# Seniors & Accessibility

One of my top priorities is working with people with disabilities and seniors towards an accessible, age-friendly city and province. Since the election I've met with dozens of seniors' and disability rights organizations, service providers, and advocates to learn about the issues and how I can support their crucial work.

On the International Day of People with Disabilities (December 3), I announced in the legislature that **our first private member's bill will focus on requiring new private residences to be built to a universal design standard**. There is a huge shortage of accessible housing, and I look forward to tabling a bill this fall that addresses this issue.

### **Housing**

We have a housing crisis in our city and province, and many people I speak to on the doors are asking us to take action. After an extremely cold winter, where many in our city had no warm place to go, we have to make sure that we are advocating for emergency and long-term solutions to our housing crisis.

We convened a meeting before the holidays to bring together front-line staff and housing providers to discuss what we can do as a community. We identified a variety of solutions for both the short term and the long term, and we will continue to push for more funding from the city and province to ensure proper housing for all.

### **Environment**

This fall's landmark report of the United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) draws a line in the sand for governments of the world. We have 12 years to take drastic action to reduce greenhouse gas emissions—otherwise it will be impossible to keep global warming below 1.5 degrees Celsius, with catastrophic consequences for global ecosystems.

When the repeal of the Green Energy Act was before the Social Policy Committee this fall, I introduced an amendment to allow virtual net metering in Ontario, a measure that would make it easier to grow renewable energy infrastructure at the local level. At my urging, the committee heard from members of the Ottawa Renewable Energy Co-op, who are engaged in that work right now in Eastern Ontario.

## **Cuts to French Services**

In December, the government announced that it would withdraw all funding from the Franco-Ontarian University, and eliminated the Frenchlanguage Services Commissioner as an independent office. Communities rose up on an unprecedented scale across Ontario, including here in Ottawa. I was proud to join thousands of people in the demonstration at City Hall on December 1, and to **speak in the legislature in defence of French language rights**. As the struggle continues, Franco-Ontarians continue to show us what real organizing looks like!

# **Monthly Town Halls**

I've been proud to host monthly events on many issues that matter to you and hear from local experts. Our first town hall in September was on Ontario's cannabis policy, where participants gathered to hear from local drug policy and legal experts on what legalization means for them. In October, we hosted a town hall on Responsible Development with speakers from the housing sector, in November we held a 100-day review of the Government and in December we held a community feast.

In February, we held a film screening and town hall on eating disorders, and we were proud to be joined by Toronto MPP Jill Andrew to speak from her expertise on the issue.
