Faith leaders recognize City Council and staff for policy change

SAN ANTONIO • COPS/Metro, in partnership with Community Churches for Social Action (CCSA), and the Baptist Ministers' Union (BMU), has recognized the

effort and commitment of elected officials and city staff for revising the San Antonio Police Use of Force policy to completely prohibit, with no exceptions, the use of any neck restraint (strangleholds, choke-

holds) collectively referred to as lateral vascular neck restraint (LVNR), along with the use of no-knock warrants.

"These policy changes certainly will not solve all of the challenges surrounding relationships between police and communities, but they do represent concrete actionable change that help confirm the city's commitment to live into the Compassionate SA ethos," read a press release from the three organizations.

COPS and Metro, CCSA, and BMU stated that they are committed to equity, transparency, and continued advocacy for policing that enhances human dignity through compassion and equal justice for all community members; regardless of race.

"There is still much work and healing needed to rebuild trust between police and Black and

Brown communities in San Antonio, but to-

day our city has taken a significant step in the pursuit of equity," said signatories Sister Gabriella Lohan, SHSp, a leader of COPS/

Metro; Pastor Patrick

Jones, pastor of Greater Pilgrim Rest Baptist Church and president of the Baptist Minister's Union; and Dr. Jerry Wm Dailey, pastor of Macedonia Baptist Church and chairman of the Community Churches for Social Action (CCSA).
