

Pennsylvania Green Party Opposes Governor Tom Wolf's regressive tax plan

Governor Wolf's tax plan negatively impacts working and low income people in Pennsylvania. Already considered one of the "Terrible Ten" states with the most regressive tax systems, Wolf's plan does little to address the problem. Property tax is a major Pennsylvania issue, but Wolf offsets cuts with significant increases in regressive sales and income taxes.

In addition, Wolf proposes cutting corporate taxes by 50%. Figures from Pennsylvania Budget and Policy Center indicate that Wolf's revenue will be derived mostly from Personal Income Tax 41% and sales tax 31% while Corporate Tax will only generate 8% of his budget.

Combined reporting, requiring a corporation and all of its subsidiaries to file a single tax return, will help generate lost tax revenue. Pennsylvania Public Interest Research Group claims Pennsylvania lost \$5.2 billion in corporate tax revenue last year. This alone would cover Wolf's proposed Property Tax reduction and education spending increases.



Counting on long term tax revenue from gas extraction makes no sense. When the process ends, so will the revenue. Sustainable funding for education is imperative.

"Governor Wolf should take a more conservative approach. Eliminate corporate tax loopholes first. Pennsylvania's lower income and working people need a break, not to be broken," said Jay Sweeney, Chair Green Party of Pennsylvania.

"As my Green Party gubernatorial campaign made clear, Tom Corbett and Tom Wolf offered voters a choice between two Republicans." said Green Party candidate Paul Glover. "Governor Wolf is now proposing to cut business taxes while funding schools through fracking our water and raising sales taxes including clothing sales. Ronald Reagan would be proud of him."

National anti-discrimination legislation covering sexual orientation and identity is necessary to strengthen marriage equality

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- Green Party leaders called passage of national anti-discrimination legislation that covers sexual orientation and sexual identity a necessary step after recent court decisions allowing same-sex marriage, especially in the wake of laws in Indiana and Arkansas that uphold a "right" to discriminate against lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender Americans.

"The controversy over the right of a business to refuse service to LGBT people because of religious beliefs shows the need for a national nondiscrimination act that includes sexual orientation and identity among the classes for which discrimination in employment, housing, public accommodations, and adoption is outlawed," said Green Mayor Jason West of New Paltz, N.Y.

"The Green Party has supported marriage equality and protection from discrimination ever since the party was founded, long before Democratic leaders decided it was safe to endorse same-sex marriage rights. In 28 states, it's still legal to fire LGBTs and deny them services at restaurants and other businesses. We hope for a Supreme Court ruling on *DeBoer v. Snyder* that recognizes marriage equality under the 14th Amendment, but true legal equality won't exist for same-sex couples or LGBT individuals until a national anti-discrimination bill is passed," said Mayor West.

In 2004, Mayor Jason West made national news when he defied state law and risked jail for solemnizing 24 same-sex weddings. Mr. West is running for reelection again in a race that will be decided on May 5 (<http://westformayor.com>).

"Refusing to do business with LGBT people should be recognized as an injury to the public good as much as refusing to do business with people because of race, ethnicity, religion, or sex. If a restaurant declined to serve Jewish or Muslim customers, if a bakery refused to bake a wedding cake for an interracial couple, there would be no dispute about legality," said Tim Casebolt, California delegate to the Green Party's National Committee and former secretary of the Lavender Green Caucus (<http://www.lavendergreens.us>).

"Businesses and other public accommodations benefit endlessly from services provided by our tax dollars, in the form of infrastructure like roads, utilities, fire and police departments, and fair business protections. LGBT people pay taxes too and deserve the same rights, freedoms, and protections as everyone else," said Mr. Casebolt.

In 2013, the U.S. Senate passed the Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA), which only covers employment. The bill, which President Obama supports, has not been passed in the U.S. House. Many state and municipal laws against discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity also cover housing and public accommodations. Such laws generally contain exemptions for religious organizations, private membership clubs, and personal living spaces.

"The principle behind marriage equality is freedom of kinship -- the right to choose whom we love, our partners and our families. A comprehensive national anti-discrimination law would clarify existing court decisions regarding marriage equality and encourage more favorable rulings. It would invalidate 'right to discriminate' statutes that have been passed in states like Indiana. These statues have nothing to do with freedom and everything to do with making LGBT people second-class citizens, forcing LGBTs back into the closet, and denying desperately needed services to young LGBTs," said Emma Lugo, secretary of the Lavender Green Caucus.



Green Party of PA on Earth Day

April 22, 2015 marked the 45th anniversary of **Earth Day**. It was started as a national teach-in to raise environmental awareness after the 1969 Santa Barbara blow out and 10 day oil spill into the Pacific Ocean.

Capitalizing on an actively engaged public who spent the previous decade fighting for civil rights and opposing the war in Viet Nam, on April 22, 1970, 20 million people participated in coast to coast events. Ralph Nader, who later ran for President on the Green Party ticket, participated in Philadelphia's Earth Day events.

This activism and awareness led to the creation of the Environmental Protection Agency and passage of the Clean Air Act, the Clean Water Act and the Endangered Species act in the 70s under Republican administration of president Richard Nixon. This was the golden age of the environmental movement.

After suffering from oil embargoes and gas rationing earlier in the 70's, president Jimmy Carter delivered a National Energy Policy speech on April 20, 1977.

The speech outlined a plan to reduce the use of oil and gas through conservation and efficiency of automobiles and to develop renewable sources of energy for sustained economic growth. Jimmy Carter established the weatherization program, placed solar panels on the White House roof to produce hot water, established the Solar Energy Research Institute to develop photovoltaic solar cells and set a goal of 20 percent of energy from renewable sources by 2000.

Despite it's promising beginning, the environmental movement has suffered serious setbacks. President Ronald Reagan's 1981 energy policy plan stated that our problem's were not as bad as the previous administration had projected and insisted the free market was sufficient to provide individual choices and judgments that will produce the proper balance of supply and demand. In 1986 President Reagan took down the solar panels former president Jimmy Carter had placed on the White House roof in 1979 to produce hot water.

More recently, Congress passed the Energy Policy Act of 2005. There was no place for solar and wind. No place for conservation and efficiency. Instead, the oil & gas industry were granted immunity from the Clean Water Act and the Safe Drinking Water Act, the "Halliburton loophole" allowing fracking. Soon thereafter, Pennsylvania was invaded by the shale army.

Over the last 5 years, we have had unprecedented disasters. On April 20, 2010 the BP Deepwater Horizon explosion and oil spill, the largest marine oil spill in the history of the petroleum industry, dwarfing the 10 day Santa Monica oil spill that spawned Earth Day. This spill flowed unabated for 3 months, discharging over 200 million gallons of oil. On March 11, 2011, The Fukushima Daiichi nuclear disaster resulted in a meltdown and release of nuclear emissions that continue to this day.

Declare Your Energy Independence



In March of 2013, an Exxon pipeline rupture spilled 5,000 barrels of oil in Mayflower Arkansas.

On April 9, 2015 Stateimpact Pennsylvania reported the results of a study, in the journal Environmental Health Perspectives, titled "Predictors of Indoor Radon Concentrations in Pennsylvania 1989-2013." Conducted by Researchers from Johns Hopkins University, radon readings were taken from 860,000 residences and other buildings between 1989 and 2013. They found that areas where gas extraction was prevalent had a 39% higher radon concentration than areas with no activity.

Dr. Brian Schwartz, a professor in the Department of Environmental Health Sciences at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health and leader of the study said one "plausible explanation" for the elevated levels is the thousands of gas wells drilled in Pennsylvania over the last 10 years.

What more evidence do we need to see that our energy policy is taking us down a path of destruction?

In one hundred years, communications have evolved from Edison's cylinders to cell phones that take photos and access the worldwide web. Yet, we rely on 19th century oil, gas and coal for energy. Why?

It is time to develop a 21st century energy policy that is sustainable and respects the earth. The Green Party of Pennsylvania reiterates the call for a ban on fracking. It is time to invest in solar, wind, geothermal and incentives homeowners and businesses to do so.

It is time for DEP to live up to it's mission "to protect Pennsylvania's air, land and water from pollution and to provide for the health and safety of its citizens through a cleaner environment. We will work as partners with individuals, organizations, governments and businesses to prevent pollution and restore our natural resources."

PA Greens Join the NEPA Cannabis Rally in Scranton

The Green Party played a major role in the NEPA Cannabis rally held in Scranton's Nay Aug Park on April 19. Hundreds of participants showed up on a beautiful spring afternoon to listen to bluegrass and reggae music and cheered to speeches. There was a long line of people all afternoon waiting to sign a petition in support of legalization of cannabis.

Former Green Party Congressional candidate Kurt Shotko warmed up the crowd. Luzerne County Green Party Chairman Carl Romanelli fired them up. Green Party supporter and activist Vera Scroggins spoke of her struggles to reveal the truth about the gas industry activity and cover up. New York's Rob Robertson brought the crowd to an ovation talking about his efforts in New Paltz, New York which including helping elect Green Party Mayor Jason West.



All in all it was a day of solidarity with friends new and old.

Cheri Honkala challenges standardized testing in Philadelphia Schools

Tuesday, March 10, 2015 - In Philadelphia, PA, the Green Party's 2012 Vice Presidential candidate is taking a leading role in public school parents' challenges to high stakes standardized testing. Cheri Honkala, the parent of a child in the Philadelphia public school system, is also the national coordinator of the Poor People's Economic Human Rights Campaign.

In October, Honkala sent and published a letter to the principal of her son's school requesting that he receive permission to opt-out of a number of state-mandated standardized tests. She wrote that "standardized testing is against our religious and philosophical beliefs." Opting out of the tests would "allow [her son] to pursue other educational activities such as independent reading, book reports, research projects, volunteering in the library, etc." Several weeks later, Honkala and her organization followed up by participating in a forum on standardized testing at Philadelphia City Hall.

Recently, organizing and publicity surrounding high stakes testing in Philadelphia has started garnering more attention. Last week, Honkala participated in a public forum on opting out of the tests. The "Test-In" was put together by a coalition of organizations in Philadelphia, including the Caucus of Working Educators, Alliance for Philadelphia Public Schools, Teacher Action Group, Philadelphia Student Union, Parents United for Public Education, & Action United. The Poor People's Economic Human Rights Campaign is also part of the coalition.

The Examiner gave some context to the meeting: "The Opt-Out movement is growing in Philadelphia. After parents and teachers took a stand against standardized testing at Feltonville School of Arts and Sciences, there has been an informational informal meeting about how parents can opt out hosted at the district-wide Home and School Association and several articles written about the movement itself. Superintendent Hite just recently gave a statement that the School District of Philadelphia will make sure that parents receive information about their opt out options. The national outcry against testing and the inherent flaws are not limited to Philadelphia or the surrounding suburbs, but are evident in New York City and Chicago too. The fear and intimidation surrounding testing can render parents, teachers, and administrators silent and powerless, but now there is another opportunity to be informed of the opt out process that is available in Pennsylvania."

Meanwhile, in a story that Honkala linked on her Facebook profile, the Washington Post is reporting that in nearby New York state, 60,000 students opted out of similar testing in 2014. For Honkala and PPEHRC, this is one more in a line of fights surrounding public education in Philadelphia. Last year, Honkala was arrested in an act of civil disobedience defending her son's elementary school from being one of dozens closed by the school district.

More recently, the Green Party of Philadelphia (GPOP, www.gpop.org) has nominated Kristin Combs for City Council. Combs is competing against Republicans for one of two seats that must go to a minority party. She is a public school teacher and advocate against the ongoing cuts to Philadelphia public schools. Her education platform, which is central to her campaign, states that "every school aged child deserves access to a meaningful public education, and Philadelphia's current climate does not allow for this." "Fund schools without property tax increase"

The Green Party of Philadelphia (GPOP) objects to Mayor Michael Nutter's budget for Fiscal 2016 because it heaps the cost of school services upon poor and working people. Meeting on April 22 at Cavanaugh's Restaurant in University City, Green Party members rejected Nutter's proposed tax increases and urged Philadelphia's City Council to tax the wealthy to pay for the public education of future citizens.

In his budget address on March 5, Nutter requested that City Council provide \$103 million more for public education.

education. Green Party members agree with this request. Chris Robinson, a member of the GOP City Committee from Germantown (Ward 59), said, "For too long, our city and state leaders have starved public education. Mayor Nutter should have made this request six years ago. The Green Party has highlighted this problem for many years, and we will continue to argue for a larger investment in public education."

While visiting Kensington Health Sciences Academy on April 9, Nutter added some additional criteria for funding an increase in public school investment. He said, "Let's cut the phoniness. Let's be serious about educating kids." The press reported that Nutter then asked for "concrete, achievable, and annually-recurring plans" to come up with the cash.

Nutter would like to pay for this investment with another increase in property tax, which is not supported by the Green Party. The Green Party City Committee decided in 2012 that the best way to pay for quality public education was to get the money from giant businesses and mega nonprofits.

The Green Party has long opposed the take-backs forced on school employees by a School Reform Commission appointed by failed-Governor Tom Corbett. The Green Party has also opposed tax increases on poor and working people, like the cigarette tax passed by City Council in 2014.

Since 2012, the Green Party has urged City Council and the Mayor to fund an increased investment in public education using methods which are concrete, achievable and annually recurring. Any of the following three methods, which will tax the wealthy, will meet the criteria of both Mayor Nutter and Green Party members:

CUT THE FREE PASS. City Council should reduce the current 10-year property-tax free pass to just five years. The current free pass benefits the new, the few, and the well-to-do, while making long-time residents and businesses pay more.

GOOD NEIGHBOR PAYMENTS. Right now, the mega nonprofits (think, Hahnemann University Hospital, the University of Pennsylvania, and others) pay no taxes on their profitable property. Since these nonprofits use city services (think, police and fire), Mayor Nutter now has a duty to issue an executive order on such payments, which was requested of him by Council on March 26.

USE AND OCCUPANCY (U&O) REFORM. Philadelphia's 2013 AVI reform of real estate taxes shifted \$200 million dollars away from businesses and onto homeowners. Instead of another property tax increase like the one requested by Nutter, City Council should raise the U&O tax rate on big businesses to restore fairness to the property-tax code. This change should exempt small businesses.

These three funding methods would allow poor and working citizens to see a better education for their children, while having that investment paid for by giant businesses and mega nonprofits that require a better-educated supply of labor and customers.

Hillary Kane, treasurer of GOP from Cedar Park (Ward 46), said, "Education of all children should be one of our main responsibilities." Kane, who is also a delegate to the Green Party National Committee, points to the Green Party Platform, which says, "We must stop disinvestment in education and instead put it at the top of our social and economic agenda. Effective schools have sufficient resources. Too many of our teachers are overworked, underpaid, and starved of key materials."

Green Party of Pennsylvania supports May Day USA march and rally

May 1, May Day, is an internationally recognized celebration of labor. The date was chosen to commemorate the Haymarket Riot. The riot was a result of police action against laborers organized to obtain an 8 hour work day and a bomb thrown by one of the protesters.

While some countries around the world celebrate May Day as Labor Day, efforts to do so in the U.S. have been unsuccessful. The Green Party of Pa endorses the May Day USA march, rally and celebration in Philadelphia.

"Eighty countries have a public holiday on May Day, but not the United States, where the 8 hour work day originated," said Vivek Ananthan member of both the Green Party of PA Steering Committee and the International Committee of the Green Party of the United States. Ananthan initiated a proposal, which was unanimously accepted by the May Day Committee, to ask Philadelphia City Council to declare May Day a public holiday.

"The Green Party supports a living wage and today's fight for \$15.00 has to rank up there with the fight for the 8 hour workday," said Jay Sweeney chair of the Green Party of Pennsylvania.
