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#### NOTICE OF PROPOSED RULEMAKING

Notice to be published on October 5, 2018

The Department of Justice (Department) proposes to adopt section 4340, repeal sections 5473 and 5512, and amend sections 5474 and 5513 of Title 11, Division 5, of the California Code of Regulations regarding the creation of a California Firearms Application Reporting System (CFARS) account, after considering all comments, objections, and recommendations regarding the proposed action.

#### PUBLIC HEARING

The Department has not scheduled a public hearing on this proposed regulatory action. However, the Department will hold a hearing if it receives a written request for a public hearing from any interested person, or his or her authorized representative, no later than 15 days before the close of the written comment period.

#### WRITTEN COMMENT PERIOD

Any interested person or their authorized representative may submit written comments relevant to the proposed regulatory action. The written comment period closes at 5:00 p.m. on November 19, 2018. Only comments received by that time will be considered. Written comments must be submitted to:

#### INFORMATIVE DIGEST/POLICY STATEMENT OVERVIEW

This rulemaking action specifies how an individual can create a CFARS account.

Penal Code section 11106 authorizes the Department to keep and properly file firearm records. These regulations explain what is required for an individual to create a CFARS account, which

will, in turn, allow an individual to report or update firearm ownership information, apply for a unique serial number for a firearm, or apply for a Certificate of Eligibility ("COE").

The regulations proposed in this rulemaking action would do the following:

CCR, Title 11, Division 5, Chapter 12

Section 4340 has been added to explain the requirements for creating a CFARS account, including the conditions of use and the required account information.

CCR, Title 11, Division 5, Chapter 39

Section 5473 has been repealed as section 4340 explains the requirements for creating a CFARS account.

Section 5474 has been amended to explain that a CFARS account must be created pursuant to section 4340 before an individual can initiate the registration of an assault weapon.

CCR, Title 11, Division 5, Chapter 41

Section 5512 has been repealed as section 4340 explains the requirements for creating a CFARS account.

Section 5513 has been amended to establish that a CFARS account must be created pursuant to section 4340 and to specify the requirements of an application for a unique serial number.

#### ANTICIPATED BENEFITS OF THE PROPOSED REGULATIONS

These regulations explain what is required to create a CFARS account so that a user can electronically submit a firearm ownership record or report, update a firearm record, request a unique serial number for a firearm, or apply for a COE. The online account system will increase the efficiency of submitting these items to the Department, storing the information, retrieving the data, and communicating with the account holder.

### EVALUATION OF INCONSISTENCY/INCOMPATIBILITY WITH EXISTING STATE REGULATIONS

Pursuant to Government Code section 11346.5(a)(3)(D), the Department must evaluate whether the proposed regulations are inconsistent or incompatible with existing state regulations. The Department has reviewed existing regulations pertaining to firearms and ammunition within California Code of Regulations (CCR) Title 11, Division 5 and determined the proposed regulations are not inconsistent or incompatible.

This determination is based on the fact that the regulations are not inconsistent or incompatible with existing state regulations because the Department is repealing or amending existing regulations that provide for or reference the creation of a CFARS account.

#### COMPARABLE FEDERAL REGULATIONS

The proposed regulations are not mandated by federal statute or regulation.

#### RESULTS OF THE ECONOMIC IMPACT ASSESSMENT/ANALYSIS

The Department has concluded that the adoption, repeal, and amendment of the proposed regulations will not:

- (1) Create or eliminate jobs within California;
- (2) Create new businesses or eliminate existing businesses within California; or
- (3) Affect the expansion of businesses currently doing business within California.

The Department's determination on items (1) through (3) is based on the fact that there is no cost to private individuals for creating CFARS account. Any individual with an internet connection has the ability to create a CFARS account. The regulations pertain only to the process for an individual to create and use a CFARS account.

(4) Benefits of the regulations to the health and welfare of California residents, worker safety, and the state's environment: Once an individual has created a CFARS account, he or she will be able to easily submit a firearm ownership report or record, update a firearm record, and apply for a COE or unique serial number. By having the information submitted and stored in an electronic database, it will be much easier for the Department to process applications, manage and retrieve information, and communicate with the account holder. Additionally, these regulations will benefit the state's environment through the use of an electronic, rather than a paper, system.

Small Business Determination: The Department has determined the proposed regulations will not affect small business because the regulations pertain only to the process for private individuals to create and use a CFARS account.

#### CONSIDERATION OF ALTERNATIVES

In accordance with Government Code section 11346.5(a)(13), the Department must determine that no reasonable alternative it considered or that has otherwise been identified and brought to its attention would be more effective in carrying out the purpose for which the action is proposed, would be as effective and less burdensome to affected private persons than the proposed action, or would be more cost-effective to affected private persons and equally effective in implementing the statutory policy or other provision of law.

Any person interested in presenting statements or arguments with respect to alternatives to the proposed regulations may do so at the scheduled hearing or during the written comment period.

### California Code of Regulations Title 11, Division 5

### Chapter 12: California Firearms Application Reporting System

#### § 4340. Account Creation.

A California Firearms Application Reporting System (CFARS) account shall be created online by an individual to report or update firearm ownership information with the California Department of Justice (Department), request a unique serial number for a firearm from the Department, and/or apply for and manage a Certificate of Eligibility in order to comply with California firearm laws and regulations.

- (a) A CFARS account may be created online at the following website: https://cfars.doj.ca.gov/login.do.
- (b) The individual shall agree to the following conditions before creating a CFARS account:
  - (1) Non-Liability: The Department is not responsible for, and will have no liability for, any hardware, software, information, or other items or any services provided by any persons other than the Department. In no event shall either party be liable to the other or any third party, under any theory of liability, including, but not limited to, any contract or tort claim for any cause whatsoever, for any indirect, incidental, special, or consequential damages, including loss of revenue or profits, even if aware of the possibility thereof.
  - Authorization: The applicant is authorized to use CFARS for the purpose of reporting or updating firearm ownership information, requesting a unique serial number for a firearm, and/or applying for and managing a Certificate of Eligibility in order to comply with California firearm laws and regulations. If the applicant becomes aware of an unauthorized user obtaining access to his or her CFARS account, the applicant shall notify the Bureau of Firearms immediately at (916) 227-7527, or via email at: firearms.bureau@doj.ca.gov.
  - (3) Fees: Notwithstanding such notification, the applicant agrees the Department shall not be liable for transaction charges fraudulently incurred. It will be the applicant's responsibility to pay any charges. The Department will not provide refunds after the submission of a transaction.
  - (4) True and Accurate Information: All of the information the applicant submits to the Department through CFARS shall be true, accurate, and complete to the best of his or her knowledge.
- (c) The individual shall provide the following information to create a CFARS account:

- (1) Full Name
- (2) Email Address
- (3) Selection of Three Security Questions and Answers
- (4) Password

### California Code of Regulations Title 11, Division 5

Chapter 39: Assault Weapons and Large- Capacity Magazines.

#### **Article 3. Assault Weapon Registration.**

- § 5473. Registration of Assault Weapons Pursuant to Penal Code Section 30900 (b)(1); California Firearms Application Reporting System ("CFARS"); Account Requirements.
- (a) Assault weapon registrations must be filed electronically using the Department's California Firearms Application Reporting System (CFARS), at the following website: https://efars.doj.ca.gov/login.do.
- (b) A CFARS account must be created to use the electronic registration system. To create a CFARS account, assault weapon registrants will be required to agree to the following conditions of use:
  - (1) Non-Liability: The Department is not responsible for and will have no liability for any hardware, software, information, or other items or any services provided by any persons other than the Department. Except as may be required by law, in no event shall either party be liable to the other or any third party, under any theory of liability, including, but not limited to, any contract or tort claim for any cause whatsoever, for any indirect, incidental, special, or consequential damages, including loss of revenue or profits, even if aware of the possibility thereof.
  - (2) Authorization: I am authorized to use CFARS for the purpose of reporting firearm information to the Department in order to comply with California firearm laws and regulations. If I become aware of an unauthorized user obtaining access to my CFARS account, I will notify the Customer Support Center immediately at (916) 227-7527, or via email at: firearms.bureau@doj.ca.gov.
  - (3) Fees: Notwithstanding such notification, the Department shall not be liable for transaction charges fraudulently incurred. It will be the cardholder's responsibility to pay any charges. The Department will not provide refunds after the submission of a transaction.
  - (4) True and Accurate Information: All of the information I submit to the Department through CFARS shall be true, accurate, and complete to the best of my knowledge.
- (c) The following information must be provided by registrants in order to create a CFARS account:

(1) Full Name

- (2) Email Address
- (3) Three Security Questions and Answers
- (4) Password

## § 5474. Registration of Assault Weapons Pursuant to Penal Code section 30900 (b)(1); Applicant and Firearms Information.

After creating a CFARS account pursuant to section 4340 Once a CFARS account has been ereated, registrants must provide the following information:

- (a) The registrant's full name, address, telephone number, date of birth, sex, height, weight, eye color, hair color, military identification number (if applicable), California Driver License number or California Identification Card number, U.S. citizenship status, place of birth, country of citizenship, and alien registration number or I-94, if applicable.
- (b) A description of the firearm that identifies it uniquely, including but not limited to: firearm type, make, model, caliber, firearm color, barrel length, serial number, all identification marks, firearm country of origin/manufacturer, the date the firearm was acquired, the name and address of the individual from whom, or business from which, the firearm was acquired.
- (c) Clear digital photos of firearms listed on the application. One photo shall depict the bullet-button style magazine release installed on the firearm. One photo shall depict the firearm from the end of the barrel to the end of the stock if it is a long gun or the point furthest from the end of the barrel if it is a pistol. The other two photos shall show the left side of the receiver/frame and right side of the receiver/frame. These locations are typically where firearms are marked when manufacturing is complete. At the discretion of the Department the last two photos shall be substituted for photos of identification markings at some other locations on the firearm.

Chapter 41: Firearms: Identifying Information and the Unique Serial Number Application Process for Self-Manufactured or Self-Assembled Firearms.

## Article 5. CFARS Reporting of Self-Manufactured or Self-Assembled Firearms Pursuant to Section 29180.

#### § 5512. CFARS Reporting Process.

- (a) To apply for a unique serial number, the applicant shall create a CFARS account online. To create a CFARS account, the applicant shall agree to the following conditions of use:
  - (1) Non-Liability: the Department is not responsible for, and will have no liability for, any hardware, software, information, or other items or any services provided by any persons other than the Department. Except as may be required by law, in no event shall either party be liable to the other or any third party, under any theory of liability, including, but not limited to, any contract or tort claim for any cause whatsoever, for any indirect, incidental, special, or consequential damages, including loss of revenue or profits, even if aware of the possibility thereof.
  - (2) Authorization: the applicant is authorized to use CFARS for the purpose of reporting firearm information to the Department and/or submitting and managing a Certificate of Eligibility in order to comply with California firearm laws and regulations. If the applicant becomes aware of an unauthorized user obtaining access to the applicant's CFARS account, the applicant will notify the Bureau of Firearms immediately at (916) 227-7527, or via email at: firearms.bureau@doj.ca.gov.
  - (3) Fees: notwithstanding such notification, the applicant agrees the Department shall not be liable for transaction charges fraudulently incurred. It will be the applicant's responsibility to pay any charges. The Department will not provide refunds after the submission of a transaction.
  - (4) True and Accurate Information: all of the information the applicant submits to the Department through CFARS shall be true, accurate, and complete to the best of the applicant's knowledge.
- (b) The following information shall be provided by the applicant to create a CFARS account:
  - (1) Full Name
  - (2) Email Address

- (3) Selection of Three Security Questions and Answers
- (4) Password

Note: Authority cited: Section 29182, Penal Code. Reference: Section 26710 and 29180, Penal Code.

## § 5513. Applicant and Firearm Identification Information Entered into CFARS by Applicant and the Department's Privacy Notice.

- (a) After creating a CFARS account <u>pursuant to section 4340</u>, the applicant shall provide certain identifying information to demonstrate that the applicant is not prohibited under either state or federal law from possessing a firearm before the Department issues a unique serial number to the applicant. The applicant shall provide the following identifying information:
  - (1) The applicant's full name, residence street address, email address, telephone number, date of birth, gender, military identification number (if applicable), California Driver License or Identification Card number, U.S. citizenship status, place of birth, country of citizenship, and alien registration number or I-94 (if applicable).
    - (A) The applicant shall be 18 years of age or older to apply for a unique serial number for a firearm that is not a handgun.
    - (B) The applicant shall be 21 years of age or older to apply for a unique serial number for a handgun.
  - (2) A description of the firearm that specifies: date of manufacture or the date its assembly will be complete, firearm type, caliber, firearm color, barrel length, type of material used to build the receiver (aluminum, steel, polymer plastic, or other), whether it is a frame or receiver only, all identification marks, and firearm city and state of origin.
    - (B) If the applicant specifies that the receiver of the firearm being reported is made from material "other" than aluminum, steel, or polymer plastic, the applicant shall provide a brief explanation of the type of material that was used to build the receiver.
  - (3) The applicant's Firearms Safety Certificate (FSC) or Handgun Safety Certificate (HSC) number. Instructions on obtaining a FSC can be found on: https://oag.ca.gov/firearms/fscinfo.
- (b) If any part of the identifying information in subdivisions (a)(1), (a)(2)(b), and (a)(3)(e) of this section is missing, the Department shall not approve the applicant's request for a unique serial number.
- (c) The applicant shall agree to the following terms of the Department's Privacy Notice:

- (1) Collection and Use of Personal Information: the Division of Law Enforcement, Bureau of Firearms in the Department of Justice collects the information on this application pursuant to Penal Code sections 29180, 29181, 29182, 29183, and 29184. The Bureau of Firearms uses this information to process and assign a unique serial number(s) to a firearm(s) and to record firearm ownership for an applicant. In addition, any personal information collected by state agencies is subject to the limitations in the Information Practices Act and state policy. The Department of Justice's general privacy policy is available at: http://oag.ca.gov/privacy-policy.
- (2) Providing Personal Information: all personal information on this application is mandatory. Failure to provide the mandatory personal information will result in the application not being processed.
- (3) Access to Your Information: you may review the records maintained by the Division of Law Enforcement, Bureau of Firearms in the Department of Justice that contain your personal information, as permitted by the Information Practices Act.
- (4) Possible Disclosure of Personal Information: in order to process and assign a unique serial number(s) to a firearm(s) for an applicant, we may need to share the information the applicant provides us with any Bureau of Firearms representative or any other person designated by the Attorney General upon request. The information you provide may also be disclosed in the following circumstances:
  - (A) With other persons or agencies when necessary to perform their legal duties, and their use of your information is compatible and complies with state law, such as for investigations, licensing, certification, or regulatory purposes;
  - (B) To another government as required by state or federal law.

#### INITIAL STATEMENT OF REASONS

#### PROBLEM STATEMENT

California Penal Code section 11106 requires the Department of Justice (Department) to keep and properly file information for firearm records, and to accept applications for unique serial numbers and Certificates of Eligibility (COE). The Department has developed an electronic system to accept, store, and manage the data. Also, to use the electronic system, individuals need an online mechanism to submit information to the Department. These regulations address that problem.

#### **ANTICIPATED BENEFITS**

These regulations specify to an individual how to create a California Firearms Application Reporting System (CFARS) account. Once an individual has created a CFARS account, he or she will be able to easily and promptly submit a firearm ownership report or record, update a firearm record, and apply for a COE or unique serial number. By having the information submitted and stored in an electronic database, it will be easier for the Department to process applications, manage and retrieve information, and communicate with the account holder. Additionally, using the electronic system, rather than a paper system, will save the individual money and allow for a more efficient processing time.

#### PURPOSE AND NECESSITY

#### § 4340. Account Creation.

This section explains the requirements for an individual to create a CFARS account and mandates the creation of a CFARS account. The creation of a CFARS account is necessary, so individuals can receive email notifications regarding the status of their submissions. A CFARS account also allows individuals to efficiently complete firearms submissions with their personal information encrypted and securely stored. Thus, there is no longer the requirement for an individual to re-type their personal information for future submissions.

Subdivision (a) specifies the web address where an individual can create a CFARS account and then submit a firearm ownership report, update a firearm record, and apply for a COE.

Subdivision (b)(1) through (4) details the conditions of use that an individual must agree to when creating an account in CFARS. This subdivision is necessary because when an individual creates a CFARS account it enables the Department to keep a lasting record of the information they provide. Furthermore, the conditions of use information presented in this subdivision is necessary to ensure the individual is aware of the specifics relative to non-liability, authorization, fees, and true and accurate information prior to creating the account.

Subdivision (c)(1) through (4) explains the information required to create a CFARS account.

## § 5473. Registration of Assault Weapons Pursuant to Penal Code Section 30900 (b)(1); California Firearms Application Reporting System ("CFARS"); Account Requirements.

This section has been repealed to remove all language regarding the creation of a CFARS account because section 4340 explains this process.

### §5474. Registration of Assault Weapons Pursuant to Penal Code Section 30900 (b)(1); Applicant and Firearms Information.

This section has been amended to explain that a CFARS account must be created pursuant to section 4340 before the registration of an assault weapon can be initiated.

#### § 5512. CFARS Reporting Process.

This section has been repealed to remove all language regarding the creation of a CFARS account because section 4340 explains this process.

## § 5513. Applicant and Firearm Identification Information Entered into CFARS by Applicant and the Department's Privacy Notice.

This section has been amended to explain that a CFARS account must be created pursuant to section 4340 before the process to acquire a unique serial number for a self-manufactured or self-assembled firearm can be initiated. Furthermore, subdivision (b) has been amended to specify the requirements of an application for a unique serial number.

## TECHNICAL, THEORETICAL, AND/OR EMPIRICAL STUDY, REPORTS, OR DOCUMENTS

Department staff relied upon its experience and expertise when writing these proposed regulations. The Department did not rely upon technical, theoretical, or empirical studies or reports when writing these regulations.

#### ECONOMIC IMPACT ASSESSMENT/ANALYSIS

The Department determined the proposed regulations will not have a significant adverse economic impact. The Department concludes it is unlikely the proposed regulations will affect (1) the creation or elimination of jobs within California, (2) the creation of new businesses or the elimination of existing businesses within California, or (3) the expansion of businesses currently

doing business with California. This assessment is based on the fact that there is no cost for an individual to create a CFARS account. Any economic impact from requiring individuals to create a CFARS account will likely be positive, resulting in savings of time and resources.

Additionally, these regulations are beneficial to the health and welfare of California residents and worker safety because they establish an electronic process for an individual to create and use a CFARS account, which will make the firearm related information easier for an individual to provide and for the Department to manage. Furthermore, these regulations will benefit the state's environment through the use of an electronic, rather than a paper, system.

## EVIDENCE SUPPORTING FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT STATEWIDE ADVERSE ECONOMIC IMPACT DIRECTLY AFFECTING BUSINESS

The Department finds that the proposed regulations will not have a statewide adverse economic impact on businesses because the regulations pertain only to the process for an individual to create and use a CFARS account.

## REASONABLE ALTERNATIVES TO THE REGULATIONS AND THE AGENCY'S REASONS FOR REJECTING THOSE ALTERNATIVES

No other reasonable alternatives were presented to, or considered by, DOJ that would be either more effective in carrying out the purpose for which the action is proposed, or would be as effective and less burdensome to affected private persons than the proposed action, or would be more cost effective to affected private persons and equally effective in implementing the statutory policy or other provision of law.

# REASONABLE ALTERNATIVES TO THE PROPOSED REGULATORY ACTION THAT WOULD LESSEN ANY ADVERSE IMPACT ON SMALL BUSINESSES, AND THE AGENCY'S REASONS FOR REJECTING THEM

The proposed regulations will not have an adverse impact on small businesses because the regulations only impact private individuals, and there is no cost to them for creating a CFARS account. Consequently, no reasonable alternatives were proposed or considered by the Department.

#### DUPLICATION OR CONFLICT WITH FEDERAL REGULATIONS

The Department determines that these regulations are not duplicative and do not conflict with federal regulations.
