Michigan Families Pitch in to Make a Difference in Their Community

During this covid pandemic, typical fundraising and service events have suffered, but CFM groups at St. Thomas the Apostle, Ann Arbor, found ways to help. Their St. Monica group gathered items to fill blessing bags to give to the less fortunate. The kids enjoyed filling the bags, looking forward to sharing them (right).

The St. Fidelis group chose to host a small gathering of families for a fund-raising dinner to benefit the **Hope Clinic in Ann Arbor**, an amazing outreach that was inspired by a CFM action. The clinic provides free food, health care, dental, laundry services and other needs to the local community <https://thehopeclinic.org/>



When Hope Clinic's founders, the late Dr. Daniel Heffernan and his wife joined CFM, their goal was to apply Scripture to their daily lives. The Heffernans' participation in CFM led them to "act" and start a weekly "tail-gate" medical clinic, loading medical supplies into their station wagon to serve the migrant farm workers in a neighboring community. The family practice physician later set up his office in downtown Ann Arbor, but the thought of helping people who lacked insurance or funding for medical care was never far from his mind. Ultimately, the creation of Hope Clinic was and is "simply a work of God," Dr. Heffernan said.

"The laity will have to come to a comprehension that our blessed Lord was not crucified in a cathedral between two candles but in the world, on a road way, in a town garbage heap, at the crossroads where there were three languages written upon the Cross. Yes, they were Hebrew, Latin and Greek, but they could just as well have been English, Bantu or African. It would make no difference. He placed Himself at the very center of the world, in the midst of smut, thieves, soldiers and gamblers. He was there to extend pardon to them. This is the vocation of the laity: to go out into the world and make Christ known."
