Following are guidelines associated with scenarios 8 to 10 to assist the Chair with his/her review of each travel request:

Scenario 8: Granted appearances must be in conjunction with your activities as a Commissioner with the 2020 California Citizens Redistricting Commission.

Scenario 9: Travel must be in conjunction with a request from a state or the federal government and/or nonpartisan independent redistricting advocacy group to discuss the independent redistricting commission concept.

Scenario 10: Travel under this scenario must be clearly connected to a better understanding of California as it relates to redistricting that cannot be ascertained utilizing technology/tools (i.e., google maps). An acceptable example would be to visit an area where we have received public input and Commissioners want to familiarize themselves with that area to help them make line drawing decisions.
