Reduced funding to support the youngest as children's services take a 19% cut

The most controversial decision taken at the last County Council meeting in October was to cut £900,000 out of the current budget of £5 million for the Children's Centres. The ruling Conservative group faces having to make huge savings in the light of central government's policies for local government (i.e. reduced grant and capping tax rises).

They justified this proposal by saying that they can save on using fewer buildings and cutting over £700k on 'management and business support', claiming that they would be able to make a small increase in 'front-line services'. The Opposition groups were not convinced by this argument but were out-voted.

Comment from County Councillor Peter Downes:

'My concern is that, if we fail to provide the support that some young children and their families need while the children are still young, life will be much more difficult later on for them and the costs to taxpayers will be much greater. Here in Brampton I am working to negotiate an arrangement between the County Council, the primary school and the 'Village Hub' to see if we can keep some provision in our village.'

Local Plan due to be published soon

HDC's building development plans through to 2036 will soon be open to the public and will be accessible on the HDC web-site in December. There is a desperate need for more houses in our district with the number of homeless increasing every year. At the same time, residents are understandably concerned about the impact on traffic, and public services such as doctors and schools.

Parking enforcement in Huntingdon

Many Brampton residents shop in Huntingdon where parking has become more difficult as the centre of gravity of the town moves away from the High Street and towards the re-built area near Sainsbury's. Lib Dem councillors are calling for better enforcement of parking regulations while encouraging people to use the available public parking areas, especially the controversial and under-used multi-storey facility.

The national scene

Labour

The Labour party has been enjoying a resurgence based on the left-wing policies and popular appeal of Jeremy Corbyn.
