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29 To amend the District of Columbia Administrative Procedure Act to provide that the  
30 Mayor shall provide 10 days' notice when proposing to install, modify, or amend  
31 a statement for guiding, directing, or otherwise regulating vehicular or pedestrian  
32 traffic, if the proposed installation, modification, or removal of the statement will  
33 increase safety at a location identified as a high-risk intersection in the  
34 Multimodal Long-Range Transportation Plan; to amend the Construction Codes  
35 Approval and Amendments Act of 1986 to provide that the Building Code  
36 Official shall not issue a permit if certain conditions are not met; to amend the  
37 Priority Sidewalk Assurance Act of 2010 to require the Mayor to install sidewalks  
38 on both sides of a street, to connect new sidewalks to existing sidewalks, to mark  
39 unmarked crosswalks, and to make conforming amendments; to amend the  
40 Department of Transportation Establishment Act of 2002 to require the District  
41 Department of Transportation ("DDOT") to submit to the Council a Vision  
42 Zero infrastructure progress report, to require DDOT to make certain  
43 information publicly available and easily searchable, to require DDOT to  
44 issue reports describing how certain capital projects implement projects or  
45 recommendations in the Multimodal Long-Range Transportation Plan,  
46 increase safety for users of modes of transportation other than motor

47 vehicles, increase equitable access to public transportation, or fulfill public  
48 safety goals or requirements of law or a federal grant, to provide that DDOT  
49 shall not issue a public space permit for certain projects unless the plans  
50 include installing new sidewalks, bicycle lanes or cycle tracks, or marked  
51 crosswalks and the applicant has met the requirements of previous permits  
52 and returned crosswalks and bike lanes to their pre-construction condition,  
53 and to provide for fines for each day that crosswalks and bike lanes are not  
54 returned to pre-construction condition; to amend the Bicycle and Pedestrian  
55 Safety Amendment Act of 2016 to collect information about the speed of  
56 motor vehicles involved in a collision or that receive moving violations, to  
57 require that DDOT adopts a transparent standard project delivery process, to  
58 require DDOT to update every two years the Multimodal Long-Range  
59 Transportation Plan and to require Council approval of the Multimodal Long-  
60 Range Transportation Plan, and to require DDOT to submit an incident report  
61 to the Council if a collision causes a death or serious injury; to amend the  
62 District of Columbia Traffic Act of 1925 to require all applicants for a new  
63 or renewal motor vehicle operator’s permit take a written test of knowledge,  
64 to reduce the speed limit on District roads classified by DDOT as local,  
65 collector, minor arterial, and principal arterial, to prohibit right turns when  
66 facing a red traffic control signal, and to require a traffic control signal or  
67 stop signs in all directions at all intersections between two or more streets  
68 classified by DDOT as local, collector, or minor arterial; to amend the  
69 District of Columbia Traffic Adjudication Act of 1978 to authorize towing,  
70 to a street where parking is not prohibited, of a motor vehicle that is  
71 obstructing a bicycle lane or crosswalk, and to authorize the Mayor to mail  
72 citations of certain moving and non-moving violations; to amend the District  
73 of Columbia Comprehensive Bicycle Transportation and Safety Act of 1984  
74 to create a Citizen Safety Enforcement Pilot Program; and to amend section  
75 2421.1 of title 18 of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations to  
76 authorize the Department of Public Works or the Metropolitan Police  
77 Department to tow or impound a vehicle that has more than 5 outstanding  
78 citations for exceeding the speed limit by more than 30 miles per hour or for  
79 overtaking a vehicle stopped for a pedestrian.

90 website a report describing how the proposed installation, modification, or removal of the  
91 statement will increase safety at a location identified as a high-risk intersection in the  
92 Multimodal Long-Range Transportation Plan approved by the Council pursuant to  
93 section 302(b) of the Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Amendment Act of 2016, effective  
94 October 8, 2016 (D.C. Law 21-155; D.C. Official Code § 50-2381, *et seq.*), via electronic  
95 delivery, excluding Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays” in its place.

96 (b) Section 301(e)(2)(D) (D.C. Official Code § 2-551(5)(B)(iv)) is amended by  
97 striking the phrase “30-days written notice, via electronic delivery, excluding Saturdays,  
98 Sundays and legal holidays” and inserting the phrase “30 days’ written notice, or 10  
99 days’ written notice if the District Department of Transportation has published on its  
100 website a report describing how the proposed installation, modification, or removal of the  
101 statement will increase safety at a location identified as a high risk intersection in the  
102 Multimodal Long-Range Transportation Plan approved by the Council pursuant to  
103 section 302(b) of the Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Amendment Act of 2016, effective  
104 October 8, 2016 (D.C. Law 21-155; D.C. Official Code § 50-2381, *et seq.*), via electronic  
105 delivery, excluding Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays” in its place.

106 Sec. 3. Section 6a of the Construction Codes Approval and Amendments Act  
107 of 1986, effective March 21, 1987 (D.C. Law 6-126; D.C. Official Code § 6-1405.01) is  
108 amended by adding a new subsection (d) to read as follows:

109 “(d) The Building Code Official shall not issue a permit required by the

110 Construction Codes for a project that will include 10 or more dwelling units unless the  
111 District Department of Transportation (“DDOT”) provides a report, published on

113           “(1) Ensures that pick-up and drop-off by private vehicles-for-hire and

118 building that is part of the project by motor vehicles, as that term is defined in section 8  
119 of An Act To provide for the annual inspection of all motor vehicles in the District of  
120 Columbia, effective March 15, 1985 (D.C. Law 5-176; D.C. Official Code § 50-1108),  
121 will not create unsafe conditions for users of the public right of way.

122           Sec. 4. The Priority Sidewalk Assurance Act of 2010 (D.C. Law 18-227; D.C.  
123 Official Code § 9-425.01 *et seq.*) is amended as follows:

124           (a) Section 2(a) is amended by striking the phrase “on at least one side of the street”  
125 and inserting the phrase “on the side of the street that lacks a sidewalk” in its place.

136 a report on the District Department of Transportation’s website certifying that a marked

139 crosswalk in the District Department of Transportation’s Design and Engineering  
140 Manual, the project plans shall include installation of high-visibility crosswalk markings  
141 or an elevated crosswalk

143                   (1) The lead-in language is amended by striking the phrase “constructing new  
144 sidewalks.” and inserting the phrase “constructing new sidewalks or crosswalks.” in its  
145 place.

147 sidewalk no less than 60 days before construction is scheduled” and inserting the phrase

170 Transportation Plan; and

171 “(D) Decrease the speed of motor vehicles;

172 “(2) A description of and the expected delivery date for all projects  
173 listed in the Transportation Plan, or projects that implement a recommendation in the  
174 Transportation Plan, for which funds have been allocated in the capital improvements  
175 plan (“CIP”).

176 “(3) For each project or recommendation listed in the Transportation Plan  
177 that is funded in the CIP at least 2 years after the current fiscal year, a description of  
178 interim measures that will be installed during the following fiscal year to provide an

179 impact, measured by the factors listed in paragraph (1), substantially similar to the project  
180 or recommendation; and

181 “(4) For any project that is not funded in the CIP, or any  
182 recommendation in the Transportation Plan for which there is no funded project that  
183 would implement the recommendation, a detailed description of why the project or  
184 recommendation was not funded, including for each project or recommendation that is  
185 not funded:

186 “(A) An analysis of the factors listed in subparagraph  
187 (A);

188 “(B) An explanation of how funding or not funding the project or  
189 recommendation would make the allocation of capital funds to DDOT more equitable  
190 across all 8 wards; and

191 “(C) A description of any projects funded in the CIP,  
192 or current DDOT policies, that provide an impact, measured by the factors listed in  
193 subparagraph (A), substantially similar to the project or recommendation.”.

194 (b) Section 5 (D.C. Official Code § 50-921.04) is amended as follows:

195 (1) Subsection (a)(5) is amended as follows:

196 (A) Subparagraph (A) is amended by striking the phrase “; and” and  
197 inserting a semicolon in its place.

198 (B) Subparagraph (B) is amended by striking the semicolon and  
199 inserting the phrase “; and” in its place.

200 (C) A new subparagraph (C) is added to read as follows:

201 “(C) Maintain a webpage that makes publicly available and easily

202 searchable:

203 “(i) All data the Mayor is required to collect pursuant to  
204 sections 101 – 106 of the Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Amendment Act of 2016,  
205 effective October 8, 2016 (D.C. Law § 21-155; D.C. Official Code § 50-1951.01 – § 50-

207 “(ii) Data in the Department of Health’s annual Trauma  
208 Registry report;

209 “(iii) All data collected by the Mayor measuring the speed of  
210 motor vehicles, including the time, date, and location on which the data was collected;  
211 provided, that the data shall be disaggregated and anonymized before it is made publicly  
212 available.”.

213 (2) New subsections (a-1) and (a-2) are added to read as follows:

214 “(a-1) The Project Delivery Administration shall not construct a capital project  
215 pursuant to subsection (a)(1)(D) if the project will require any reconstruction, major  
216 repair, or curb and gutter replacement on a segment of road or sidewalk unless DDOT has  
217 published a report on its website describing how the project:

218 “(1) Implements a project or recommendation listed in the Multimodal Long-  
219 Range Transportation Plan approved by the Council pursuant to section 302(b) of the  
220 Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Amendment Act of 2016, effective October 8, 2016 (D.C.  
221 Law 21-155; D.C. Official Code § 50-2381, *et seq.*) (“Transportation Plan”);

223 vehicles, as that term is defined in section 8 of An Act To provide for the annual  
224 inspection of all motor vehicles in the District of Columbia, effective March 15, 1985

226 “(3) Increases equitable access to public transportation by furthering  
227 Transportation Plan’s goal of 50% of all commuter trips by public transportation by  
228 2032; provided, that the report shall describe whether the project improves access to  
229 transit in an area identified as a transit priority need area in the Transportation Plan;

230 “(4) Fulfills a public safety goal of the District of Columbia; or

231 “(5) Fulfills a requirement of law or a federal grant.

232 “(a-2) The Operations Administration shall not approve a request for or issue a  
233 permit pursuant to subsection (a)(3)(E) if the project will require any reconstruction,  
234 major repair, or curb and gutter replacement on a segment of road or sidewalk unless:

235 “(1) The project plan includes:

236 “(A) For a road segment that lacks a sidewalk on the side of  
237 the street where the project for which a permit is requested will occur, installation of a

240 direction and is on the same side of the street as the new sidewalk;

242 Recommended Bicycle Network in the District of Columbia’s Multimodal Long-Range  
243 Transportation Plan, installation of a new protected bicycle lane or cycle track and a  
244 connection to an existing bike lane if there is an existing bike lane within 1/10 of one  
245 mile of either end of the new protected bicycle lane or cycle track; provided that, DDOT  
246 may waive this requirement if DDOT makes a showing that construction of a protected  
247 bicycle lane or cycle track on the road segment will begin during the period during which

248 the permit requested pursuant to subsection (a)(3)(E) is valid, or within 6 months of the  
249 expiration of the permit requested pursuant to subsection (a)(3)(E); and

250                   “(C) For a road segment that includes a crosswalk, as that term is  
251 defined in 18 DCMR § 9901.1, that is not marked, a marked crosswalk, unless the  
252 Director certifies that a marked crosswalk would be unsafe for pedestrians; provided, that

287 DCMR § 2405.7.

288           “(c) A photograph taken with the app shall indicate the time and location that the  
289 photograph was taken.

290           “(d) A photograph and the accompanying information submitted through the app  
291 shall be treated as a notice of infraction issued pursuant to title III of the District of  
292 Columbia Traffic Adjudication Act of 1978, effective September 12, 1978 (D.C. Law 2-  
293 104; D.C. Official Code § 50-2303.01 *et seq.*).

294           “(e)(1) The Department shall develop a pilot training program for up to 10  
295 residents of each ward that shall provide training in:  
296                           “(A) Bicycle and pedestrian safety;  
297                           “(B) Laws, regulations, policies, and best practices related to  
298 issuing notices of infraction for parking violations;  
299                           “(C) Proper use of the app; and  
300                           “(D) Conflict resolution techniques.  
301           “(2) The Department shall provide 60 days for District residents to apply  
302 to participate in the training program.  
303           “(3) If more than 10 District residents in each ward apply to join the  
304 training program, the Department shall choose 10 residents from each ward by lottery.  
305           “(f) If the Department determines that a resident has successfully completed the  
306 training program described in subsection (e) of this section, the Department shall provide  
307 the resident with access to the app.  
308           “(g) Anyone who knowingly submits false information through the app, or who  
309 provides anyone not authorized by the Department with access to the app, shall be subject  
310 to a civil fine of up to \$100.  
311           “(h) One year after the Department ends the pilot training program created  
312 pursuant to subsection (e), the Department shall transmit a report to the Council  
313 describing:  
314                           “(1) The number of District residents trained pursuant to subsection (e) of

316                           “(2) The number of District residents provided access to the app pursuant

317 to subsection (f) of this section;

318 “(3) The number of notices of infraction documented through the app;

319 “(4) The number of notices of infraction documented through the app that

323 “(6) Recommendations for improvements to or expansions of the Citizen  
324 Bike Safety Enforcement Pilot Program.”.

337 semicolon in its place.

341 “(11) The speed of the motor vehicle that committed the moving infraction.”.

342 (c) A new section 301(c-1) is added to read as follows:

343 “(c-1) The Complete Streets Policy shall describe a standard project delivery  
344 process for projects DDOT manages or constructs, pursuant to section 5(a)(1)(D) of the  
345 Department of Transportation Establishment Act of 2002, effective May 21, 2002 (D.C.  
346 Law 14-137; D.C. Official Code § 50-921.04(a)(1)(D)), or issues a permit for, pursuant to  
347 section 5(a)(3)(E) of the Department of Transportation Establishment Act of 2002,  
348 effective May 21, 2002 (D.C. Law 14-137; D.C. Official Code § 50-921.04(a)(3)(E)),  
349 including:

350 “(1) Descriptions of all project phases, including identification,  
351 planning, construction, and operation;

352 “(2) A chart listing all projects DDOT manages or constructs, pursuant  
353 to section 5(a)(1)(D) of the Department of Transportation Establishment Act of 2002,  
354 effective May 21, 2002 (D.C. Law 14-137; D.C. Official Code § 50-921.04(a)(1)(D)), or  
355 issues a permit for, pursuant to section 5(a)(3)(E) of the Department of Transportation

363 Multimodal Long Range Transportation plan as adopted in , and other DDOT plans"

365 "Sec. 302. Multimodal Long-Range Transportation Plan.

366 "(a) By September 30, 2020, and every two years thereafter, the Mayor shall  
367 submit to Council a Multimodal Long-Range Transportation Plan that includes:

368 "(1) A plan to ensure that by 2032, 50% of all commuter trips in all wards are  
369 on public transportation and an additional 25% of commuter trips in all wards are by a  
370 mode of transportation other than motor vehicle;

371 "(2) A plan to ensure equitable access to public transportation in all wards,  
372 including a list of transit priority need areas that DDOT has identified as having a  
373 below average transit access rating;

374 "(3) A list of streets on, or Metrobus lines for which, DDOT plans to  
375 designate a vehicle travel lane for use exclusively by public transportation, including at  
376 least one street in, or Metrobus line that serves, each ward;

377 "(4) A list of high-risk intersections DDOT has identified as having an above  
378 average number of crashes leading to a death or serious injury in the previous two years,  
379 or that DDOT certifies as being at high risk of a crash that could lead to death or serious  
380 injury in the future;

381 "(5) Any elements the Council, in an approval resolution for the current plan,  
382 has directed DDOT to include.

383 "(b) The Council shall, by resolution, approve or disapprove the plan; provided,  
384 that if the Council does not pass a disapproval resolution within 60 days, the plan shall be

385 deemed approved.

386 “(c) Until the Council approves the first plan submission required by subsection (a),  
387 the Multimodal Long-Range Transportation Plan published by the District Department of  
388 Transportation on October 21, 2014 is deemed approved by the Council.

389 “(d) For purposes of this subsection, the term:

390 “(1) “Public transportation” means any publicly owned or operated  
391 commercial vehicle, including DC Circulator, DC Streetcar”, MetroAccess, Metrobus, or

393 “(2) “Transit access rating” means a neighborhood’s average transit score,  
394 using the formula available on [www.walkscore.com](http://www.walkscore.com), or another formula that DDOT has  
395 created.

396 “Sec. 303. Incident report required.

397 “Within 30 days of a collision, as that term is defined in section 2(3) of the District  
398 of Columbia Traffic Act of 2915, approved March 3, 1925 (43 Stat. 1119; D.C. Official  
399 Code § 50-2201.02(3)), that causes a death or serious injury, the District Department of  
400 Transportation (“DDOT”) shall transmit to the Council and publish on its website an  
401 incident report describing:

402 “(1) Interim design elements that, after the collision, DDOT has installed at  
403 the site of the collision;

404 “(2) Permanent or interim design elements that DDOT plans to install at the  
405 site of the collision; and

406 “(3) Whether the site of the collision is identified as a high-risk intersection  
407 in the Multimodal Long-Range Transportation Plan approved by the Council pursuant to



408 section 302(b).”.

409           Sec. 8. The District of Columbia Traffic Act, 1925, approved March 3, 1925 (43  
410 Stat. 1119; D.C. Official Code § 50-2201.01 *et seq.*), is amended as follows:

411           (a) Section 7(a)(1)(B)(i) (D.C. Official Code § 50-1401.01(a)(1)(B)(i)) is  
412 amended by striking the phrase “An examination of the applicant’s knowledge of the  
413 traffic regulations” and inserting the phrase “A written examination, that shall not be  
414 waived for any reason, measuring, for all applicants for a new or renewed motor vehicle  
415 operator’s permit, the applicant’s knowledge of the traffic regulations” in its place.

416           (b) Section 9(a) (D.C. Official Code § 50-2201.04(a)) is amended by striking the  
417 phrase “under the authority of this act.” and inserting the phrase “under the authority of  
418 this act; provided, that no vehicle shall be operated at a rate of speed greater than 20  
419 miles per hour on a street classified by the District Department of Transportation as local,  
420 collector, or minor arterial; and provided further, that no vehicle shall be operated at a  
421 rate of speed greater than 25 miles per hour on a street classified by the District  
422 Department of Transportation as a principal arterial.” in its place.

423           (c) A new section 9e is added to read as follows:

424           “Sec. 9e. Traffic control at intersections.

425           “(a) A motor vehicle operator shall not make a right turn when facing a red traffic  
426 control signal.

427           “(b)(1) At all intersections between two or more streets classified by the District  
428 Department of Transportation as local, collector, or minor arterial, the intersection shall  
429 be controlled by a traffic control signal or stop signs in all directions.

430           “(2) The Mayor may install alternate traffic controls, that do not comply with

431 subsection (a), at intersections between two or more streets classified by the District  
432 Department of Transportation as local, collector, or minor arterial if the District  
433 Department of Transportation has published on its website a report describing how the  
434 alternate traffic controls provide safer conditions for users of modes of transportation  
435 other than motor vehicles, as that term is defined in section 8 of An Act To provide for  
436 the annual inspection of all motor vehicles in the District of Columbia, effective March  
437 15, 1985 (D.C. Law 5-176; D.C. Official Code § 50-1108).”.

438         Sec. 9. The District of Columbia Traffic Adjudication Act of 1978, effective  
439 September 12, 1978 (D.C. Law 2-104; D.C. Official Code § 50-2301.01 *et seq.*) is  
440 amended as follows:

441         (a) Section 303(c-1) (D.C. Official Code § 50-2303.03(c-1)), is amended by  
442 striking the phrase “When a violation is detected by an automated parking enforcement  
443 system, the Mayor shall” and inserting the phrase “When a violation is detected by an  
444 automated parking enforcement system, when the operator of a motor vehicle leaves the  
445 site of a violation before personal service or service by affixing the notice to the vehicle  
446 can be effectuated, or when evidence of a violation is transmitted pursuant to section  
447 4a(b), (c), and (d) of The District of Columbia Comprehensive Bicycle Transportation  
448 and Safety Act of 1984, effective March 16, 1985 (D.C. Law 5-179; D.C. Official Code §  
449 50-1601 *et seq.*), the Mayor may” in its place.

450         (b) Section 505 (D.C. Official Code § 50-2201.21) is amended by striking the  
451 phrase “a vehicle conveyance fee.” and inserting the phrase “a vehicle conveyance fee;  
452 provided, that a vehicle that is obstructing a bicycle lane or crosswalk may be towed and  
453 conveyed to any street where parking is not prohibited, pursuant to 18 DCMR § 2421.1.”

454 in its place.

455           Sec. 10. Section 2421.1 of Title 18 of the District of Columbia Municipal  
456 Regulations is amended by striking the phrase “Any unattended vehicle found parked in  
457 violation of any traffic regulation, except overtime parking of less than twenty-four (24)  
458 hours, may, by or under the direction of a member or members of the Metropolitan Police  
459 force or employees of the Department of Public Works” and inserting the phrase “Any  
460 unattended vehicle found parked in violation of any traffic regulation, except overtime  
461 parking of less than twenty-four (24) hours, or an unattended vehicle that has more than 5  
462 outstanding citations for violations of 22 DCMR § 2200.12 or § 2221.5, may, by or under  
463 the direction of a member or members of the Metropolitan Police Department or  
464 employees of the Department of Public Works” in its place.

465           Sec. 11. Fiscal impact statement.

466           The Council adopts the fiscal impact statement in the committee report as the fiscal  
467 impact statement required by section 4a of the General Legislative Procedures Act of  
468 1975, approved October 16, 2006 (120 Stat. 2038; D.C. Official Code § 1-301.47a).

469           Sec. 12. Effective date.

470           This act shall take effect following approval by the Mayor (or in the event of veto  
471 by the Mayor, action by the Council to override the veto), a 30-day period of  
472 congressional review as provided in section 602(c)(1) of the District of Columbia Home  
473 Rule Act, approved December 24, 1973 (87 Stat. 813; D.C. Official Code § 1-  
474 206.02(c)(1)), and publication in the District of Columbia Register.
