

Freedom: The Final Frontier

Libertarianism on the World Wide Web --by Robert Giedt

In this day where truly free speech can be sometimes swept aside by the government and increased "moral" censorship is increasingly imposed by the Religious Right, one frontier still stands mostly untarnished from interference--the Internet. Despite the failed efforts of the so-called "Communications Decency Act" to regulate this publishing revolution, the Internet remains a global community, easily accessible, where freedom-loving individuals can still speak their peace without the vice-grip of Big Brother Government.

What follows is a brief list and description of a few Web sites describing libertarian-based research and policy groups, entertaining diversions and informative e-mail mailing lists. Many of these sites have Web links of their own combined, they form a consciousness net for libertarian ideals.

The basics

[The Libertarian Party](#)

This site is maintained by the national Libertarian Party and contains a wealth of info including the Party Platform, current press releases, lists of state affiliate parties and a nationwide calendar of libertarian events. A good reference point for party doctrine.

[Reason Foundation](#)

This Los Angeles-based research institute is familiar to many libertarians, and its Web site is home to a vast array of policy studies from its subgroup the Reason Public Policy Institute (RPPI). The site also contains a link to <http://www.reasonmag.com>, the online version of their popular *Reason* monthly magazine.

[Cato Institute](#)

Another public policy foundation, the Cato Institute preaches "market liberalism" and directs its energy at major government issues. Social Security, NATO, the federal budget and international trade are familiar targets. The organization publishes a monthly magazine, *Regulation*, which is available from the Web site. Their subsidiary site (<http://www.socialsecurity.org>) has detailed studies on the privatization of that government program.

[Advocates for Self-Government](#)

Creators of the famous "World's Smallest Political Quiz," this independent organization is a great producer of libertarian material: pamphlets, audio and video tapes, wearables and more. Their material helped get me involved in libertarianism perhaps it can do the same in your community.

August Meeting Notes

As planned, August's meeting was dedicated mostly to review of old treasury business, but extended to planning for the future and touched on other subjects as well. In Mary Steiner's absence, new Vice Chair Lacy Nelson chaired the meeting, with Steve Marsland guiding portions of the discussion.

Past treasury business

After debating each category of Mary Steiner and Mike Moloney's past expenditures at length (with a view to voting on each item at the end of the night), Mike was asked how he would like to proceed. He proposed that instead of a potentially divisive vote, he would be willing to donate \$750 (\$500 in 810 days and \$250 before October 1), which, added to his donation last month of \$500, would total \$1,250--replenishing most of the \$2,038 awaiting retroactive ratification.

In addition to these personal donations, he would also work to raise enough money from those in agreement with his spending to cover the balance. Mike's offer was contingent that nobody construed his donations as an admission of wrongdoing. Acceptance of his offer was unanimous! Mike reiterated his request that we hold him responsible for the decisions and not Mary (the Treasurer at the time). Now that he is paying for the lion's share of the cost, to him also belongs the greatest share of the credit for the good this money was used for. A partial list would include: a mailbox, voicemail, signs, Browne campaign literature, and copies of *Libertarianism in One Lesson* that Mike has been handing out.

Steve Marsland said he also will work to raise money to cover our past spending and make similar measures possible in the future. Several of those present made donations after the meeting.

Treasurer's report

Margret handed out Treasurer's reports detailing past and present costs of printing the newsletter, recent expenditures and potential upcoming monetary needs.

Other news

Steve distributed an article about fund-raising that he picked up at a meeting on the subject. His goal is to vastly improve our fund-raising efforts in the coming months...Mike said he would take over our old mail drop for use as his campaign address...Steve brought in a preliminary copy of our proposed chapter bylaws for those in attendance to see. After a handful of comments, Steve reported that he will make revised copies of our proposed bylaws available to any interested person before our next meeting...Congrats to Mike and Bernie! They got a letter to the editor published recently in the *San Mateo County Times*...Mike continues to hit the streets three, four and even six (!) days a week to promote his campaign, and is seen by as many as 15,000 cars...Margret offered \$5 packets of the Advocates for Self-Government's "World's Smallest Political Quiz" for sale...I recounted the story of our region's Crockett-Bunce award.
