## **PART 1: Short-Answer Questionnaire**

1) Please describe your qualifications for the position you seek (include your key issues/priorities if elected and any key endorsements you'd like to share), plus anything else that you'd like our members to know about you and your candidacy.

I have served as Public Defender for the past twelve years. Prior to being elected in 2002, I worked as a Deputy Public Defender for 11 years and the office's Chief Attorney for 2 years. I have personally handled over 3,000 criminal cases and have tried over 150 jury trials. I have been certified by the California State Bar Criminal Law Specialist for the past 24 years and have served on the Boards of the California Attorneys for Criminal Justice and the California Public Defenders Association.

As Chief Attorney, I worked to bring the office into the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Prior to 1998, the office did not have computers and a networked database. After being elected Public Defender in 2002, I worked to increase staffing and resources for the office. For many years, the office had suffered from inadequate staffing and high caseloads. I implemented effective managerial and staff support, caseload and workload standards to ensure superior legal outcomes, and training. Since being elected, the office's budget has increased from \$13 million to \$30 million.

Each year, the office and its dedicated staff helps over 20,000 San Franciscans obtain justice in the courts, and uphold our nation's Bill of Rights and Constitution. Today our office is considered one of the best in the nation.

I have also founded a number of innovative community-based programs and reforms that prevent crime. Our Clean Slate and prisoner reentry programs have helped thousands of people turn their lives around. Our award winning juvenile justice programs, including MAGIC and Legal Education Advocacy Program (LEAP) keep kids in school.

I have received top national, statewide, and local awards from the American Bar Association, the National Legal Aid and Defense Association, the California Public Defenders Association, the SF Lawyer's Committee, and the Mayor's Fiscal Advisory Committee's Managerial Excellence Award.

2) If you are running for College Board, tell us about what you have done to support CCSF during its accreditation crisis and what you plan to do to keep it open and funded. Even if you aren't running for College Board, if you have been a part of the fight to save CCSF, feel free to tell us about what you have done to help.

I attended City College in Sacramento, where I grew up, so I strongly support CCSF and keeping it open so students from all economic and social backgrounds have access to a college education.

3) Do you support repeal or reform of the Ellis Act? Locally, what specifically would you do to fight for housing affordability in San Francisco?

I support repeal of the Ellis Act, and supported the recent effort to reform the Ellis Act in San Francisco. I have always supported affordable housing, and recently I worked with a coalition of tenant advocacy organization, and joined with Supervisor David Campos to obtain \$1 million in funding which will be used to hire 10 tenant attorneys. This is an issue that is very important to me. 90% of landlords are represented by a lawyer in eviction proceedings, while only 10% of tenants are represented by a lawyer. We increased the number of tenant attorneys for 35%, and as a result, all tenants facing eviction will be able to receive full scope representation.

- 4) In your opinion, what kind of reform of Prop 13 is needed, if any? Would you support a split-roll property tax system? Prop 13 should be repealed. But failing that, there should be a split-roll property tax system so corporations who are not paying their fair share are required to pay higher property taxes.
- 5) LGBTQ elders and older people living with HIV face a number of challenges, including finding affordable housing, accessing health care and a general lack of services. Many are being evicted. If you were elected, what would you do in your power to help address these challenges? As mentioned above, I have worked to increase the number of lawyers available to tenants, and worked in collaboration with the AIDS Legal Referral Panel, AIDS Housing Alliance, Eviction Defense Collaborative, Causa Justa, the SF Tenants Union, the Asian Law Caucus and other

organizations to improve legal services to LBGTQ seniors and others who are vulnerable given the rising cost of living in our City.

6) Similarly, LGBTQ youth face challenges including bullying and a high rate of homelessness if ostracized by their families. If you are elected, what would you do in your power to help these youth? For School Board candidates, what would you do on the SFUSD board to help LGBTQ students who are bullied?

Over the past two years, the MAGIC Programs (BMAGIC and Mo MAGIC), which I founded, both in the Western Addition- Fillmore and Bayview Hunters Point have worked with LYRIC and other LGBT organizations to provide diversity and antibullying training to over 120 non-profits from those communities. This training has been key in terms of strengthening bridges and understanding between LGBT members both inside and outside of those communities.

7) Supervised injection facilities or drug consumption facilities have been shown to reduce new HIV and hepatitis infections, overdose deaths, and public drug use, and to increase linkage to medical care and substance use treatment and save money, yet they remain controversial and illegal. If you are elected, what would you do to advocate for supervised injection sites?

I completely support supervised injection sites, as they have in Canada. I have spent my entire career fighting against the senseless War on Drugs and would welcome supervised injection sites and wet houses.
