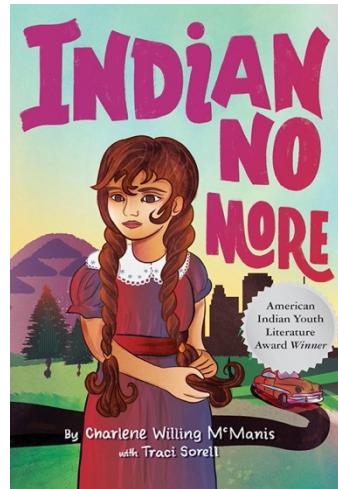

 	<p>What have your grandparents or elders taught you?</p> <p>What are ways we can comfort a friend or family member in a difficult or stressful situation?</p> <p>When Chich died- “Keith didn’t know what to say. He stood in silence, rocking slowly back and forth on his heels”(p. 159).</p>


	Vocabulary
 	<p>Streuselkuchen: (p. 160) A German-style crumb cake</p> <p>Gurney: (p. 157) A hospital bed with wheels that makes it easy to move patients around <i>Ex: “Two men lifted Chich onto a gurney, and we followed as they carried her to the ambulance”</i></p>

Urging: (p.151) To consistently persuade/recommend someone or something to do something. In the picture- the doctor is urging people to stay home.
Ex: At Keith's urging, I finally agreed to go over to Philip's house"

Arroz con pollo: (p.164) A dish originating in Spain. It includes cooked chicken, tomatoes, herbs and rice.

Ropa vieja: (p. 160) A slow-cooked beef-and-vegetable stew served with rice, and one of the national dishes of Cuba


