Hartford, CT- The Hartford Hurricane Relief Network has chosen 6 grassroots organizations to receive the funds from its various fundraisers. These awards are funded through several community based fundraisers that occurred between Sept 15th and November 1st. The "Puerto Rico Hurricane Relief Network" is comprised of the [CT Puerto Rican Agenda](#), The [Center for Latino Progress](#), [CICD Hartford Puerto Rican Day Parade](#), and The [San Juan Center](#), working in tandem with the [Hispanic Federation](#).

The total amount that will be dispersed is \$45,000. The awardees are:

Coqui Solar is elaborating community-based socio productive development alternatives through training and empowerment of its residents, with special emphasis on its youth and children.

Coqui Solar is a strong, community-driven organization in the town of Salinas that can use this support to rebuild and transform the community center. The funding would help the process of expanding the center and installing a photovoltaic system in the community center to meet its energy demand with solar power. The community center serves the community of El Coqui with over 3,000 people. The center is utilized for community activities, study, and tutorials area for children, and for summer activities during the months of June and July.

Coqui Solar is a perfect example of a community-led initiative that is working to transform the energy grid to renewable, community-centered microgrids that utilize the island's potential for solar power while empowering its residents and being a model for other communities to follow. The hurricanes have left millions without power and have exposed the failure of an archaic electrical grid and I believe this project is one of the models for the solution to that problem.

Proyecto Matria \$5000

Proyecto Matria is dedicated to aid to all the participants of the organization that are usually women who have experienced situations of gender violence, low-income



female heads of household and people from LGBT communities. Matria has participants in 15 towns in Puerto Rico including: Caguas, San Lorenzo, Aguas Buenas, Ponce, Villalba, Mayagüez, Isabela, Aguadilla, Cabo Rojo and San Juan. After the hurricane, Matria expanded its operations to serve other people groups and mainly families from rural areas. Matria is already supporting families from Comerío, Orocovis and Utuado. Also, families of the urban zone of Caguas. Currently, Matria is coordinating aid for Patillas, Bda. Morales de Caguas, Utuado (other neighborhoods) and Morovis. The list of villages will increase as we identify neighborhood leaders and receive additional donations.

Comedores Sociales de PR

This funding will go to directly feed the residents of Caguas, a community outside of San Juan that still needs a lot of help.

Comedores Sociales is a soup kitchen in Caguas Puerto Rico that has been making hundreds of meals every day since Maria hit. The funds will go to buy food and new cooking tools.

There will be serious problems with families being able to provide food over the coming months and this organization is helping hundreds of families stay fed and healthy. It is impossible to rebuild if basic needs aren't met, and this project will help feed the recovery efforts over the long term.
