Witness to Police Brutality on November 10, 2012

I was present in the metro bus shelter located at 3rd & Hennepin Ave, when I witness an extreme case of police brutality inflicted by policeman John Chamberlain, who arrived on the scene in car 160 at about 5:15 pm, Saturday evening.

I was sitting in the middle section of the bus shelter when I saw the incident unfold. The shelter has 3 sections, two are enclosed and one is open. I was in the open section. The incident occurred in the east section, the side facing Washington Ave.

There were 7 to 10 young people in this section. It was a mixed group of black & white and male & female. I could small marijuana coming from this section while I was waiting on my bus. After a while two of the young people left. They were white and one was male and the other was female. A moment or two after they had left a police cruiser pulled up in front of shelter populated by the young people. The cruiser had its headlights and the spot light directed at the youths. A policewoman was driving and a male officer was the passenger. The policewoman, Sherry Appledorn, was the first to enter the shelter and the male officer, John Chamberlain, was behind her. Officer Chamberlain entered with his Taser gun pointed at the youths. He was hostile and aggressive from the moment he entered the shelter. One of the youths stated that the lights were blinding him and if the officers would turn off the lights. Officer Chamberlain told him to shut up. The other youths said they had just arrived in the shelter and they hadn't done anything.

The male youth asked the officers again if they would turn off the lights because he couldn't see. Officer Chamberlain told that youth he was going to jail. The kid responded he hadn't done anything. Officer Chamberlain again told the youth to shut up and get up. The youth kept saying he hadn't done anything. The policeman handcuffed him very roughly and began to take the kid toward the police car. Suddenly the policeman stopped and slammed the kid's face on the right window pane of the shelter. The youth screamed when his face hit the window pane and said he hadn't done anything. I shouted to Chamberlain that I was taking pictures of what he was doing. The policeman pulled the youth off the window and turned him around and proceeded toward the police car. Officer Chamberlain stopped, turned around and forced the young man toward Hennepin Ave. The young man was complaining that the handcuffs were hurting him. The policeman then put the kid in a choke hold and took the young man down to the ground choking him. The kid was gurgling and saying he couldn't breathe. The officer continued to choke him very forcefully. I shouted again that I was taking pictures of what he was doing. The youth could barely speak but he was pleading for help and begged the policeman to stop. I told the officer to stop that he was hurting the young man. I shouted to the other officers present to stop Officer Chamberlain. I told them to stop the brutalization that was occurring but neither one of them did anything but watch. In fact, they looked very sad at what was going on. Another policeman was present, (Officer Baskin), and was watching Chamberlain

choking the kid on the ground. Then Officer Chamberlain pulled the young man up and took him to the car and put him in the back seat. Then unbelievably, Officer Chamberlain got in the back seat on top of the kid and starting beating him with his fist. The youth was screaming and pleading for help. He kept begging for someone to help and stop Chamberlain. The policeman continued punching the kid in the back seat of the car. I continue to beg the other officers to stop him. I said this was police brutality and was uncalled for. I told them I was going to report this to the NAACP, the newspapers, the TV stations, and the police department. I told them Chamberlain's behavior was uncalled for and he didn't deserve to be a policeman. I shouted that Chamberlain had lost control of himself and was hurting that young man. I continue to plead to the police officers to stop Officer Chamberlain. Officer Appledorn came toward me and said she had called her Supervisor and reported the incident. She said the Supervisor was coming to the scene. I told Officer Appledorn my bus would be arriving soon and I would have to leave. The officer told me if I missed my bus she would give me a ride home.

Again I was astounded by Chamberlain's behavior. He had got off the young man and pulled him out of the car. He stood the young man up and slammed his face on the roof of the police car. The kid was handcuffed and screaming. Chamberlain then took the car door and slammed it against the young man's body several times. Chamberlain had gone berserk! It was unbelievable. If one had not witnessed this incident it would be hard for anyone to believe a policeman would behave this way. Particularly when all these young people were doing was seating on the bench in the bus shelter when the police arrived. None of them were disrespectful to the police officers. There wasn't any bad language, any threatening gestures, no standing and shouting or anything out of line. They all had remained sitting on the bench. All they had said was they had not done anything wrong and they had just arrived at the shelter.

Chamberlain had put the youth back in the car and then got into the front seat of the car. Officer Appledom was talking to me when Chamberlain shouted to her, "let's go". She continued to talk to me and he shouted, "let's go to the jail". Shortly after he had said this, Sgt. Patricia Nelson arrived on the scene. She spoke with Officer Appledorn and then she approached me. She introduced herself as the Supervisor of the Precinct and asked my name. I told her and then I recounted what had occurred. She said Officer Appledorn had told her I had taken pictures and would I show them to her. I told her I had but the pictures were dark and you couldn't see anything on them but the lights of the police car and the street lights on Hennepin Ave. I told Sgt. Nelson that I had friends who were police officers and I knew that all policemen didn't behave the way Chamberlain had. I told her it was policemen like Chamberlain that gave the police force a bad name. I stated he had been completely unprofessional and didn't deserve to be a policeman. I told her it was situations like this that contributed to why the Black community did not trust and respect white policemen. I said Officer Chamberlain was a danger to society and should be removed from the police department because he was unprofessional and he carried a firearm. He had lost control of himself and went berserk in front of a number of people. She told me the incident would be investigated and thanked me.

CASE BACKGROUND

On November 10, 2012 at 1710 hours, Sgt. Patty Nelson responded to a call at 3rd Street South and Hennepin Avenue to conduct a supervisor's force review. After Sgt. Nelson spoke with Officers and witnesses at the scene she had some concerns regarding the force used by Officer Chamberlain. Sgt. Nelson called Lt. Glampe, Lt. Lund (Car 9) and Inspector Frizell and it was decided that Officer Chamberlain would finish his shift working as the desk Officer at the First Precinct.

Sgt. Nelson later submitted a memo to her Commander, Inspector Frizell regarding the force used by Officer Chamberlain. After a review of CAPRS report CCN 12-351609, and Sgt. Nelson's memo, Lt. Glampe determined that Internal Affairs would conduct an investigation to see if the actions of Officer Chamberlain violated MPD Policy or Procedure.

Lt. Glampe assigned this case investigation to me on November 13, 2012. On November 26, 2012, Mr. Woodrow Benford delivered a completed OPCR Complaint Form to the Internal Affairs Unit. Since I had made significant progress on the case I

continued with my investigation and included his original complaint form in this case file along with his statement. Lt. Glampe hand delivered a copy of the complaint to Michael Browne for review.

CASE INVESTIGATION

Officer Appledorn has been a patrol officer with the Minneapolis Police

Department since March of 1993; she currently works in the First Precinct as a

Middle Watch Patrol Officer.

Officer Baskin has been a patrol officer with the Minneapolis Police

Department since January of 1999; he currently works in the First Precinct as a

Middle Watch Patrol Officer.

Sgt. Patty Nelson has been a patrol officer with the Minneapolis Police

Department since September 1997; she currently works in the First Precinct as a

Middle Watch Sergeant.

Officer Chamberlain has been a patrol officer with the Minneapolis Police

Department since November 2006; he currently works in the First Precinct as a

Middle Watch Patrol Officer.

Sgt. P. Nelson's Memo

Please refer to the case file tab, (Memo from Sgt. P. Nelson) and read her entire memo that she wrote and submitted to Inspector Frizell on November 13, 2012 regarding her response and the information she gathered regarding the use of force by Officer Chamberlain. Also see the full police report, CCN 12-351609 in the case investigation.

VIDEO

I called SIC on November 13, 2012 and spoke with Officer Melissa Bjorklund and asked her to check all cameras in the area of 3rd and Hennepin Avenue South during the one hour time frame regarding the police call on November 10, 2012. Sgt. Nelson also called SIC the night of the incident and asked to preserve any camera footage. Officer Bjorklund said that nothing on the camera footage involving the incident was located. I obtained a copy of the video and have included it in the case file. I also included an e-mail in the case file from Officer Bjorklund regarding her help.

Sgt. Nelson noted in the CAPRS report that she interviewed Trokon Guar in her squad car the night of the incident with her MVR running. I made a request to the crime lab and obtained a copy of the MVR video with that interview. The sound quality makes it difficult to hear the interview. This appears to be an issue with Sgt. Nelson's DVR that recorded the interview. I included the copy of the video in this file.


PHOTOGRAPHS

the pictures as well as a printed set; both are in the case file.


PREVIOUS SIMILAR COMPLAINTS FOR OFFICER CHAMBERLAIN

Case 11-199, Sustained as 3 B level violations for Policy's 5-103 Use of Discretion, 5-105(9) Professional Code of Conduct & 5-105 Professional Code of Conduct(10,14&15). On 12/2011 Officer Jones reported that she and Officer Feucht pulled a woman over and placed her in the rear of their squad and had the MVR on and recording. Officer Chamberlain was called by them to administer a PBT. The woman was not cooperative and turned her head refusing the PBT. Officer Chamberlain climbed in the back seat of the squad and tried to physically force the PBT into her mouth. When she asked for Officer Chamberlain's name he said, "I'm not going to give you my f—king name right now because I don't f—king feel like it" there is other foul language used by him on the tape as well.



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Summary of Case Statements

Officer John Chamberlain Statement

For a significant portion of Officer Chamberlain's statement in IAU he referred to his CAPRS report and read directly from his supplement. I have attempted to summarize the 18 page statement for ease of reading without

eliminating the relevant content. The entire statement and CAPRS supplement are included in the case file for full review.

Officer Chamberlain was the passenger Officer and they arrived at the call location. Officers illuminated the bus shelter with the take down lights and side spot lights. He exited the car with his flashlight out as well.

When Officer Chamberlain approached the shelter he smelled marijuana but did not see anyone smoking. Officer Chamberlain saw one individual (later Id'd as Guar) sitting furthest away from him and he said Guar appeared to be "upset and enraged" that they had their spotlights focused on the group in the bus shelter.

When I asked Officer Chamberlain to explain what he meant by enraged he said, "He appeared very angry upon our arrival, that we were there, and that we had used out lighting". He further explained that his concern was that Guar was argumentative and that he began swearing saying, "Get those lights out of my fuckin face". Officer Chamberlain said Guar had watery bloodshot eyes when he shined his flashlight towards him to get a better look. I asked Chamberlain when he shined the flashlight on Guar if he could see him holding any weapon, narcotics or alcohol. Chamberlain he said he couldn't see Guar's hands and he couldn't remember where Guar's hands were.

Officer Chamberlain said Guar, "continued to uhh, to badger us about being there, umm, making comments about uhh, something that he was minding his own business or something along those lines. And it got to the point where uhh, after he was swearing, or I believed that he was, uhh, it would make the most sense to have him removed from that group".

Officer Chamberlain said Guar was "inciting" the group, that they were "disturbed" by Guar's conduct so he asked Guar to stand up but Guar didn't. Officer Chamberlain said, "I uhh, planted my MPD issued taser CED at him, using it in a red dot mode, pointing it towards his torso. I told him to stand up and to keep his hands where I could see them and then I told him to come back uhh, towards me outside of the shelter and to face away from me. He stood up - He seemed hesitant to do so, he was slow and lethargic in doing so. When he did stand up, he walked slowly towards me. Umm...His eyes were very wide, his umm, body language was tense, and I told him to uhh, face away from me a second time. He did not cooperate after I told him a second time to face away. It was my understanding, based on uhh, the fact that we were trying to conduct an official investigation while in response to a 911 call, that he was interfering with our ability to do this; based on his language. based on uhh, the tone and pitch of his voice - which was uhh, boisterous - it was certainly offensive by his use of words, and uhh, it appeared to be disturbing and inciting the other group members around there. Uhh...After that second time I had told him to face away and he didn't cooperate, it was at that point that I told him that he was under arrest and to face away. He didn't cooperate with my instructions to face away, so I pushed him with my free hand".

I asked Officer Chamberlain what happened next and he said, "I still had my uhh, taser in my hand. Umm...He took a step back and his eyes became uhh, wide and uhh, his profanities and boisterous tone continued. He was uhh, yelling indiscernibly – he was very loud, and uhh, I used uhh, verbal orders – which were

professional, but loud, to, "Turn around, face away, you're under arrest." Uhh...I then holstered my taser and I got him handcuffed."

Officer Chamberlain then tried to walk Guar to the squad car where he said Guar "violently" pulled his handcuffed arm away from Officer Chamberlain. Officer Chamberlain said he tried a wrist manipulation, wrist lock but it was ineffective.

Officer Chamberlain said Guar was loud and used profane language.

Officer Chamberlain said he thought Guar would escape custody, fight him or kick him so he used a conscious neck restraint to bring his resistance under control and bring him down to the ground. He said that Guar used a "loud verbal tirade" with him so he used his body weight to pin Guar to the ground and check his waistband for weapons. He considered this a custodial arrest at this point to prevent further criminal conduct.

Officer Chamberlain said "Officer Appledorn was still standing with other members of the group. Uhh...I was able to get him up on my own, umm, and with...with his own efforts. I asked him to stand up, not to make matters worse, and I walked him towards the squad car. Umm...He continued to struggle, I just used my strength and uhh, a brisk walk in order to walk him towards the car."

Officer Chamberlain said once he was at the squad he directed Guar to spread his feet and he said that Guar was "indignant" about this. "I uhh, uhh...told him a second time not to make matters worse, spread your feet apart, you're under arrest, and uhh, he didn't cooperate. Uhh...I, uhh, pinned his body between the squad car and my own, partially, just to...to maintain control of him while...while uhh, conducting a search of him".

Officer Chamberlain said that Officer Appledorn was still dealing with the rest of the group, "Then I, uhh, I told him to spread his feet apart in order to conduct a search. He did not uhh, cooperate with spreading his feet apart. I...I uhh, used my thumb directed towards his hypoglossal nerve - It's a pressure point technique directed about an inch underneath the jaw" I asked Officer Chamberlain why he did this and he said, "That was used to uhh, change his aggressive thought process and to get him to uhh, separate his feet for the search". I asked what happened next and he said, "After I had searched him umm, more thoroughly, umm, I then checked his hands and handcuffs for fit prior to uhh, physically pushing him into the car. He was resisting as far as not getting into the car – which I asked him to do".

Officer Chamberlain said it was a struggle to get Guar in the squad car and Guar was using his physical strength the keep from going in the car. Officer Chamberlain said he bumped his own head on the corner of the car. Officer Chamberlain said he believed Guar was trying to get out of the car, "At that point I then used a hypoglossal pressure point, uhh, in order to uhh, move his, uhh, involuntarily move his...his...his head and his body into the car and away from the exit door of the squad car". Officer Chamberlain said he used one of his legs to pin Guar into the vehicle, had one hand supporting the back of Guars head and used the other hand to apply the pressure point and was finally able to get Guar in the car.

Officer Chamberlain said he then spoke with Guar for a while and was attempting to ID him. Officer Chamberlain then made the decision to remove Guar from the car to retrieve an ID from Guar's pocket. Officer Chamberlain said as soon as he opened the car door Guar used his body weight to try and get out of the car.

Officer Chamberlain tried to use his body weight to keep Guar in the car.

Chamberlain said, "I then uhh, when I saw that those lesser attempts at using my strength were ineffective, I then used uhh, another conscious neck restraint to bring his level of resistance under control and to bring him back down to the ground".

Officer Chamberlain said that Baskin helped him get Guar back in the car and at that point Officer Appledorn walked up to the car. Officer Chamberlain said he was on his own for most of the incident. He said Officer Appledorn got in the back seat with Guar but he doesn't know what she was doing and that was the end of his dealing

with Guar.

I asked Officer Chamberlain when he first approached the bus stop if the other people in the bus stop were compliant and he said, "They didn't seem to be a...a threat to officers or our investigation". I asked Officer Chamberlain how Guar was then inciting this group and he said, "My...My word choice of saying "incited" was...What I was trying to describe was, they uhh, were...seemed to be responding to his verbal level of aggression, which was swearing and loud tone. It appeared to be more of a like, "Calm down man," kind of...kind of thing towards the...towards the AP".

I asked Officer Chamberlain to further explain when he decided to arrest Guar for Obstructing the legal process and the following conversation occurred: Q=Sgt. Chiodo, A=Officer Chamberlain

Q: Okay. Umm...So you decided to take this individual away from the group, and eventually you made the decision umm, to place him under arrest, umm, for

obstructing the legal process. Umm...What legal process of yours was he obstructing? I want a little more detail on that because...

A: Sure.

Q: at this point, he is the only one you're dealing with,

A: Mmm hmm (indicating yes).

Q: so is he obstructing you from dealing with him? I'm not clear on what...what you were doing. You...You said you didn't see anyone smoking marijuana when you came up,

A: Mmm hmm (indicating yes).

Q: you know, everything seemed to be okay. So what was your legal process he was obstructing?

A: That happened a bit...the...The obstructing the legal process was - My understanding of that was he was interfering with us to do our official duties. But the disorder...

Q: And how...How was he...what...How was he interfering? Because I'm...I'll tell you this – Officer Appledorn didn't have a clue that you were arresting this guy or for what, and he wasn't preventing her from doing anything. So, what was he preventing you, Officer Chamberlain, specifically from doing that would violate that law that he was obstructing the legal process? Your partner didn't even know why you arrested him. So, in your mind you had a reason, and it's not clear in here, so that's what I'm asking – What was that reason?

A: Sure. My reason for arresting him was for the disorderly conduct. It was for him facing his body towards me, his body being tense, him using profane language, the

tone and pitch of his voice, uhh, the uhh, uhh, the fact that we were there to investigate people smoking marijuana where he was located. If he didn't want to be a part of it, there was a shelter right next door which I believe had no persons inside of it - if he didn't want to be part of that group. He had that option, it's not like it was the only shelter. And I believe it was about 60 degrees out, I was wearing short sleeves.

I reminded Officer Chamberlain that he listed himself as a Police Victim of Disorderly Conduct in the CAPRS report and asked him if he was aware that Officers cannot be victims of this and he said, "In...In cases of...I...I believe that we can't be the victim of disorderly conduct as far as language. As far as physical aggression, I believe we...we may be able to be, or even obstruct at that level"

I reminded Officer Chamberlain that he used the words "enraged, verbal tirade and indignant" to describe Guar but also said he could not understand what Guar was saying other than to get the lights out of his "fuckin face". I asked him to describe Guar's actions and specific words that caused his arrest for disorderly conduct. Officer Chamberlain said Guars words were rude, profane and abusive. I asked again what the "angry" words and "enraged" and "badgering" actions were by Guar and Officer Chamberlain said he couldn't remember the words but Guar did use the word "fuck" and "bullshit" and that delivered the words in an "aggressive" way.

Earlier Officer Chamberlain said he remained professional with Guar during this encounter, I asked Chamberlain if he was raising his voice telling Guar to "Shut

up" or "shut the fuck up". Officer Chamberlain said he believes he said shut up when Guar used profanities. He said he yelled at Guar to match his level of aggression.

I asked Officer Chamberlain if Guar was upset from the onset of the call of was Guar getting upset at the events progressed. He believed that Guar was upset from the beginning of the encounter.

I asked Officer Chamberlain if at any point he shoved Guar face first into the glass but shelter. He said that he believed he used the bus shelter as a barrier to pin Guar's body against but he did not shove him face first into it.

I asked Officer Chamberlain when he first pulled his taser out and red dotted Guar, what was he attempting to do, was he hoping to gain verbal or physical compliance? Officer Chamberlain said he was hoping to gain voluntary compliance to have Guar step out of the shelter so he wouldn't have to go hands on or pass by the other people in the shelter.

I asked Officer Chamberlain if ever asked his partner for assistance or got on the air to ask for assistance dealing with Guar since he describes such a struggle and all the force that he had to use. Officer Chamberlain said he did ask his partner for assistance and looked at her for help and that she never assisted him.

I asked Officer Chamberlain if he ever had his hands around Guar's throat when he was in the back of the squad car and he said no. I asked Officer Chamberlain if he ever heard Guar scream, "Help! This officer's trying to kill me! He's killing me!"? Officer Chamberlain said he remembers him saying something like that.

I asked Officer Chamberlain what he was doing when Guar was screaming this and he said he thought he was shutting the squad door or trying to get him in the squad. He did not believe he was using force at that time.

I asked Officer Chamberlain if he ever had a strangulation hold on Guar and he said, "absolutely not. That's not what I used".

I asked Officer Chamberlain why he didn't call a supervisor to the scene immediately to report the force he used. He said that because Guar was so loud and it was attracting people he was going to go to a different location to report the force. He said he always reports force; he understands the policy and follows it.

I said to Officer Chamberlain, "your partner, Officer Appledorn, was standing outside of the squad talking to a witness, Officer Baskin was still there, umm, and you...Is it correct that you got on the PA several times, telling her to get in the car, you're going to jail?" He said he was saying, "Let's get out of this area" to her.

Officer Chamberlain said he remained professional and used appropriate force given the circumstances.

I told Officer Chamberlain that a witness described him as the aggressor that set the tone of the entire encounter and kept ratcheting it up by telling Guar to shut up, putting a taser red dot on him and that the witness actually described him as a berserk out of control cop. Officer Chamberlain said he was professional and used a loud tone of voice to take command presence; he didn't want to lose control.

I told Officer Chamberlain that the other officers at the scene did not get involved with the force, that they thought he didn't need any help yet he describes a pretty good struggle where he had to use his body strength several times along with

a conscious neck restraint several times while other officers did nothing. His response was that Officer Baskin showed up at a later time and he doesn't know why Officer Appledorn did not help.

Officer Chamberlain said, "Umm...Yeah. It was ...It was a concern of mine that after this...this incident happened, that uhh, neither Officer Appledorn or Sgt. Nelson asked me for my account of the situation. Uhh...It would have...I believe that I could have clarified my perception, my understanding, my reasons, uhh, for using force or for...for uhh, effectuating an arrest – if they would have asked me. I attempted to uhh, tell Sgt. Nelson my reason for using it, and she uhh, did not take my...did not...declined to take my, uhh, report of the force. Umm...Also, I think it's important, uhh...I've worked with Sherry for probably the better part of a year. Uhh...The night of this incident, uhh, she told me that she had federal court the following week for some force incident. The night before that, uhh, the Friday night before that, the 9th of November, she told me the same thing and indicated that she was under some pressure from this. Uhh...I believe that it's possible that if she's under this level of pressure, if she...she is...was not uhh, acting as she usually does, from what I've seen her".

Officer Chamberlain also mentioned a long list of his training qualifications which are on page 17 of his statement.

I asked Officer Chamberlain if he has had any problems with force or professionalism.

Officer Appledorn Statement

Officer Appledorn was working with her partner Officer Chamberlain on November 10th, 2012. Officer Appledorn was the driver officer when they responded to a disturbance call at 3rd Avenue South and Hennepin Avenue. They were responding to a group smoking in the bus shelter.

Officer Appledorn said the parking lot is not lit up very well so she drove into the parking lot and positioned her headlights to light up the bus shelter so she could see the people inside. She said that Officer Chamberlain turned on his spotlight on the passenger side and put the squad take down lights on as well.

Officer Appledorn said she walked into the shelter first followed by Officer Chamberlain who was standing behind her. She said that Trokon Guar started giving them a hard time about the lights, complaining that they didn't need them on. Officer Appledorn said she started joking with Guar because she did not want the other people in the bus shelter to start complaining as well. She said the others started chuckling; she said the next she knew Officer Chamberlain had his taser out and had the red dot on Guar's chest. She said she did not see him take the taser out and this caught her off guard.

When I questioned Officer Appledorn more about the original encounter with Guar she said he remained seated and he was just mad about the lights. She said he was not threatening towards officers. She also did not see him smoking any marijuana.

I asked Officer Appledorn if she carried a taser and she said "yes". I asked her if she pulled hers out and she said "no". I asked her if she felt the need to pull her taser out and she said "I didn't, no".

I asked Officer Appledorn what happened next. She said that Guar got upset and said that he wasn't doing anything wrong. She said Officer Chamberlain then came into her view and told Guar to stand up and that he was under arrest. She said Guar hesitated and again said he wasn't doing anything wrong. Officer Appledorn said she did not know what he was under arrest for and Officer Chamberlain did not communicate why he was arresting Guar.

Officer Appledorn saw Officer Chamberlain handcuff Guar and she thought he was going to walk him to the squad car so she continued dealing with the other people in the bus shelter. Officer Appledorn said that either just prior to Guar being handcuffed or during the process she looked over and saw Officer Chamberlain push Guar up against the glass in the bus stop. She also heard Officer Chamberlain yell at least once to Guar to "Shut up". She did not hear Guar use any type of derogatory language towards Officer Chamberlain.

Officer Appledorn said, "The next thing I know, I kind hear Guar yelling and I hear Chamber...Officer Chamberlain kinda yelling, and I look over to my right and they're kinda...they're kinda past the bus shelter to the...kinda to the right of the squad, but you know, kinda in front of it a little bit, and they're both on the ground and Officer Chamberlain is trying to put a, umm a, uhh, neck restraint hold on Guar." She is not sure what Guar and Officer Chamberlain were yelling at each other, she said their loud voices are what drew her attention.

Officer Appledorn went on to say that Officer Chamberlain had his arm around Guar's neck and used his body weight to pin him into his arm to apply pressure. Guar was still in handcuffs when they were lying on the ground side by side when this was occurring. Officer Appledorn then told the group to just sit there and she went over to Officer Chamberlain. She said he had not yet put him in a level three neck restraint to put Guar out yet. She said "Guar was yelling and you know, screaming and having a hard time over this, so I just told him to relax, you know, just relax, stop fighting with him". She said Guar relaxed and she was able to help get Guar up and walk him to the rear of the squad. Officer Chamberlain was searching Guar so she went back to the rest of the group.

Officer Appledorn said the group was now yelling and screaming about what was going on and they were mad at what Officer Chamberlain did. She said the group was saying, "He is choking him out". She said an older gentleman (later ID'd as Woody Benford) approached her and said he was videotaping the event. She said she was talking to Benford and he was walking up closer to the squad at this time.

Officer Appledorn's attention was drawn back to the squad at this point. She said since it was nice night she had the back windows of the squad down and she heard Guar yelling from the back seat, "He's trying to kill me!" She said the rest of the group began yelling at that point as well. She said, "So I look over, and Officer Chamberlain is like...uh...uh...in the back seat." She went on to say, "he was actually in the back seat on top of Guar, and uhh, he has both his...both his hands around Guar's neck, umm, in a strangulation hold."

I asked Officer Appledorn if he was using his actual hands and she said, "Yes".

I asked Officer Appledorn if she could have been mistaken at what she saw, that maybe Officer Chamberlain was doing a hypoglossal pressure point. I wanted to know if she was confident in what she saw. Officer Appledorn responded, "I am positive that he had his hands around his throat".

I asked Officer Appledorn what she did at this point and she said she went over to the squad and before she got there Officer Chamberlain pulled Guar out of the squad and was putting him in another neck restraint. The same as he did earlier when he was on the ground with Guar. She said Officer Chamberlain broke him down and then they went down to the ground. She then went over and told Guar to relax. She said Guar was yelling and screaming. She said Guar and Officer Chamberlain both stopped and she helped Guar get back up.

Officer Appledorn said she was trying to talk Guar into the squad car but he did not want to go. Guar kept yelling that Officer Chamberlain was going to kill him.

Officer Appledorn said, "So I go around to the driver's side, and against my officer's safety, as far as...I actually had to crawl into the squad, into the backseat. Umm...I get his...Guar's attention by tapping him on the shoulder and I basically tell him, I mean, like I said, I don't quote it in the report, something in regards to, Honey, you just...you gotta get in the squad and I'll get this taken care of. And it was enough that Guar drew his attention to me and he sat, umm, he sat back down. But I know before he sat back down, Officer Chamberlain was umm. Trying to close the squad door on him."

I asked Officer Appledorn why she went against her 20 years of patrol experience and Officer Safety and got in the back seat with Guar. She replied, "I

needed to diffuse the situation. Umm...It...It would have not gotten any better, and so I just...I...I just needed to get in there, diffuse it, and get him in there. And I figured it I was able to do that, hopefully he wouldn't turn on me in there, but I just wanted to avoid anybody else get...anybody getting hurt from the officers at this point".

Officer Appledorn then called for a supervisor over the air to respond to their location and then she went and spoke with the rest of the group.

I asked Officer Appledorn if at any point during the encounter she felt the need to use force on Guar or help Officer Chamber when he was using force and she said, "No I don't think I needed to. No". I asked Officer Appledorn if she should have called for backup or other squads to assist and she said, "Initially, no. I ...I...It was just a group supposedly smoking pot in the bus shelter".

I asked Officer Appledorn why she called Sgt. Nelson to respond to the scene and she said, "Force was used and she needed to be called out to the scene". I asked Officer Appledorn if she was upset when she spoke with Sgt. Nelson and she said, "Yes". I asked her why she was upset and she responded, "In my opinion, umm, I just thought it went a little too far. I, umm, I didn't see from my point, I didn't see why certain things were done. I didn't understand why certain things were done, and umm, I didn't think they needed to be done. And then hence, now it puts me into a situation where I...I'm not happy about."

Officer Appledorn said that when she waiting for the supervisor to respond she was outside of the squad car and was speaking with Mr. Benford. She said Mr. Benford was upset over Officer Chamberlain's actions. She advised him that she

called a supervisor and she asked him to wait until she arrived. She offered to give him a ride home if he missed his bus. While they were standing there Officer Chamberlain said several times that they were going to jail and on the PA system as well. She said she still had no idea what Guar was under arrest for and Officer Chamberlain never did tell her. I asked Officer Appledorn if Officer Chamberlain was aware of the fact that a supervisor was called to the scene and she said, "He should be, I did it over my...my portable radio. The squad radio was on". She said she just ignored his demands that they go to the jail.

Once Sgt. Nelson arrived they got Guar out of the backs seat and she unhandcuffed him and she asked him if he was injured or needed an ambulance. She said Guar had a mark on his eye and a red mark on his neck. Guar said that Officer Chamberlain put something against his throat. Officer Appledorn was trying to figure out what Guar was describing and thought it may have been an Asp. She did not see Officer Chamberlain use an Asp as any point.

Officer Baskin Statement

Officer Baskin was working Squad 110 alone on November 10, 2012. Officer Baskin went to assist squad 160 on the disturbance call at 3rd Avenue and Hennepin Avenue. When he arrived he said "I got out on the street and just walked up and, uh, didn't exactly seem like mayhem, but by the time I got there Officer Chamberlain was escorting, uh, Guar to his squad car. I was probably fifteen or twenty feet away from that, uh, I believe Officer Appledorn was over by the bus shelter so I just kind of followed Officer Chamberlain towards the car. I unlocked the door for him, uh,

and he got Guar in the back seat of the squad." He then went over to Officer Appledorn and asked if she needed anything.

At some point he said his attention was drawn towards the squad car. He said, "The whole time throughout this he was screaming, you know, extremely loud. I couldn't tell you what he was saying but just constantly screaming. Uh, and I think I was up by the bus shelter for a pretty good amount of time I might have even made contact with a witness – a Vietnam Vet that was up there and had a couple of words with him. Uh, nothing negative just I think he, you know, asked why I wasn't stopping Officer Chamberlain. I think he asked that a few times". It was shortly after this that he saw Officer Chamberlain getting Guar out of the squad car and there was a short struggle.

Officer Baskin said, "...it ended up being Officer Chamberlain kind of back peddling with Guar in some kind of neck restraint. They both went to the ground". He went over to them and Officer Chamberlain got Guar back up. He recalls Officer Appledorn go to the other side of the squad.

I asked Officer Baskin if he heard Guar screaming that Officer Chamberlain was trying to kill him and he said, "Yeah I think so, yeah". I asked if he ever saw Officer Chamberlain get in the back seat of the squad car when Guar was in the back seat and he said, "Yeah, I think it was the second time". I asked him if he could see what Officer Chamberlain was doing when he was in the backseat of the squad and he said, "No, I left, I went back towards the bus shelter".

I asked Officer Baskin if he knew what they people in the bus shelter were referencing when they asked him if he was going to do anything or stop Officer

Chamberlain. He said, "Well I think they just thought he was being excessive, you know". I said to Officer Baskin, "Like in the force he was using"? Officer Baskin responded, Yeah, yeah – I mean it's clear that that's what their objection was".

I asked Officer Baskin if at any point he felt like he needed to call for backup or needed to help restrain Guar. He said, "No, I didn't even feel like he needed my help". I asked if he heard Guar use any derogatory language or make any threats towards officers or say he was going to hurt them or kill them and he said, "No". He said Guar was screaming "bloody murder" the entire time and it was really loud.

Officer Baskin did not hear Officer Chamberlain use any racial or derogatory language towards Guar.

While Officer Baskin was at the bus shelter waiting for the supervisor to arrive he said, "I just kind of made sure that the rest of the crowd was cool and they were and, uh, you know hung out with Sherry for a little while, she was upset and I remember Chamberlain got on the PA once or twice and got out of his squad once or twice and just told Sherry let's go, you know, we're leaving".

Sgt. Patty Nelson Statement

On November 10, 2012 Sgt. Nelson was at the First Precinct and was the only Middle Watch supervisor working. Officer Appledorn asked her over the air to come to their location so she did.

Sgt. Nelson told me, "When I arrived I pulled up, uh, I was almost parallel with 160's car. I saw Officer Appledorn walking away from the squad car. Um, I saw Officer Baskin was out and Officer Chamberlain was in the squad car and then there was a group of people. Um, Officer Appledorn looked really upset so I walked over

to her right away to see if everything was okay cause I didn't know exactly why I got called over there and she just, um, she looked at me and said, 'he went too far. I can't even talk about it right this moment'. And that's when I realized she was mad but not hurt upset".

Sgt. Nelson said she asked Officer Appledorn what she meant and Officer Appledorn told her there were a bunch of witnesses and pointed towards the bus shelter. She let Officer Appledorn walk away and cool off at this point.

Sgt. Nelson said she spoke with several witnesses; there were six or seven in the bus shelter. She said Mr. Benford became the spokesperson for the group because he had the most detail. Sgt. Nelson relayed the following to me, "Uh, he provided quite a bit of details, he said that, uh, the squad had pulled up. They - that there had been a group in the bus shelter, the squad had pulled up and had their lights on, their take down lights and their spot lights and that the female officer, who was Officer Appledorn was talking to the crowd, telling 'em well hold on I'll take care of the lights in just a minute, I'm old, I have to see. Uh, and that the male officer who was Officer Chamberlain, when Guar, I think that's how we pronounced his last name, said something about can you get the lights out of my face. Officer Chamberlain went up to him and had his taser pointed at him and put his flashlight in his face and started yelling at him. When that happened, um, Officer Chamberlain still remained engaged with Guar, pushed him up against the bus shelter. He called it, um, yanking his hands behind his back and handcuffing him and then put a choke hold and took him to the squad car while he was handcuffed and in a choke hold".

After Mr. Benford told her the story he and two other witnesses demonstrated the choke hold that Officer Chamberlain used on Guar. Sgt. Nelson went on to say, "Uh, then they said, uh...Benford said when, um back at the squad car that there was a point when Chamberlain went back to the back seat to get Guar after he had already been into that squad car and had him in a choke hold again and that's when Officer Appledorn and Baskin had to go help". She said the witnesses told her at some point Chamberlain had Guar out of the backseat and in a chokehold again.

Sgt. Nelson then asked Officer Appledorn to give her a short statement of what happened to see if it would match up with the witnesses and it did. She did not ask for too many details but the stories were matching up regarding the force used by Officer Chamberlain. She did not ask Officer Baskin for too much detail because at that point she had determined, "A) I think we have an arrest that was unfounded and B) that I knew Officer Chamberlain was not gonna be going back out on the street that night because he was – for two reasons; because I thought that he, from what I had heard, may have used excessive force and second, because if his temper was this far out of control I didn't know if he'd have a chance to bring it back. I didn't want him to get in any other trouble".

Sgt. Nelson thought this was going to take awhile to straighten out so she had Officer Baskin take Officer Chamberlain to squad 110 and she went to squad 160 to speak with Guar. She said Guar cried for over ten minutes about his religious necklace that broke and she finally got him calmed down. She photographed the broken necklace and gave it back to him. She found out Guar did not have a phone

so she had him sit in the front seat of her squad, turned on the MVR and had him tell his side of the event.

This is what Sgt. Nelson recalled Guar telling her, "He said he had walked up right before the squad had got there. He was not part of the group that was smoking marijuana and when he got there the squad car was shining lights at him. He thought it was at him, so he asked 'em to move the lights because he didn't have anywhere else to stand. He said as soon as I said that the male officer came and had a flashlight in his face and was yelling at him. Um, he didn't really remember the taser. The witnesses did but not Mr. Guar. He said he got pushed up against the bus shelter and he said at that point I put my hands up and that he had each hand wrenched behind his back and handcuffed. Uh, when he asked what he was being arrested for that's when Officer Chamberlain put him in a chokehold and basically drug him back to the squad car."

Sgt. Nelson continued to relay to me what Mr. Guar told her. She said she was a little confused about the sequence of events but back at the squad car Officer Chamberlain was squeezing Guar's throat possibly with an Asp or some other object. Guar also told her that Officer Chamberlain came to get his ID when he pulled Guar out of the squad and had him in a choke hold again.

Sgt. Nelson said that Chamberlain came up to her and said he needed to give her his force review and she said to me, "I knew at this point that A) we were going to be going back to station and talk about things and B) that I didn't want to cross any Garrity lines asking him specific details. I knew I was gonna have to do a force review but I knew I could also do it off of his report instead of asking specific

questions. So I told him to just hold on I had to check some things, we'd talk back at the precinct".

I asked Sgt. Nelson if anyone at the scene told her what Guar was under arrest for. She said, "I knew that Officer Chamberlain wanted him arrested. Uh, I also knew from Officer Appledorn and everyone else's description that there wasn't a disorderly conduct because he wasn't part of the original group nor did he engage in any disorderly behavior and, um, eventually Officer Chamberlain put in his report that he wanted obstructing with force, however, it didn't sound like there was any active part on his part to stop the arrest". From what she heard she did not think there was enough to arrest him so she released him from the scene.

She has not spoken with Officer Chamberlain about this event. Since Sgt.

Nelson was not having Chamberlain go back out on the street she did call his

Lieutenant. She also called Car 9, Lt. Lund and Lt. Glampe to make sure everything

was in the right order. She also spoke to Inspector Frizell and they decided to put

Officer Chamberlain on the desk and Officer Appledorn called Lt. Delmonico.

Sgt. Nelson did take photos of scratches that Officer Chamberlain had, she asked him if he was okay but nothing specific about the incident.

Sgt. Nelson said that Guar came into the station later that night yelling about the mistreatment but he was gone before she could get downstairs. Last week she was at Davnni's picking up food when she saw Guar. He saw her, walked in and thanked her, read her a Bible scripture and left. She has not spoken with him since.

Sgt. Nelson concluded her interview by saying, "I think what makes this event so significant was the officers reaction and the fact that the officers, the witness

officers and the witnesses themselves all had pretty much the same story, Uh, and the fact that the arrest part didn't worry me so much because I could have figured out why he thought he was arresting him but it was all the actions afterwards. Especially the second part of the squad car, the back seat of the squad car, um, I just couldn't understand that one completely either and granted I probably should have talked to Officer Chamberlain, but I really didn't, I really felt right away I couldn't cross that line cause it was a serious event".

Witness Woodrow Benford Statement

Mr.Benford was sitting in the bus shelter at 3rd Avenue and Hennepin Avenue south on his way home to Fridley from supper at Famous Daves. Mr.Benford said in the other section of the bus shelter there were seven to ten young people. He said they were quiet but he could smell the odor of marijuana. He said a male and female left the shelter and then the police pulled up. He said the squad headlights and spotlights drew his attention.

Mr. Benford said, "Two officers got out of the squad car...car. One was a female, the other was a male. The female was driving the car. Uhh...The female entered the shelter first where the young people were and the other officer entered the shelter with his taser gun pointing towards the young people".

Mr. Benford said the young people spoke first. "When the officers pulled up, uhh, the kids were saying, uhh, well one kid said, "I can't...Well, I can't see, the lights are blinding me. Can you turn off the lights?" "Then Officer Chamberlain, the male one, stated, uhh, he said, "Shut up." And then the other kids said, "Well, we didn't do anything." And they said that sort of in unison. And he said, "Shut up" again – I mean

really hostile. And then this other kid said, "Can you turn out the lights, you...the lights are blinding me" - again. At that point, Officer Chamberlain told him that he...he pointed to him and said, "You're going to jail."

Mr. Benford said when Officer Chamberlain said that, the kid said again, "Well, I didn't do anything." The cop said, "Shut up. I told you to shut up and come here, you're going to jail." And then he had the kid turn around so he could handcuff him, which his forcibly turned him around and put the cuffs on him, which had to be extremely tight because the kid screamed out and said, "These are really tight!"

Mr. Benford said "the cop exited the shelter, then he stopped and turned and slammed the kid's face into the windowpane of the shelter". When he saw that he yelled to the cop, "Hey, that's not right."

Mr. Benford explained what he saw next. "The kid hadn't done anything. And then the officer just...he took the kid off...pulled him off, away from the window, and then it looked as if he was taking him to the police car, and for some reason he just stopped, turned around and took the kid toward Hennepin Ave. And the kid was saying at the time, "I didn't do anything." And the Officer Chamberlain put the kid in a choke hold and I could hear the kid gurgling, he said, "I can't breathe. I can't breathe. Please stop." The officer then took the kid to the ground.

At that time, several other police cars pulled up and when they pulled up the kid was screaming and hollering and said, "I'm choking, I can't breathe!" And I asked the officers, I said, "Stop them. That's police brutality!" And they just observed. They didn't do anything. They watched him as he continued to choke the kid. And the kid was

just...The kid could hardly get any sound out - it was muffled sounds because he was being choked.

Then the officer quit choking the kid, got up and was taking him to the police car. He got to the police car; he put him and sat in the police car. Then the officer got inside in the back seat with the kid and started punching him. And the kid was screaming and hollering, he said, "Help me! Help me! Someone please help me!" And I could not believe it. I asked the officers again, I said, "Stop it. Please stop what he's doing to that kid. That is brutality, that man is killing that kid!" And it was Officer Appledorn and Officer Baskin who enter...who came in with another police c...car. And they just stood there and...while the cop was in the back seat beating the kid.

And then he stopped, he pulled the kid out of the car and then he stood the kid up and slammed the kid's face on the roof of the police car. And the kid was screaming and hollering and saying, "Help!" And there were uhh, other folks waiting for the bus on 3rd Ave. and they were seeing all this transpire. And then after he slammed the kid's head on the police car, the roof of the car, he straightened the kid up and then took the door of the police car and started slamming it against the kid's back – and the kid was handcuffed.

The kid was still screaming and hollering. And I asked Officer Appledorn at that time, I said, "Can you do something? Can you stop this?" She said, "Well, I called our supervisor, she'll be here shortly." I said, "Well, my bus will be coming any moment now, I don't know if I would be here." Officer Appledorn then said, "Well, if you miss your bus I will give you a ride home." A few minutes later, uhh, Chamberlain was in the ve...he got in the squad car, in the front seat and he told Officer Appledorn, "Let's go to ...Let's go to the jail." And she was standing there waiting for the Precinct capt...uhh,

supervisor. And then he said again, "Come on, let's go to the jail." And by that time, Sgt. Nelson appeared.

I asked Mr., Benford if the officers spoke over their PA system when they first pulled up and he said no. I asked Mr. Benford had his taser out when he approached the bus shelter and he said yes. I asked Mr., Benford if Officer Chamberlain put the kid in a choke hold after he was handcuffed and he said yes.

I asked Mr. Benford if the kid had been physically fighting the officer during the encounter and he said, "Not at all. In fact, the kids were very respectful, they were not loud, they did not use any profanity. They only said, you know, "We didn't do anything." That's all that they said. And the one that...the kid...The kid that he had arrested had not raised his voice to the officer, the only thing he had said, "I have not done anything." He just kept saying, "I didn't do anything. I didn't do anything." That's the extent of it. Then he started screaming and shouting for his life.

I asked Mr. Benford if he actually saw Officer Chamberlain punching the kid in the back of the squad car and he said, "Well no, I could actually see him. He was on top of the kid and I saw his arm going up and down. I just assumed he was punching him."

Mr. Benford said he was about eight feet away during this entire event. At the end he was speaking with Officer Appledorn waiting for the supervisor when Officer Chamberlain yelled several times, "let's go", "let's go to jail", he said that Officer Chamberlain also said this over the PA system

Mr. Benford ended his statement by saying, "Well, I can just say that I uhh, did mention to Officer Appledorn that I felt that Chamberlain should not be on the Police Force, that I was gonna do everything I could to see that he was removed because he was

a danger to society. Uhh, he was very unprofessional, he lost control and that was...and that was one of the reasons...And what we witnessed that day was one of the reasons I...No, I said to Officer Appledorn, that I know that all policemen were not like Chamberlain, I have friends that are policemen and they...I know they don't behave that way, there are good policemen on the Force – and it's the bad ones like this guy, that give the Force a bad name".

Witness Justin Kaler Statement

Mr. Kaler works for by Block by Block. The Downtown Improvement District contracts through Block by Block for its ambassadors. Mr. Kaler was working the night of November 10, 2012.

At approximately 1700 hours Mr. Kaler was walking in the area of 3rd street and Hennepin Avenue when he smelled marijuana coming from the bus stop. He observed a group of eight to ten individuals passing some type of narcotic around in the bus stop for five to ten minutes. He then requested the Fusion Center call 911 and walked to the opposite corner of the block and continued to observe the group until police arrived.

Once the police arrived Mr. Kaler approached within about thirty feet of the bus stop and remained there leaning against a tree. Mr. Kaler said the police arrived and announced their arrival over the loud speaker. He said the police had their headlights and spot lights on the main vestibule of the bus stop.

Mr. Kaler said a few minutes later he saw that an officer had one person in hand cuffs. He was not able to see into the bus shelter or observe what took place prior to the handcuffing. Mr. Kaler said the handcuffed person was being "verbally

abusive" to the officer and was jumping up and kicking his legs. He said the handcuffed person was saying, "what did I do, what did I do, let me go, I didn't do anything wrong". He said that is what he could hear when he was across the street.

Mr. Kaler said the suspect was wiggling back and forth, jumping up and down. He said the suspect wasn't making actions or threats towards the officer but he was not being cooperative either.

Mr. Kaler said that while this was going on the other officers were dealing with the other people in the bus stop. He said one of the guys in the bus stop was very upset asking why the officer treated the suspect the way he did and that it was not right.

Mr. Kaler said that later the officers were trying to get the suspect in the squad car but he was preventing them from closing the door. He could not hear what was being said during this time. He said that they finally got him in the car and that about five minutes later the majority of the people in the bus stop were either cited or disbursed except for two people.

Mr. Kaler said one man that remained was a black male in his mid forties. He described him as "opinionated and voiceful". He said the man was saying, "That's wrong why do you treat him like this"? Mr. Kaler said he then approached the officers and asked if they needed anything from him.

Mr. Kaler said he believed the officers did the best they could and the guy was verbally abusive towards officers. I asked Mr. Kaler to explain how the suspect was being verbally abusive and what he was actually saying. He said the suspect

was asking, what did I do, why am I being detained and was asking what he did wrong repeatedly.

I asked Mr. Kaler if he observed and officer put a choke hold or put his hands around the individual's neck during the encounter. Mr. Kaler replied, "Standing up, no. I mean possibly trying to get him under control when the suspect was, you know, in handcuffs, jumping up and flailing his legs on the sidewalk, trying to being escorted over to the squad car, um, but nothing intentional. You know nothing like, you know, I'm gonna put you in a Full Nelson or you know I'm just standing there and okay there it goes". Mr. Kaler stated that he was not close enough to see into the squad car. He only knew they were trying to get the suspect in the car. Mr. Kaler said he did not hear the officers use racial or derogatory language.

Witness Johnny Edwards Statement

I mailed a certified letter to Mr. Edwards on November 19, 2012 asking him to contact me. On December 14, 2012 I spoke with Mr. Edwards on the phone and he said he did not wish to give a statement. He explained that he was given a business card by Sgt. Nelson the night of the incident but after what he saw the male police officer do to the kid that was in the back seat he thought it would be better for him not to give a statement.

After a few minutes he finally consented to me recording the remainder of the phone conversation we had. Mr. Edwards said he did not see the original incident at the bus stop. He was walking with a female from the bus stop towards the library just before the police arrived. He heard a kid yelling that he didn't do

anything wrong. Mr. Edwards said the female he was with and another guy stopped to watch the police officers at the bus stop so he stopped too.

Mr. Edwards said he saw that the kid in the backseat of the squad car. Mr. Edwards some people were talking about how the kid originally was upset over lights being shined in his face. When Mr. Edwards turned to see what people were talking about he saw that the kid was now out of the squad car and the cop was "kicking the shit out of him". When I asked what this meant he said he could see the kid was in handcuffs and was getting choked by the male police officer and possibly stomped on. He could hear the kid yelling that he didn't do anything wrong and the cop was yelling at the kid to shut up.

Mr., Edwards says he did not see how the kid got out of the car or the initial confrontation. Mr. Edwards said the woman he was with realized she left a bag in the stop and he told her they were not going back where that cop was and get the "shit kicked out of us" too.

Mr., Edwards said he did not have his glasses on so he could not give a good description of the police officer other than it was a male. He also said he did not know who the kid was that the officer was dealing with.

Mr. Edwards concluded by saying it was his birthday today and he was 55 and that if I needed to speak to him about this again I could call him.

Witness Erica Arceneaux Statement

On November 13, 2012 I called Erica at 612-396-6520 and she agreed to come in for an interview on November 15, 2012 at 2:00pm. Erica was also going to

bring her boyfriend Marquel Mitchell with so he could give a statement as well.

Neither of them showed up for the interview or called to re-schedule.

I mailed a certified letter to Ms. Arceneaux on November 19, 2012 asking her to contact me. As of today's date she has yet to contact me for a new interview date. Someone did sign for the certified letter on 12/07/12.

Witness Shawntrel Vaughn Statement

On November 19, 2012 I mailed a certified letter to Mr. Vaughn asking him to contact me. On November 21st the certified letter was delivered. As of today's date he has yet to contact me for an interview.

Witness Marquel Mitchell Statement

I mailed a certified letter to Mr. Mitchell on November 19, 2012 requesting he contact me. His letter was delivered on November 26, 2012 but he has not contacted me to schedule an interview.

Trokon Guar Statement

There is no listed phone number for Mr. Guar. I sent him an e-mail on November 30^{th} , 2012 asking that he contact me.

SUMMARY OF ALLEGATIONS

Allegation # 1: It is alleged that Officer Chamberlain arrested Trokon Guar for disorderly conduct and for obstructing the legal process when Mr. Guar's actions did not meet the elements of the crimes he was initially arrested for. If this allegation were found to be true it would violate the following:

5-103 USE OF DISCRETION

The police profession is one that requires officers to use considerable judgment and discretion in the performance of their daily duties. Officers have a large body of knowledge from Department policies and procedures, training, their own professional police experience and the experiences of their fellow officers to guide them in exercising proper judgment and discretion in situations not specifically addressed by Department rules and regulations. In addition, officers must always adhere to the following principles in the course of their employment with the Minneapolis Police Department:

POLICE ACTION - LEGALLY JUSTIFIED: Officers must act within the limits of their authority

Investigative Facts

- Officer Chamberlain and Officer Appledorn were responding to a disturbance
 call of a group smoking pot in the bus stop
- Trokon Guar along with approximately 8 other men and women were sitting in the bus stop when officers arrived
- Officers lit up the bus stop with the headlights, spot lights and take down lights, Officer Chamberlain also used his flashlight
- Officers could smell the odor of marijuana when they exited the squad
- Officers stated Guar was seated in the bus stop when they arrived



- Officers said they did not observe Guar smoking any substance in the bus stop
- Officer Appledorn said that Guar was giving Officers a hard time about all the lights they had on complaining how bright they were but he remained seated
- Officer Appledorn said Guar was not threatening towards officers
- Officer Appledorn was attempting to use humor to explain why they lit up the people in the bus shelter
- Officer Appledorn did not hear Guar use any derogatory language towards officers
- Officer Appledorn said that Officer Chamberlain was standing behind her when she was in the bus stop talking to the group
- Officer Appledorn said "the next thing I know, Officer Chamberlain had taken
 out his taser. I didn't see him take out the taser, but the laser light, the red
 dot, was umm...Guar, it was on his chest. And so I was like, okay, I kinda was
 caught...taken off guard a little bit"
- Officer Appledorn said she did not pull her taser out or feel the need to
- Officer Appledorn said Guar got upset and said he wasn't doing anything
- Officers Appledorn said that Officer Chamberlain then told Guar he was under arrest and ordered him to stand up and walk towards him
- Officer Appledorn stated that she had no idea what Officer Chamberlain was arresting Guar for



- Officer Appledorn said that Officer Chamberlain never communicated to her during the entire process what he was arresting Guar for and she never did know what it was for
- Officer Appledorn said that up to the point where Officer Chamberlain told
 Guar he was under arrest and hand cuffed him, she had been watching Guar
 the entire time
- Officer Appledorn said that Officer Chamberlain turned Guar around and pushed him face first into the glass wall of the bus shelter, she was not sure but she thought it was before Guar was handcuffed
- Officer Appledorn said the rest of the group started becoming upset about what was taking place between Officer Chamberlain and Guar
- Officer Appledorn said that later when she was waiting for the supervisor to arrive on scene, Officer Chamberlain repeatedly got on the PA and told her they were leaving and going to jail with Guar
- Witness Benford said when Officers first arrived Guar asked several times
 for them to turn their lights out and said that they were blinding him
- Witness Benford said that he then saw Officer Chamberlain point his taser at Guar, tell him to "Shut up" several times and then Officer Chamberlain told Guar he was going to jail
- Witness Benford said that Guar responded by saying "I didn't do anything"
 and Officer Chamberlain told him to "shut up" and forcibly turned him
 around and put the cuffs on him which he believed were extremely tight
 because he heard Guar scream out and say "these are really tight"



- Witness Benford said Officer Chamberlain exited the shelter with Guar and stopped, turned and slammed Guar's face into the windowpane of the bus shelter
- Witness Benford said he yelled at Officer Chamberlain, "Hey, that's not right"
- Witness Benford said he had not witnessed Guar do anything wrong other than repeatedly asking officers to get the light out of his eyes and after he was handcuffed Guar was yelling "I didn't do anything"
- Witness Benford said that later he heard Officer Chamberlain yell over the PA
 and in person to Officer Appledorn, "Let's go to the jail", "Come on, let's go to
 the jail"
- When Officer Baskin arrived Guar was already handcuffed and was being escorted to the squad car
- Officer Chamberlain said Guar was sitting in the bus shelter when he arrived and appeared" upset" and "enraged" and Guar "addressed some concern" about why the lights were on
- When I asked Officer Chamberlain to describe further how Guar was upset and enraged he said that he was "argumentative" saying "Get those light's out of my fuckin face"
- Officer Chamberlain said that Guar continued to "badger" officers by making comments about how he as minding his own business
- Officer Chamberlain said at that point his intention was to remove Guar from the rest of the group to further investigate where the marijuana came from
- Officer Chamberlain said that Guar was not smoking marijuana

- Officer Chamberlain said the group was getting incited by Guar's conduct so
 he asked Guar to stand up and when Guar didn't cooperate Officer
 Chamberlain said he pulled out his taser and used it in red dot mode
- Officer Chamberlain said that Guar was slow to respond to his commands
 and wouldn't face away, Officer Chamberlain said these actions along with
 the fact that he was trying to investigate a 911 call and Guar was interfering
 with his ability to do this led him to tell Guar he was under arrest
- I asked Officer Chamberlain what he was arresting Guar for and he said "My reason for arresting him was for the disorderly conduct."
- Officer Chamberlain listed himself as a Police Victim of DISCON in the CAPRS
 report
- I asked Officer Chamberlain if he was aware that Police Officers cannot be the victim of a Disorderly Conduct and he said, "In cases of...I...I believe that we can't be the victim of disorderly conduct as far as language." He went on to say, "As far as physical aggression, I believe we...we may be able to be, or even obstruct at that level."
- Police Officers cannot be the victim of Disorderly Conduct, even if someone swears at the Officer
- I asked Officer Chamberlain to explain what physical actions Guar was doing to be disorderly or obstructing and he said, "His actions were loud...his tone of voice"



- I asked Officer Chamberlain to specifically talk about Guar's actions prior to the arrest. Officer Chamberlain described Guar as using words that were abusive, profane and rude. He specifically said that Guar used the words "fuck" and "bullshit"
- Witness Kaler was on the opposite side of the block when Officers first
 approached the bus shelter and he said due to the glare of all the lights on the
 bus shelter he could not see what was going on in the shelter.
- Sgt. Nelson wrote in her CAPRS report "It was my decision to release Guar at
 the scene without a citation or being booked because I did not believe that
 the criminal standards for disorderly conduct or obstruction had been met
 when I spoke to Officer Appledorn and the witnesses.
- Sgt. Nelson said from what she heard at the scene she didn't feel like there was enough to arrest Guar so she released him from the scene.

Allegation # 2: It is alleged that Officer Chamberlain acted unprofessional with Trokon Guar during his interactions with him. If this allegation were found to be true it would violate the following:

5-105 PROFESSIONAL CODE OF CONDUCT

3. Officers shall use reasonable judgment in carrying out their duties and responsibilities. They need to weigh the consequences of their actions.

Investigative Facts

- Officer Chamberlain said that he did not use profanities and he said "I believe that I remained professional and I used appropriate force given the circumstances"
- During all the interviews nobody could recall hearing Officer Chamberlain using racial or derogatory language during the incident
- Officer Baskin said that Guar was screaming extremely loud
- Witness Benford said that after Officer Chamberlain started dealing with
 Guar, Guar yelled loudly asking what he did wrong and eventually for help
- Officer Appledorn was caught off Guard that Officer Chamberlain pulled out his taser and red dotted Guar, she did not feel the need to pull out her taser
- Officer Appledorn said the people in the bus stop were getting upset with how Officer Chamberlain was interacting with Guar
- Officer Appledorn heard Officer Chamberlain yelling at Guar to "shut up"
- Witness Benford said Guar asked the officers to turn the lights off and he
 heard Officer Chamberlain tell Guar to "shut up" several times in a really
 hostile voice and then he heard Officer Chamberlain say, "You're going to jail"

- Witness Benford said Guar responded by saying "well, I didn't do anything"
 to which Officer Chamberlain said, "Shut up, I told you to shut up and come here, you're going to jail"
- Witness Benford said that Officer Chamberlain then forcibly turned Guar around and put the cuffs on extremely tight he assumed because Guar yelled, "These are tight"
- Witness Benford said that Officer Chamberlain exited the shelter and stopped, turned and slammed Guar's face into the windowpane of the shelter
- Officer Appledorn said that Officer Chamberlain turned Guar around and pushed him face first into the glass wall of the bus shelter as he was telling him to get his hands behind his back
- When I asked Officer Chamberlain if he shoved Guar face first into the glass
 of the bus shelter he said, "I believe that I pushed, I used the bus shelter as a
 uhh, as a barrier to pin his body up against. As far as shoving him face first, I
 don't believe that happened"
- Witness Benford said Officer Chamberlain put Guar in a choke hold several times after he was handcuffed and Guar was yelling "Help me, help me, someone please help me", "I'm choking and can't breathe"
- Witness Benford said the following at the end of the interview "I think that that officer was unprofessional, to say the least. Uhh...He seemed to be out of control, totally out of control. Also, it appeared he didn't really care who saw what he was doing because there were people watching him and he just continued to be...to take it to brutalize that kid. And then I couldn't believe it

myself that I had...could see this officer do this and not stop it and that there was witnesses watching what he was doing. It seemed as he had just really lost...like he was cr...went crazy, was berserk"

- Witness Kaler described Guar as loud and verbally upset, repeatedly saying "what did I do wrong"
- Witness Kaler said the group in the bus shelter was verbally upset with
 Officer Chamberlain and they were asking why he treated guar that way and saying it wasn't right
- Officer Appledorn said that Officer Chamberlain and Guar were yelling back and forth at each other when she was speaking with the group in the bus shelter
- Officer Appledorn said the group was mad at Officer Chamberlain and they were saying things like, "He is choking him out"
- yelling and screaming, umm, that, "He's trying to kill me!" Umm...He uhh...I had...It was a nice night, so I had...the back windows of the squad were down. And umm, so I could hear him and then...then the group also started yelling and...and umm...So I look over, and Officer Chamberlain is like...uh...uh...in the back seat, umm, actually kinda...I don't know if he had both feet on the ground, but at least one foot was on the ground, so he was actually in the back seat on top of Guar, and uhh, he has both his...both his hands around Guar's neck, umm, in a strangulation hold"

- I asked Officer Appledorn if she could be mistaken and she said, "I am
 positive that he had his hands around his throat"
- Officer Appledorn was upset and called a supervisor because of the force used
- I asked Officer Appledorn why she was upset and she said, "In my opinion, umm, I just thought it went a little too far. I, umm, I didn't see, from my point, I didn't see why certain things were done. I didn't understand why certain things were done, and umm, I didn't think they needed to be done. And then hence, now it puts me into a situation where I...I'm not happy about."
- Sgt. Nelson said when she arrived at the scene Officer Appledorn looked upset and said to her, "he went too far, I can't even talk about it right this moment"
- Sgt. Nelson did not allow Officer Chamberlain to return to the street after the call for two reasons, she said, "I thought that he, from what I had heard, may have used excessive force and second, because if his temper was this far out of control I didn't know if he'd have a chance to bring it back it. I didn't want him to get in any other trouble"
- Sgt. Nelson concluded her interview with me by saying, "I think what makes
 this event so significant was the officers reaction and the fact that the
 officers, the witness officers and the witnesses themselves all had pretty
 much the same exact story"

Allegation # 3: It is alleged that Officer Chamberlain used excessive force when dealing with Trokon Guar. If this allegation were found to be true it would violate the following:

5-303 AUTHORIZED USE OF FORCE

Minn. Stat. §609.06 subd. 1 states, "When authorized...except as otherwise provided in subdivision 2, reasonable force may be used upon or toward the person of another without the other's consent when the following circumstances exist or the actor reasonably believes them to exist:

When used by a public officer or one assisting a public officer under the public officer's direction:

- In effecting a lawful arrest; or
- In the execution of legal process; or
- In enforcing an order of the court; or
- In executing any other duty imposed upon the public officer by law."

In addition to Minn. Stat. §609.06 sub. 1, MPD policies shall utilize the United States Supreme Court decision in Graham vs Connor as a guideline for reasonable force.

The Graham vs Connor case references that:

Because the test of reasonableness under the Fourth Amendment is not capable of precise definition or mechanical application, its proper application requires careful attention to the facts and circumstances of each particular case, including:

- The severity of the crime at issue,
- Whether the suspect poses an immediate threat to the safety of the officers or others, and;
- Whether he is actively resisting arrest or attempting to evade arrest by flight.

The "reasonableness" of a particular use of force must be judged from the perspective of the reasonable officer

The calculus of reasonableness must embody allowance for the fact that police officers are often forced to make split-second judgments - in circumstances that are tense, uncertain, and rapidly evolving - about the amount of force that is necessary in a particular situation."

Authorized use of force requires careful attention to the facts and circumstances of each case. Sworn MPD employees shall write a detailed, comprehensive report for each instance in which force was used.

Investigative Facts

Officer Chamberlain wrote these points in his CAPRS supplement:

- Officer Chamberlain handcuffed AP1 and tried to walk him to the squad car
 when AP1 "violently pulled away from me" since AP1 had not been searched
 he tried a wrist lock and then put AP1 in a conscious neck restraint to gain
 control
- Officer Chamberlain lowered AP1 to the ground with the neck restraint where he violently struggled, he then checked his waistband
- Officer Chamberlain walked AP1 to the squad and pinned AP1's body to the squad car to search him
- Officer Chamberlain wrote it seemed like AP1 was trying to distract him so
 he used a hypoglossal pressure point to bring his resistance under control
- Officer Chamberlain checked AP1's handcuffs for fit "prior to pushing him in the squad car" Guar then tried to get out of the squad car so Officer
 Chamberlain used a hypoglossal pressure point to get him in the squad and secure the door
- Officer Appledorn was still speaking with others in the group when this occurred
- Officer Chamberlain opened the squad door when AP1 forced his body out and Officer Chamberlain used a conscious neck restraint to lower AP1 to the ground
- Officer Appledorn and Officer Baskin assisted him getting AP1 back into the squad

Officer Appledorn wrote the following points in her CAPRS supplement

- Officer Appledorn was watching the rest of the group when she saw Officer
 Chamberlain shove Guar up against the glass of the shelter face first at the
 same time telling him to get his hands behind his back
- Officer Appledorn heard Guar yelling he wasn't doing anything wrong when she observed Officer Chamberlain take Guar to the ground and apply a neck restraint on him (Guar was handcuffed)
- Officer Appledorn said she walked over to Guar and told him to relax and stop struggling at which point Officer Chamberlain got control and walked Guar to the squad where he put Guar up against the trunk of the squad and his face on the back windshield and Guar started to yell about Officer Chamberlain
- Officer Appledorn noticed Baskin arrive on scene at this point and he asked her if she needed any help
- Officer Appledorn said the group she was with was yelling about Officer
 Chamberlain's behavior at this point
- Officer Appledorn heard Guar yell and she looked over at the squad and saw
 Guar in the backseat. She saw Officer Chamberlain in the backseat leaning
 over Guar partially on top of him with his hands around Guar's neck
- Officer Appledorn saw Officer Chamberlain take guar out of the backseat and put on the ground by Officer Chamberlain who was administering a neck restraint

- Officer Appledorn walked to the squad and saw that Officer Chamberlain was trying to get Guar in the backseat but Guar wouldn't get in and was saying "he is trying to kill me"
- Officer Appledorn walked over to the passenger side and against her officer safety she got in the back seat and talked to Guar to calm him down so he got in the backseat
- Officer Appledorn then called a supervisor to the scene over her radio
- Officer Appledorn said that Officer Chamberlain got on the loud speaker and yelled "we are leaving get in the squad, he's going to jail"

Sgt. Nelson documented the following points in her CAPRS report

- Sgt. Nelson was told the following by witnesses at the scene, when Guar told the officers that their lights were bright, Officer Chamberlain walked up to Guar with his taser out and started yelling at him that he was under arrest, then pushed him up against the walls of the bus shelter. Officer Chamberlain continued to yell at Guar and wrenched his right arm behind his back, while still pushing him against the shelter. Officer Chamberlain then put Guar in a choke hold and they went down to the ground where he finally handcuffed Guar. Witnesses Benford, Arceneaux and Vaugh all demonstrated the choke hold to Sgt. Nelson and described Officer Chamberlain's actions
- Sgt. Nelson said the witnesses told her that once Guar was up and walking back to the squad they saw Officer Chamberlain put Guar in a choke hold again and try to slam Guar into the car door and then shove him in the back seat

- Sgt. Nelson spoke with Guar and he told her he made comments to the police
 about the lights being in his face and at that point Officer Chamberlain
 walked up to him with his taser out, yelled at him and slammed him up
 against the glass of the shelter stating he was under arrest.
- Sgt. Nelson wrote that Guar stated he put his arms up and Officer
 Chamberlain wrenched them behind his back, put him in a chokehold and then handcuffed him. Once back at the squad Officer Chamberlain again put him in a choke hold and at some point ripped the necklace off of Guar
- Sgt. Nelson wrote that Guar told her that at some point Officer Chamberlain grabbed him by the front of the throat
- Sgt. Nelson wrote that she spoke with Officer Appledorn and was told that
 Officer Chamberlain was out of control and had been choking Guar
 Officer Chamberlain said the following points in his IAU interview
- Officer Chamberlain asked Guar to stand up so he could remove him from the group. When Guar did not cooperate he red dotted him with his taser
- Officer Chamberlain said Guar was not cooperating his instructions to face away so he pushed him with his free hand to spin him around, he reholstered his taser and hand cuffed Guar
- Officer Chamberlain said he was trying to maneuver Guar around the wood
 fence to the squad when Guar "violently" pulled his arm and he thought Guar
 might want to escape custody or kick or fight him so he tried a wrist
 manipulation, wrist lock and when those didn't work he used a conscious
 neck restraint

- Officer Chamberlain used the neck restraint to bring Guar to the ground then got him up and walked him to the squad car, he said Officer Appledorn was still with the rest of the group during this
- Officer Chamberlain said he told Guar twice not to make matters worse, to spread his feet and that he was under arrest and Guar would not cooperate so he pinned Guar's body between his and the squad car to maintain control and search him
- Officer Chamberlain said Officer Appledorn was still with the group when he was doing this
- Officer Chamberlain said Guar would not spread his feet so he applied a hypoglossal pressure point to change his aggressive thought process
- Officer Chamberlain said after the search he pushed Guar into the squad car,
 he said Guar used his physical strength to resist, he thought Guar was trying
 to get out of the squad so he used another hypoglossal pressure point to
 move his head and body into the car
- Officer Chamberlain said he was convinced by Guar that he settled down so
 he opened the Squad door to get an ID out of Guar's pocket and Guar kicked
 his legs out and got out of the car
- Officer Chamberlain said he his lesser attempts at using strength to get Guar in the car were not working so he used another conscious neck restraint to bring Guar to the ground
- Officer Chamberlain said Officer Baskin and Appledorn walked up and secured Guar in the car

- I asked Officer Chamberlain if he shoved Guar face first into the glass of the bus shelter and he said, "I believe that I pushed, I used the bus shelter as a uhh, as a barrier to pin his body up against. As far as shoving him face first, I don't believe that happened"
- I asked Officer Chamberlain if he asked his partner for assistance or got on
 the air and asked for assistance in dealing with Guar and he said, "I believe I
 asked my partner for assistance, uhh, while she was standing there.
 Umm...I...I looked up at her a couple times and umm, I said that I'd be
 bringing him to the sq...to the squad car."
- I restated this to Officer Chamberlain that he asked his partner for assistance and she never helped him and he said, "I believe that is correct"
- I asked Officer Chamberlain if he had his hands around Guars throat when he was in the back of the squad and he said, "No"
- I asked Officer Chamberlain if he ever heard Guar yelling, "Help, This officer is trying to kill me! He's killing me" and Officer Chamberlain said "I remember him saying something like that"
- I asked if Officer Chamberlain ever had Guar in a strangulation hold and he said, "Absolutely not, that's not what I used"

Officer Appledorn said the following points in her IAU interview

- She was taken off guard by Officer Chamberlain pulling out his taser and pointing it at Guar, she did not feel the need to pull her taser out
- Officer Appledorn saw Officer Chamberlain push Guar face first against the glass of the bus shelter

- Officer Appledorn observed Officer chamberlain use a conscious neck restraint on a handcuffed Guar two times during the call and she did not feel that Officer Chamberlain needed any assistance from her or backup
- Officer Appledorn said she is confident and knows what she saw and that it
 was Officer Chamberlain get part way in the back seat of the squad and put
 his hands around his neck, she reiterated "I am positive he had his hands
 around his throat"
- Officer Appledorn got in the back seat of the squad with a suspect when I asked her why she went against her 20 years of officer safety to do this she said, "I just needed to get in there, diffuse to, and get him in there. And I figured if I was able to do that, hopefully he wouldn't turn on me in there, but I just wanted to avoid anybody else get...anybody getting hurt from the officers"
- Sgt. Nelson said the following in her IAU statement
- Sgt. Nelson said "I think what makes this event so significant was the officers
 reaction and the fact that the officers, the witness officers and the witnesses
 themselves all had pretty much the same exact story"

Officer Baskin said the following in his IAU statement

 The people in the bus stop told him he they believed Officer Chamberlain was being excessive with his force

- Officer Baskin didn't feel that he needed to call for backup and he didn't think
 Officer Chamberlain even needed his help dealing with Guar
 Civilian Witnesses said the following points in their IAU Interview
- Witness Benford said Officer Chamberlain put Guar in a choke hold several times after he was handcuffed and Guar was yelling "Help me, help me, someone please help me", "I'm choking and can't breathe"
- Witness Benford said that Officer Chamberlain then forcibly turned Guar around and put the cuffs on extremely tight he assumed because Guar yelled, "These are tight"
- Witness Benford said that Officer Chamberlain exited the shelter and stopped, turned and slammed Guar's face into the windowpane of the shelter
- Witness Benford said Officer Chamberlain put Guar in a choke hold several times after he was handcuffed and Guar was yelling "Help me, help me, someone please help me", "I'm choking and can't breathe"
- Witness Benford said that the only thing Guar was doing during all of this
 was to yell that he didn't do anything wrong repeatedly
- Witness Edwards said that he could see the officer had Guar on the ground and was choking him while he was in handcuffs two different times
- Witness Edwards would not let his female friend return to the bus stop to get her back the reason he gave was, "I don't think you're gonna get that bag, the way he is whoopin that dud right now"
- Witness Edwards told me he did not want to give a statement to Sgt. Nelson that night or me out of fear after what he saw Officer Chamberlain do to Guar

 Witness Kaler said he wasn't that close to see things but he thought the officer was doing the best he could to control the suspect (Guar)

It should also be noted that Officer Chamberlain did not call a supervisor to the scene for the force he used. Officer Appledorn called for a supervisor to their location over the air. While waiting for the supervisor to arrive Officer Chamberlain got on the PA and several times he told Officer Appledorn, "Let's go, we are going to jail" Officer Appledorn reported hearing this as well as Officer Baskin and Witness Benford.

When I questioned Officer Chamberlain about this he said that is not what happened, he said, "I think that there was two different things that were happening. One – I was saying, "Let's get out of this area," to her. And I believed that this male, Mr. Benford, had some relationship with...with the arrested party. So my response to him was that this male's going to jail, so if he wanted to make arrangements or whatever the situation was to pick him up, or whatever their...their relationship was, that he understood." Officer Chamberlain also said that he always reports force.

On 11/10/2012 at 1710 hours, I was called to 3rd St S/Hennepin Avenue S by Officer Appledorn. She was assigned Squad 160 with her partner, Officer John Chamberlain, and they were out on a disturbance call (CCN: 12-351609). When I arrived, I was met by Officer Appledorn, who informed me that Officer Chamberlain had used force against the male (TROKON GUAR) in their back seat. She then directed me to several witnesses that were in the bus stop on the Northeast corner of the intersection.

The following is a summary of what the witnesses told me:

When officers pulled up facing the bus shelter (in the parking lot, facing southwest), they had their spotlights and takedown lights on. Officer Appledorn was initially making contact with the group when GUAR told her the lights were bright. At that point, Officer Chamberlain walked up to GUAR with his taser out, started yelling at him that he was under arrest, then pushed him up against the walls in the bus shelter. Officer Chamberlain continued to yell at GUAR and wrenched his right arm behind his back, while still pushing him up against the bus shelter. Officer Chamberlain then put GUAR in a choke hold and they went down to the ground. Officer Chamberlain maintained the choke hold and finally handcuffed GUAR.

Once GUAR was up, and walked back to the squad car, once back at the squad car, the witnesses saw Officer Chamberlain put GUAR in a choke hold again, and try to slam him into the car door. Officer Chamberlain finally shoved GUAR into the back seat of the squad car. One of the witnesses (BENFORD) stated that Officer Chamberlain was using racially derogatory language, but did not want to repeat the exact phrases for me. BENFORD also has some of the incident captured on the video on his phone; however, he was having problems playing it back for me at the scene. He stated he would be preserving the video on his Blackberry Phone.

I spoke with the subject of the force, TROKON GUAR, who gave me an accounting of the incident that I recorded on my MVR in P#76371. The tape the statement was recorded on, P1-1323, was property inventoried at the precinct. I reviewed just a short portion of the video, and it appears that the entire statement was recorded. I did this because GUAR does not have a contact phone number, only a contact email: T_Man1son@yahoo.com/

Guar stated that he was standing in the bus shelter, but he was not affiliated with the original group that was smoking marijuana. When the officers pulled up, the lights on the squad were shining right at him and he made a comment about the lights being in his face. At that point, Officer Chamberlain walked up to him and put his flashlight in Guar's face. Guar also saw that Chamberlain had his taser out. Chamberlain yelled at him, and used racial slurs according to the victim, then slammed Guar up against the glass, stating that Guar was under arrest. Guar stated that he put his hands up and Officer Chamberlain wrenched his arms behind his back, pushing his right arm up into the middle of his back. Officer Chamberlain put him in a chokehold and then handcuffed Guar. Once back at the squad car, Officer Chamberlain again put Guar in a chokehold, and at some point, ripped Guar's necklace from his neck. Officer Chamberlain also grabbed Guar by the front of the throat with his hand and pinched, as well as using his ASP to push on Guar's neck. Guar stated that both techniques were extremely painful. Officer Chamberlain shoved Guar in the back of the squad car, continuing to yell at him and using racial slurs.

Guar had a small cut over his left eye, but refused medical treatment when it was offered to him several times. I took photographs of the small cut, the broken necklace, and Guar's neck area. Guar was released from the scene.

I spoke to Officer Appledorn, who was Chamberlain's partner, and she was so upset that she had to walk away from the squad car and could not even be in it with Chamberlain. She told me that he had been out of control, that he had been choking Guar. I did not have her elaborate further since I needed to make some phone calls to find out further steps. Officer Baskin was also on scene, but I did not get a chance to interview him in depth.

Officer Chamberlain offered to brief me on his use of force, but I purposely did discuss it with him. I had all three officers complete their CAPRS reports.

Squad 160 and Squad 110 did not have their MVR's recording. Squad 160 was pointed at the incident; however, Squad 110 was out on Hennepin Avenue, not pointing at the incident.

I contact SIC to determine if there was any camera footage, there are no cameras at 3/Hennepin, however Melissa Bjorklund was checking the other cameras to see if any were pointed in that direction. I requested that any possible footage be preserved.

Witness Benford stated he will be preserving his footage since he wants to make a formal complaint.

I attempted to contact security at the Minneapolis Central Library to check on possible footage from their cameras, but I have not had any success yet.

Officer Chamberlain has been currently assigned to desk duty at the 1st Precinct.

Officers Appledorn and Baskin, along with Officer Chamberlain, were directed to complete their reports as required by policy.

Lt. Glampe, Lt. Lund, and Inspector Frizell were notified via phone.

Were you notified ahead of time of this? 11 12 A: I was. 13 Q: Okay. All right. Umm...Is it correct that you were working, umm, as an Able 14 squad on November 10th, 2012? 15 A: No. I was... 16 17 18 Q: Or I mean as a two person squad? 19 A: Correct. 20 21 Q: And who was your partner that day? 22 A: Officer Sherry Appledorn. 23 24 Q: And what was your squad number? 25 A: Our squad number was 160. 26 Q: Okay. At some point in the evening were you called umm, to a Disturbance 27 Call in the area of 3rd and Hennepin? 28 A: Yes. We were dispatched to a call in the area of uhh, 3rd and Hennepin – it 29 30 was a Disturbance Call. 31 32 Q: Okay. And why don't you tell me, umm, what you knew about the call when 33 you were going to it. A: Sure. And umm...So you got this call and I'm assuming you responded to this area. Why don't you tell me umm, what happened when you 39 responded there - walk me through the call. 40 A: Sure. Uhh...I was riding as the passenger officer, Officer Appledorn 41 was...was driving the squad car. Uhh...She said that uhh, she had located the 42

group and I looked and I could see that we had both located the group, which

was uhh, at the uhh, NE corner of 3rd and Hennepin.

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44 45 There's uhh, two bus shelters that were side-by-side or within close proximity to each other there. Uhh...We pulled into uhh, a surface parking lot from the uhh, kinda from the north. Uhh...As we pulled our squad car up there, both Officer Appledorn and I uhh, looked – we could see that there was a group. Uhh...They appeared to be a larger group, like it could have been around or close to ten people, that was sitting inside the uhh, uhh, bus shelter that was closest towards Washington. Uhh...There was another bus shelter that was adjacent to it, but...but closer towards 3rd St.

Uhh...We illuminated the group with our...our squad lighting, the take-down lights, and the ...and the uhh, uhh, side spotlights.

Q: Okay. Okay. And then once you arrived and you illuminated the group, what did you do next?

A: Uhh...We got out of our squad car. Uhh...I got out on the...on the passenger's side obviously, she got out on the driver's side, and we walked towards the shelter. Uhh...There is a wooden fence that's located uhh, between the surface parking lot and the two shelters, bus shelters.

Uhh...We walked up there. Uhh...As soon as we got close to the group, I could smell the odor of uhh, marijuana – smelled like it had been burn...burning marijuana. Uhh...That led me to believe that there was some uhh, uhh, consistency with the remarks of the call that had come from, what I read, was a DID employee.

Q: Okay. So you umm, pull up, umm, and you walk to the shelter and you smell the marijuana. Did you see anybody smoking it at this point?

A: At this point I had not seen anybody smoking it.

 Q: Okay. And did you...I mean, you had your take-down lights, your spotlights on – Did you uhh, have your flashlight out...out at this time?

A: I did uhh, take it out at some point. I...I believe I did have that out, uhh, as I

was walking up to the ... to the uhh, the group.

Q: Okay. So then tell me what happens once you walk up to the shelter.

A: I uhh, keyed up my portable microphone and notified dispatchers that officers would be out with this group, uhh, at that location – that we would be out with a group of people.

Uhh... One of the individuals that was sitting in the bus shelter furthest away from me and furthest away from Appledorn, uhh, facing us, uhh, appeared to be very upset and enraged that we had uhh, uhh, spotlights and lighting that was focused on...on the group. Uhh... He addressed some concern about why there were lights and Officer Appledorn uhh, said that she had turned the lights on because she was old and couldn't see very well.

 Q: And when...You said he was upset and enraged, umm, in my mind I have an idea of what enraged is – What...Describe what you mean by he was "enraged."

A: He appeared...Uhh...He appeared very angry upon our arrival, that we were there, and that we had used our lighting. Uhh...The other individuals in there, uhh, didn't seem to respond much to us being there, they didn't have much to say.

Uhh...My concern at this point was that...that he was argumentative, uhh, in response to what Officer Appledorn had said. Umm...He then began swearing, saying, uhh, and "Get those lights out of my fuckin face." Uhh...I noticed that his eyes were watery and bloodshot in appearance and umm, I had shined my flashlight towards him to uhh, get a better look at him and...and to kind of figure out what was going on with the situation.

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Q: And when you had your uhh, flashlight shined at him, did you see him uhh, if he was holding any type of weapon or if he was holding any umm, narcotics or alcohol or anything like that at that point?

A: I couldn't see his hands and I did ask him, uhh, at some point to see his hands.

 Q: Okay. Where...Where were his hands that you didn't see them?

A: I don't remember the incident.

Q. Okay.

A: I don't know.

Q: Okay. All right. So, umm, he was argumentative and you...you uhh, shined your flashlight on him. Tell me what happened next.

A: Uhh. He continued to uhh, to badger us about being there, umm, making comments about uhh, something that he was minding his own business or something along those lines. And it got to the point where uhh, after he was swearing, or I believed that he was, uhh, it would make the most sense to have him removed from that group.

Umm...At that particular point, it was my...not my intent to arrest. At that point it was my intent to remove him from that group so we could investigate further and see where that marijuana was coming from.

Q: Okay. So what happened when you attempted to remove him from the group and how did you attempt to re....First, how did you attempt to remove him and what happened when you did this?

A: Okay. When I noticed that the other group members, uhh, they appeared to be getting somewhat incited and disturbed by his conduct, I asked him uhh, to

stand up. He did not cooperate with what I told him to do. He was furthest away

from the other group members and Luhh, planted my MPD issued taser CED at

him, using it in a red dot mode, pointing it towards his torso. I told him to stand

up and to keep his hands where I could see them and then I told him to come back uhh, towards me outside of the shelter and to face away from me.

Q: Okay. And what happened then?

A: He stood up – He seemed hesitant to do so, he was slow and lethargic in doing so. When he did stand up, he walked slowly towards me. Umm...His eyes were very wide, his umm, body language was tense, and I told him to uhh, face away from me a second time. He did not cooperate after I told him a second time to face away.

Q: Okay. What happened then?

A: 'It was my understanding, based on uhh, the fact that we were trying to conduct an official investigation while in response to a 911 call, that he was interfering with our ability to do this; based on his language, based on uhh, the tone and pitch of his voice - which was uhh, boisterous - it was certainly offensive by his use of words, and uhh, it appeared to be disturbing and inciting the other group members around there. Uhh... After that second time I had told him to face away and he didn't cooperate, it was at that point that I told him that he was under arrest and to face away.

Q: Okay. And then what happened?

A: He didn't cooperate with my instructions to face away, so I pushed him with my free hand.

Q: And how did you push him?

26 A: Uhh...Towards...I...It was an open-hand push towards his torso.

Q: Okay.

A: Uhh...It was on his shoulder to try to get his body spun uhh, in an opposite direction from mine.

Q: Okay. And what happened after that?

A: I still had my uhh, taser in my hand. Umm...He took a step back and his eyes became uhh, wide and uhh, his profanities and boisterous tone continued. He was uhh, yelling indiscernibly – he was very loud, and uhh, I used uhh, verbal orders – which were professional, but loud, to, "Turn around, face away, you're under arrest." Uhh...I then holstered my taser and I got him handcuffed.

Q: And where was he standing when you handcuffed him, was he in the bus shelter - Where was he?

A: No, he was standing outside of the bus shelter at that point.

Q: Okay. So after you handcuffed him, what...you...you...What happened after you handcuffed him?
A: After...

Q: Or you said you attempted to – What happened?

A: Okay. Uhh...l did get him handcuffed at that point.

4 Q: Okay,

A: Umm...I tried to walk him away from the bus shelter and towards the squad car parked in the surface lot. I was trying to maneuver around the wooden fence and while I was doing so, he violently pulled his arm, while handcuffed, away from me. Fattempted a wrist manipulation a wrist lock, in order to gain control of him and walk him towards the squad car - That was ineffective. He was very loud, profane language, he was being the was using, and that didn't work.

Umm...He...When he was pulling away from me, I thought that he would either escape custody or want to fight or kick at me or cause further problems; uhh, therefore, I used a conscious neck restraint in order to bring his level of resistance under control. Uhh ... I took into consideration that Hennepin Ave. was not too far away and he was moving his body in the direction of that.

Uhh Lused a neck restraint to bring him down to the ground. He continued to use a loud, verbal tirade with me while I was bringing him down to the ground, and by using my body weight to keep him pinned to the ground while I checked his waistband for weapons, to make sure that there was nothing that he had. I was... Certainly at this point that, uhh, I believed that this was gonna be a custodial arrest to prevent further criminal conduct.

Q: Okay. And so you used a conscious neck restraint and took him to the ground. What happened next?

A: Uhh...Officer Appledorn was still standing with other members of the group.
Uhh...lwas able to get him up on my own, umm, and with...with his own efforts.
I asked him to stand up, not to make matters worse, and I walked him towards the squad car. Umm...He continued to struggle, I just used my strength and uhh, a brisk walk in order to walk him towards the car.

Q: And then uhh, what happened after you were walking him towards the car?

A: I walked him up, uhh, up to the car, instructed him to spread his feet apart, uhh, in order to search him. It was my understanding this was a custodial search at this point. Uhh...When I told him to... to spread his feet apart, uhh he... he was indignant about his... his actions, his behavior, and everything that had transpired.

I uhh, uhh...told him a second time not to make matters worse, spread your feet apart, you're under arrest, and uhh, he didn't cooperate. Uhh...l, uhh, pinned his body between the squad car and my own, partially, just to...to maintain control of him while...while uhh, conducting a search of him.

Uhh...Officer Appledorn uhh, was still...seemed to be dealing with the other group members, though I was dealing with him all along.

Q: Okay. And what happened next?

A: Then I, whh, I told him to spread his feet apart in order to conduct a search.

He did not uhh, cooperate with spreading his feet apart. I... I uhh, used my thumb directed towards his hypoglossal nerve - It's a pressure point techniq

thumb directed towards his hypoglossal nerve - It's a pressure point technique directed about an inch underneath the jaw.

8 Q: And where...Where was...You had...Your...Would you have used your left hand or your right hand?

10 A: I believe it was my right hand. I believe my left hand was controlling his left 11 arm.

Q: Okay. So you applied this hypoglossal pressure point ,umm, and that was to get him in the car, or what was the point of that?

A: That was...That was used to uhh, change his aggressive thought process and to get him to uhh, separate his feet for the search.

Q: Okay. All right. What happened after that?

A: Umm...After I had searched him umm, more thoroughly, umm, I then checked his hands and handcuffs for fit prior to uhh, physically pushing him into the car.

He was resisting as far as not getting into the car – which I asked him to do.

Q: Okay. So then you get him...Did you get him in the car?

A: Uhh...Not without a struggle. Umm...I tried to get uhh...I tried to get him into the car. Umm...I had difficulty getting him in there, he was physically using his body and his strength to not go inside the squad car.

 Umm...While I was trying to secure him in there by using my physical strength, he ended up moving his ...moving his body towards me, and he wasn't all the way in the car. I ended up bumping my head on the corner of the...of the squad car. Uhh...It was my understanding he was trying to get out.

At that point I then used a hypoglossal pressure point, uhh, in order to uhh, move his, uhh, involuntarily move his...his head and his body into the car and away from the exit door of the squad car.

Q: And that would have been the same before, you used your thumb up underneath...?

A: No. That was ...It was simil...It was the same concept, but in that, I used the ...the digital tips of my uhh, middle finger and index finger directed towards about an inch below the jawbone.

43 Q: Okay.

A: Umm...There's two ways of doing the...the hypoglossal – One is with a...with a fist to support the thumb, the other one is with the middle and index finger, and that was what I used in this case.

Q: Okay. And so you're using your...Uhh...Which hand would you have been using to do that, do you recall?

A: I believe that was my right hand that I was using on his...it would have been on his left side.

Q: Okay. And what were you doing with your other hand?

A: I was supporting his...his head with my other hand, with my thumb, and pushing...Uhh...Supporting his head, and pushing his head back away and into the squad car.

Q: Okay. And what uhh, happened next?

A: Then uhh... After I was able to get him uhh, into the ... into the squad car...

I should back up. At a point I did use my uhh, my knee to pin his leg while...while struggling with him to get him in there. And I did use that hypoglossal pressure point that I described long enough to get him all the way into the car, so I could get the, uhh, the door secure.

Q: Okay. So after you had the door secure, what happened?

A: I then got into the front passenger's seat of the squad car and I asked AP1, the...Mr. Guar, for his name and he initially told me he wasn't gonna give it to me because he didn't think he did anything wrong.

Uhh...I then explained to him why we were there. I showed him the squad computer. Uhh...I...I, uhh, pulled up the call, I showed him that it said that there were ten people smoking pot. I showed him that we were at Hennepin and 3rd St. I explained to him that he was at the particular corner that we were investigating, uhh, and that is why we were even there, even having any contact with him at all.

He seemed, after I tried to talk to him and explain this, he seemed to calm down, he seemed to be uhh, more calm than he was before and to have relaxed his...his efforts to...to be aggressive.

Q: Okay. So what happened next?

A: He told me that he had...that his ID was...Uhh...That his name was on his ID, which was on his person.

Q: Okay. So then what did you do?

A: I-then whh, got out and opened his squad car door and as soon as I did that, he kicked his legs out and got out of the car.

Q: Okay. So what did you do?

A: I told him that I didn't want him out of the car and to stay in there. And he used his strength, which was able to...I tried to use my strength to keep him in

the car. He...He used his strength against me and uhh, I wasn't able to by my own strength, keep him secured inside of the car. I then when I saw that those lesser attempts at using my strength were 4 ineffective, I then used uhh, another conscious neck restraint to bring his level of resistance under control and to bring him back down to the ground. 7 Q: Okay. And what happened after that? 8 A: Uhh...It took myself and Officer Baskin, and I believe Appledorn walked up at 9 that point, to secure uhh, Mr. Guar in the car. 10 11 Q: Okay. Was that the first time that uhh, Officer Appledorn had walked up to 12 then assist you with this ...with this person? 13 A: I don't know for sure. I was uhh, on my own for most of the incident as far 14 as being able to control him. Uhh...That's because she appeared to be talking to 15 uhh, a male that was uhh, I believe later identified as Benford. 16 17 Q: Yep. 18 A: So. 19 20 Q: Okay. So you were able to get umm, the AP back in the squad car. What 21 happened after that? 22 A: Uhh. Officer Appledorn got into the squad car and sat next to the arrested 23 24 party.... 25 Q: Okay. And then what happened? 26 A: Juhh.: She was talking to him about something. I don't know what she was 27 discussing with him. 28 29 Q: Okay. Okay. Umm... So you decided that you were 34 going to place this person under arrest, umm, and you said that...that...Well, first 35 you were getting him, you were getting him out of the shelter. Umm...You said 36 that he was causing a disturbance. 37 38 Umm...And in your report you describe the other people, you said that, "AP was 39 causing a disturbance while the other males were sitting in the bus stop." 40 Umm..."They were not being boisterous or directing profanities at police and they 41 were communicating with one another as if acquainted." That's what you said 42 about the other males. So, they seemed to be compliant or ...? 43 A: They didn't seem to be a...a threat to officers or our investigation. 44

Q: Okay. And in the next sentence you stated, "The others in the group 2 appeared to be getting incited by AP1's conduct." 3 A: Mmm hmm (indicating yes). 4 5 Q: How were they incited if they... I mean, in one sentence they're 6 A: Mmm hmm (indicating yes). 7 8 Q: hanging out talking with their friends, yet at the same time they're incited. 9 And in my mind, I have "incited" - that they're getting upset, that they're verbally aggressive towards you. What...What was going on there? 10 11. A: My My word choice of saying "incited" was . What I was trying to describe was, they unh, were seemed to be responding to his verbal level of aggression, 12 which was swearing and loud tone. It appeared to be more of a like, "Calm down 13 14 man," kind of kind of thing towards the towards the AP. 15 Q: Okay. Umm...So you decided to take this individual away from the group, 16 and eventually you made the decision umm, to place him under arrest, umm, for 17 obstructing the legal process. Umm...What legal process of yours was he 18 obstructing? I want a little more detail on that because... 19 20 A: Sure. 21 22 Q: at this point, he is the only one you're dealing with, 23 A: Mmm hmm (indicating yes). 24 Q: so is he obstructing you from dealing with him? I'm not clear on 25 what...what you were doing. You...You said you didn't see anyone 26 27 smoking marijuana when you came up, 28 A. Mmm hmm (indicating yes). 29 Q: you know, everything seemed to be okay. So what was your legal process 30 31 he was obstructing? 32 A: That happened a bit. the .. The obstructing the legal process was - My understanding of that was he was interfering with us to do our official duties. But 33 34 the disorder... 35 Q: And how...How was he...what...How was he interfering? Because I'm...I'll 36 tell you this - Officer Appledorn didn't have a clue that you were arresting this 37 guy or for what, and he wasn't preventing her from doing anything. A: Because he had convinced me that he had changed his to...his...his attitude and his behavior.

A: And if I... If we could have issued a citation under the circumstances, I would not have a problem issuing a citation. This appeared to me to be a custodial arrest though, and I didn't know how long Officer Appledorn was gonna be talking to this uhh, Mr. Benford.

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Q: Okay. After you had Guar in the back seat and you knew you were making the custodial arrest and you described all the force you used why didn't you call; immediately call a supervisor to the scene because of the force you used? A: Because we had...Uhh...There were a number of people around there and I...Mr. Guar was making, he was extremely loud and it appeared to be attracting more people to the area.

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Uhh...Working as a Defensive Tactics instructor, lalways report my force always. And lalways report it, if necessary, as the policy requires, to a supervisor. My intent was to have us go to a different location or away from that area in order to report that force. I had every intention of reporting the force that I used. I've used neck restraints before - I always report it - every time. I understand how the policy is and I follow it.

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41 42 Q: Okay. Umm...And your partner, Officer Appledorn, was standing outside of the squad talking to a witness, Officer Baskin was still there, umm, and you. six it correct that you got on the PA several times, telling her to get in the car, you're going to jail?

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A: I think that there was two different things that were happening. One - I was saying, "Let's get out of this area," to her.

And I believed that this male, Mr. Benford, had some relationship with...with the arrested party. So my response to him was that this male's going to jail, so if he wanted to make arrangements or whatever the situation was to pick him up, or whatever their...their relationship was, that he understood.

Q: What made...What led you to believe that this Mr. Benford, who you could see was con...you know, one was a young man, one was an old man, they were both in separate sides of the bus stop — Other than both being black males, what made you think they were together?

A: He was...He took a par...This Mr. Benford took a particular interest in uhh, the situation. He was...appeared to be video cameraing, taping, with his cell phone, uhh, from the moment that I first placed my hands on the arrested party.

Q: Okay. Umm...And it's your statement that you, during all this you remained professional, you remained calm, you used appropriate force?

A: believe that I remained professional and I used appropriate force given the circumstances.

Q: Okay. Umm...It con...Umm...What's your response to umm, a witness describing you as, umm, the aggressor, umm, kind of...This is what they say – that you were the aggressor, that it was you who set the tone of this encounter and you kept ratcheting it up with your telling this person to shut up -Guar - putting the taser on him. And they actually describe you as an, "out of control, berserk cop." What's...What is your response to that?

A: My response is that I don't believe that I was out of control. I don't believe that I was berserk. I believe that I was acting professionally, but I was using a loud tone of voice in order, and uhh, and commands in order to take command presence of the situation. I didn't want to lose that level of control.

Q: Okay. And umm, one last thing. Umm...There was two other officers there with you, umm, and other than at the end helping you get him in the squad car, umm, they did not get involved with the force you were using. Umm...What is your response to that?

A: (No audible answer.)

Q: They actually...They actually stated they didn't feel that the force rose to the level that...that you needed any help with this. Umm...And you have described what...what appears to be a pretty good struggle. You say you had to use your strength, your body force.

A: Mmm hmm (indicating yes).

Q: You used a conscious neck restraint several times, umm, yet other officers did nothing. Umm...What...What's your response to that?

A: I believe Officer Baskin showed up at a later time and Officer Appledorn, I don't know why she didn't help me.

Q: Okay. All right. Umm...Is there anything else I haven't asked you about...about this situation that you think I should know about today, Officer Chamberlain?

A: Umm...Yeah. It was...It was a concern of mine that after this...this incident happened, that uhh, neither Officer Appledorn or Sgt. Nelson asked me for my account of the situation. Uhh...It would have...I believe that I could have clarified my perception, my understanding, my reasons, uhh, for using force or for...for uhh, effectuating an arrest – if they would have asked me. I attempted to uhh, tell Sgt. Nelson my reason for using it, and she uhh, did not take my...did not...declined to take my, uhh, report of the force.

Umm...Also, I think it's important, uhh...I've worked with Sherry for probably the better part of a year. Uhh...The night of this incident, uhh, she told me that she had federal court the following week for some force incident. The night before that, uhh, the Friday night before that, the 9th of November, she told me the same thing and indicated that she was under some pressure from this. Uhh...I believe that it's possible that if she's under this level of pressure, if she...she is...was not uhh, acting as she usually does, from what I've seen her.

Umm...And as far as my...my qualifications and training that are specific to using force...Uhh...My...My training in using uhh, pressure points are from uhh, PBCT. Umm...I have worked on the Department for six years. I have worked as a Defensive Tactics instructor for two years. Uhh...In my...From my training in doing that, I've worked, I've had training from the MPD Training Unit in PBCT, which is Pressure Point Control Techniques, asp baton, handcuffing, how to use the baton (inaudible) asp, NLETC, the National Law Enforcement Training Center, which teaches uhh, they don't specifically teach, uhh, the neck restraint, they call it, they refer to it as the LVNR. Uhh...I have training as a ...as a uhh, Taser Instructor, and I also have training as a Crisis Intervention Team Officer, and as a CIT Coach also, helping to train other officers in evaluating situations.

Umm...That's my qualifications that, you know, as far as uhh, Officer Appledorn and I having a...a...not being on the same page as far as what happened, I can't...I don't know what her reasons were for that.

Q: Okay. You did, umm, mention all your qualifications. You also mentioned you felt that maybe Sherry wasn't acting the same because she had federal court, umm, for a use of force.

Umm...I guess I think it's only fair then to ask you, umm — Have you recently had any other uhh, problems with force on calls, any umm, allegations against you, about force or umm, uhh, maybe umm, your professionalism umm, with other people that you've arrested or dealt with?

White There was another bus shelter that was adjacent to it, but closer towards 3rd St.

We illuminated the group with sees our squad lighting, the take-down lights, and the sand the with, white side spotlights.

Q: Okay. Okay. And then once you arrived and you illuminated the group, what did you do next?

A: Light...We got out of our squad car. the last got out continued on the passenger's side obviously, she got out on the driver's side, and we walked towards the shelter. There is a wooden fence that's located this between the surface parking lot and the two stations, bus shelters.

We walked up there. As soon as we got close to the group, I could smell the odor of what, marijuana – smelled like it had been burning marijuana. That led me to believe that there was some whit, whit, consistency with the remarks of the call that had come from, what I read, was a DID employee.

Q: Okay. So you umm, pull up, umm, and you walk to the shelter and you smell the marijuana. Did you see anybody smoking it at this point?

A: At this point I had not seen anybody smoking it.

Q: Okay. And did you...I mean, you had your take-down lights, your spotlights on — Did you uhh, have your flashlight out...out at this time?

A: I did the, take it out at some point. believe I did have that out, the, as I was walking up to the. the train, the group.

Q: Okay. So then tell me what happens once you walk up to the shelter.

A: I state, keyed up my portable microphone and notified dispatchers that officers would be out with this group, state, at that location — that we would be out with a group of people.

One of the individuals that was sitting in the bus shelter furthest away from me and furthest away from Appledom, whith, facing us, with, appeared to be very upset and enraged that we had white with, spotlights and lighting that was focused on the group. White He addressed some concern about why there were lights and Officer Appledom white, said that she had turned the lights on because she was old and couldn't see very well.

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Q: And when...You said he was upset and enraged, umm, in my mind I have an idea of what enraged is – What...Describe what you mean by he was "enraged."

A: He appeared. The appeared very angry upon our arrival, that we were there, and that we had used our lighting. The other individuals in there, which didn't seem to respond much to us being there, they didn't have much to say.

My concern at this point was that he was argumentative, with, in response to what Officer Appledorn had said. Umm...He then began swearing, saying, with, and "Get those lights out of my fuckin' face." Lights. I noticed that his eyes were watery and bloodshot in appearance and water, I had shined my flashlight towards him to with, get a better look at him and ... and to kind of figure out what was going on with the situation.

Q: And when you had your uhh, flashlight shined at him, did you see him uhh, if he was holding any type of weapon or if he was holding any umm, narcotics or alcohol or anything like that at that point?

A: I couldn't see his hands and I did ask him, at some point to see his hands.

Q: Okay. Where...Where were his hands that you didn't see them?

A: I don't remember the incident: + hat.

Q: Okay.

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A: I don't know.

Q: Okay. All right. So, umm, he was argumentative and you ... you uhh, shined your flashlight on him. Tell me what happened next.

A: Little. He continued to united badger us about being there, united making comments about rate, something that he was minding his own business or something along those lines. And it got to the point where state, after he was swearing, er I believed that he was, when it would make the most sense to have him removed from that group.

When you uhh, were dealing with Guar, umm, you described first when he was handcuffed, that he was umm, not compliant and you had to take him, you had to use a conscious neck restraint on him. Umm...And then you describe later at the car, again you had to use...you had to use a hypoglossal on him several times.

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Umm...At any point did you either ask your partner for assistance or get on the air and ask for assistance dealing with this individual?

A: I believe I asked my partner for assistance, uhh, while she was standing 24 there. I looked up at her a couple times and parts, I said that I'd be 1c /25 10 26 bringing him to the squad car.

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Q: Okay. And you believe you asked her for assistance, but she never assisted vou?

A: I believe that's correct.

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> Q: Okay. When you had uhh, Mr. Guar in the back seat of the squad, did you ever physically have your hands around his throat?

34 A: No.

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Q: When Mr. Guar was in the back seat of the squad, was he ever screaming, umm, "Help! This officer's trying to kill me! He's killing me!"?

A: I remember him saying something like that.

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Q: What...What were you doing at the time that he was saying that, that he was screaming that?

A: I don't think that I was...I think I was getting his door shut at that point. 42

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A: Or trying to get him inside the squad car. But I don't believe that I was using 45 46 force at that point.

Q: Okay. So at no point you had...you did not have in a strangulation hold A: Ab...

Q: in the back seat?

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A: Absolutely not. That's not what I used.

Q: Okay. When you had...Umm...You described Guar as umm, "enraged," "indignant," that you had quite the struggle with him multiple times, from the time you handcuffed him to the time you finally got him in the squad car. Umm...Why did you, and you'd already decided to book him, you said that it was gonna be a custodial arrest – Why didn't you just drive him to jail and get him ID'd there instead of pulling someone that you described was a physical struggle - Why did you get him out of the back of the car to get an ID out of his pocket, when you could take him to the jail and get him ID'd there?

A: Because he had convinced me that he had changed his temhie...his attitude and his behavior.

Q: Okay. : A
A: And if I will we could have issued a citation under the circumstances, I would not have a problem issuing a citation. This appeared to me to be a custodial arrest though, and I didn't know how long Officer Appledorn was gonna be talking to this will. Mr. Benford.

Q: Okay. After you had Guar in the back seat and you knew you were making the custodial arrest and you described all the force you used, why didn't you call, immediately call a supervisor to the scene because of the force you used?

A: Because we had blibb There were a number of people around there and In.Mr. Guar was making, he was extremely loud and it appeared to be attracting more people to the area.

Whith. Working as a Defensive Tactics instructor, I always report my force — always. And I always report it, if necessary, as the policy requires, to a supervisor. My intent was to have us go to a different location or away from that area in order to report that force. I had every intention of reporting the force that I used. I've used neck restraints before — I always report it — every time. I understand how the policy is and I follow it.

Q: Okay. Umm...And your partner, Officer Appledorn, was standing outside of the squad talking to a witness, Officer Baskin was still there, umm, and you...ls it correct that you got on the PA several times, telling her to get in the car, you're going to jail?

A: I think that there was two different things that were happening. One – I was saying, "Let's get out of this area," to her.

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And I believed that this male, Mr. Benford, had some relationship with. with the arrested party. So my response to him was that this male's going to jail, so if he wanted to make arrangements or whatever the situation was to pick him up, or whatever their...their relationship was, that he understood.

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Q: What made...What led you to believe that this Mr. Benford, who you could see was con...you know, one was a young man, one was an old man, they were both in separate sides of the bus stop - Other than both being black males, what made you think they were together?

A: He was ... He took a par... This Mr. Benford took a particular interest in the situation. He appeared to be video cameraing, taping, with his cell phone, the moment that I first placed my hands on the arrested party.

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Q: Okay. Umm...And it's your statement that you, during all this you remained professional, you remained calm, you used appropriate force? A: I believe that I remained professional and I used appropriate force given the circumstances.

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Q: Okay. Umm...It con...Umm...What's your response to umm, a witness describing you as, umm, the aggressor, umm, kind of...This is what they say that you were the aggressor, that it was you who set the tone of this encounter and you kept ratcheting it up with your telling this person to shut up -Guar putting the taser on him. And they actually describe you as an, "out of control, berserk cop." What's... What is your response to that?

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A: My response is that I don't believe that I was out of control. I don't believe that I was berserk. I believe that I was acting professionally, but I was using a loud tone of voice to ender mand with, and commands in order to take command presence of the situation. I didn't want to lose that level of control.

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Q: Okay. And umm, one last thing. Umm...There was two other officers there with you, umm, and other than at the end helping you get him in the squad car, umm, they did not get involved with the force you were using. Umm...What is your response to that?

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A: (No audible answer.)

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Q: They actually...They actually stated they didn't feel that the force rose to the level that...that you needed any help with this. Umm...And you have described what...what appears to be a pretty good struggle. You say you had to use your strength, your body force.

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A: Mmm hmm (indicating yes).

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Q: You used a conscious neck restraint several times, umm, yet other officers did nothing. Umm...What...What's your response to that?

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A: I believe Officer Baskin showed up at a later time and Officer Appledorn; I don't know why she didn't help me.

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Q: Okay. All right. Umm...Is there anything else I haven't asked you about...about this situation that you think I should know about today, Officer Chamberlain?

A: Umm....Yeah... It was a concern of mine that after this incident happened, that the neither Officer Appledorn of Sgt. Nelson asked me for my account of the situation. State it would have clarified my perception, my understanding, my reasons, with, for using force or for ...for effectuating an arrest – if they would have asked me. I attempted to tell Sgt. Nelson my reason for using it, and she who did not take my did notated to take my the report of the force.

Land Also, I think it's important, which I've worked with Sherry for probably the better part of a year. The night of this incident, she told me that she had federal court the following week for some force incident. The night before that the Friday night before that, the 9th of November, she told me the same thing and indicated that she was under some pressure from this. Uhh...I believe that it's possible that if ches under this level of pressure, the same was not was, acting as she usually does, from what I've seen her.

And as far as my qualifications and training that are specific to using force... Little My ... My training in using util, pressure points are from ubb, PBCT PPCT Light...I have worked on the Department for six years. I have worked as a Defensive Tactics instructor for two years. Hither tremy. From my training in doing that, Pre-worked, I've had training from the MPD Training Unit in PRCT, PPCT, which is Pressure Point Control Techniques, asp baton, handcuffing, how to use the baton (inaudible) asp, NLETC, the National Law Enforcement Training Center, which teaches whit; they den't specifically teach, whit, the neck restraint, they call it, they refer to it as the LVNR. Libbs. I have training as a ... as a who, Taser Instructor, and I also have training as a Crisis Intervention Team Officer, and as a CIT Coach also, helping to train other officers in evaluating situations.

hat's my qualifications that, you know, as far as with, Officer Appledorn and I having a...a... not being on the same page as far as what happened, earit.... I don't know what her reasons were for that.

Q: Okay. You did, umm, mention all your qualifications. You also mentioned you felt that maybe Sherry wasn't acting the same because she had federal court, umm, for a use of force.

Umm...I guess I think it's only fair then to ask you, umm - Have you recently had any other uhh, problems with force on calls, any umm, allegations against you about force or umm, uhh, maybe umm, your professionalism umm, with other people that you've arrested or dealt with?

A. Yes I do. 36 37 38 Q. Is it true that you have read, understood and signed the Data Practices warning, otherwise known as the Tennessen Warning? 39 40 A. Yes I have. 41 Q. Have I informed you that the purpose of this statement relates to an internal 42 investigation, specifically an administrative review that is being conducted on the 44 following: 45 On November 10th, 2012, it is alleged that Officer Chamberlain arrested a person 46 without cause and used excessive force on the subject prior to handcuffing and 47 after the subject was handcuffed. It is further alleged that Officer Chamberlain

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used harsh and racist language towards the subject. And you are being called here to answer questions today, have you been informed of this ahead of time? A. Yes I have.

Q. Are you ready to answer questions about this?

6 A: Yes I am.

Q. Um, the night of this incident that Officer Appledorn and Officer Chamberlain responded to, um, you responded to the scene of their call. Why did you respond?

A: I was working squad 106. I was the only Mid-Watch supervisor on, um, I was actually at the station when squad 160, uh, Officer Appledorn asked for me to come to the scene on the air.

Q: Okay and when you arrived on the scene um, who did you speak to?
A: When I arrived I pulled up, uh, I was almost parallel with 160's car. I saw
Officer Appledorn walking away from the squad car. Um, I saw Officer Baskin
was out and Officer Chamberlain was in the squad car and then there was a
group of people. Um, Officer Appledorn looked really upset so I walked over to
her right away to see if everything was okay cause I didn't know exactly why I got
called over there and she just, um, she looked at me and said, "he went too far",
"Lean't even talk about it right this moment". And that's when I realized she was
mad but not hurt upset.

Q: Okay and what did you do after that, after she told you that?

A: Um, I asked her, uh, I asked her what she meant and she goes there's a bunch of witnesses over there and pointed towards the bus shelter and I let her walk away and cool off and I went to talk to the witnesses to see what was going on.

Q: Okay and after talking to the witnesses what did you, um, learn about this situation?

A: Well I talked to several witnesses. There were six or seven in the bus shelter. There was a main, um, older male, um, Mr. Benford, who became the spokesperson because he actually had the most detail. Uh, he provided quite a bit of details, he said that, uh, the squad had pulled up. They – that there had been a group in the bus shelter, the squad had pulled up and had their lights on, their take down lights and their spot lights and that the female officer, who was Officer Appledorn, was talking to the crowd, telling 'em well hold on I'll take care of the lights in just a minute, I'm old, I have to see.

Q: Um-hum (positive response).

A: Uh, and that the male officer, who was Officer Chamberlain, when Mr. Guar, I think that's how we pronounced his last name, said something about can you get the lights out of my face. Officer Chamberlain went up to him and had his taser pointed at him and put his flashlight in his face and started yelling at him. When that happened, um, Officer Chamberlain still remained engaged with Guar, pushed him up against the bus shelter. He called it, um; yanking his hands

1 behind his back and handcuffing him and then put him in a choke hold and took him to the squad car while he was handcuffed in a choke hold.

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Q: Okay. And what else did they tell you about that incident?

A: Um, well both Benford and two other witnesses demonstrated the choke hold? by putting their own arms around their neck and then Mr. Benford said that Officer Chamberlain was saying some racially derogatory statements. I asked him if he would clarify what those were for me and he said that he wouldn't repeat them.

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Q: Okay.

A: So I did not get any specifics. He just said it was racially derogatory. 12

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Q: Okay.

A: Uh, then they said, uh. Benford said when, um, back at the squad car that there was a point when Chamberlain went back into the back seat to get Guar after he had already been into that squad car and had him in a choke hold again 18 and that's when Officer Appledorn and Baskin had to go help him and get him back in the squad car. I wasn't - that part was a little fuzzy listening to the witnesses.

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Q: Okay

A: Um, that got clarified later after I read the statements but, um, there was a point that the witnesses said that he was at the back door, that he had taken him out of the back seat and had him in a choke hold again.

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Q: Okay. Okay and after you, um, heard all of this what did you do? A: Uh, well first thing I did while Guar was still in the back seat yelling, um, I then went back to Officer Appledorn because Officer Baskin was kind of helping manage the crowd. I went back to Officer Appledorn and asked her to give me a short statement of what happened just to see if it would match up with the witnesses and she, she just basically told me, um, Chamberlain - she had been talking to the crowd and they were fine and Chamberlain got mad at Guar and walked up to him and started yelling at him and handcuffed him and brought him to the back seat of the squad car. She didn't know exactly why, so she said that, Chamberlain said he was under arrest but she didn't know exactly why and then once he was in the squad car, Guar was, Chamberlain had gotten in the front seat and for some reason while Appledorn and Baskin were still out with the crowd trying to calm them back down, he got out of the squad car again and took him out of the back seat and that's when they started struggling and she had to go-help-him-put-him-back in. So that was, that was, I didn't ask for too many details I wanted to see if it kind of matched up to the witnesses and it did. At that point it was matching up to the same kind of story.

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Q: Okay.

A: I didn't actually ask Officer Baskin for too much detail out there cause at that 46 point I had determined that A) I think that we have an arrest that was unfounded 47 and B) that I knew that Officer Chamberlain was not gonna be going back out on 48

the street that night because he was - for two reasons; becaused thought that he from what I had heard may have used excessive force and second because if his temper was this far out of control I didn't know if he'd have a chance to pring it back it I didn't want him to get in any other trouble.

5 6 Q: Okay.

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A: And I knew that this was going to take a while to straighten out. So then I had Officer Baskin take Officer Chamberlain and go sit in 110 because Mr. Guar was in 160 and that's when I took Mr. Guar out and talked to him.

Q: Okay and what did Mr. Guar tell you?

A: Well after we finally got him calmed down he, he was, he had cried for almost 13 ten-minutes over his necklace that was broken and um when I found out he didn't have a phone number I actually put him in my squad car in the front seat and hit my MVR to record our conversation just in case we couldn't get a hold of him again, and he said he had walked up right before the squad had got there. He was not part of the group that was smoking marijuana and when he got there the squad car was shining lights at him. He thought it was at him, so he asked emto move the lights because he didn't have anywhere else to stand. He said as soon as I said that the male officer came and had a flashlight in his face and was yelling at him. Um, he didn't really remember the taser. The witnesses did but not Mr. Guar. He said he got pushed up against the bus shelter and he said at that point I put my hands up and that he had each hand wrenched behind his back and handcuffed. Uh, when he asked what he was being arrested for that's when Officer Chamberlain put him in a choke hold and basically drug him back to the squad car.

Q: Okay

A: Back at the squad car, um, and this is also a little confusing. I don't know if he was pressing on his throat with his hand like squeezing and using the asp the first time he was put in the back seat of the squad car, but he said after he had gotten in the squad car Officer Chamberlain asked him for his ID and he said it was in his pocket. At that point Officer Chamberlain came and got him out of the squad car and was pushing, and had him in a choke hold again.

Q: Okay.

A: So the sequence of when he got pressed in the neck with a hand and an asp, I don't know if that was the first time or the second time.

Q: Okay. Um, after you spoke to Guar, um, did you speak to Officer Chamberlain?

A: Officer Chamberlain came up to me and said well I need to, he needed to give me his force review and I knew at that point that A) we were going to be going back to the station and talk about things and B) that I didn't want to cross any Garrity lines asking him specific details. I knew I was gonna have to do a force review but I knew I could also do it off of his report instead of asking specific questions. So I told him to just hold on I had to check on some things, we'd talk back at the precinct.

Q: Okav.

A: So, I did not take any report from him on the scene.

2 3

Q: Okay, did anyone at the scene specifically tell you what they were placing 4 5 Guar under arrest for?

A: No, uh, I did not know that...I knew that Officer Chamberlain wanted him 6 arrested. Uh, kalso knew from Officer Appledorn and everyone else's description 8 that there wasn't a disorderly conduct because he wasn't part of the original 9 group nor did he engage in any disorderly behavior and, um, eventually Officer Chamberlain put in his report he wanted obstructing with force, however, it didn't 10 sound like there was any active part on his part to stop the arrest. 11

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Q: Okay.

A: Just from what I had heard out there I didn't feel there was enough to arrest him for so Lactually released him from the scene.

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Q: Okay. Um, has Officer Chamberlain spoke to you about this since the 17 incident? 18

A: No, um, I've, I immediately started calling lieutenant's because this is not something we usually have happen.

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Q: Um-hum (positive response).

A: I knew I wasn't gonna let him go back out on enforcement duties that night so I needed to make sure I took the right steps, uh, after I talked to Car 9, which was Lt. Lund and Lt. Glampe to make sure everything was in the right order and I talked to Inspector Frizell, we put him on the desk. Um, Lt. Delmonico had already been called by Officer Appledorn because she had some questions about statements, which worked out really well cause I didn't know for sure if they should all be doing statements including Officer Chamberlain at that point and he came and... and I purposely did not ask him anything specific about it. I told Officer Chamberlain I would just review his report for the force review, um, and I did take pictures when he showed me that he had some scratches on his arm and I asked him if he was okay but I didn't ask him anything specifically about what he did.

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Q: Okay. Uh, have you had any further contact with, um, either Guar or any of the witnesses since this incident?

A: Guar did come into the station later that night. I really got the impression he didn't think I was doing anything because he had saw Officer Chamberlain leave with Officer Baskin in 110, in a squad car, and Officer Appledorn leave in a squad car. Uh, he came into the station about an hour later yelling about, um, being mistreated and nobody was doing anything and I had heard him. I was upstairs in my office and by the time I came downstairs he had already left.

Q: Okay.

A: I did see him last week when I was at Davanni's picking up some food and he walked in and he said thank you and read me a bible scripture and left.

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Q: Okay, um.

A: As for the rest of the witnesses, not that I have noticed.

Q: Okay. Okay, um, is there anything else that you did that night?

A: I took photographs. Guar did have a cut over his either left or right eye; it's whichever ones in my report. I did take a picture of the, his necklace, which was very precious to him. It was a religious symbol that got broken and he took that back with him so I don't have the broken necklace. Um, I did my reports obviously. I talked to Inspector Frizell and a couple lieutenants and then I told, um, Officer Chamberlain was told both by me and by Lt. Delmonico that he would be on the desk during the duration of this investigation. Um, or until somebody higher than me made the decision that he wasn't.

Q: Okay.

A: And he was also informed that night that he couldn't work part-time because he had been put on desk duty for right now.

Q: Okay. Is there anything about this event, um, that you, that you think I should know about that maybe isn't in the reports or that I didn't ask you about?

A: Ithink what makes this event so significant was the officers reaction and the fact that the officers, the witness officers and the witnesses themselves all had pretty much the same exact story. Uh, and the fact that the arrest part didn't worry me so much because accould have figured why he thought he was arresting him but it was all the actions afterwards. Especially the second part of the squad car, the back seat of the squad car, um, I just couldn't understand that one completely either and granted I probably should have talked to Officer Chamberlain, but I really didn't, I really felt right away I couldn't cross that line cause it was a serious event.

Q: Okay. Is there anything else that you think I should know about?

A: Um, no I don't think so; I think I either covered it here or in my statement, so.

Q: Okay. Has this been a true and accurate statement today?

A: Yes it has.

Q: Okay. Umm...And at any time while you were sitting there, umm, did the police -6 Minneapolis police officers respond? 7

A: Yes. After I had been sitting there for a while, and then a couple of the young people left, there was a male and a female – they were white; and then I saw a squad car pull up 9 with the headlights on and the spotlights, and that drew my attention. 10

Q: Okay. And umm, why don't you describe to me umm, once the police officers 12 arrived and they lit up the bus shelter with their spotlights, tell me what you saw. Walk 13 me through it. 14

A: Well, two officers got out of the squad car...car. One was a female, the other was a 15 male. The female was driving the car. Uhh...The female entered the shelter first where 16 the young people were and the other officer entered the shelter with his taser gun pointing 17 18 towards the young people.

O: Okay. Umm...And did you hear them say anything to the young people that were in 20 the bus shelter, did you hear the officers speak? 21

A: Well, the young people spoke first.

A: Uhh... Then Officer Chamberlain, the male one, stated, uhh, he said, "Shut up." And then the other kids said, "Well, we didn't do anything." And they said that sort of in unison. And he said, "Shut up," again - I mean really hostile. And then this other kid said, "Can you turn out the lights, you...the lights are blinding me" - again. At that point, Officer Chamberlain told him that he...he pointed to him and said, "You're going to jail:"

A: When he said that, the kid said again, "Well, I didn't do anything." The cops said, 36 "Shut up. I told you to shut up and come here, you're going to jail!" And then he had the 37 kid turn around so he could handcuff him, which his forcibly turned him around and put 38 the cuffs on him, which had to be extremely tight because the kid screamed out and said, 39 "These are really tight!" 40

Then the officer proceeded to take the kid to the squad car. He exited the shelter, then he 42 stopped and turned and slammed the kid's face into the windowpane of the shelter, the 43 left side – if you're on this side of the shelter it would be on the left side. 44

46 Q. Okay. A: Slammed his face into the shelter. When I saw that, I said, "Hey, that's not right."

3 Q: Mmm hmm (indicating yes).

A: The kid hadn't done anything. And then the officer just...he took the kid off...pulled him off, away from the window, and then it looked as if he was taking him to the police car, and for some reason he just stopped, turned around and took the kid toward Hennepin Ave.

89 Q: Okay.

A: And the kid was saying at the time, "I didn't do anything." And the Officer

Chamberlain put the kid in a choke hold and I could hear the kid gurgling, he said, "I

can't breathe. I can't breathe. Please stop." The officer then took the kid to the ground.

At that time, several other police cars pulled up and when they pulled up the kid was screaming and hollering and said, "I'm choking, I can't breathe!" And I asked the officers, I said, "Stop them. That's police brutality!" And they just observed. They didn't do anything. They watched him as he continued to choke the kid. And the kid was just... The kid could hardly get any sound out - it was muffled sounds because he was being choked.

Then the officer quit choking the kid, got up and was taking him to the police car. He got to the police car, he put him and sat in the police car. Then the officer got inside in the back seat with the kid and started punching him. And the kid was screaming and hollering, he said, "Help me! Help me! Someone please help me!" And I could not believe it. I asked the officers again, I said, "Stop it. Please stop what he's doing to that kid. That is brutality, that man is killing that kid!" And it was Officer Appledorn and Officer Baskin who enter...who came in with another police c...car. And they just stood there and...while the cop was in the back seat beating the kid.

And then he stopped, he pulled the kid out of the car and then he stood the kid up and slammed the kid's face on the roof of the police car.

Q: Okay.

A: And the kid was screaming and hollering and saying, "Help!" And there were uhh, other folks waiting for the bus on 3rd Ave. and they were seeing all this transpire. And then after he slammed the kid's head on the police car, the roof of the car, he straightened the kid up and then took the door of the police car and started slamming it against the kid's back – and the kid was handcuffed.

40 Q: Okay.

A: The kid was still screaming and hollering. And I asked Officer Appledorn at that time, I said, "Can you do something? Can you stop this?" She said, "Well, I called our supervisor, she'll be here shortly."

Q: Okay.

A: No, she said, "I called the uhh, Precinct supervisor and she's a woman, she'll be here shortly." I said, "Well, my bus will be coming any moment now, I don't know if I would be here." Officer Appledorn then said, "Well, if you miss your bus I will give you a ride home." A few minutes later, uhh, Chamberlain was in the ve...he got in the squad car, in the front seat and he told Officer Appledorn, "Let's go to the jail." And she was standing there waiting for the Precinct capt...uhh, supervisor. And then he said again, "Come on, let's go to the jail." And by that time, Sgt. Nelson appeared.

9 Q: Okay.

A: She came over. Well, she spoke with Officer Appledorn and then she came over and spoke with me and they asked, because she...she said, "I've been told that you took pictures of the incident." I said, "Yes, I did." And then I tried, I showed her the camera, well my cell phone – pulled up the pictures, but they were dark and you couldn't see anything except the lights from the squad car and the street lights on the street.

Witness to Police Brutality on November 10, 2012

I was present in the metro bus shelter located at 3rd & Hennepin Ave, when I witness an extreme case of police brutality inflicted by policeman John Chamberlain, who arrived on the scene in car 160 at about 5:15 pm, Saturday evening.

I was sitting in the middle section of the bus shelter when I saw the incident unfold. The shelter has 3 sections, two are enclosed and one is open. I was in the open section. The incident occurred in the east section, the side facing Washington Ave.

There were 7 to 10 young people in this section. It was a mixed group of black & white and male & female. I could small marijuana coming from this section while I was waiting on my bus. After a while two of the young people left. They were white and one was male and the other was female. A moment or two after they had left a police cruiser pulled up in front of shelter populated by the young people. The cruiser had its headlights and the spot light directed at the youths. A policewoman was driving and a male officer was the passenger. The policewoman, Sherry Appledorn, was the first to enter the shelter and the male officer, John Chamberlain, was behind her. Officer Chamberlain entered with his Taser gun pointed at the youths. He was hostile and aggressive from the moment he entered the shelter. One of the youths stated that the lights were blinding him and if the officers would turn off the lights. Officer Chamberlain told him to shut up. The other youths said they had just arrived in the shelter and they hadn't done anything.

The male youth asked the officers again if they would turn off the lights because he couldn't see. Officer Chamberlain told that youth he was going to jail. The kid responded he hadn't done anything. Officer Chamberlain again told the youth to shut up and get up. The youth kept saying he hadn't done anything. The policeman handcuffed him very roughly and began to take the kid toward the police car. Suddenly the policeman stopped and slammed the kid's face on the right window pane of the shelter. The youth screamed when his face hit the window pane and said he hadn't done anything. I shouted to Chamberlain that I was taking pictures of what he was doing. The policeman pulled the youth off the window and turned him around and proceeded toward the police car. Officer Chamberlain stopped, turned around and forced the young man toward Hennepin Ave. The young man was complaining that the handcuffs were hurting him. The policeman then put the kid in a choke hold and took the young man down to the ground choking him. The kid was gurgling and saying he couldn't breathe. The officer continued to choke him very forcefully. I shouted again that I was taking pictures of what he was doing. The youth could barely speak but he was pleading for help and begged the policeman to stop. I told the officer to stop that he was hurting the young man. I shouted to the other officers present to stop Officer Chamberlain. I told them to stop the brutalization that was occurring but neither one of them did anything but watch. In fact, they looked very sad at what was going on. Another policeman was present, (Officer Baskin), and was watching Chamberlain

choking the kid on the ground. Then Officer Chamberlain pulled the young man up and took him to the car and put him in the back seat. Then unbelievably, Officer Chamberlain got in the back seat on top of the kid and starting beating him with his fist. The youth was screaming and pleading for help. He kept begging for someone to help and stop Chamberlain. The policeman continued punching the kid in the back seat of the car. I continue to beg the other officers to stop him. I said this was police brutality and was uncalled for. I told them I was going to report this to the NAACP, the newspapers, the TV stations, and the police department. I told them Chamberlain's behavior was uncalled for and he didn't deserve to be a policeman. I shouted that Chamberlain had lost control of himself and was hurting that young man. I continue to plead to the police officers to stop Officer Chamberlain. Officer Appledorn came toward me and said she had called her Supervisor and reported the incident. She said the Supervisor was coming to the scene. I told Officer Appledorn my bus would be arriving soon and I would have to leave. The officer told me if I missed my bus she would give me a ride home.

Again I was astounded by Chamberlain's behavior. He had got off the young man and pulled him out of the car. He stood the young man up and slammed his face on the roof of the police car. The kid was handcuffed and screaming. Chamberlain then took the car door and slammed it against the young man's body several times. Chamberlain had gone berserk! It was unbelievable. If one had not witnessed this incident it would be hard for anyone to believe a policeman would behave this way. Particularly when all these young people were doing was seating on the bench in the bus shelter when the police arrived. None of them were disrespectful to the police officers. There wasn't any bad language, any threatening gestures, no standing and shouting or anything out of line. They all had remained sitting on the bench. All they had said was they had not done anything wrong and they had just arrived at the shelter.

Chamberlain had put the youth back in the car and then got into the front seat of the car. Officer Appledorn was talking to me when Chamberlain shouted to her, "let's go". She continued to talk to me and he shouted, "let's go to the jail". Shortly after he had said this, Sgt. Patricia Nelson arrived on the scene. She spoke with Officer Appledorn and then she approached me. She introduced herself as the Supervisor of the Precinct and asked my name. I told her and then I recounted what had occurred. She said Officer Appledorn had told her I had taken pictures and would I show them to her. I told her I had but the pictures were dark and you couldn't see anything on them but the lights of the police car and the street lights on Hennepin Ave. I told Sgt. Nelson that I had friends who were police officers and I knew that all policemen didn't behave the way Chamberlain had. I told her it was policemen like Chamberlain that gave the police force a bad name. I stated he had been completely unprofessional and didn't deserve to be a policeman. I told her it was situations like this that contributed to why the Black community did not trust and respect white policemen. I said Officer Chamberlain was a danger to society and should be removed from the police department because he was unprofessional and he carried a firearm. He had lost control of himself and went berserk in front of a number of people. She told me the incident would be investigated and thanked me.



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

The one on I'd say the closest of the northwest corner, there was about eight to ten probably individuals in there and from what I observed smoking marijuana or some type of narcotic and they were passing it around.

A: Um, I observed them for five - ten minutes doing this and made a call to my dispatch, which, um, they were able to put a camera on it, but didn't have a good view, and at that time I requested a call be placed to 911 for a response.

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Q: Okay and did you stay in that area and wait for the police to respond? A: I did. um. I initially walked across to the - actually northwest corner, it was the northeast corner the bus shelter is on. And then I traveled down to the southwest

corner where the other bus stop is, pretty much kiddle corner to that bus stop and

just continued to observe them until units arrived.

Q: Okay and when the police arrived, um, did you stay in the south corner or did you come closer to the bus stop again.

A: I came closer, once I, um, saw that they arrived on scene I started to head back north, uh, up to the northwest corner of 3rd and Hennepin and maybe twenty or thirty feet up there there is like a tree and I'm kind of just leaning up against a tree pretty much directly across from the bus stop and just observing everything that was taking place.

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Q: Okay, and, um, can you tell me what you observed once...tell me what you observed the police do once they arrived on scene?

Police responded to the above intersection to investigate a disturbance call. DID was the 911 caller. The remarks indicated that a group of 10 were smoking marijuana at the above location. Police observed odor of marijuana use inside of the bus shelter by a large group at this location. AP1 began using profanities and his actions were getting the other members of the group beside him upset. AP1 was ordered to step away from the group and he showed much hostility towards police. AP1 was then told he was under arrest. The on duty supervisor was called to the scene to assess the force used. AP1 was eventually ID'd and tagged in lieu for DISCON and OBSTRUCT.

REC: CASE CLOSED BY ARREST.

On Saturday, November 10, 2012, at about 1707 hours, I was working uniformed patrol district 160 (as the passenger) with my assigned partner OFCR APPLEDORN. At this time, officers were dispatched to a DISTURBANCE located at the NE corner of HENNEPIN AVE and 3RD ST S. The 911 caller was the Downtown Improvement District (DID). The remarks of the call stated the following:

"11/10/2012 17:06:13 CT064075 Response NE CORNER GRP OF 10 SMOKING POT"

Upon arrival, officers located a group at the NE corner of the above intersection inside the bus shelter closest to the north (there were two separate bus shelters right next to each other at this location). I saw a group of males sitting in the bus shelter. Officer APPLEDORN pulled the car up to the north shelter from the surface parking lot; officers were specifically coming from the north. I illuminated the shelter area with the squad car's overhead takedown lights and my side spotlight.

Officers walked up to the bus shelter entryway and I could immediately smell from my career experience and career training that there was a pungent odor of marijuana coming from the bus shelter. The other adjacent shelter appeared unoccupied and was available for any individuals wishing to stay away from marijuana use.

I used my portable flashlight to illuminate the group in addition to the squad car's lighting. I notified MECC dispatchers via radio that officers were out with the group.

When I shined my flashlight at the group, one of the males facing officers, (later ID'd as AP1) said, "Get those lights outta my fuckin' face!" I saw that AP1's eyes were watery and bloodshot in appearance and he appeared enraged. He continued to badger officers while using loud profanities.

There were at least 5 males in the shelter, including AP1. There were people inside of the shelter; from where officers were facing, to our right, our left, and straight ahead. The group of males were all seated on the separate benches inside of the shelter. I could smell the odor of burning marijuana, even stronger in smell, as I got closer to the enclosed portion of the shelter. The smoking of any substance is prohibited inside of bus shelters by law.

AP1 was causing a disturbance while the other males sitting in the bus stop were not being boisterous or directing profanities at police; however they were communicating with one another as if acquainted. The others in the group appeared to be getting incited by AP1's conduct. From my experience dealing with groups of people, under the influence of alcohol or drugs, I believed that it would be safest for officers to remove AP1 from the other group of males as AP1 had showed the most verbal aggression. Officer APPLEDORN and I were also outnumbered by the group at this point in time.

I instructed AP1 to stand up. AP1 did not cooperate and he was in the furthest bench away from officers; meaning that I would have had to enter the shelter past the other group members to get a hold of AP1. I pointed my MPD issued CED (Taser) at AP1, red-dotting his torso. I told him again to stand up and to keep his hands where I could see them. I told AP1 to come back towards me outside of the shelter and to face away. He walked outside of the shelter and stood with his body facing mine. His posture was tense. I told him a second time to face away and he did not cooperate. I then told AP1 that he was "under arrest" and to face away. I pushed him with my free hand, I still had my CED in my weapon hand. He took a step back and his eyes became wide and his profanities and boisterous tone continued. I told him he was interfering with officer's ability to do our jobs. I stered my CED and handcuffed AP1. I tried to walk AP1 away from the bus shelter and towards the squad car parked on the surface lot and AP1 violently pulled away from me. I briefly attempted a wrist lock but these attempts at control were not effective. AP1 had not been searched at this point and I did not know his intentions. I then used a conscious neck restraint to

bring AP1 under control. I lowered AP1 to the ground but he struggled violently. I did not use any strikes, and AP1 did not appear to go unconscious. I did use my body weight to pin AP1 down until I could check his waistband for weapons. AP1 processing at me while he was down on the ground. I did not use any strikes directed at AP1, but he was moving his aggressively while down on the ground. It is possible that his face made contact with the asphalt.

OFCR APPLEDORN was still speaking with other males from the group.

I saw and heard an older male standing nearby with his cellphone in his hand, appearing to record the incident.

I was able to get AP1 to stand up and walk over to the squad car. He was continually indignant and used loud profanities. I searched AP1 more thoroughly at this time, because AP1 needed to be booked to prevent further criminal conduct. AP1 began raising his voice again, while I was searching him and pulled his body away. I pinned AP1's body between the squad car and my body. It seemed likely that AP1 was trying to distract me from searching him, possibly to prevent me from locating contraband at a NARC related call. I told AP1 to spread his feet and he did not cooperate. I used a hypoglossal pressure point technique; in order bring AP1's resistance under control. I checked AP1's hands and handcuffs for fit prior to pushing him into the squad car. I had my flashlight in my free hand. AP1 again, tried to get out of the car, causing me to bump my head against the door frame of the squad car. I pinned his leg with my knee and pushed his head back with hypoglossal pressure point, long enough to get him all the way inside of the squad car and I got out and secured the door.

I then got in the front passenger seat of the squad car and attempted to ID AP1 by name. Initially he told me that he wasn't going to give his name. I then explained to him why officers were on the call by showing him the computer. I showed him that he was at the NE corner of 3TH ST and HENNEPIN AVE and that the remarks indicated that there was marijuana being smoked by 10 at this location. He seemed to calm down and told me that his name was on his ID. AP1's mood swings were cyclic, but at this point he was softer spoken and it seemed like he had calmed down. I then attempted to get his ID from him because I was not able to get it before, and he had convinced me that he would be cooperative. As soon as I opened the door he quickly kicked his legs out, I took a step back to avoid being struck, at which time moved his body out of the squad car. I tried to use my strength to maintain control of him and to prevent flight. My efforts to bring him under control by my strength again proved to be unsuccessful. I then used the conscious neck restraint to lower AP1 to the ground. AP1 did not appear to conscious at this time. At this point, OFC APPLEDORN and OFC BASKIN assisted me with getting AP1 into the squad car. I closed the door. SGT NELSON responded to the arrest scene. I asked her if she wanted me to report the force at this time and she said that I could report it back at the station.

I noticed that I had fresh scratches on both my left and right forearms as a result of the struggle with AP1 and a blood spot on my left shoulder patch. I showed my injury to SGT NELSON and she photographed the scratches and blood stain to my patch.

While working squad 160 with my partner OFC Chamberlain, we were dispatched to 3 St S/Hennepin Av S on the NE corner where the MTC bus shelter is located that there is a group smoking "pot" according to the caller.

I pulled into the parking lot from Hennepin Av S to approach the front of the bus shelter at which point I could see that there were some people sitting in the shelter. The bus shelter is partially enclosed with glass on three sides except for the east facing side; this is where I pulled the front of the squad to face with the lights into the shelter. Because it was dark outside and the shelter was not lite from inside, I used the front headlights and OFC Chamberlain turned on his spot light and also the take down lights on top of the squad. This was enough light that I could visibly see everyone making sure that our safety was not jeopardized.

There is a wooden fence that is used to block the front of the bus shelter and stretches along the shelter and partially past. Because of the height of the wooden fence I did not want to try and jump over and fall, so I walked down to one of the opening which was closest to the group sitting inside the shelter.

When I got to the front of the opening I could see that there were about six people sitting in the shelter and one of them as later ID as Trokon Guar 12-25-90. Guar was sitting on the far bench which faces the squad which is why he started to complain about the lights being in his face. He was getting upset over the lights and had asked that we "officers" turn the lights off and that is was "wrong" for us to be using them. I told Guar "Honey, it is dark outside and I need to see and I am old" which I said to help diffuse the situation of Guar getting upset. He continued to complain and I again told him that I needed to see and just give me a minute to figure stuff out. It should be noted that the rest of the group sitting in the shelter was compliant and had no issues with the lights being used.

I heard OFC Chamberlain tell Guar to relax and to "shut up" which Guar said he was doing nothing wrong which I then noticed the taser red dot on Guar chest/torso area. It should be noted that he was still sitting at this time when the taser red dot was deployed by OFC Chamberlain. I then heard OFC Chamberlain tell Guar that he was under arrest and to get up, but Guar refused right away saying something to the effect that he was doing nothing wrong. OFC Chamberlain again told him to get up and walk toward him.

Guar got up leaving his belongings on the bench and started to walk toward OFC Chamberlain at the same time Guar was upset over being asked to get up and being placed under arrest and was yelling about it but I don't remember what all he was saying. I was now focused on the remainder of the group sitting in the bus shelter. I noticed movement out of the corner of my right eye which is where OFC Chamberlain was with Guar, I was watching the group but also trying to keep OFC Chamberlain in view. I saw him shove Guar up against the glass of the shelter face first at the same time telling him to get his hands behind his back. OFC Chamberlain was able to get him handcuffed and started to walk him back toward the squad.

I then explained to the group that we got a 911 call on several people smoking inside the shelter and that I could smell both marijuana and cigarette smoke, which the group verbally acknowledged but denied it was them. It should be noted that I did not observe anyone smoking when I first arrived on scene. While I was talking with the group of which they appeared to be teenagers, I heard Guar yelling and screaming about how he wasn't doing anything wrong and I observed OFC Chamberlain take Guar to the ground and apply a neck restraint on him. Guar was yelling and I walked over to where they were at and I told Guar to stop resisting and just to relax to stop struggling with OFC Chamberlain while they were both on the ground at this point. At some point OFC Chamberlain then got compliance and got Guar up to his feet and started to walk him back to the squad. I watched OFC Chamberlain walk Guar to the back of the squad on the passenger side and open up the door. I observed Guar being put up against the trunk of the squad with his face on the back windshield and I could hear Guar yelling about OFC Chamberlain but then Guar was placed in the rear of the squad.

I than noticed that OFC Baskin had arrived on scene and asked me if I needed anything in regards to the group that was still in the helter. I was up by the group and they were yelling about OFC Chamberlain and his behavior and one asked if they could go. I told them that everything was ok with them and if they wanted to leave they could. At some point another person walked up and said something about "that officer and his behavior and that he has it on his cell phone".

I could hear Guar yelling while he was in the back of the squad because I had the back windows down because of how nice it outside. I looked over and saw OFC Chamberlain in the backseat of the squad leaning inside and partially on top of Guar his hands around Guars neck. I then saw Guar being taken out of the backseat of the squad and being put on the ground and OFC Chamberlain was administering a neck restraint.

I immediately started over r in their direction because now I could leave because the group had left the bus shelter unlike before I had to keep an eye on them and OFC Chamberlain and Guar dividing my attention making sure the group would not get involved because like I said earlier they were already upset over OFC Chamberlains behavior. I have had past experiences where groups standing by and watching get "worked up" upset and start yelling and at some point will try to get involved.

When I got over the squad OFC Chamberlain was trying to get Guar back into the backset but Guar was not going to go saying something about "he is trying to kill me" and stiffened his body upright which was making it hard for OFC Chamberlain to get him into the squad. I walked over to the driver side of the squad and opened the back door and crawled inside, knowing this goes against my comfort in officer safety placing myself in this position, but I did this to try and de-escalate the situation in getting Guar in the backseat. Once I was inside the back of the squad, I started to talk very calm and slow saying "honey just relax, breath and get inside" which Guar turned to his left looking at him and got inside the squad all the way. I was trying to calm Guar down over the situation and I told him that I was taking care of this and had called my sergeant. I closed the backseat door and noticed that the windows were now rolled up.

I then walked over to the guy that said initially that he had been taping the incident and was explaining to him that I had a sergeant coming out and that if he would be willing to stay she would like to view the video.

OFC Chamberlain then yelled at me that "we are leaving" and when I did not acknowledge him, he got on the PA system of the squad "loud speaker" and yelled "we are leaving get in the squad, he's going to jail". It was then that I walked over to OFC Chamberlain who was sitting in the front seat and told him that we are not leaving and Sgt. Nelson was coming out to the scene that I had called her to come out.

Nelson arrived on scene and I spoke to her about what occurred. Sometime later Sgt. Nelson wanted to speak with Guar and take some photos and which point I took him out of the backseat of the squad took the handcuffs off. While Sgt. Nelson was asking him questions about the incident and if he needed medical attention, he mentioned that OFC Chamberlain put something to his throat at the same time he was making hand gestures in trying to describe what was used. He at first held his hands out in front to show how long the 'thing' and then said it was on his belt. I looked at my belt trying to figure out what Guar was talking about and then he made another gesture with his hands like a up and down motion at which point I took out my ASP and showed it to him and he stated that was it.

I was informed to go to the precinct to start my report which I started to and then realized when I got here and opened up the trunk that I had Guar property. I then returned to incident location and returned his property.

On 11/10/2012 at 1710 hours, I was called to 3rd St S/Hennepin Avenue S by Officer Appledorn. She was assigned Squad 160 with her partner, Officer John Chamberlain, and they were out on a disturbance call (CCN: 12-351609). When I arrived, I was met by Officer Appledorn, who informed me that Officer Chamberlain had used force against the male (TROKON GUAR) in their back seat. She then directed me to several witnesses that were in the bus stop on the Northeast corner of the intersection.

The following is a summary of what the witnesses told me:

When officers pulled up facing the bus shelter (in the parking lot, facing southwest), they had their spotlights and takedown lights on. Officer Appledorn was initially making contact with the group when GUAR told her the lights were bright. At that point, Officer Chamberlain walked up to GUAR with his taser out, started yelling at him that he was under arrest, then pushed him up against the walls in the bus shelter. Officer Chamberlain continued to yell at GUAR and wrenched his right arm behind his back, while still pushing him up against the bus shelter. Officer Chamberlain then put GUAR in a choke hold and they went down to the ground. Officer Chamberlain maintained the choke hold and finally handcuffed GUAR. Witness Bedford, Arceneaux, and Vaughn all demonstrated the choke hold by wrapping their arm around their neck while describing Officer Chamberlain's actions.

Once GUAR was up, and walked back to the squad car, once back at the squad car, the witnesses saw Officer Chamberlain put GUAR in a choke hold again, and try to slam him into the car door. Officer Chamberlain finally shoved GUAR into the back seat of the squad car. One of the witnesses (BENFORD) stated that Officer Chamberlain was using racially derogatory language, but did not want to repeat the exact phrases for me. BENFORD also has some of the incident captured on the video on his phone; however, he was having problems playing it back for me at the scene. He stated he would be preserving the on his Blackberry Phone and would be able to access it better at home.

I spoke with the subject of the force, TROKON GUAR, who gave me an accounting of the incident that I recorded on my MVR in P#76371. The tape the statement was recorded on, P1-1323, was property inventoried at the precinct. I reviewed just a short portion of the video, and it appears that the entire statement was recorded. I did this because GUAR does not have a contact phone number, only a contact email: T_Man1son@yahoo.com

Guar stated that he was standing in the bus shelter, but he was not affiliated with the original group that was smoking marijuana. When the officers pulled up, the lights on the squad were shining right at him and he made a comment about the lights being in his face. At that point, Officer Chamberlain walked up to him and put his flashlight in Guar's face. Guar also saw that Chamberlain had his taser out. Chamberlain yelled at him, and used racial slurs according to the victim, then slammed Guar up against the glass, stating that Guar was under arrest. Guar stated that he put his hands up and Officer Chamberlain wrenched his arms behind his back, pushing his right arm up into the middle of his back. Officer Chamberlain put him in a chokehold and then handcuffed Guar. Once back at the squad car, Officer Chamberlain again put Guar in a chokehold, and at some point, ripped Guar's necklace from his neck. Officer Chamberlain also grabbed Guar by the front of the throat with his hand and pinched, as well as using his ASP to push on Guar's neck. Guar stated that both techniques were extremely painful. Officer Chamberlain shoved Guar in the back of the squad car, continuing to yell at him and using racial slurs. Guar would also not tell me the exact racial slurs that Officer Chamberlain was allegedly using.

When GUAR was talking about the ASP, Officer Appledorn was standing near me, listening, and GUAR was attempting to describe the tool. He held his hands out about 12 inches apart, said it was black, and then made a flicking motion with his right wrist, while saying that the officer had it on his belt. He said that it was the thing you hit with, and then made a striking motion with his right hand, a motion that looked like a baton striking motion. At that point, Officer Appledorn removed her ASP baton from her belt, and GUAR immediately pointed at it, and said, "that's it."

Gir had a small cut over his left eye, but refused medical treatment when it was offered to him several times. I took ographs of the small cut, the broken necklace, and Guar's neck area. Guar was released from the scene. He was extremely upset, and although I had been able to calm him down enough to get a statement, he was enraged when I sent the officers back to the precinct to do their report. I explained to him that action was being taken that evening; however, I got the

impression that he thought I was not going to do anything. This suspicious was later confirmed when GUAR came to the station, upset, demanding that something be done, but he left before I could come downstairs to speak with him.

ke to Officer Appledorn, who was Chamberlain's partner, and she was so upset that she had to walk away from the squad car and could not even be in it with Chamberlain. She told me that he had been out of control, that he had been choking Guar. I did not have her elaborate further since I needed to make some phone calls to find out further steps. Officer Baskin was also on scene, but I did not get a chance to interview him in depth.

Officer Chamberlain offered to brief me on his use of force, but I purposely did not discuss it with him. I had all three officers

return to the precinct to complete their CAPRS reports.

Squad 160 and Squad 110 did not have their MVR's recording. Squad 160 was pointed at the incident; however, Squad 110 was out on Hennepin Avenue, not pointing at the incident.

I contacted SIC to determine if there was any camera footage, there are no cameras at 3/Hennepin, however Officer Melissa Bjorklund was checking the other cameras to see if any were pointed in that direction. I requested that any possible footage be preserved.

Witness Benford stated he will be preserving his footage since he wants to make a formal complaint. He also called the precinct to make the complaint, and was informed by the desk officer to speak with me. He stated that he already had and wanted to make sure that action was being taken.

I attempted to contact security at the Minneapolis Central Library to check on possible footage from their cameras, but I have not had any success yet.

At the precinct, Officer Chamberlain showed me some red marks on both his right and left forearms that appeared to be scratches from the incident. He also had a drop of blood on his patch on his left arm. I took photographs of these injuries and the blood on a separate S/D card, and also property inventoried it with the S/D card that had Guar's injuries, and the MVR with Guar's statement.

Onicers Appledorn and Baskin, along with Officer Chamberlain, were directed to complete their reports as required by policy.

It was my decision to release GUAR at the scene without a citation or being booked because I did not believe that the criminal standards of disorderly conduct or obstruction had been met when I spoke to Officer Appledorn and the witnesses. Guar could always be charged by complaint. Officer Chamberlain had not been informed of this action before completing the public information in this report that is why Guar is still listed as A1. Also, I changed the public narrative, which was the same as the first paragraph in Officer Chamberlain's supplement, to the one sentence it currently reads. I felt that the current public information was all that was necessary at this time for the report.

Upon arrival I parked just north of 3rd St. on Hennepin and noticed that Squad 160 had already arrived and was parked in the surface lot by the bus shelter.

l observed Officer Chamberlain escorting a party later ID'd as Trokon Isaac Guar (05-14-69) towards his squad car. Upon arrival to his squad the back doors were locked so I unlocked them for Officer Chamberlain. Guar was yelling while being escorted and it appeared that Officer Chamberlain was stuggling trying to control Guar during the escort. Officer Chamberlain placed Guar, in the rear of his squad.

I then met with Officer Appledorn who by the bus shelter and asked if there were was anything she needed assistance with and she said no. I could still hear Guar yelling and there were bystanders who were yelling in objection to the way they thought Guar was treated. I then noticed that Officer Chamberlain had the rear door to the squad open and Guar got out of the squad car and Officer Chamberlain unable to control him put him in a neck restraint and they both went to the ground. Officer Chamberlain gained control of Guar, got him up, and he was put back in the squad. It appeared that there was a good amount of struggling and effort to get Guar in the squad.

I was advised by Officer Appledorn that Sgt. Nelson was enroute. I met with the witnesses who wanted to make a complaint and advised them that a Sergeant was on the way. Sgt. Nelson arrived and met with the witnesses. I then gave Officer Chamberlain a ride back to the station to start on the report.

At about 1910 while at the front desk area, Guar came into the station and was yelling about being treated the way he was. I asked if he would like to speak to a Sergeant and he said that he didn't. He stated that his necklace was broken in the incident and that we would all be swept away by the flood.

5-103 USE OF DISCRETION

The police profession is one that requires officers to use considerable judgment and discretion in the performance of their daily duties. Officers have a large body of knowledge from Department policies and procedures, training, their own professional police experience and the experiences of their fellow officers to guide them in exercising proper judgment and discretion in situations not specifically addressed by Department rules and regulations. In addition, officers must always adhere to the following principles in the course of their employment with the Minneapolis Police Department:

POLICE ACTION - LEGALLY JUSTIFIED: Officers must act within the limits of their authority

5-105 PROFESSIONAL CODE OF CONDUCT

- 3. Officers shall use reasonable judgment in carrying out their duties and responsibilities. They need to weigh the consequences of their actions.
- 14. Employees shall not use any derogatory language or actions which are intended to embarrass, humiliate, or shame a person, or do anything intended to incite another to violence

5-303 AUTHORIZED USE OF FORCE

Minn. Stat. §609.06 subd. 1 states, "When authorized...except as otherwise provided in subdivision 2, reasonable force may be used upon or toward the person of another without the other's consent when the following circumstances exist or the actor reasonably believes them to exist:

When used by a public officer or one assisting a public officer under the public officer's direction:

- In effecting a lawful arrest; or
- In the execution of legal process; or
- In enforcing an order of the court; or
- In executing any other duty imposed upon the public officer by law."

In addition to Minn. Stat. §609.06 sub. 1, MPD policies shall utilize the United States Supreme Court decision in Graham vs Connor as a guideline for reasonable force.

The Graham vs Connor case references that:

Because the test of reasonableness under the Fourth Amendment is not capable of precise definition or mechanical application, its proper application requires careful attention to the facts and circumstances of each particular case, including:

- The severity of the crime at issue,
- Whether the suspect poses an immediate threat to the safety of the officers or others, and;
- Whether he is actively resisting arrest or attempting to evade arrest by flight.

The "reasonableness" of a particular use of force must be judged from the perspective of the reasonable officer

The calculus of reasonableness must embody allowance for the fact that police officers are often forced to make split-second judgments - in circumstances that are tense, uncertain, and rapidly evolving - about the amount of force that is necessary in a particular situation."

Authorized use of force requires careful attention to the facts and circumstances of each case. Sworn MPD employees shall write a detailed, comprehensive report for each instance in which force was used.
