How can you use Slack?

- Chat with other GetUp members across the country
- Collaborate with other people in your state and around Australia
- Chat with people in your Action Group
- Get the latest campaign news and strategy updates
- Get tech support
- Ask staff questions and give feedback

Why Slack?

- Reduces email
- Slack can serve multiple functions all in one place: communications within groups, between groups, between volunteers and staff...
- Slack empowers volunteers to make your own channels, add people and message whoever you want in the network
- GetUp staff are all already on Slack, so jumping on there is easy and intuitive- meaning campaigners are more likely to use it!

Who is on Slack?

- Slack is a space for **active members of Action Groups**, people who attend meetings and/or other Action Group events regularly
- Membership of Slack is about **quality** not quantity, to make sure we have lots of great conversations rather than lots of confused people!

Privacy and access

- Slack will be used to share strategic information, so we need to keep it as secure as we can
- Action Group Coordinators, Action Group Secretaries, State Support Team Members and Staff have an invite link that they can use to get new members on Slack
- Slack is end-to-end encrypted and your data will not be sold to advertisers or other third parties

And one more thing...

- Slack automatically deletes all messages once there are 10,000 messages- so if there is a conversation or a file you don't want to lose, considering downloading and storing it elsewhere

When to create a new channel

- For ongoing conversations about a particular topic or area of work, where people are likely to come and go from the conversation, eg. a **working group** within your action group or the **executive/leadership team** in your action group
- For a topic you'd like to discuss with lots of people in the network, for example sharing good books or films

When *not* to create a new channel

- When a direct message with an individual or group of people works just as well
 - When there is already a very similar channel
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
