Our latest responses to COVID-19

Mail - HCV Executive Officer - Outlook

Due to the international Coronavirus pandemic and the current state of emergency provisions, the HCV has cancelled or postponed its program of face-to-face activities. Meanwhile, we are active virtually, making use of our website, the online environment and emails until further notice. The Board now meets by teleconference.

We have adopted an <u>Epidemic-Pandemic Policy and Procedure</u> to guide our work during these extraordinary times.

We have endorsed <u>A Journal of the Plague Year: An archive of COVID19</u>, a global project that aims to create an historical resource for the future, providing evidence of how COVID-19 has affected our lives. The Melbourne History Workshop at the University of Melbourne has organised <u>a local node of the Journal</u>.

The <u>home page</u> of the History Council's website now provides a range of timely information for people wanting to engage with History while socially isolated or in quarantine. Check it out, get involved, and let us know if you have suggestions for additional content. We expect to keep adding to the page, so please visit it every so often to see what's new.

Information about the HCV that was previously on the home page has been moved to the <u>About</u> section of our website.

Via our Facebook page (<u>@HistoryCouncilVic</u>), we have invited people to respond to this question: *Which history books would you recommend to people who are in quarantine or maintaining social distance because of COVID-19?* If you have a Facebook account, please reply to our post with your suggestions, and enjoy the reading recommendations posted by others.

Making Public Histories – March and May seminars cancelled

The seminars scheduled for March and May were cancelled last week in order to protect our speakers, staff and audience members from the risks associated with COVID-19. Each seminar had attracted widespread interest and strong bookings. Each may be rescheduled at a later date, or communicated in other ways. The organising committee (including representatives from HCV, Monash University and the Old Treasury Building) feels that it's premature to make decisions about the July, August and November seminars but will provide updates <u>via the MPH webpage</u> and future E-news bulletins.

History Roadshow – update on plans for 2020

The Board of the HCV has reviewed the way in which the <u>History</u> <u>Roadshow</u> program will be delivered this year for VCE History students in regional Victoria, in light of the extraordinary circumstances caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

We are aware of school closures and the measures that the Victorian and Australian governments are taking to try to limit the spread of the coronavirus, including an early start to the school holidays. Our customary funded tours to regional centres are simply not possible in the current environment or in the foreseeable future.

We hope to be able to offer the *Roadshow* tours as a face-to-face experience, later this year.

Meanwhile, we have emailed all teachers on our mailing lists, seeking their guidance on what the HCV can do to assist teachers and students during this extraordinary and challenging year.
