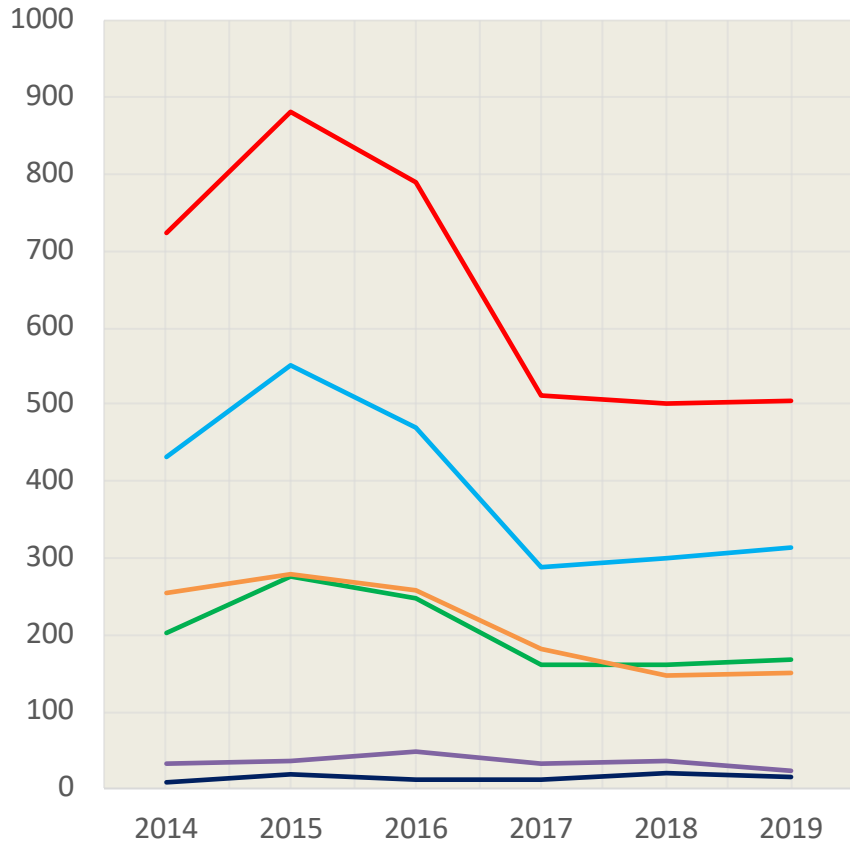

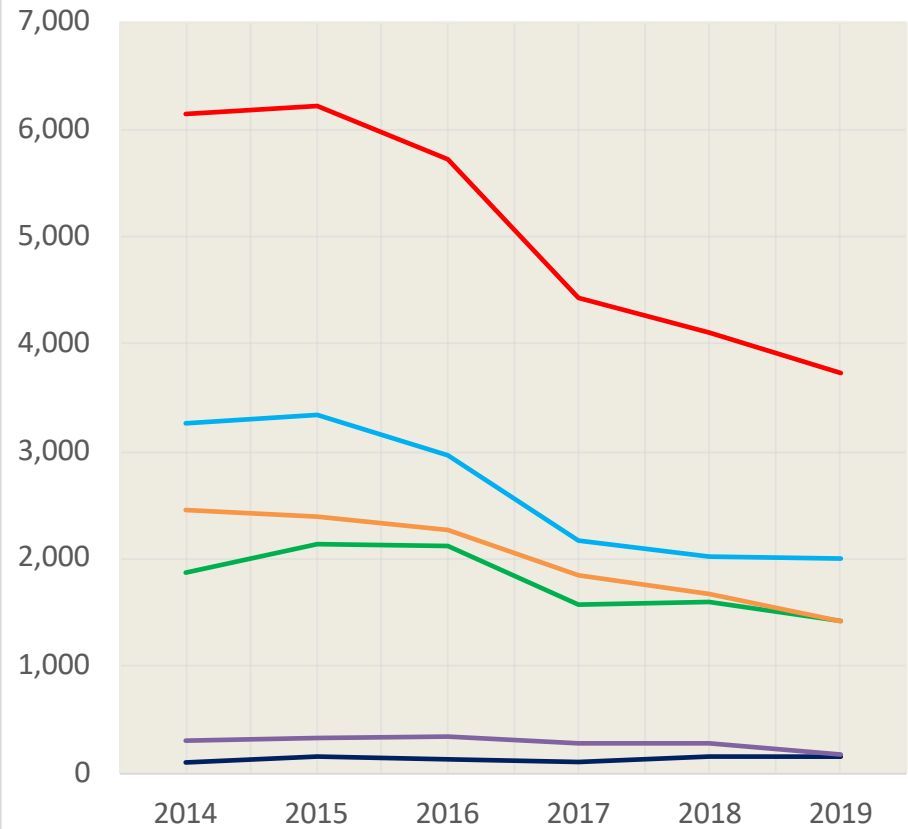

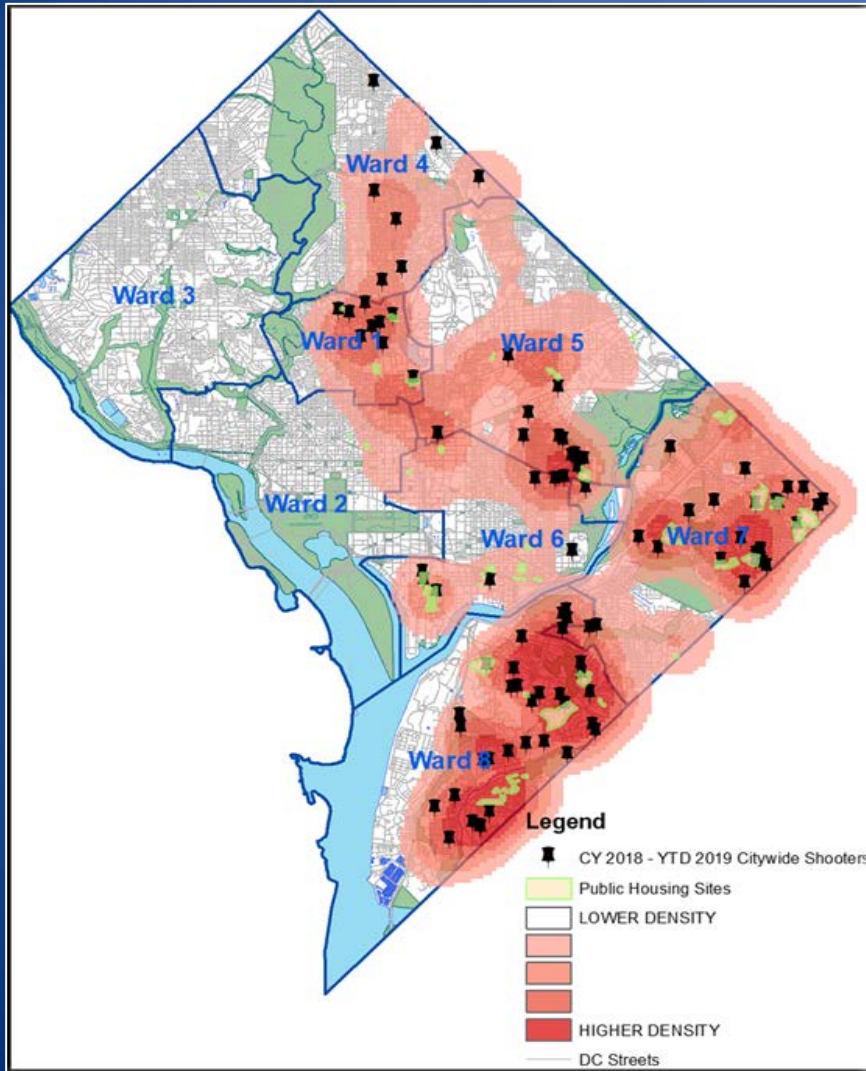

# ATF Data: Where do guns come from?

## Key Takeaways:

- By far, Virginia (599) is the largest annual source of firearms recovered in the District, with Maryland (179) a distant second
- On average, the “time to crime” from purchase for a gun in the District is nearly 10 years

3. **Tripled Funding for Violence Interruption Programs, Extended MPD Senior Police Officer Program**
