What is the Common App? Why is it important?

The common app is a website and portal that is used to submit your applications to colleges at the same time in the same place. This is why it is called the "common app".

It is designed to make applying for college easier.

How do I get to the Common App?

Start the college application process at:

www.commonapp.org

Step 1: Create your account

Create your account using the button in the top right corner

Choose your account type




Step 1: Create your account

In order to create your account you will need to enter:

- Email address that you will remember to check often
- Password that you will remember *write it down*
- Legal first and last name
- Phone number
- Date of birth
- Address

Step 2: Adding Colleges

Once you have created your account, you will see a welcome message and new tabs will appear. Click the "College Search" tab to find the colleges you want to apply to and add them to your "My Colleges" tab.



Step 3: Complete the My Profile Section

This section is found under the "common app" tab.


Here, you will fill our basic information about yourself including:

Step 4: Complete Family Section

They want to find out what college, if any, that your parent(s) and sibling(s) attended or are attending.


They also want to know how many people are living in your house and whether your parents are together or not (similar to FAFSA questions).



Essay Prompts (2020)

1. Some students have a background, identity, interest, or talent that is so meaningful they believe their application would be incomplete without it. If this sounds like you, then please share your story.

2. The lessons we take from obstacles we encounter can be fundamental to later success. Recount a time when you faced a challenge, setback, or failure. How did it affect you, and what did you learn from the experience?

3. Reflect on a time when you questioned or challenged a belief or idea. What prompted your thinking? What was the outcome?

4. Describe a problem you've solved or a problem you'd like to solve. It can be an intellectual challenge, a research query, an ethical dilemma - anything that is of personal importance, no matter the scale. Explain its significance to you and what steps you took or could be taken to identify a solution.

5. Discuss an accomplishment, event, or realization that sparked a period of personal growth and a new understanding of yourself or others.

6. Describe a topic, idea, or concept you find so engaging that it makes you lose all track of time. Why does it captivate you? What or who do you turn to when you want to learn more.

7. Share an essay on any topic of your choice. It can be one you've already written, one that responds to a different prompt, or one of your own design.

Tips on the Writing Section

 Be specific about what you choose to write about. Do not answer the prompt in broad and vague language.

Don't try to cram your life story in 650 words.

Be genuine

Additional Tips

- Pay attention to deadlines.
- You can only apply to 20 colleges at a time.
- Some colleges will have additional writing requirements, and some will not have any at all. Be mindful of this.
- You can only apply to one college Early Decision. That means if you get accepted, you HAVE to go to that school. It's a binding contract.

Common App Fee Waiver


Any of the following indicators of economic need can qualify you for a Common App fee waiver:

- You have received or are eligible to receive an ACT or SAT testing fee waiver
- You are enrolled in or eligible to participate in the federal free or reduced price lunch program (FRPL)
- Your annual family income falls within the Income eligibility guidelines set by the USDA Food and Nutrition Service
- You are enrolled in a federal, state, or local program that aids students from low-income families (e.g., TRIO programs such as Upward Bound)
- Your family receives public assistance
- You live in a federally subsidized public housing, a foster home or are homeless
- You are a ward of the state or an orphan
- You can provide a supporting statement from a school official, college access counselor, financial aid officer, or community leader

Your counselor will be asked to complete a fee waiver form to affirm your request for a fee waiver.

Common App Fee Waiver

You can find the Common App Fee Waiver in the **Profile section** of the Common App tab. To apply for this fee waiver: 1. Answer "Yes" to the fee waiver statement.


