## CMETrust Kenya Field Representatives Report April 2014 - March 2015

#### **Activities:**

Every single year brings itself with amazing events in our calendar. 2014/2015 has not been an exception.

In the last few months we have seen the organization holding successful holiday programs, opening up a new office, hosting distinguished guests including our board members as well as recruiting 20 new scholars who will represent us in different parts of the country.

We have to say, despite a few challenges, 2014/2015 has been the best year so far in terms of achieving new facilities, improving efficiency and effectiveness in our operations.

Below is a list of other exciting activities that took place from April 2014 to date:

## 1st Term Holiday Program 14.04.2014 - 19.04.2014

April saw the scholars engage in a very interesting activities including introduction to entrepreneurship skills, life skills, swimming, clean up amongst others. But the highlight was the presence of CMETrust volunteers Jodie Hewson and her boyfriend Rob who took time from their travels to undertake what would be a very successful *Fill our Yearbook* campaign.

Jodie and Rob joined the scholars for the whole week whereby they interacted, took photos and videos and had a great time with the alumni and scholars. They also shared their experiences in terms of volunteerism and giving back. All in all, the scholars seemed very excited to have them here and we believe that's the same feeling Jodie and Rob had when they left to go back to Canada.

#### Mathare Office Development 01.05.2014 - 10.09.2014

After almost seven years of operations, the CMETrust fraternity thought it necessary to finally have an office that the Kenya Field Reps and other stakeholders can use for effective and more efficient operations. The office was also needed to provide more credibility and presence in bid to creating new partnerships and networks.

The office took almost four months to construct and it was fully functional by early September 2015. Since then we have seen the office slowly but surely develop as the main centre for all of our operations, received guests from far and wide, provided a dropping point for all the secondary scholarships as well as provided safe and reliable space for our alumni to meet, interact and use electronic devices.

For us this was a very great step in the right direction. We would like to point out that it would have been especially very difficult to recruit a 3<sup>rd</sup> field rep earlier this year if we didn't have this facility.

## 2<sup>nd</sup> Term Holiday Program 11.08.2014 - 16.08.2014

In August, we had a very dynamic list of guest speakers. The week was kick started by Michael Njoroge, Managing Director, Multi-Link Group Ltd who talked about how to start a small business. He talked about his challenges and successes in pursuit of his entrepreneurial career.

The second day was led by Roselyn Nyakundi, program coordinator of Hope Worldwide. Roselyn happens to be one of the few guest speakers who have visited our scholars a number of times. She delved into the issue of sexuality, sexual identity as well as gender challenges and how to overcome them. Thursday saw us welcoming Paul Kimotho, a senior partner with Robson & Harris Advocates. Paul talked about his journey from an office messenger to holding a Masters Degree in Law; the hard decisions he had to make including leaving his young family back to go for further studies in Britain, the feeling of loneliness associated with living in a foreign land as well as the moment he was offered a good job and he refused due to his values and courage.

Michael Murungi, a senior policy analyst with Google Africa, graced us with his presence. He talked about his background and how he finally came to be a lawyer who specialized on cyber security. He also talked about leaving a very plum job as a CEO of a big government department to join a less privileged position at Google.

Lastly, our scholars visited Rescue Dada – a children's home that takes care of vulnerable and orphaned girls from all over the country. The scholars helped to clean, wash, cook and play with the kids at the orphanage. This was part of the giving back philosophy that CMETrust believes in and promotes highly.

## 3<sup>rd</sup> Term Holiday Program 01.12.2014 - 22.12.2014

This December was very unique – we had the board well represented by the very able Victoria Sheppard, president, Consuelo van Beek, vice president and Heather Arnold, Treasurer. The board members joined us two days after our holiday programs had begun.

This week the scholars had the privileged to have amazing speakers including Jonathan Wasonga, a mentor and youth leader, Christine Stenton, a Canadian undertaking masters degree at Carlton University, Timothy Kamau a specialist on career development as well as Aisha Fariz, a seasoned engineer. All their

presentations centred around the issue of self-discipline, confidence, setting smart goals as well working hard towards an individual's dreams.

After a great meeting with the board, we came up with a final list of items to be done before they left back to Canada. Amongst the items agreed upon included meetings with KCITI, Canada High Commission, alumni, parents, and scholars amongst others. We also agreed to pursue engagement with Rotary. We also agreed to organize a walk-a-thon to be combined with official office opening ceremony.

#### School Search Trip - 28.01.2015 - 30.01.2015

After a thorough evaluation of our partner schools, we realized that one of the girls school was not doing justice to our partnership. We had a few meetings with students about Iruma Girls after they had raised a few concerns. We also noticed an ignorance, unprofessionalism and lack of desire to succeed from the management when we visit the school early last year.

We brought the findings to the board and they agreed to support our proposal to look for another partner school.

Our trip took us to five schools both in Mwea and Chogoria towns in eastern province. The schools that included Mugumo, Kiburia, Karoti, Makuri and Nguvyo, took us 2 days to visit. Our efforts were made easier when Charles decided to join us during the visit.

Few days after the visit, we held a meeting to discuss the outcome and we finally chose Makuri Girls as the best fit for a partnership. It had better resources, better performance, good learning environment and the management was very welcoming.

A total of 11 scholars have embarked on their studies at their new school.

#### 3<sup>rd</sup> Field Rep Interviews 05.02.2015 - 28.02.2015

After a not so successful PSS program field rep recruitment campaign late last year, we took the initiative to restart the process with a bit of twist. Benedict and Titus with help from Charles started talking to their close friends who they thought had the potential to add value to the very demanding and dynamic post secondary program.

The interested candidates finally applied who later got shortlisted to four candidates – three ladies and one gentleman. After a successful interview, one lady,

Monica Nyaga and the gentleman, Jonathan Wasonga emerged as the best fits for the new role. A second interview that now included the board members was carried out. The panel took almost a week to come up with their scores, opinions and concerns. We finally had the most promising candidate who has now gone on to become the third field rep primarily dealing with post-secondary and alumni issues.

Everybody felt that Monica Nyaga had the best qualities at that point in time. Since then, Monica has hit the road and she has kept herself busy by meeting the new and old alumni, working on alumni database, perusing the KCITI proposal as well as taking time to study how the wiki works.

## 2015 Intake process 17.02.2015 - 20.02.2015

This is an annual process that we use to identify and recruit new scholarship recipients. The well-attended event brought together approximately 40 prospective young men and women from Mathare who were looking for a chance to join our organization. The first day we initiated the application process by face-to-face interviews. The short-listing process took three days. Thereafter we embarked on the last phase of announcing the successful applicants and signing the parent consent forms.

We would like to confirm that we took in 20 scholars – 11 girls and nine boys. This was the toughest interview to date, as there were very many applicants who dropped their applications at our new office.

#### Post Secondary Scholarship Program 2014 - 2015

The PSS program has been largely very successful. We have now a total of five scholars who depend solely or partly to the PSS program for their studies.

Boniface Kitheka (Moi University) and Daniel Shiraku (Nairobi University) joined Ketty Olengalo (McEnsal School of Fashion Design), Jonah Oyieyo (Nairobi University) and Victor Ochieng (Rongo University) in the PSS program courtesy of achieving Direct Entry marks.

#### Goals:

- Create more local partnerships
- Undertake the annual CMETrust Walk-a-thon
- Develop a clear volunteer program
- Help the new field representative Monica Nyaga to settle in quickly
- Implement the KCITI proposal once approved by the board

#### **Conclusion:**

We have to say that we have had many successful years in the past but 2014-2015 stands out in many aspects. From getting a new office to having the founding board members in our midst, supporting our volunteers to realise fill our yearbook campaign and finally recruiting a new field representative. We can easily say this has been the most successful year in our history.

## 2014 Toronto Chapter Report

#### **Our Achievements in 2014:**

- In 2014, the Toronto chapter continued to strengthen its fundraising and outreach efforts with support from a small, committed group of volunteers
- In January 2014, our third annual Laughs for Learning Comedy Show event was successfully held at Comedy Bar in Toronto. The event was well attended and raised \$972.
- Chapter volunteers were able to raise \$3,000 in grants from the University of Toronto Rotman Business School and CIBC
- In April 2014, the chapter held its first annual Pub Night and silent auction at the Office Pub that raised nearly \$800. There were a great selection of prizes and roughly 60 people in attendance.
- The Toronto chapter hosted a booth at Timeraiser, a volunteer matching fair and silent art auction held at The Power Plant Exhibition Centre in May 2014. The event helped generate a list of prospective volunteers.

## 2014 Ottawa Chapter Report

#### Introduction:

This note summarizes activities of Ottawa's Chapter of CMETrust. This annual report 2014 is additional to a previous report outlining past (March 2013-April 2014) and future activities. Because of some overlap in timing across these two reports, the potential for double counting exists. The reader should consider this potential in reviewing and extracting information from this report. We have not included any information on the UOttawa Chapter's activities. Our repeated attempts to connect with new chairs of that university chapter have not been successful.

## Activities in the 2014 calendar year:

- A Pub Quiz Night at the Lieutenant's Pump on April 10 was a great success. This fundraiser featured three rounds of trivia, and grand prizes for teams in first, second and third places. The event raised \$1,166, including proceeds from bar sales generously donated by the Pump.
- Seven runners participated in the Ottawa Race Weekend in May 2014 and raised more than \$3,600.
- As in past years, we had a kiosk at the One World Film Festival held at Library and Archives Canada in September 2014. This year marked the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the film festival. To help increase visibility of CMETrust we decided to act as a festival sponsor, thanks to a \$250 donation from a volunteer. The CMETrust logo was amply displayed and we were entitled to a kiosk on two nights (Thursday 25 and Friday 26). We displayed some of our 2014 collection of Mathare in Focus photos at the event and promoted CMETrust's Help Us Fill Our Yearbook Campaign. We sold a few card sets. This was an outreach event.
- The sixth annual Mathare in Focus photo vernissage and launch of the Mathare in Focus Calendar, held in mid-November 2014, raised \$515 (including calendar sales). It was a micro version of our flagship fundraiser, held at Pressed Café, organized and put on by few volunteers. It featured the live performance of spoken word artist, ARray of Words (Greg Frankson). Tickets were \$10 (student) and \$15, and roughly 40 people were in attendance. We had decided to pursue the event despite limited lead time and volunteer effort and were therefore not expecting a huge turnout. Our target was to break even. Shortly after the event we learned that allegations of sexual misconduct had been

leveled at the spoken word artists, causing him to be expelled from three cities' spoken word collectives. Legal actions are ongoing. $^{\rm 1}$

## 2014 Post-Secondary Scholarship (PSS) Committee

In 2014, the PSS Committee worked in the following areas:

- Administration of the PSS fund;
- Development of the job description for the third field rep:
- Preparation of questions for the job interview process;
- Discussions with the field reps on using the PSS fund to support more high school graduates in a variety of post-secondary studies.

With regard to the personnel on the Committee – Brian Sheppard resigned as secretary in June 2014 and Anna-Marie Castrodale assumed that responsibility. In April 2014, Angela Khakali was elected to the Board of Trustees, taking over the role from Anna-Marie. Angela also made a trip to Nairobi in December and was able to meet with Titus and Benedict and some of the students during her tour of Mathare.

## **Administration of Scholarship Fund:**

The Committee continued to administer the scholarship fund support for self-sponsored students, Jonah Oyieyo, at the University of Nairobi and to Ketty Ajuma at the Mcensal School of Fashion Design. As well, funds for personal expenses for each semester were forwarded to three direct entry students – Victor Ochieng at Rongo University College and two new students, Boniface Kitheka at Moi University and Daniel Shiraku at the University of Nairobi. At the suggestion of Titus and Benedict, with one exception, all students now receive the same level of personal support at Ksh 30,000 per semester.

## **Fund-Raising:**

The Committee set a fund-raising goal of \$6,400 for 2014 but did not pursue any activities following a request from the Board to put fund-raising on hold. The Committee also felt it would be timely to have a discussion with the Board about integrating fund-raising for the post-secondary program into fund-raising for the Trust as a whole.

#### **PSS Program:**

In April 2014, the Committee was asked to give a full report and recommendation about the PSS Program to the CMETrust AGM.

Based on the experience of administering the program for four years and working with Titus and Benedict, the Committee had come to the following conclusions:

- The third field rep needs to be in place to implement and administer a revised PSS Program;
- There needs to be a clear structure so that both students and staff understand how the program works and students can apply for support;

- Students in post-secondary environments may need additional personal support;
- Based on discussions with the field reps, the Committee expects that going forward, post-secondary support will go high school graduates who receive direct entry to university and to graduates qualified for technical courses such as those offered at an institution like KCITI.

From January to August 2014, the Committee continued to work with the field reps and the Board on finalizing the job description for the new third field rep. In July 2014, the Committee participated in a Skype call with Titus and Benedict and Board members to review the proposed job description and work plan for the new field rep and made further revisions as a result of this call.

In October, the Committee developed a two-page document to be used in the interviews with the prospective candidates for the field rep position. Also in October, with the assistance of the communications teams, the Committee sent out its first "Newsflash" to donors. The purpose was to keep in touch with our donors and give them a look at the achievements of the students they were supporting with their donations.

#### Conclusion:

The Committee looks forward to the further development of the PSS program following the hiring of the third field rep in 2015.

- 11. Interest and Bank charges include Monthly fees on our RBC account (\$3.75/month), other bank fees associated with transactions made above the limits set on our community account, and a \$45 fee every time we transfer funds to Kenya.
- 12. Office supplies and other expenses include a printer, ink, telephone costs for regular calls from Canada to Kenya, postage, accounting software, donor relations software, Skype premium fees, and webmail account expenses.
- 13. Fundraising Expenditures are expenses associated with putting on fundraising events by CMETrust Chapters. Please note that some expenses related to fundraising events in 2014 may have been incurred in 2013 or 2015 and therefore are not accounted for in the 2014 financial report.
- 14. Merchandise expenses include the production of the Mathare in Focus Calendar, production of Mathare in Focus photo prints, framing and postage.
- 15. Other expenditures include: costs associated with the 2014 Annual General Meeting; room rental costs for bi-monthly board meetings; and, membership fees to Volunteer Toronto, Volunteer Ottawa and the Ontario Council for International Cooperation.
- 16. The surplus/deficit is the amount of revenue minus expenses for the year.
