Um, we went and took him into custody, I believe. I think I 3 went over and talked to Officer Lehner real quick. Um, I think I looked at, uh, this 4 5 alleged, uh, victim that he kicked. This is a recorded statement of Miriam Aguilar Garcia on January 23, 23rd, 2017 at 9:40 a.m. in the Minneapolis Civil Rights Department Room 239 being interviewed by Investigator Liisa M. Hill. Also present is Sergeant Matthew McClean of Minneapolis Police Department Internal Affairs Unit. This is regarding OPCR Case 15-16258.

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What is your full name?

- A. Miriam Aguilar Garcia. Um, and I'll spell it out too. Ah, M-I-R-I-A-M A-G-U-I-L-A-R G-A-R-C-I-A.
- Q. Thank you. What is your present address and phone number?
- 20 A. 3916 16th Avenue South, Apartment 2, Minneapolis, Minnesota 55407.
 - Q. What is your age and date of birth?
 - A. Um, age, I'm finally 24 and you?
- 25 Q. Date of birth.
 - A. Date of Birth? Um, 04/22/1992.
- Q. You are being questioned as part of an official investigation into a complaint of police misconduct. The information you provide will be used in a fact finding process as part of the total evidence to determine if such misconduct occurred and for assessing whether disciplinary action should be taken. The information you supply may also be used in a grievance hearing, arbitration or other appeal procedure. Other parties outside the Minneapolis Civil Rights Department, OPCR Office, may have access to the information you provide as part of the internal investigation.
- At this time, I'd like to ask you some questions about, ah, concerning an incident that occurred on December 29th. 2013 at approximately 3 a.m. in the morning, um, at the location or the vicinity of 44th and Nicollet in Minneapolis, Minnesota.
- Go ahead and please tell me what, you know, start from when you were, you know, pulled over from, by the police officers and go ahead and just, you know, tell us what you, um, your experiences, what you saw, what you heard.
 - A. Okay. Well, I remember, um, leaving, sitting in the backseat of the car when I heard my, ah, my baby dad said that we were being pulled over. So, you know, obviously, he pulled over and then, um...

- Q. And what was his name?
- A. Antonio.
- Q. Okay. And he was driving the vehicle?
- 50 A. Yeah, he was driving the vehicle.
 - Q. Okay.
 - A. I was in the backseat with my brother and, um...
- 55 Q. And, your brother is?
 - A. Luis, um, Garcia.

- Q. Okay.
- A. And, um, so I, I see a cop coming on the left side of the car and he was, um, he had, um, a flashlight and, um, he pointed it at the window with a gun which was where, ah, the driver was sitting at.
- Q. Okay.

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A. Um, so he went directly towards the driver and, ah, he, he was like, um, he told us that we were, you know, we were being stopped and then, um, he right away was, he, um, showed an aversive, um, behavior right away. Um, telling us that we were about to run over one of his, ah, partners, which is an officer. And, um, so he, you know, obviously, um, the window was already rolled out and, um, he said, "Do you know what just happened? Do you know what just happened back there? Did you see?" You, you, you know like he was cussing at, um, Antonio, um, tellin' him, "You almost ran over, um, an officer." and then he's like, "What? No." And he's like, "I stopped." It's like, and then he's like, "Okay." He was like, "Just step out, step outside of the car." And he was about to unbuckle his seatbelt when the officer ger, um, basically like opened the door and like grabbed him by his arm and pulled him out of the car.

Um, so from that moment, um, you know, he was taken and then another officer came, um, came on the left side of the car, um, but this time to the back door of the car so where my brother was sitting at. Um, he opens the door and he, he starts asking questions. Um, you know, um, "Do you have an ID? Can I see an ID? Do you have an identification? What's your name?" You know, stuff like that and then so my brother told him he's like, "An ID? No. I don't have an ID." And I first, you know, kind of thought my brother was kind of like just not, maybe not wanting to show identification or something. Um, but I was like, "Dude, just show them your ID." He's like, "I don't have it. Like, I really don't have one. I left it at home." I'm like, "Okay. Um, we'll just tell them that." And he's like, "I already did. You know, I keep telling him I don't have one. You know, I don't have anything to show him."

And so the officer was like, was like, "Show me an ID. Show me an ID. I want to see your identification. What's your name?" you know, and he's like, "I already told you, I don't have one." So the officer kept going and asking and then, you know, I was like, "He doesn't have an ID." And then he's like, "I'm talking to him." I'm like, "Well but he's telling you he doesn't have an ID. There's no ID." He said, "Do you have an ID?" I'm like, yeah, I'm like just, I had my school ID at the time, um, and so I showed him that one and so, um, I'm like, "I don't know if this works..." um, but and then he's like, "Yeah."

So, he didn't grab my ID right away but he kept going with my brother so obviously my brother got irritated and he said, "Hey, man, what the fuck and like I already told you I don't have an ID, like what do you want me to show you? I just fuckin' told you, I don't have an ID." And so the officer was like, "Okay, Okay, well, you need, you don't, you don't, you don't need to be like, you know." like I guess like over-react about it and my brother was like, "Well, what the fuck? I, you're getting me mad like I'm telling you I don't have an ID."

So, um, my brother was, um, a bit tipsy so that kinda contributed to like him, you know, he was getting upset but again the officer was just, you know, cussing, just kept asking for any ID's. So, Apparently, um, my brother got a little irritated, um, and then the officer was like, "Okay, um, just step outside of the car." And then he was like, "Why? I didn't do anything?" He was like, "Just step outside of the car." and took him with him as well.

Um, and so the only two people left in the car was myself and my, um baby dad, um, um, cousin. Her name is, ah, Stephanie [INAUDIBLE 6:54] and so she was sitting in, um, in the, next to the, was it the passenger seat? Yeah, the passenger seat. Um, and so we're just there waiting, wondering, you know, what's gonna happen. Like, we don't have a way to get home, you know, 'cause...

Q. Mmhmm.

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A. Um, they already took the driver, they took my brother and so she's like I mean, do you think, I like what, what should we do? And then she's like, "I don't know. Maybe we should just kind of stay here and wait and, you know, maybe they'll let them go and they'll let us, you know, go home." She's like, "We didn't even do anything." I'm like, "I know we, you know, we stopped" like I saw him stop so and so we're there waiting and then another officer comes and, you know, he asked, um, if we have a, an ID and we're like, "Yeah." You know, so I was like, that was when I said again, "I have, ah, my school ID. I don't know if this would work but, you know." He was like, "As long as it shows your name and your date of birth, you should be fine." Um, oh and, make sure it has a picture of me I'm like, "Yeah." So, I gave him my, my school ID and, um, she, um, Stephanie gave, um, her ID as well and he's like, "Okay." and he was like, "I'll be right back."

Well, he comes back I would say, ah, I don't know, maybe like five minutes after, um, or ten and then he comes back and then, you know, he's asking me he's like, "Are you sure this is yours?" I'm like, "Yeah." That's my ID." And he say, "Well, I don't seem to find you in our system." I'm like, "Really?" He's like, "Yeah, your name doesn't show us or you know." I'm like, "Well, that's my name, that's my date of birth and that's obviously me. Like, you can see the picture." And it's a school ID, I mean.

20 Q. Mmhmm.

A. No way can, you know. And then he's like, "Okay." he's like, "No, no, it's fine. I believe you. It's fine. I'm just saying your name is not showing up." I was like, "Okay." So, he handed our ID's back and, um, I was, I asked him, I'm like, "Well, what's gonna happen? Um, are they comin' back or?" He said, "Ah, I'm not sure." He's like, "But you two are good. You two are fine, um, thank you for, you know being, for cooperating with us, you know, for staying calm." and kinda like saying, like there were aggressive towards the officers [INAUDIBLE 9:18].

Q. Mmhmm.

A. And, you know, I didn't care much I was just in my head okay, what do you mean? (laugh) So, um, so we stayed there and he's like, "Oh and he was like yeah, you, you two can just wait here in the car, um, and then we'll, we'll get back at you. So, we stayed there. As he leaves, and we stay in the car, I started hearing some noise out there which is I don't know like if like if s-s-s-s-somethin' was hitting or I don't know maybe it was just loud noises like, um, and then I was tryin' to see but there was an, um, a cop car behind us with the lights on so it was kinda hard to see...

Q. Mmhmm.

A. Plus it was wintertime so the windows were kinda foggy and so, well the back one was, um, and so I'm like, you know, I'm tryin' to see, you know, what's going on and then she was like, I'm like, Did you hear that? And then Stephanie was like, "Yeah." And she's like, "Well, what was that?" and I'm like, "I don't know." She was like, "Oh, my Gosh. She was like, I hope nothin' bad is going on out there. I'm like, I hope so too like it sounds bad. Um, and I started getting kind of worried, you know, 'cause I'm like, "Okay, they're not coming back. They're leaving us here. I can't see anything but you can just hear these loud noises going on.

Like someone is like someone is hitting somethin' or someone's hitting something or someone, you know and so, um, and so I was like, "What should we do?" And then she was like, "Well, I, I don't know." She was like, "I think maybe we should just stay in the car." I'm like well, "But..." I'm like what, what if they're, what if they're hitting them? What if they're doing something to them, you know?" And so I, I [INAUDIBLE 11:09] and I'm like, "What should I do?" Like, "I don't want to get in trouble. I don't want to make things worse but I need to know what's going on." You know, like, that's my brother outside and my baby's dad as well so, um, so I just I was like, "You know what? I, I can't be sitting here."

So, I got out of the car. I walked, um, you know, down the right side and I passed like the, um, the

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officer, um, cop, um, the, the cop car and there was, ah, two officers sitting in there and one of they looked at me but they didn't say anything so I kept walking towards like the end of the car...

- Q. Mmhmm.
- 5 A. And that's where, um, that's where I saw, um, like about five officers like just kind of like in a half moon...
 - Q. Okay.
- A. Um, and the car part was like just right behind the officers. Um, and then I see the, I see my brother is on the floor and by this time I forgot a lot more because I don't know what's going on, right? So, my head is like, I was like, "Oh, those, now is this, was them, you know, where is special in my brother getting, getting beat up by the officers. Um, and so I started calling out my brother's name, um, to see if I get a response from him so I started yelling, um, you know, his name, Luis, are you okay? Luis, what's going on? Luis, um, you know, talk to me. Um, and I'm also, you know, talking to him in Spanish just, you know...
 - Q. Mmhmm.
 - A. Just so he, he knows I, it's me you know. Um, and, but same thing, you know, I'm telling him every, even in Spanish I'm telling him, you know, talk to me. Are you okay? I need to know that you're okay. And then I asked the officers. I'm like, "What's going on? Why is he on the floor? Is he okay? They all just kind of looked at each other like this like kind of like, you know, how would you say that? Um...
 - Q. Eyeing each other? You know, looking at each other.
- 25 A. Yeah.

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- Q. Without saying anything.
- A. Yeah. Without saying anything and, and they all looked down to, to see my brother, see if he moved maybe and they just kind of stood there and they didn't answer any, any questions and so I try to get a little closer to my brother but again I, you know, I didn't get as much because I'm like I didn't want them to, you know, now, you know I'm, I'm like well if, if they did that to my brother or they do something to me. So, try to like kept my distance as well, um, and again I kept yellin' at him like, "Dude" you know, just circling around, "Get up." You know, "Do what they're telling you to do. Don't make this any worse. You know, um, I'm like, Come on, talk to me, say something, are you okay? And, um, I'm like, Come on, get up, just...it doesn't, you know, I'm just freaking out and you know and I'm like, "Don't, don't be stupid. Which get up like...
 - Q. Mmhmm.
- A. Like, stop fooling around, like, and then like he wasn't moving, he wasn't doing anything, like I was waiting for him to like at least, um, kind of lift his head a little but, you know, just to know that he was okay but he didn't move at all like he would just stare, um, face down on the ground, um, and he, um, and his hands were like handcuffed because his hands were like back not like on both sides of him...
- 45 Q. Mmhmm.

- A. But like just, you know, on the back of, um, of his back and, and so, um, you know because I kept like yellin' his name and tellin' him, you know, that I know, tell me something. One of the officers was like, "Okay. That's enough. Shut up. Shut the fuck up. That's enough."
- 50 Q. And he said this to you?
 - A. Yeah, one of the officers, the one, the duh, the one that was, um, closer to me, um, said that and I, you know, I completely ignore him because I'm like you know what, whatever it's my brother. I didn't say anything to the, to the officer, I just ignored what he said, you know, and I kept tryin' to get, ah, you know, tryin' to get, ah, you know, tryin' get a reaction from my brother and, um, and because I didn't stop, he, um, he walked towards me and he was like, "Okay, come on. That's it.

That's, that's enough. Get. Go back. Go back in the car and he, ah, he pushed me. Um, you know luckily I didn't feel anything but, um, he pushed me and so I was like all right, ah, I'm like, "If I stay here, you know, I, you, I don't know what's gonna happen, you know, what if they get also like aggressive towards me and all I could think in the back of my head is like I have my little boy waiting at me at home. I have my mother waiting for me so I, I better get, just get back in the car. So, that's what I did. I went back to, to the car, Um, and, and then, um, we're there waiting and then one of the officers, ah, comes and asks if we have a way to get home. We're like, "No." And he's like is there anyone that can come to get you and then, um, Stephanie said, "Ah, oh, I can see and try to call my mom to see if she can come get us. And then she's like, "Well, what's gonna happen? And then she's like, "Well, they were gonna take them, um, she's like, "Okay, what about the car? He, he's like, um, "You can't take that car. You have to leave the car here. Um, and then we, we need to have someone, you know, come get you.

So...

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- Q. Sgt. McClean: Can I stop you there?
- A. Yeah.
- Q. Sgt. McClean: Okay. Let's go back to them. Why don't you, um, just draw a little diagram. So, the, the, the drawing that I did of the cars here and then I'd like her to just mark on the paper...
 - A. [NO AUDIBLE DIALOGUE 7:15]
 - Q. Okay.
 - A. [NO AUDIBLE DIALOGUE 7:16]

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- Q. Sgt. McClean: Where she was when she saw [INAUDIBLE 17:16]. So, is this accurate where we have this is your car...
- A. Mmhmm.
- 30 Q. Sgt. McClean: And you were seated back here and your brother was in this backseat?
 - A. Correct.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: All right. And then you said you got out of the car and you walked past and you saw there was another squad car and you said that there were two officers in the squad car?
- 35 A. Yes.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Do you remember that?
 - A. Yes.
- 40 Q. Sgt. McClean: Was one officer a female?
 - A. Yeah, it was a, a, a lady and, and a man.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: And was the man, um, in the squad car the same man that had taken out your, um, baby's father or was it a different officer?
- 45 A. Um-m-m-m, it should be asked. I don't remember. It's like I just remember the one, that took my baby's dad, um, it was a male, um, and he was, um, not as short, ah, not too tall either, maybe average.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Okay.

 - Q. Sgt. McClean: All right. And you said there were officers. How many officers were standing around?
 - A. I believe there was five around.

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- Q. Sgt. McClean: Five? So, you've drawn one, two, three, four, five and you were standing right there.
- A. I was, ah, I was, stand right here first and then I moved over a little more in here.
- 30 Q. Sgt. McClean: All right.
 - A. Over here. Um, 'cause the officer didn't want much distance when [INAUDIBLE 21:11].
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: All right. Was the female officer standing in this group?
 - A. Um, as far as I remember, it was all males.

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- Q. Sgt. McClean: Okay.
- A. For officers.
- Q. Sgt. McClean: Okay. Let's sit back down. Thank you.
- 40 A. Mmhmm.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: At any time...at any time, did you see any of the officers use a force on your brother?
- A. Um, not when I was outside, no, not at all, um, like I said, there were just standing there staring at him, um, and then when I asked them what had happened, why was he on, you know, layin' on the ground, they just stared at each other and didn't say much.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: How much time do you think elapsed from when you got out of the car and saw your brother lying on the ground motionless until you had to leave and go back into your car after the officer told you to do that?
 - A. I would say maybe... maybe ten minutes.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Ten minutes you were outside of the car?
 - A. Mmhmm. Yeah, I, I...

- Q. Sgt. McClean: Now I want you to really think hard about that.
- A. But I...well, I know he wasn't as in ten full minutes 'cause I remember I was kind of out there for, for a little bit, um, before I, I had to go back to the car. The only reason why I actually went back to the car is because, you know, the officer had told me to, you know, shut up and then well he didn't say shut, she said shut the fuck up.
- Q. Sgt. McClean: She or he?
- A. He did. Um, and he and I, I still, um spent, ah, a little time before he even pushed me. It wasn't like he told me shut the fuck up and then pushed me right away. It took some, some time.
- Q. Sgt. McClean: All right.
- A. So...

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- Q. Sgt. McClean: So, having thought about it, how long from the time you got there behind the car and saw your brother lying on the ground, 'til when you had to leave. How much time elapsed?
 - A. Ummmm, I don't remember exactly the amount of time but I know for sure it wasn't less than ten minutes. It, it couldn't had been less than ten minutes.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Okay. And in that entire time, ten minutes, was your brother unconscious?
- 20 A. Yes...
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Did you...
 - A. He was...
- 25 Q. Sgt. McClean: Did you see him move?
 - A. No, not at all.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: So, to be clear, you're saying that he was unconscious for approximately ten minutes?
- A. Yeah, he was, I mean, at the most, at the, at the least, I would say maybe I was out there for like six, eight minutes but during that time he didn't move at all.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: And what were the officers doing? Were they giving him first aid?
- A. No, not at all. They were just around him like I said kind of like in a half moon just standing just staring at him and lookin' at me because I'm already, you know, there and talking to my brother and he's not moving. Like, he didn't respond at all.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Were any of the officers down on their knees attending to your brother or doing anything...
- 40 A. No.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Like that?
 - A. No. No.
- 45 Q. Sgt. McClean: Could you see if your brother was bleeding? Could you see blood on the pavement at all?
 - A. I couldn't see his face at all. I could see the back of his head which, um, I, his, um, I'm assuming his left side of his face was the one touching the ground because if he would have been like nose touching the ground I would have been able to see the left side of his face but I wasn't able to see his face at all.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: You couldn't see his face?
 - A. No.

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55 Q. Sgt. McClean: Okay.

- A. No.
- Q. Sgt. McClean: Did you hear the officers saying anything to each other during this time that you were standing there?
- 5 A. Ah, not as far as I remember. No.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Did you hear any of the officers say anything about getting an ambulance to the scene?
 - A. No.

- Q. Sgt. McClean: Did you hear any officers saying anything about your brother using force or assaulting one of the officers or trying to kick one of the officers?
- A. No.
- 15 Q. Sgt. McClean: Did the officers say anything?
 - A. Um, I, um, I'm not sure if there was...before I left, you know, before I head back to the car, or as we were leaving when, um, Stephanie's mom picked us up, um, that, ah, there was actually two other, two other, um, police cars, um, one was kind of like next to where, next to, ah, where the police, the police car where my brother was and the other one was a little more ahead.

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- Q. Sgt. McClean: This was after your brother was taken up off the pavement and put in the police car?
- A. No, he was still, he, I, he was still laying down. I, I remember seeing about four to five police cars and that's when I saw my brother and I don't know if, um, I don't know if they had been as well as still standing there as I was walking back but I, if I didn't misheard one of them did ask, um, is everything okay? And they're like, yeah, yeah, we're, we're fine. Um, we're just gonna, ah, take him down, um, I can't remember where he said because I, I believe I was already walking back to the car but, um, but I don't know if, if, um, I don't know how long more my brother stayed there on the ground.

- Q. Sgt. McClean: All right.
- A. Because when I b...went back to the car, he was still there.
- Q. Sgt. McClean: All right.
- 35 A. He was still laying down.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: You said, um, earlier that while you were seated in the car you heard noises.
 - A. Yes.
- 40 Q. Sgt. McClean: What did the noises sound like?
 - A. Like...I don't know like, like something was hitting, kinda like big loud noises like, like if somethin' was like, like I don't know how you would call it taunting? I don't know, like...
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Okay.
- 45 A. Kinda like...
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Did it sound, did the pounding or the hitting noises sound like it was something that was hitting metal? You know the sound if you were to kick metal what that sounds like. Did it sound like that? Or did it sound like...?
- 50 A. Yeah...I'm usually, I, I, yeah, I bet, it's...it was just a big noise. Initially I...
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: How many, how many noises? How many times did you hear that noise, that particular noise?
 - A. Um, I probably stayed in the maybe 3-5 minutes before I even stepped out of the car.

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- Q. Sgt. McClean: But how many times did you hear that banging noise?
- A. Um, just, um, approximately, approximately like it, it was just noise going on.
- Q. Sgt. McClean: How long did that go on?
- 5 A. Ah, maybe about five minutes or so before I step out of the car.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Did you hear any yelling?
 - A. Um, I, it was just, just kind of hear 'cause I was in the car but, um, I don't know, there was just a lot going on all we could hear was metal noises like...

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- Q. Sgt. McClean: Did you hear any verbal commands from the officers?
- A. No.
- Q. Sgt. McClean: Saying to do something or to stop doing something?
- 15 A. No.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Any kind of orders from the officers?
 - A. No.
- 20 Q. Sgt. McClean: Did you hear your brother yelling anything?
 - A. Um, no.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Could you hear him yelling from the back of the squad car?
 - A. No. No. As far as I remember, no.

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- Q. Sgt. McClean: Do you ever recall your brother yelling once he was taken out of the squad car?
- A. Um, no, I, own, the only thing he said was to the officers, he was asking why he was being taken.
- Q. Sgt. McClean: And this was when he was being taken out of the car you were in?
- 30 A. Mmhmm.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: The noises, the banging noises, did you ever hear them change in the way they sounded while they were going on? In other words, did it ever change from it sounded like banging on metal to something else, a different kind of a sound?
- A. Um, um, it was just at points the, the loudness would kind of decrease a little bit and then you, you could be able to hear it again like more loud.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Did the noise sound like it was...did the noise sound like they were coming from inside a car or from outside?
- 40 A. No, outside.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Outside?
 - A. Mmhmm.
- 45 Q. Sgt. McClean: And how many bangs did you hear that you felt came from outside?
 - A. Hmmm, I don't...I'm not sure. "Cause they were, it was a lot...
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: One?
 - A. I just remember it was a lot, like...

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- Q. Sqt. McClean: More than one?
- A. It was a lot of noise going on until the point that I couldn't take it anymore and that's when I decided to step outside of the car because it if would just been one loud noise, I wouldn't go. Well, you know, maybe I wouldn't have freaked out as much but, like I said, the noise just constantly kept going.

- Q. Sgt. McClean: Are you sure your brother was out of the car when you heard these noises?
- A. Um, I mean I, I, I believe he was outside because I'm, I don't know, I'm guessing that if he, if he would have been inside of the car, I wouldn't have been able to hear it as much since the, since it was a, um, a more longer distance...
- Q. Sgt. McClean: Yeah.
- A. Than from the police car that was behind us, you know.
- 10 Q. Sgt. McClean: The cars...were the engines running on the police cars?
 - A. Um, I, I believe so. I mean, the, the one behind us I'm fore sure it was because it, it, it had the lights on.
 - Q. Mmhmm.
- 15 A. Mmhmm.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Okay. How many separate bangs or noises do you think you heard then?
 - A. Um...I heard it maybe three to four times before I even step out of the car.
- 20 Q. Sgt. McClean: So, three to five bangs?
 - A. Like, loud noises.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Loud noises?
 - A. Mmhmm.

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- Q. Sgt. McClean: And how long do you think that lasted? Those three to five bangs or loud noises?
- A. From the...from the time they took my brother to the time the other officer came to ask for ID's, went back, came back, I would say were inside the car maybe for a couple...fifteen minutes probably. 'Cause we were sitting there for like for a while.
- Q. Sgt. McClean: Okay but when you were...Once you hear the bangs, how, how long did that time last do you think?
- A. Um, maybe five minutes or maybe a little more before I even decided to go out.
- 35 Q. Sgt. McClean: Okay.
 - A. Yeah.
 - Q. Okay. So then, you get out. Do you hear anything? Maybe we've already covered this but as you're walking around, do you hear anything else? Do you hear those same bangs?
- 40 A. No.
 - Q. Okay. So, it's kind of silent and then you walk around and you see your brother on the...
 - A. Mmhmm.
- 45 Q. But you didn't hear anything else?
 - A. No.
 - Q. Okay.
 - A. [NO AUDIBLE DIALOGUE 32:46]

- Q. Sgt. McClean: So, the banging stopped before you got out of the car?
- A. I believe so because by the time I got out of the car I didn't hear anything.
- Q. Sgt. McClean: Did you see any of the officers punch or kick your brother?
- 55 A. No.

- Q. Sgt. McClean: Did your brother tell you that he'd been punched or kicked by any of the officers?
- A. Um, he said at first he didn't remember but then, um, he said he was able to recover his conscious once he was already in the car but he was confused because he didn't know what was going on. He's like, I just feel a lot of pain and I noticed I was bleeding and I didn't kinda understand why but later on I guess as he tried to make more, like, like remember more of what happened, he's like, yeah, I do remember being kicked, um, I don't know with what but I know they kicked me. I just, I lost conscious right away, ah, like I, I was just...
- 10 Q. Did he say he remembered being kicked while he was in the police car or outside?
 - A. I don't remember to be exact. I know that in the, I guess, police report, it said that he was, he was inside the police car and the door was open and apparently he was gonna fall out of the car and so that's when he I guess like accidentally got hit himself with I don't know, I don't know if it was with like one of the officer's shoe or the door. I don't know but it was something like that in the reports that he said it probably was like an accident. But I'm like I don't, I don't think an accident can cause much harm. I mean especially, you know, from how high the police car is from the ground, like.
- Q. Sgt. McClean: When did your brother tell you that he had been kicked and that he had lost consciousness? How long after that incident did he tell you this?
 - A. When, when we went to visit him at the hospital.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: That night? The next morning?
 - A. The next, the next day.

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- Q. Sgt. McClean: The next day?
- A. Mmhmm.
- Q. Sgt. McClean: Okay. Do you remember what his injuries were?
- A. Ah, his, he got stitches on his, I believe it was his bottom lip and, ah, he was in a lot of pain from where his jaw, ah...

Q.

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- Q. Sgt. McClean: Records?
- A. Records, papers that they had.
- 40 Q. Did they have to wire it?
 - A. Ah, I don't remember, um, I don't remember, um, I don't think he did but they did have to stitch his lip because it was actually like kind of like hanging out.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Were his teeth damaged?
- 45 A. Yeah. Ah, he's missin' his two, um, two front ones, the two top ones.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Did he have those teeth...
 - A. Oh yeah.
- 50 Q. Sgt. McClean: That night before?
 - A. Yeah.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: At the party?
 - A. Mmhmm.

- Q. Sgt. McClean: And when you were stopped and taken out of the car?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Sgt. McClean: Do you remember his teeth? What they looked like?
- 5 A. Yes. Mmhmm.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Can you describe them?
 - A. Um, they were, they were just normal teeth, you know, they were clean and then they were in good condition.

- Q. Sgt. McClean: Did he...?
- A. Um, he, he was good. I mean, overall he had pretty good teeth.
- Q. Sgt. McClean: Did he have problems with his? Were they decayed or had he gone to the dentist a lot for his teeth before...
 - A. Um, he, um...
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: This happened?
- A. He, um, I don't know how long before the accident was but he, he had obviously, ah, visited the dentist before for like cleaning and, you know things like that.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Okay. But, did he have problems with his teeth?
 - A. No. No. He was pretty good. I mean, he, he didn't, he didn't, um, it's not like he complained of like having any pain before the accident.

- Q. Sgt. McClean: That's what I was wondering.
- A. [NO AUDIBLE DIALOGUE 37:12]
- Q. Okay.
- 30 A. Mmhmm.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: Okay. All right. Did you draw a map for her to look at and, and...
 - A. [NO AUDIBLE DIALOGUE 37:18]
- 35 Q. Yes.
 - A. [NO AUDIBLE DIALOGUE 37:19]
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: You did. Can you look at the map and then verify that everything is correct on the map?
- 40 A. Yep.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: And what the map is, it's a reflection of what you've drawn on the board.
 - A. [NO AUDIBLE DIALOGUE 37:27]
- Q. Right. Up there. So, we've got your vehicle. You said you walked out. Here's a police vehicle and then that's kind of where your brother is.
 - A. Mmhmm. Ah, except this one was a little more...
 - Q. Okay. So this one's about right there?
- 50 A. Mmhmm.
 - Q. And that's your car?
 - A. Mmhmm.
- 55 Q. Okay. So, so you get out and go this way?

- A. Mmhmm.
- Q. Okay. So is that pretty accurate?
- A. Yeah.

- Q. Okay. You know what I'm gonna do? I'm gonna have you sign right there and then I want you to initial right there that I made some changes.
- A. Oh, right here?
- 10 Q. Yeah, you can just initial. And then you can just sign your name right there. All right.
 - A. [NO AUDIBLE DIALGOUE 38:31]
 - Q. Anything else?
 - A. [NO AUDIBLE DIALOGUE 38:36]

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- Q. Sgt. McClean: I don't have any more questions. No.
- A. [NO AUDIBLE DIALOGUE 38:37]
- Q. All right. Um, I think you were already asked this but of the five officers that you saw surrounding your brother when he was laying down, you said all of them were male?
 - As far as I remember.
 - Q. Okay. Um, white male, Hispanic, African?
 - A. White.

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- Q. Okay, all of 'em white male?
- A. Mmhmm. As far as I remember, yes.
- Q. Okay. And at that time was there only your observation one female officer out there?
- 30 A. Mmhmm. As far as I remember, yes.
 - Q. Okav.
 - A. Mmhmm. She was inside of the car.
- 35 Q. Okav.
 - A. Right, well by the time I got out of the car she was in the officers...
 - Q. Okay.
 - A. Um, car.

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- Q. Sgt. McClean: Did, um, did the other woman who was riding in the front seat, um, your, who was your baby's father's sister, correct?
- A. Ah, cousin.
- 45 Q. Sgt. McClean: Did she get out of the car?
 - A. No.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: She stayed in the whole time?
 - A. Yes.

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- Q. Sgt. McClean: Okay. Yeah, I don't have any more questions.
- A. She, um, she actually, ah, suffers from I don't know how she's doing at this point but back then she was kind of delinquent with like, um, like, with like her, like nerves, like she kind of like got like nervous right away when some big im...like things would go like any huge impact, she would like, she, um, like at the time she kinda just spaced out like she was just very confused, she got really

scared, um...

- Q. Sgt. McClean: Prior to this? That's what she did or did this incident cause that?
- A. At the...no, she was previously like that but that they, um, because, you know, normally she talks more but that day she was just kinda just blanked out like. And, I, it got me worried because I know like the condition she has...
 - Q. Mmhmm.
- A. And so like I, I hope she doesn't get any, you know, reaction, you know after this, um, she, she was pretty scared though. Um, like I said, she decided to stay in the car. Um, and was unable to react much, um, because of the impact. Otherwise, I'm pretty sure she would have probably stopped me from even putting myself at risk because I know I was putting myself at risk when I decided to step out of the car door.
- 15 Q. Mmhmm.
 - A. That was just somethin' that I, I felt I had to do.
 - Q. Sgt. McClean: All right.
 - A. [NO AUDIBLE DIALOGUE: 41:19]

- Q. Okay. Is there anything else that you'd like to add to this statement that we haven't asked you?
- A. Um, no.
- Q. Okay. Is this a true and accurate statement?
- A. Ah, yes. Oh, also, well I don't know if it appears on any of the police reports but my baby's dad was actually, um, um, he had, ah, physical aggression from the officers as well. As far as I know, he was, ah, pushed very hard against the, um, how do you, how do you call it the front part of the...?
- 30 Q. The hood?
 - A. The hood. And that he's had even one [INAUDIBLE 41:58] at a time and he had this part of his face swollen up.
 - Q. Okay.
- 35 A. Mmhmm. So.
 - Q. Okay. Again, is this a true and accurate statement?
 - A. Yes.
- 40 Q. Ah, that concludes the interview. The time is 10:21.
