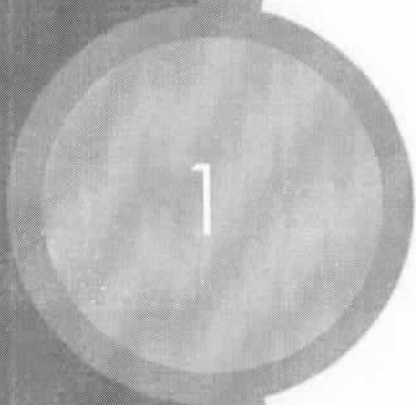

Methodology



Methodology

This study was conducted on the Galaxy Online Omnibus between Thursday 3 September and Sunday 6 September, 2015.

The sample was 1,000 Australians aged 18 years and older distributed throughout Australia, as follows:

| ➤ South Australia | 100 |
| ➤ Western Australia | 99 |

Age, gender and area quotas were applied to the sample.

Following the completion of interviewing, the data was weighted by age, gender and area to reflect the latest ABS population estimates.

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Main Findings



Main Findings

- The majority of Australians (63%) support banning logging on Bruny Island in order to protect the swift parrot.
- Those that support the banning of logging on Bruny Island outnumber those opposed by a factor of four to one.
- Support for the banning of logging on Bruny Island may be observed across all demographic groups and all states of Australia.
