GPPA Looks Forward to 2008

Green wins boro council seat; GPUS holds Annual Meeting in Reading

2007 was an exciting and challenging year for the Green Party of Pennsylvania.

In July, more than 300 state delegates, party leaders, and other Greens from nearly every state and several foreign countries came together in Reading for the 2007 National Meeting of the Green Party of the United States, hosted by the Reading Greens, the Berks County Greens and the Green Party of Pennsylvania. Highlights of the meeting included a workshop on "Dismantling Racism," and appearances by Ralph Nader and Cynthia McKinney. This November, GPPA celebrated the election of Samuel Ettaro to Boro Council in Curwensville, a small town in Clearfield County struggling to build an economic base in the "new" economy. Ettaro, 39, ran a write-in campaign, beating out a long-time incumbent. Ettaro's major issue was the Sunnyside Ethanol plant to be built near his daughter's elementary school. One of Ettaro's biggest challenges will be to gain support for an alternative economic development plan and the Green Party intends to help him. Be on the lookout for more Green news from Clearfield County in 2008 and beyond!

Ettaro joins 35 other Greens across the country who were elected this past November. In PA, our other candidates ran valiant races bringing new people into the Green Party, getting the word out about our issues and values, and challenging the "same old same old" politics of the two corporate parties. Jennaro Pullano, the Green Party candidate for Mayor of Reading, placed third in a hard-fought five-way race, and we fielded candidates in contests across the state.

Chris Robinson of Philadelphia in an election analysis pointed out four ways to help grow the GPPA in 2008:

- Volunteer to help the Green Party at your polling place two days this year: the Primary Election in April and the General Election in November.
- 2. Stay informed by joining one or more of GPPA's email lists
- 3. Become familiar with the Green Party platform, talk with your neighbors about the Green Party, and ask them to register as Greens
- 4. Participate in progressive political activities as a Green.

Why we run candidates

We run candidates with the goal of winning, so they can impact legislation and political decisions congruent with Green values. On that basis, some critics within the party ask: Why bother running if the chances of winning are slim, as with Presidential and statewide candidates? Why bother collecting signatures for a candidate who is very unlikely to win?

- **Because** ... as difficult as it is to win an election with the deck stacked against us, there is always at least a slim chance of immediate success.
- **Because** ... our candidates have a very real chance to shape the outcome of elections as spoilers, which will give corporate parties an incentive to adopt IRV, etc.
- **Because** ... even third party candidates can use their campaign to bring Green issues and values to the election discourse.
- **Because** ... to gain and maintain recognition as a legitimate political option in the eyes of Pennsylvania voters we must continue to have a presence in front of them, on the ballot, and on the campaign. That is crucial to gaining members and continuing to grow. Without growth we will never have success.

We get Presidential and statewide candidates on the ballot because that is how we get minor party status, and with Presidential candidates, because if we do not, someone else will do it in lieu of us.

Ultimately the answer to these questions comes down to where you heart is. If in your heart you can support Obama or Clinton or Edwards, or McCain or Huckabee or Romney or Giuliani, or either of the two corporate parties they represent, then maybe you shouldn't bother supporting Green candidates by collecting signatures -- but if none of those not-so-magnificent seven is someone you would care to see as President, if you believe corporate giants need to be removed from politics, or if you believe that voters should have many choices and that having more choices is better for democracy, then you have to do what is right: Fight the good fight, and work for someone you would like to see as President, a party whose values you believe in, and the right to a more democratic election process, even if the odds of short-term success are long, knowing that your work will move us in the direction of long-term progress. Be strategic, but do not give up.

And as I have said and written previously, 2008 is going to be a lot different than 2006. We WILL get our statewide and Presidential candidates on the ballot in Pennsylvania.
