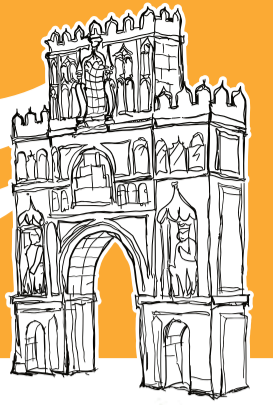

but used the extra space in the shop to increase the range of products available. This was especially useful when the supermarkets were running out of essentials such as bread, flour, rice and pasta.

LABOUR HAVE LEFT BRISLINGTON WEST

Brislington West Liberal Democrat Councillor, Jos Clark, and Councillor Candidate, Andrew Varney would like to extend their best wishes to Labour Cllr. Harriet Bradley, who announced her resignation last week due to ill health. Both Jos and Andrew hope Harriet can now get the time she needs to make a speedy recovery. Jos said, 'I have worked with Harriet in Brislington West for the last four years. Although Harriet didn't live in the ward, I believe she had the interests of the residents at heart and I would like to thank her on behalf of local people'. Andrew added, 'I was very grateful for Harriet's support for my long-standing campaign to stop the destructive Callington Road Link, despite going against the wishes of the Mayor and the Bristol Labour group'.

Cllr. Harriet Bradley's resignation now leaves a vacant seat in Brislington West. We believe that local people deserve full representation on the council but due to the coronavirus pandemic, all elections are currently suspended this year. However, should the guidelines change, the Brislington Lib Dems are ready to stand Andrew Varney as their local candidate. Andrew has been part of the Brislington Lib Dem team for the last four years, ably assisting Cllr. Jos Clark. Andrew said, 'it has been an immense privilege working together with Jos since her election. During that time we have fought many campaigns together including saving Jubilee Pool, preventing the closure of Wick Road Library, winning funding for environmental improvements on Sandy Park Road, and so much more'. Jos added, 'As a hardworking community activist, Andrew has demonstrated his commitment to the people of Brislington West time after time. As a local councillor for the ward, I know he could achieve even more'.

CARING COMMUNITY

Back in early March, Jos and Andrew set up an online form for people needing help during the Coronavirus Lockdown. They were also looking for volunteers and were delighted with the overwhelming response as dozens of people got in touch.

Andrew said, 'It has been such a pleasure coordinating all the volunteers and matching them with people needing help'. Jos added, 'So far we've organised support with shopping, collecting prescriptions, dog walking, arranging telephone 'buddies' and even laundry help.'

Of course this lockdown period has been overwhelmingly negative, often affecting people's lives and livelihoods in a terrible way, but there have been some positives, including the renewed sense of community spirit.

Phoning Brislington

Jos and Andrew have been telephoning elderly and vulnerable residents right across Brislington West over the last few months.

Jos said, 'We were worried some of the most vulnerable people in our ward might not have internet access or might be reticent about completing an online form.'

So far Jos and Andrew have made well over 2,000 phone calls. Andrew added, 'The great news is, most people seem to have a good support network already in place, with family, friends and helpful neighbours.' However, as a result of these calls, Jos and Andrew have been able to ensure over two dozen people have got the help they needed.

Jos said, 'As a councillor, phoning elderly and vulnerable residents in my ward has been one of the most rewarding things I've ever done. To know that I have been able to help someone in need is the best feeling'.



We Are Bristol

Bristol City Council launched their own city-wide helpline, 'We Are Bristol' alongside a volunteer network 'Can Do Bristol'.

Jos and Andrew wanted to publicise this as widely as possible but were concerned that the most vulnerable residents might not have access to the internet. So they got together with all the councillors in Brislington West and East, along with community campaigners and local groups and came up with the idea of a leaflet which could be delivered to every address in Brislington.

Andrew said, 'The whole process was incredibly speedy and our volunteers were amazing. We managed to print, distribute and deliver the leaflet in a matter of days. It's great to know we live in a part of the city with such a strong community spirit'.

SPACES FOR PEOPLE



Jos, Andrew and the Bristol Liberal Democrats launched a petition demanding the temporary widening of pavements and creation of 'pop-up' cycle lanes in order to aid social distancing, improve safety for key workers and anyone taking daily exercise during the Coronavirus pandemic.

Andrew said, "In many UK cities and around the world, temporary active travel improvements are happening but they were not taking place here. We were pleased the mayor finally put forward proposals for 'pop-up lanes' but were disappointed that once again Brislington was largely overlooked."

Mary Page, Lib Dem candidate for Mayor said "Mayor Rees chose to concentrate on the city centre and Clifton, ignoring your needs. Prior to lockdown, people in Brislington suffered from illegal levels of pollution and unacceptable congestion, and it would be a lost opportunity if we returned to any 'old normal'. Clean air must be a right for all, not a privilege for some."
