The shocking terrorist attacks in Paris last month show the continuing challenges we face when it comes to protecting our values and defending our way of life and it is important that this threat does not go underestimated and that a response is carefully considered.

That is why in the coming weeks and months ahead, we must seriously consider the future of our defence and security services with a comprehensive and joined-up strategy that meets the needs of the UK to prevent and mitigate any threats we currently face, as well as preparing for any future threats that may emerge.

Whilst the current Strategic Defence and Security Review (SDSR) won't undo the damage to our Armed Forces inflicted by the 2010 SDSR, it is important that the Government does not leave Britain open to attack. That is why issues around capacity, equipment and morale of armed forces personnel must be addressed if we are to have a strategy fit for the 21st Century; as well as reconsidering the decommissioning of HMS Ocean in 2018, Sunderland's adopted flagship, which only last year underwent a £65million refurbishment. The future of our defence and security is as important now as it has ever

been, when - at the time of writing - the PM is seeking Parliamentary approval to intervene with military force in Syria to combat the scourge of so-called Islamic State and help to end the on-going Syrian Civil War. Any military involvement by the UK should and must be based on checks and balances that learn from past military actions in the Middle-East, along with a clear strategy that not only stops the brutal actions of so-called Islamic State, but brings long-term peace to the region through democratic government that allows Syrians currently fleeing their homes to return and rebuild their lives.

The Autumn Statement

announced the Government's spending plans for this Parliament. Whilst it was welcome to see Universal Infant Free School Meals (UIFSM) protected for the duration of this Parliament after the campaign I was heavily involved in, there were still concerns that the announcements made were a masterful show of Osborne's smoke and mirrors tactics. Labour welcomed the Government's decision to make a u-turn on their planned cuts to tax credits and local police forces, after we put pressure on the Government to reverse these decisions. Yet, we must watch to see if people lose out just as badly when these cuts are eventually transferred to Universal Credit. Pair this with the concerning fact that working people will be worse off by £1billion next year, then it is clear that this Government's plans will not support working people. If we are to support working people then economic growth must benefit us all. To do this, significant increases in wages and investment in business, including up-and-coming industries, must be prioritised in the coming years.

Coming up in Parliament

One of the big pieces of legislation coming up will be the Cities and Local Government Devolution Bill where Labour will be making sure that local authorities and new combined authorities have the powers to address local employment, economic growth and infrastructure to support local communities.
