**1. Mobile Police Station Beat Surgeries.** Neighbourhood Beat Manager, Peter Crawford has organised a mobile Police Station beat surgery to be established in Princess Victoria Street on the following days. Saturday August 13<sup>th</sup>, Wednesday September 21<sup>st</sup>, Wednesday October 12<sup>th</sup>, Thursday November 10<sup>th</sup> and Sunday December 11<sup>th</sup>. All between 10am and 12 noon. All are welcome to drop in and raise any issues of concern, or just to meet your local police team.

**2. Speed limit petition for Hotwell Rd/Portway.** You may recall from our January bulletin that residents of The Colonnade, St Vincent's Parade and the Hotwell Rd on the Portway are campaigning to reduce the speed of traffic in front of these houses, some of which have lower ground areas that open straight onto the road. The suggestion is to have a 30mph limit extend from Bridge Valley Road to the South end of the Plimsoll Bridge, (and vice-versa). If the speed of vehicles were reduced we think the carriageway could be altered to allow short term parking outside in a "protected" space. Currently there is absolutely no facility for the nurse or doctor to pull up or the gas man etc. And so we have a classic case of what appears to be vehicle movement and speed being more important than life quality for residents.

We would like to see this number raised significantly as the speed limit here is currently being reviewed. ***Please have a look at the petition if you have not already done so and if you support this idea then please sign and encourage others to do so. Every signature will help.***

**3. Neighbourhood Partnership Wellbeing Grants.** The next round of Wellbeing Grants are open for applications.
