PART 1: Short-Answer Questionnaire

1)

Please describe your qualifications for the position you seek (include your key issues/priorities if elected and any key endorsements you'd like to share), plus anything else that you'd like our members to know about you and your candidacy.

I am running because, despite sitting at the center of global technology and innovation, San Franciscans continue to struggle with challenges around education, transportation, technology, and affordability. We desperately need energetic, inventive leaders who have the vision and energy to improve our communities through more responsive and open city government.

As a 10-year resident of District 2 who has raised my family here, as well as an avid bicycle and train commuter, I understand the unique challenges facing San Francisco firsthand. I have spent my adult life as an innovator, crafting creative solutions for firms in a wide variety of sectors, from communications to clean energy. I have a Ph.D. in Engineering, numerous patents, an M.B.A., and a wide range of accomplishments in both business and science. My commitment is to bring my professional success as an inventor, scientist and business leader to create new programs that can change San Franciscans' lives for the better.

If you are running for College Board, tell us about what you have done to support CCSF during its accreditation crisis and what you plan to do to keep it open and funded. Even if you aren't running for College Board, if you have been a part of the fight to save CCSF, feel free to tell us about what you have done to help.

I am not running for College Board.

Do you support repeal or reform of the Ellis Act? Locally, what specifically would you do to fight for housing affordability in San Francisco?

I support the ongoing and emerging initiatives ensuring that real estate speculation does not drastically reduce middle income housing via evictions. This includes several reforms of the Ellis Act.

I also support current initiatives to increase the San Francisco housing stock (in this case by 30,000 units in the next decade), but with a larger percentage (30% or more) for low and middle-income housing.

Finally, I believe additional measures should be studied (which I would strongly encourage as Supervisor) to drive public-private partnerships that would add low- and middle-income housing beyond the above goal. Potential innovative uses of adoption and naming rights for special types of housing could also be studied.

4)

In your opinion, what kind of reform of Prop 13 is needed, if any? Would you support a split-roll property tax system?

Prop 13 changes have been rejected by voters in the past. But, if there is evidence is that a split-roll system can address some of the fundamental problems existing today, such as growing inequality and housing affordability, I could consider sponsoring a proposal. Also, proposals such as Tom Ammiano's, which close loopholes in Prop 13, are worth supporting.

LGBTQ elders and older people living with HIV face a number of challenges, including finding affordable housing, accessing health care and a general lack of services. Many are being evicted. If you were elected, what would you do in your power to help address these challenges?

The aforementioned housing measures should help address this, at least in part. In addition, I will ensure that LGBT rights continue their firm ascent through vigorous support for existing and emerging legislation (at the municipal and state level) and initiatives including the following:

- Equal housing initiatives: creating affordable housing for LGBT individuals, especially seniors (e.g. the San Francisco Openhouse program, the LGBT Aging Policy Task Force proposal for LGBT senior housing co-op and low-income units in the Castro, the re-opening of Marty's Place, etc).
- Healthcare initiatives: ensuring equal protection for transgender individuals (in particular standardizing procedure criteria for determining "medical necessity" and coverage for surgery, therapy, counseling, leave, etc.), finding safe injection sites for drug users, providing equal opportunity to donate blood, modernizing birth and death certificates, promoting LGBT cultural competency in healthcare, etc.

Similarly, LGBTQ youth face challenges including bullying and a high rate of homelessness if ostracized by their families. If you are elected, what would you do in your power to help these youth? For School Board candidates, what would you do on the SFUSD board to help LGBTQ students who are bullied?

In addition to the above, I will fight to prevent bullying in schools (by enforcing the “Protect Students” law, “Seth’s Law”, and others) and work to stop discrimination in youth groups.

Supervised injection facilities or drug consumption facilities have been shown to reduce new HIV and hepatitis infections, overdose deaths, and public drug use, and to increase linkage to medical care and substance use treatment and save money, yet they remain controversial and illegal. If you are elected, what would you do to advocate for supervised injection sites?

With strong evidence in hand that these facilities help address infection rates, I would begin a discussion around legalization and, if appropriate, sponsor measures and/or legislation to help make it a reality.
