2nd Street SW Cycle Track that will connect between 10 Avenue in the Beltline and 26 Avenue at the Elbow River Pathway in Mission.

he new and improved streetscape introduces protected cycle tracks and numerous safety improvements while maintaining parking and two-way car traffic.

THE ROAD TO A SAFE, NEIGHBOURHOOD SOLUTION FOR 2ND STREET

In June of 2018, the City of Calgary proposed adding unprotected bike lanes to 2nd Street SW, which is currently part of the City Centre bike network but marked only by "sharrows" (bike stencils) that have been proven to do little in the way of protecting people on bikes from cars.


After much community feedback in support of safe, separated cycle tracks, in November 2018 the City of Calgary proposed a new design

with protected cycle tracks and one-way (north-bound) vehicle traffic.

In October 2019, after further community feedback the City released the final plan for 2nd Street SW.

A NEW BENCHMARK FOR SAFE NEIGHBOURHOOD STREETS IN CALGARY

2nd Street SW is a critical link between the Elbow River Pathway and the Downtown Cycle Track Network. A new and improved 2nd Street SW that works for pedestrians, cyclists and cars is a win for the Beltline and will set a new standard for safe neighbourhood streets in Calgary.



WANT THE INSIDE SCOOP? HERE'S A SUMMARY OF THE KEY FEATURES:

- → 1 Protected cycle tracks on both sides of the street will make riding a bike safe for all users of all levels. The cycle track will be maintained in the winter.
- 2 Curb extensions and painted crosswalks at seven intersections will make crossing the street much safer.
- 3 Flashing beacons will provide additional safety at three specific intersections.
- New traffic signals at 13 Avenue and 2nd Street SW will improve safety for all modes of travel at this busy intersection.
- → 5 Two-way traffic lanes with on-street parking for residents and visitors will maintain ease of access and add to
- the "neighbourhood feel" of the street.
- On-street
 parking for residents
 and visitors will be
 mostly maintained.
- Road resurfacing will make for smoother sailing.

She/Her on Bikes











Lori Andrews has been riding bikes in Calgary her entire life. In 2019, the World Winter Cycling Congress came to our city and Andrews was selected as one of two photographers to capture the event. As soon as she started photographing participants, Andrews knew she wanted to feature the stories of woman-identified cyclists. Andrews' next portrait project was born: the She/Her bike series.

hile continuing to snap photos of she/her cyclists in 2019, Andrews learned about the important link between feminism and cycling. She came across the writing of British writer Louise Jeye, who, in 1895 wrote:

"There is a new dawn ... of emancipation, and it is brought about by the cycle. Free to wheel, free to spin out in the glorious country, unhampered by chaperones ... the young girl of today can feel the real independence of herself and, while she is building up her better constitution, she is developing her better mind." 1

When asked what it means to be a womanidentified cyclist in Calgary, many of the She/Her portrait subjects echoed Jeye's 1895 description. Participants reported using their bikes to move between work, school and everyday life. As mothers, sisters and aunties,

"Cycling makes me feel so free, limitless and fast - like I can fly."


they use their commutes as a welcome time for self-care in their busy schedules. The project's bike enthusiasts talked about hauling groceries on their bikes, saving money by using two wheels and feeling a sense of empowerment and belonging.

The She/Her bike series makes a seriously good case for riding your bike year-round; it demonstrates to all Calgarians that it's worth it, and fun!

With close to 40 portraits captured in 2019, Andrews will be back focusing her lens on She/Her bike portraits once it's possible for Calgarians to get together safely.

Time for a BUMP: 2020 Will Mark Biggest Year of Murals Yet

TD presents the 2020 BUMP Festival in beautiful Calgary, Alberta this August 26 to 29.

hough most of society is just getting used to new physical distancing restrictions, mural and graffiti artists are some of the original practitioners of working apart from others, spending much of their time high up on ladders, scaffolding and lifts or by the cover of night on railcars far away from any crowds. Turns out that this year, amidst a plethora of cancellations in the arts sector, that was our saving grace.

For 2020, our jury has put together an unbelievable lineup of 20 mural artists from Calgary and across Canada. This will bring BUMP's total mural count to 50 as the Beltline Urban Murals Project enters its fourth year of bringing magic and the biggest

bump yet to the streets of Calgary.

Known for fusing graffiti with sculpture and painting some of the most complex and largest graffiti art in Canada, Toronto-based **Kwest** will be making his Calgary debut. In December, he was inducted into the Museum of Graffiti in Miami, Florida.

Grenoble via-Montreal artist **Ankhone**, whose work is rooted in graffiti culture, transposes pictorial and graphic work - a style that he calls "poetry in motion." His work can be found across France, Montreal's many boroughs and even on a bulk carrier ship, CSL's St. Laurent.

Not to miss out on plenty of hometown talent, the BUMP Festival will celebrate our largest local lineup ever with big-hitters including Alex Kwong, Cheka Creative, Derek Simmers, Michelle Hoogveld and Nasarimba in partnership with Jill Stanton from Edmonton whose most recent work appeared on the National Music Centre in the East Village.




Introducing High Park

High Park is a new signature public space being developed for the Beltline as a destination for all Calgarians to visit and enjoy. The park is proposed to reimagine the underutilized 90,000 square foot parkade space on the top decks of the Centre City Parkade at 4 Street and 10 Avenue SW,

and provide more public space for Calgarians.

Opening late summer 2020, the BNA will launch an engagement hub installation with Public City Architecture, an experienced Landscape Architecture firm known for their interactive and place-making installations.
