BHHI's Vision


- BHHI will be responsive to the urgent crisis of homelessness
- BHHI's goal is to be a resource for accurate, timely, and impact-oriented research to inform appropriate systemic, programmatic, and policy responses focused on preventing and ending homelessness in the San Francisco Bay Area, California, and across the United States

BHHI's Vision

- Strengthen the evidence-base to elevate policies that are most effective in reducing and preventing homelessness through the use of strategic science
- We know what works: Housing is the solution to homelessness
 - What policies and practices are most effective in reducing and preventing homelessness?
 - What systemic, policy, and programmatic innovations are critical to reducing and preventing homelessness?
 - What evidence do we need to build better policies and align funding priorities with the evidence?
- **Where does innovation and radical restructuring of systems need to happen and what evidence do we need to make those decisions and take risks?**

Strategic Science:

A model to conduct science that is

Strategic Science

- Insures that we are answering questions of key interest to people in the field doing the work, experiencing homelessness, making policy and funding decisions
- Creates a feedback loop
 - We take policy/pragmatic questions and turn them into answerable (research) questions
 - We conduct research
 - Provide policy recommendations, communications/translation to broader audiences
- Allows us to be flexible—to be able to pivot towards impact and need

What We Do and What We Don't Do

- ✓ Provide impactful and responsive answers to strengthen community's responses to homelessness
- ✓ Innovate using a flexible funding source
- ✓ Rely on community input
- ✓ Center people with lived experience
 - ✓ Hire staff with lived experience
 - ✓ Conduct participatory research
 - People with lived experience will be involved in research design, data collection, and data analysis
- ✓ Use an equity lens in all our work

Race Equity and Homelessness

- Race is a crucial lens through which people should understand the dynamics of homelessness
- Given the orientation of our policy-focused research, the design of any work will necessarily be taking into account the causal role of historical and structural racism on homelessness
- Our research design will be informed by a critical understanding of the significant contributions of structural racism with its deeply entrenched histories in many different forms to homelessness

Race Equity and Homelessness

- Educate researchers on understanding how the current landscape emerged
- Gather evidence about how to serve people of color more equitably and effectively
- Survey methods, data collection, analysis – important to be thinking about we are taking into account that racism has historically figured into research design and survey methods
 - For example, ethnocentric assumptions can skew the kinds of data results that are going to show up in our data
 - Participatory research – people with lived experience involved in research design, collecting data, and analyzing data

What We Do and What We Don't Do

- Design research that will take forever
- Design research that is not impactful to current crisis
- Design research that isn't in partnership with the community stakeholders
- Design research that does not center equitable design and analysis
- Not make findings translatable or useful
