#### **JANUARY 12TH PRESCHOOL OPEN HOUSE**

The evening opened with a brief presentation by local school administrators discussing kindergarten readiness and the importance of finding a quality preschool. #### **JANUARY 17TH 4TH ANNUAL MLK** "MAKING IT MORE THAN A **DREAM" CELEBRATION**

The Coalition Interfaith Outreach Committee celebrated the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. through an interfai service at First Presbyterian and Trinity Church in South Orange. The Reverend Sandye A. Wilson, Rector of the Episcopal Church of St. Andrew and Holy Communion in South Orange, spoke, along with other guests. Each year, we also urge residents to make the MLK holiday a day of involvement rather than just a day off from work or school and the Annual MLK Celebration is a wonderful way to do that! This year, in addition to bringing food donations for the MEND Food Pantry, sresidents had the opportunity to participate in a volunteer fair where they learned about volunteer service needs in our community.

#### **APRIL 21ST COMMUNITY DISCUSSION SERIES: I SIT WHERE I WANT**

The South Orange/Maplewood Community Coalition on Race was pleased to present a screening of the important film I SIT WHERE I WANT: The Legacy of Brown v. Board of Education on April 21, 2005 in the Columbia High School New Cafeteria. The film examined the state of race relations and social integration 50 years after the Supreme Court decision that outlawed racial segregation in public schools, by following a racially diverse group of high school students in Buffalo, New York as they attempted to integrate their lunchroom. After the screening, filmmakers Marco Williams and Whitney Dow led an assembly for the high school students during the day and a discussion for the community that evening, each discussion was followed by a question and answer segment. The four-session series was held every Thursday in May at the South Orange Middle School library. Discussions explored possible solutions for this major issue facing many school districts including our own. The series was offered free of charge with reading materials provided.

#### **JULY 3RD** TWO TOWNS IN HARMONY **WORLD PREMIERE: AN AMERICAN DALE: BECOMING A PLACE FOR ALL PEOPLE**

The Community of South Orange and Maplewood was proud to be one of only five communities in the United States, and the only one in New Jersey, selected for participation in this year's national Continental Harmony project. The South Orange/ Maplewood Community Coalition on Race actually wrote the grant in partnership with local musicians. The grant provided partial funding to commissioned composer, Janet Albright, to create an original, truly remarkable nine movement orchestral and choral piece to celebrate the uniqueness and diversity of our two towns. Over 250 musicians and singers, professional and amateur, performed the piece live on July 3, 2005. Local artists created and displayed fabric sculptures and murals on Flood's Hill and students from the local Middle and High Schools created a sculpture garden and art exhibit "An American Dale: Becoming A Place For All People". Several thousand residents gathered to participate in the community wide block party which included browsing for volunteer opportunities among the participating civic organizations or shopping the vendors who comprised the Two Towns Village for that day only. 2005 ANNUAL REPORT JANUARY 1, 2005—DECEMBER 31, 2005

On February 1, 2006 I ioined the South Orange/ Maplewood Community Coalition on Race as Executive Director. Having been in the non-profit field for many years

I had always hoped to find personal common ground with the vision of the organization that I would come to lead. The Coalition's vision for a "community that is truly inclusive and racially integrated—free of segregation in housing patterns and community involvement" could not have been closer to my own personal vision.

Not unlike many of the residents of South Orange and Maplewood, our decision to move to this community five years ago was also tied to this vision.

This year marks the 10th anniversary of the South Orange/Maplewood Community Coalition on Race. Over the past 10 years through the hard work and vision of dedicated staff, board leadership and volunteers our two towns have benefited from the many innovative programs that have helped to continue the open dialogue around race relations and the challenges and opportunities of living in a community that values racial integration. A friend of mine once asked "if this is such a great place to live why do you need a Community Coalition on Race". A look at the recent NY Times article discussing the Nebraska Governor's decision to sign into law a bill that calls for dividing the public schools into three racially identified districts; one black, one white, and one Hispanic is just one example of why!

Gary Orfield and Chungmei Lee of the Civil Rights Project at Harvard University remind us that non-integrated communities will always lead to unequal opportunities and will produce "both ignorance and damaging racial stereotypes in the minds of both the segregated and the segregator".

As we move into 2006, I look back over the past year and am astounded, as I usually am, by the enormous amount of energy that the South Orange/ Maplewood Community Coalition on Race has to put forth. The citizens of Maplewood and South Orange have much to be proud of. We could not do our work without your support. The passion and dedication that our volunteers bring to each event is shown by the caliber of the programming that we present annually and for which we have become nationally recognized.

We began 2005, with our Martin Luther

King Jr., Interfaith Outreach Program with Rev. Sandye Wilson as our guest speaker. In the spring, our Schools Committee presented a Columbia High School assembly and evening community forum entitled "I Sit Where I Want," in partnership with the Allstate Foundation and a New York based organization, Facing History and Ourselves. In addition, the Schools Committee hosted a four-week discussion group focusing on the Minority Achievement Gap. And, who can forget our July 3rd extravaganza, Two Towns in Harmony? In the fall of 2005, the Schools Committee presented a Parent Advocacy Workshop—Aim High, to assist parents in navigating the school system. The Neighborhood Association and Civic Life Committee, along with the Schools Committee, hosted our annual Preschool Open House for parents seeking the best environment to meet the needs their youngsters. We continue to support Two Town One Book- a community wide reading sponsored by our town libraries. On the following pages, you will read more about the public activities that have given us national, as well as local recognition.
