



On May 26th 2017 THE ULURU STATEMENT FROM THE HEART, the outcome of a long period of consultation with many Indigenous communities and groups all over the country, was presented to the then Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull. Five months later in October 2017 after the statement was not endorsed by Cabinet Mr Turnbull announced in a press release "THE ULURU STATEMENT FROM THE HEART was not capable of winning acceptance (in a referendum)."

Then in August 2018 after several weeks of turmoil in Australia's Federal Liberal Party we have a new Prime Minister Scott Morrison who announces former Prime Minister & now backbencher Tony Abbott MP as a 'Special Envoy' for Indigenous Affairs. Elder indigenous statesman and the Father of Reconciliation Labor Senator Patrick Dodson had this to say.

ULURU STATEMENT FROM THE HEART

We, gathered at the 2017 National Constitutional Convention, coming from all points of the southern sky, make this statement from the heart:

Our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander tribes were the first sovereign Nations of the Australian continent and its adjacent islands, and possessed it under our own laws and customs. This our ancestors did, according to the reckoning of our culture, from the Creation, according to the common law from 'time immemorial', and according to science more than 60,000 years ago.

This sovereignty is a spiritual notion: the ancestral tie between the land, or 'mother nature', and the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples who were born therefrom, remain attached thereto, and must one day return thither to be united with our ancestors. This link is the basis of the ownership of the soil, or better, of sovereignty. It has never been ceded or extinguished, and co-exists with the sovereignty of the Crown.

How could it be otherwise? That peoples possessed a land for sixty millennia and this sacred link disappears from world history in merely the last two hundred years?

With substantive constitutional change and structural reform, we believe this ancient sovereignty can shine through as a fuller expression of Australia's nationhood.

Proportionally, we are the most incarcerated people on the planet. We are not an innately criminal people. Our children are aliened from their families at unprecedented rates. This cannot be because we have no love for them. And our youth languish in detention in obscene numbers. They should be our hope for the future.

These dimensions of our crisis tell plainly the structural nature of our problem. This is the torment of our powerlessness.


We seek constitutional reforms to empower our people and take *a rightful place* in our own country. When we have power over our destiny our children will flourish. They will walk in two worlds and their culture will be a gift to their country.

We call for the establishment of a First Nations Voice enshrined in the Constitution.

Makarrata is the culmination of our agenda: the coming together after a struggle. It captures our aspirations for a fair and truthful relationship with the people of Australia and a better future for our children based on justice and self-determination.

We seek a Makarrata Commission to supervise a process of agreement-making between governments and First Nations and truth-telling about our history.

In 1967 we were counted, in 2017 we seek to be heard. We leave base camp and start our trek across this vast country. We invite you to walk with us in a movement of the Australian people for a better future.

Pacific Calling Partnership News

Former President of Kiribati to visit Australia in October In October the Pacific Calling Partnership will be hosting His Excellency Anote Tong in Australia.

Mr Tong will be in Australia from the 15th of October to the 25th of October and will be visiting Sydney, Canberra and Melbourne. During that time the Pacific Calling Partnership are arranging meetings with politicians and community leaders. We are also arranging some public meetings and press interviews.

Mr Tong, who was president of Kiribati from 2003 to 2013, is among the most prominent advocates for urgent global action on climate change. Former President Tong's country, the Pacific island nation of Kiribati, is one of the first places to confront sea level rise and other devastating real-life consequences of climate change.

Mr Tong is a strong voice for the Pacific and has been campaigning for climate justice for his people and those of the Pacific for many years. Bringing his voice to Australia is especially important in the current circumstances where Australians are engaged in a debate about the

continued mining and use of coal. The Pacific Calling Partnership is bringing Mr Tong to Australia in an effort to change the terms of the climate change debate in this country.

During his visit, Mr Tong will have the opportunity to present his case to the people of Australia at various forums. His aim is to convince the Australian people and Australian politicians that the future of Kiribati is dependent on bold action from countries such as Australia. According to the United Nations, the low lying island nations of the Pacific are facing an "existential threat" from rising sea levels. The latest research actually suggests that they may become "uninhabitable" beyond mid-century. Mr Tong has highlighted the possible need for his people to seek a place of safety in the extreme of having to migrate. In this eventuality he has reiterated that he is seeking migration with dignity for his people. Mr Tong considers it is a moral imperative for Australia to do as much as it can to help. These islands have been looking to Australia for many years for leadership. PCP considers that are falling down in that duty.

Mr Tong's visit will follow the United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change's Special Report on 1.5C. and will come ahead of the Climate Vulnerable Summit in late November and COP24 in December. In the lead up to a Federal election, it would be very timely to highlight the impacts of climate change in the Pacific, the leadership of Pacific peoples in driving solutions, and the need for Australia to play a role.

The PCP aims to transmit the voice of the Pacific to as wide an audience as possible in Australia. PCP's Vincent Sicari has said, "Their problem will become our problem soon enough. The implications for Australian foreign policy are immense as the in-roads of Chinese diplomacy in the Pacific is already showing. The Pacific knows what Australia is doing in terms of climate change policy and they are concerned, and very disappointed, even angry."

While Australia has made some efforts to curb its greenhouse gases, the perception of Australia in the Pacific is of a nation exporting vast amounts of coal which will inevitably produce carbon dioxide, the primary greenhouse gas. The clear message for Mr Tong has for Australia is that its economy should not be the sole priority when the very existence of nations like Kiribati and Tuvalu hangs in the balance.
