The National Housing Strategy

In 2017, the federal government created a National Housing Strategy. The NHS claimed to mark the return of large-scale planning and financial investments in housing by the federal government. The Liberal Government's NHS, which has been wrapped into their election platform, has faced critiques from housing advocates who say the plan doesn't go far enough. A recent review of the NHS by Parliamentary Budget Officer says funding levels on housing overall haven't increased and have even slightly decreased for those in core housing need.*

The housing crisis in Canada is a complex issue in need of a robust set of solutions. Both the New Democratic Party and the Green Party of Canada have also promised multifaceted National Housing Strategies. Ultimately though, success hinges on getting more affordable homes built to balance out the market. Here's how the Parties' promises match up.
