

## Q&A with The Rt Hon David Miliband



### 1. Many Chinese feel that the Labour Party has deserted them, how can you assure them that this is not the case?

The Labour Party takes our relationship with ethnic minority groups in the UK, especially the Chinese community, extremely seriously. Since 1997 we have introduced the national minimum wage, tax credits and the New Deal, each of which has helped ethnic minority groups to find work and support their families.

Modern political parties must reflect the diversity of modern communities and it is crucial that local Labour parties, especially in parts of London, Sheffield, Manchester and Liverpool where there are large Chinese Diaspora, tap into the energy of local neighbourhoods. Labour's international achievements are amongst our proudest, but our internationalist outlook applies also to our party structures at home, which is why groups such as Chinese for Labour are vital to our future.

As a party in government, Labour values hugely our relationship with China. China is the 21st century's indispensable power, with a decisive say on the future of the global economy, climate change and world trade, and we enjoy working closely together.

### 2. The Chinese in the UK is often invisible in the political process, how

#### do you encourage the British Chinese to engage and participate in the politics?

There a number of things local parties can do to encourage participation, such as inviting non-members to events and producing literature in a range of difference languages. BAME Labour works to empower ethnic minority members within the Labour Party and campaigns for greater representation of ethnic minority communities in public life. There are a number of ways that British Chinese can get involved in politics. It is important to register to vote with the Electoral Commission so that you can have a say about who represents you on your Council, in Parliament and in the EU. You can also campaign with your local

### 3. Since first shown over twenty years ago, there is still no Chinese character in EastEnders, Limehouse in the East London was the home of one of the most important Chinese communities. Why are there no Chinese faces in any of our top TV soaps?

We want to see more Chinese people in all walks of public life – whether in politics or the media. Public institutions in cohesive, integrated societies must reflect the communities in which people live. The UK is home to Europe's largest Chinese community and many Chinese have been in Britain for several generations, making an important and lasting cultural and economic contribution to our country.

### 4. The first recorded Chinese arrived in 1686, and today more than 300 years later, there is no naturalised or British born Chinese in the House of Lords. What is the Labour Party doing about this?

Labour has taken the lead in increasing the gender representation in Parliament but, as one of the most diverse countries in the world, Britain needs to go further to make sure that Chinese and all BAME groups are represented in our political processes.

Our politics needs to move into the 21st Century, which is why the Labour government encouraged the establishment of a Speaker's Conference to examine increasing the

representativeness of the House of Commons. Through organisations such as Chinese for Labour, British Chinese will have an opportunity to discuss how they can be better represented.

### 5. China is an important trade partner, and a global powerhouse, learning the Chinese language would put our young people at an advantageous position, do you think our schools should encourage the teaching and learning of Chinese?

In the coming years China will become one of the two global powers that count, alongside the USA. It is excellent news, therefore, that more schools and colleges are offering to teach Chinese, which will help British students to get jobs in the global marketplace.

Labour has long promoted language teaching in schools, which is why one of the key elements of our National Languages Strategy is a commitment to introduce an entitlement to language learning, including Chinese, for every pupil throughout Key Stage 2 by 2010.

## From the Chair...

**W**ISHING all readers a Happy & Prosperous 2010. This year will be a challenging year for us in the Labour Party. We are currently trailing in the polls and with a general election in the first half of the year we know we face a tough fight. Cameron may be mouthing compassionate conservatism – but what does he know about being unemployed or having no money to pay for your next meal? We have to stop their charm offensive and reveal them as the frauds that they are. They will say whatever the public wants to hear to get elected, we have to expose their lies and total lack of compassion.

Till then, it is encouraging that all children should be allowed to study Mandarin under a Government plan to resurrect foreign languages in schools. Ed Balls, the Schools Secretary, said every secondary school pupil should have the opportunity to take the subject to meet the needs of business. That is a great first step in learning about the Chinese culture, and with China taking its rightful place in the global environment, this is a welcome step from the Labour Government.

Congratulations to Wing Yip on his OBE, and Truong Van Cuong for his MBE in this year's Honours list. We are immensely proud of their achievements. However, we in the community need to do more – the number of Chinese awarded honours for outstanding services in the last few years amount to no more than 100. This is pathetically low compared to other minority groups. Unsung heroes and unselfish acts of community service are simply not being publically recognised. Similarly, Chinese entrepreneurs are employing thousands are contributing billions to the UK economy – again with little public recognition, so let's aim for more CBEs, OBEs and MBEs!

# SO YOU WANT TO BE A POLITICIAN?

**W**E all know that the House of Commons is grossly under-represented by black and minority ethnic parliamentarians and to date there is no Chinese MP in Westminster. As someone who has gone through the Labour Party selection process twice (in 2001 and 2005), I would like to share some of my personal experiences and provide some advice to would be hopefuls. The main reason why I felt I wanted to become an MP is because after 16 years as a local Labour councillor, with over 25 years of Party membership, I had something to contribute at a national level, from helping to put through important legislation as well as doing something positive for individual constituents and communities. I was never tempted by the so-called 'status and trappings' of the Westminster village but was entirely driven by my values, political beliefs, a sense of public service ethos and my experiences of living in Britain.

The key things you will need are



energy, time, focus and good organisation to pursue a seat. The formal selection process may last for 3 months but preparation starts months before. I would strongly recommend you attend the excellent training programmes put on by the Party and gain a thorough understanding of the selection process and the procedures you have to follow. The training will also provide you with practical skills such as writing your selection literature, presentation, interview and campaigning skills. Once you have identified your target constituency, you need to research the area, the type of

seat (is it a marginal or safe seat and how the opposition has done in the past). You will need to gather as much information about the constituency and the local party as possible from many sources. Some of this preparation will involve your actual presence to build up your local knowledge and networks. It is important you have a thorough understanding of the key issues which matter to local residents and communities and how being a Labour candidate and then MP, you can address these issues and concerns.

It is about having a well thought out strategy, campaign plan and having a good campaign team behind you. You will need the help of several people who can help you put in the legwork and telephone canvassing to reach out to local party members and their affiliated organisations such as trade unions and socialist societies. You will need to secure nominations from branches and affiliated organisations to ensure that you reach the shortlist. If you reach the shortlist stage, you will need to spend a considerable amount of time reaching out again to party and affiliated members. They will be the ones who will turnout on the final

selection night. This final stage is nerve-racking but at the same time extremely exciting and you will need to be at your best in giving your ten minute or so presentation and in dealing with the questions from members.

It is about your ability to convince the members that you will either win the seat for Labour and make a difference to the lives of the constituents and to the local party or at least make a significant difference to the Labour vote. Although the whole process can be very stressful, exhausting, demanding and may appear to make you neglect your family and friends at times, you will learn so much from it and about yourself too. It certainly helped me to sharpen my political values and beliefs and made me more confident. Good luck and remember even if you do not succeed the first time, this experience will make you stronger and better to try again.

您想成为一名从政人士吗？

我们都知道，目前在英国议会当中只有极少数的黑人或是别的少数种族的议员。而至今在西敏寺，仍没有出现华人议员。作为一名曾经两次（分别在 2001 年与 2005 年）参与工党候选人选拔的成员，我愿在此与大家分享一些经验与建议。当时我希望成为一名议员的主要原因是：我已经加入工党 25 年，并且作了 16 年的工党区议员。我认为自己在国家层面上有可以付出的东西，我希望通过我的工作来完成一些重要的立法，并为每一个选民及社区带来一些积极的影响。我从来都没有被西敏寺所象征的所谓“地位与光环”所诱惑。我所做的一切均源自于我的价值观、政治信仰、对于公共服务的思考，以及我在英国生活的经验。

如果想要在议会中赢得席位，那么你所需要的一些重要的东西将包括：精力、时间、专注与良好的计划性。正式的选拔过程可能会持续三个月，但实际上，提前几个月就应该开始做准备了。我强烈建议想要参选的人应参加工党组织的培训项目。通过培训，你会对选拔过程与程序有一个全面的了解。培训还将教会你许多技巧，如掌握选拔中所需要的写作技能、演讲技能、宣传运动的技能等等。一旦你确定了你的目标选区之后，你将需要针对这个地区以及你所要竞争的席位特点（如：它是一个安全席位还是边缘席位？反对党以前在这个选区作为如何？）作调研。你将需要从尽可能多的地方收集有关这个选区及地方政党方面的信息。有时候，为做准备，你还需要亲临当地以了解信息、建立联络网。最重要的是，你需要对当地居民及社区最关心的事物有完整的了解。因为只有这样，当您成为工党候选人（以后又成为议员）之后，你才可能提出解决这些问题的方案。

这就是说，你需要具备一整套完善的计划、宣传策略，并有一个优秀的宣传团队在后面支持你。你也将需要大家的帮助，比如你将需要一个为你跑腿的人，一个电话拉票代理人等。他们将帮助你接触到当地政党以及与之合作的一些组织，如工会等。在提名方面，你将需要保障你得到了党支部与合作组织的支持，并确认你的名字出现在最终候选人名单中。如果你进入了最终候选人名单，你则需要花费大量的时间来同政党成员及合作组织接触，因为他们将成为出席最终选拔决策的人。终选过程很伤脑筋，但也非常叫人激动。这时，你将需要拿出你最出色的一面，完成好一个大约十分钟的演讲，并准确无误地完成问答过程。

关键在于，你要有能力说服评委们去相信：你将为工党赢得席位，并完善当地政党、改善当地选民的生活。或至少，你要让评委相信：你会对工党的选票产生重要影响。虽然整个过程将令人感到强大的压力、筋疲力尽，有时你甚至可能因此忽略了你的家人和朋友，但你会在这个过程中学习到很多东西，并且重新认识自己。这个过程无疑帮助了我自己更清晰的认识到了我的政治信仰与价值观，同时也使我更自信。最后，我祝愿大家马到成功，并提醒大家记住：即使你的第一次尝试没有成功，这宝贵的经验将令你变得更强大，并在下一次的尝试中取得更好的成绩！

## Sonny Leong

Sonny Leong is the Chair of Chinese for Labour and a member of the Labour Party 1000 Club. He founded his publishing company, and became the largest independent academic law publisher in the UK before selling the business in 2006. He was formerly the Chairman and now Hon President of the Independent Publishers Guild, former Chair of International Division and Council member of the Publishers Association in the UK. He is on the Board of the Council for Education in the Commonwealth, was Chair of Book Power, a registered UK charity which makes available specially selected, unabridged editions of international, tertiary-level textbooks to students in developing countries, and is involved with various consortiums in donor agency projects. ## Mee Ling Ng, OBE
