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GOVERNOR/LT GOVERNOR

Vote for 1 pair

GOVERNOR DUTIES: The Governor is the chief executive officer of Maryland and appoints judges to the state courts and the heads of statewide departments. The Governor also makes other appointments as provided by the Maryland Constitution or by law and proposes the annual operating and capital budgets to the legislature. The Governor may veto legislation passed by the legislature.

SALARY: \$180,000 per year.

TERM: Four years, limit of two consecutive terms.

HOW ELECTED: Elected statewide as a team with the Lt. Gov.

LT. GOVERNOR DUTIES: The Lieutenant

Governor assists the Governor and is elected jointly on a ballot with the gubernatorial candidate. The Lieutenant Governor fills the office of Governor in case of death, resignation, or disability and carries out specific duties assigned by the Governor.

SALARY: \$149,500 per year.

QUALIFICATIONS: Shawn Quinn has lived a lifetime doing the types of jobs that real people do, not politicians. This gives him a street-level view of life that somebody only used to the "big picture" will miss. Shawn served for twenty years in the United States Navy. Shawn Quinn worked in law enforcement for five years. He has seen firsthand what an impersonal government does to the people. **BUDGET:** Shawn Quinn plans to drastically reduce the income tax within his first two years of office. These tax cuts will be paid for by reducing the role of government in areas best handled by private-public partnerships. When a person is not allowed to live to their full we all miss out of all of their possible achievements. There are already laws on the books to address discrimination. If somebody has an idea to improve an existing law or policy then Shawn will weigh the merits of each proposal individually. Every change will be looked at for its benefit to people. **HEALTH CARE**: The biggest health crisis facing Maryland and the nation is the opioid epidemic. People need help. DUTIES: The Comptroller is the financial officer of Maryland, responsible for collecting, managing and planning for revenue to support the state budget. The Comptroller collects and administers Maryland taxes on income (both personal and corporate), retail sales, motor vehicle fuel tax, tobacco, beer, wine and liquor, and estate tax. The Comptroller serves on the Board of Public Works along with the Governor and the state Treasurer, who is appointed by the General Assembly.

SALARY: \$149,500 per year.

TERM: Four years, no term limit.

HOW ELECTED: Elected statewide.

The Attorney General should be vigilant to ensure that our laws are respected and people are treated equally. **OTHER PRIORITIES**: As a prosecutor/counsel to the Senate Jud. Comm., I focused on domestic violence/sexual exploitation/trafficking. The AG should make protection of the most vulnerable a priority. The opioid crisis in Maryland needs leadership from the AG to bring together the law enforcement, public health and recovery communities to find appropriate solutions. Consumer protection must be a priority as well.

We have penalized and shut down industries that prey on the poor. **OTHER PRIORITIES**: Over the past three years my office has achieved hundreds of millions of dollars of settlements and judgments from Wall Street Banks, Predatory Lenders, Automakers, Tobacco Companies, and Polluters who sought to injure or defraud Marylanders.My office is working with the multi-state investigation of opioid manufacturers. If re-elected, I pledge to remain the People's lawyer & continue our efforts.

DUTIES: U.S. Senators make laws along with the members of the House of Representatives, ratify treaties, and conduct investigations on issues of national importance. The Senate confirms Presidential appointments.

HOW ELECTED: Elected statewide. In 2018, Maryland voters will elect one of our two Senators. About one-third of the 100 members of the Senate is elected every two years. Senators must be at least 30 years old, have been citizens of the United States at least 9 years and be residents of the state they want to represent.

One of the great dangers of unfairly drawn districts is that voters feel powerless and disenfranchised. Voting may be suppressed. The most significant thing we can do to advance the democratic process is encourage voters to the polls. Drawing more representative districts will do that. The process needs to be as non-political as possible. **ENVIRONMENT**: The large issue is climate change. The first challenge is to get everyone to acknowledge the science behind it.We need to take actions to decrease our contribution to it.We need to incentivize clean energy production by increasing goals for percentage of and offering tax incentives for it, as well as more restrictively defining clean energy. We must also continue to protect our natural resources. **DISCRIMINATION**: Justice reform. From bail reform to flexible sentencing to decriminalization of lesser non-violent offenses, we can help mend the extreme racial imbalance in our justice system, which tends also to follow socio-economic lines. Also, we must eliminate biases in the work place against women and the LGBT community. Restrictions on employer questioning and information gathering are critical here. **EDUCATION**: We need universal pre-k for 3 & 4 year olds. The funding can come from the Ed Trust Find once we "lock the box." A severe imbalance of school quality exists along socio-economic & disability status. We must make sure educational opportunities are equitable, both for those who are in poverty and those with disabilities. Finally, we need to let school calendar decisions be made at the local level. HEALTH CARE: In the face of the changes made in Washington to the tax code, we need to institute the individual mandate in Maryland to keep costs down. We need to continue our efforts to control prescription drug costs and to address the opioid crisis. Finally, we need to provide health care for every Marylander. It is past time for us to take a serious look at single payer health care in Maryland. **TRANSPORTATION:** Public transportation must be our priority. I have been disappointed with the recent focus of the transportation trust fund usage almost exclusively on roads. The long-range focus must be on mass transit and it must be affordable. For example, while I like the idea of a fast train between Baltimore and DC, I would rather see the MARC line running every 30 minutes at its affordable price.

I will take an active role in our school system. We cannot have leaders who leave this key issue only to the Board of Education. The Council should exercise oversight through the budget process and work closely with the new elected Board of Education to improve our system. FAIR/AFFORDABLE HOUSING: I do not think that the current voucher program is working in Baltimore County. There is a need to ensure that there is access to affordable housing. One approach to consider is the method utilized in Montgomery County that encourages moderately priced housing, but that focuses on home ownership. We need to encourage redevelopment in established communities that often have available housing stock. **PUBLIC WORKS**: Unplanned development has put a strain on our infrastructure. It is a direct cause of school overcrowding and congested roadways. We need to update our longterm community plans and ensure that we stick to them. We should look at approaches like Harford County, which places a moratorium on new housing permits when schools become overcrowded. This allows the needed infrastructure to catch up. LAND USE/DEVELOPMENT: Each one of these groups has a role to play in the zoning process. Zoning decisions should be closely based off of the Master Plan and long-term community plans. Zoning decisions should not be a result of pay-to-play politics that often seem to be rampant in our current system. I will call for reforms that ensure all groups have a seat at the table, and not just politically-connected donors. **HEALTH/SOCIAL SERVICES**: Baltimore County has an unemployment rate of 4.3%, which is higher than the national rate and higher than every other suburban Baltimore jurisdiction. The Board hires the Superintendent who is charged to carry out those policies.

This empowerment includes reducing initiatives that overburden educators as well as reducing class sizes so that individual students are engaged in learning. BUILDINGS: In order to address all three, we need to raise revenue which is why I support the Fix the Fund Act as well as the Kirwan Commission proposals to increase school funding. There also needs to be a determined approach to an equitable allocation of resources. **SAFETY**: Schools need to be a safe place to learn and teach. To achieve this we need to promote progressive discipline, restorative practices, and the community school model which will provide a holistic approach in dealing with safety issues in our schools, while also helping build a more inclusive school community. **BUDGET:** The STAT program should be reassessed to best fit the needs of our students, and more staff including but not limited to educators, social workers, counselors, and pupil personnel workers need to be hired to meet state recommended ratios. **COLLEGE ALTERNATIVES:** Vocational training and apprenticeship programs need to be emphasized in order to meet local demands for the workforce. The career side of Maryland's College and Career-Ready Standards needs to be promoted and transparent in guiding students toward those local opportunities. **PARTNERSHIPS**: I agree with providing students the opportunity to take college and vocational training courses through our community college before they graduate high school. Summer programs should also be available to less fortunate families in accordance with our parks and recreation. Every student should have access to engaging Summer programs. ADMINISTRATION ACCOUNTABILITY: I believe that accountability starts with holding ourselves accountable to our communities. I will adopt a practice from my own classroom called "Grade a Gresick."

We need honest and open feedback from those we serve on a regular basis in order to best meet the needs of all stakeholders.

QUALIFICATIONS: As a retired director from Verizon, I am skilled at problem solving, resolving budget constraints, leading others towards a common goal, and working in a collaborative environment. As a former adjunct faculty member at CCBC, I have had hands on exposure to recent graduates of BCPS and have specific knowledge of how well prepared, or not, our graduates are for work or college. **PRIORITIES**: My first priority for BCPS is to start the search for a new superintendent immediately after the election. The entire system can only be as good as its leader. My second priority is to address the increase in violence that is occurring in BCPS schools on a regular basis. Children can't learn when they are afraid; teachers can't teach when they are constantly addressing behavior issues. BUILDINGS: To address the issue of aging facilities, the BOE should create a template of standards for BC schools. Each school should be measured against the template. Schools must have adequate heat and air conditioning, drinking water, working bathrooms, no lead paint, and no asbestos. Once this inventory is completed, it can be used to look at the need for new schools or the reallocation of students. **SAFETY**: The school system cannot solve these problems alone. Changes made at the state and

federal level to address a disproportionate rate of suspensions/expulsions for minority students have made it almost impossible for schools to address safety issues so prevalent in schools today. For example, the current BCPS handbook indicates that a student detonating a bomb in school MAY be expelled. Insanity! **BUDGET:** BCPS should not renew the annual "lease" for the devices provided to all students. Every student does not need a device. The money saved by scaling back on the 1:1 device initiative can be better used to provide more wrap-around/holistic services to students since many BCPS students face issues at home that get in the way of learning. They need more counselors and crisis interventionists. **COLLEGE ALTERNATIVES**: High schools should continue to offer concurrent enrollment with community colleges that offer classes in automotive repair, HVAC, plumbing, welding, medical assisting, mortuary science, and other "non-college" careers. Schools must communicate often with students to spread the message that college is not for everyone and there will always be a need for someone to repair cars, pipes, and heat/AC. **PARTNERSHIPS**: If teachers/schools are expected to address all of the socio-economic issues that students bring to school, schools need to be staffed to address appropriately. For example, instead of centrally locating social workers, assign social workers to schools. Schools should also tap the huge resource of retired people/volunteers who are looking to give back by partnering with area Senior Centers, etc. ADMINISTRATION ACCOUNTABILITY: The power of the BOE cannot be held in the hand of one person even if that person is the superintendent. The BOE must create and maintain an environment where it is okay to question and disagree and it must utilize the input of its greatest resource -teachers-on a regular basis. Any purchases must be made through an open bid process that is fully transparent and fully available to anyone.

Second, I would like to try to increase the number of teachers and support staff in order to help decrease class sizes. Third, I would like to reduce the standardized testing to allow for more, and better quality teaching time. Forth, I would like to see investments made in improving the deteriorating infrastructure. **BUILDINGS**: Until a new superintendent is found, the board should be finding the funds to repair or replace those schools that are not up to safety and security needs. Part of that endeavor should include utilization studies to determine where larger capacity is needed. This takes precedence over laptops for everyone budget items. We cannot be a technology leader with crumbling, outdated schools. **SAFETY**:

I believe we need more and better trained SROs in and around the schools. They should be able to act independently of the school's administration to handle drug and gang violence as they would according to the laws. Short of gunfire, the SRO should be able to remove students from the building if they commit criminal acts in or out of the school. Bullies should also be removed from the school. **BUDGET**: Increase spending on teachers para educators and support staffs as well as the necessary supplies to fill our classrooms with everything they need to teach. Increase spending on facilities and updating buildings to handle new technology. There is no need for every student to have a laptop but every student should have access to a computer and the kind of software they will need for college. COLLEGE ALTERNATIVES: We have been neglecting vocational education for years in the attempt to promote STEM to the exclusion of all else. We need to re-establish vocational programs to prepare those non-college bound students for apprenticeships and licensure exams. Students who may need alternative paths to graduation may need special programs to reach a minimal standard for a diploma. **PARTNERSHIPS**: Partnerships between schools and local businesses is also a subject that has been neglected in Baltimore County for many years. Allowing local businesses to support athletic and academic teams gives them a stake in the school that can lead to internships and summer jobs for students. Community outreach on a local level should be a part of every school, s operation plans. **ADMINISTRATION ACCOUNTABILITY: This** is a topic that falls under the heading of professional development and education. Programs to educate on and create better, more efficient accountability and oversight processes should be a part of the Staff Development days that are already built into the calendar. I have proven to be an independent, responsive voice on the Board. **PRIORITIES**: Accountability & Transparency; Increased Staffing; Safety & Discipline; Healthy Classrooms BUILDINGS: A long-term, independent facilities plan is needed to address issues objectively and to prioritize construction projects. I would urge contracting with an outside firm to review and evaluate facility conditions including overcrowding, and to develop, without influence, a ten-year plan and budget for addressing our urgent school facility needs. The plan would also make short-term recommendations. **SAFETY**: Early detection and support services for at-risk students are critical for prevention. We must invest in staffing to provide these services. We must also strengthen discipline policies to include minimum consequences for serious offenses. Regular audits are needed to ensure that discipline is delivered consistently. The safety of students and teachers should be paramount in disciplinary decisions. **BUDGET**: The STAT (1:1 device) initiative is neither balanced nor fiscally responsible. The costs of STAT continue to be unnecessarily exorbitant. Less expensive devices that meet instructional requirements should have been selected. The savings of hundreds of millions of dollars spent on laptops could be allocated toward repairing facilities, additional school staffing, safety, and meal programs. **COLLEGE ALTERNATIVES:** I support Career and Technology Education programs that prepare students for fulfilling careers through hands-on learning and internship opportunities. Such programs provide the skills and certifications students need (and employers want) to transition from school to the workplace. I also support individualized instruction plans for students requiring alternate paths to graduation. **PARTNERSHIPS**: BCPS can provide professional staff to connect students and families to needed county and community services and can partner for referrals. Students cannot learn when basic needs are not met. County government and community organizations offer a myriad of family support, education, and health programs that increase student and family quality of life and promote solid educational experiences. The projected overcapacity of high schools requires examination of both facilities and programming. Community involvement is a priority. We need to work with the county government to explore options. **SAFETY**: There must be integrity and consistency in establishing safe schools. Actions to include: re-establishing school-based addiction intervention teams, reviewing the scope of operation of SROs, providing more educational options, revising current alternative school programs, establishing protocol to provide support for troubled students outside the classroom, & hiring more behavioral specialists. BUDGET: School staff is more important in education than software, both in learning and school climate. Technology is a wonderful tool but is not a panacea & has become a larger part of the budget. We need more personnel in the buildings. Mandatory testing in high school using College Board exams must end. None school-based staffing needs to be examined. We need to develop more vocational programs. COLLEGE ALTERNATIVES: We need to prepare students for life and not just graduation & end the stigma of vocational education. We can expand vocational opportunities immediately using existing programs & use data on job shortages for planning. We can create business partnerships for internships & apprenticeships. More Transition Facilitators are needed. High school programming needs flexibility. **PARTNERSHIPS**: I believe there has been hubris in school leadership which narrowed opportunities. That must change. Continuing partnership with CCBC is important. We need greater coordination with governmental agencies. More Transition Facilitators are needed as conduits between school and community. Other districts have effective programs from which we could learn. We need dedicated personnel for this. I am willing to collaborate and contribute to an open dialogue. I have the dedication to spend the time necessary to be well informed. **PRIORITIES**: Allocation, Investment, and Safety. Our facilities need attention, we have inadequate school buildings and overcrowded classrooms. We need to get more resources to the classroom. Class sizes are increasing and teachers are not able to adequately reach every student with the attention they need. With a class size of 30 there is no way a teacher can reach every student. **BUILDINGS**: As a system we spend money to have a physical facilities rating of all schools. Logic says that you would go to the worst school and work backwards-addressing those worst schools because they need the most attention. We do not do it that in Baltimore. By reining in wasteful spending we can dedicate the resources necessary to ensure our children have adequate facilities for instruction. **SAFETY**: Smaller class sizes can be a very helpful method to address school safety. Being able to develop personal relationships with students and having the available time to do so leads to identification of bullying, drug use, and possible gang activity at an early stage. With smaller class sizes teachers can build a rapport with the kids and construct meaningful collaborative relationships. **BUDGET**: The budget needs to be more effective. We need to deliver as many resources to the classroom as possible. While many reports say Baltimore County spends roughly \$14,000/ student that is misinterpreted.\$14,000 does not make it to the classroom, a lot is allocated to individuals that are not even in a schoolhouse. We need to be better stewards, yet make the investment, in proven effective programs. COLLEGE ALTERNATIVES: College is not the only path for our graduating students. There are many paths available to students and I support alternative options. Each student is an individual and needs a path molded to them. There are apprenticeship programs, technical high school, specialty certifications, the military, or straight into the workforce. I support whatever works for the individual. **PARTNERSHIPS**: BCPS should be in conversation with the community to promote and build upon services offered, whether they be through churches, recreation council, service clubs, or neighborhood associations. BCPS should work on partnerships to offer more physical and mental health services, early childhood development services, family engagement, mentoring and after school tutoring, and nutritional options. ADMINISTRATION ACCOUNTABILITY: Contracts should be fully investigated and properly vetted by the board. The current way that the board has done things has led the board to lose the support of community and trust of those they are called on to represent. The tenants that I have built my campaign around are exactly what I would expect of BCPS: Community involvement, Oversight, Accountability, and Transparency.

The new Board members need to have available to them in Dec, a short list of qualified candidates. Getting BCPS headed in the right direction starts with a new Superintendent. School Safety is a paramount concern: School Resource Officers at all BCPS; addressing consequences for bad behavior; & attempting to reduce bullying behaviors. External Audit BUILDINGS: Fortunately in District 7 Dundalk Elem is being built; Colgate ground-breaking this fall, and Berkshire following. Prioritize all 34 District 7 schools according to facility needs. When county and state capital money become available, negotiate District 7's fair share. Study each respective school's capacity; and increased & projected enrollments. Plan ahead; trailers are not the long term answer SAFETY: Opioid epidemic -Utilize the school nurse; PSAs in high schools; and opportunities within the curricula. Guest speakers; graphics; whatever it takes to get the message out to our children. Gang problems -School Resource Officers (grades 6-12) are the experts on this topic. Elem schools need to reach out to the local precincts. Bullying - Establish firm and swift consequences to the offenders. **BUDGET**: Special Education budgets need to be expanded. More and more students are being identified as deserving SE services. We need more teachers; occupational and speech therapists. I am not an advocate of giving every student a laptop. Our students absolutely need to have globally competitive computer skills. However in-house computers labs and carts can be reserved, supplemented by personal computers COLLEGE ALTERNATIVES: BCPS already has 2 excellent alternatives to graduation: Academy Completers (concentrated areas of study -College; Advanced Tech; and Career and Research Development which requires an internship or work experience). And Pathway Options which includes 11 different choices. However, we seriously need to look at re-instituting some form of vocational education. College is not for everyone. **PARTNERSHIPS**: In recent years BCPS has increasingly hired more School Social Workers for our high schools, middle schools and elementary schools. Experienced School Social Workers can support students, parents and families by linking them to community resources such as financial aid; housing; child care; medical care; legal assistance; early educational intervention; emergency aid; and mental health assistance. **ADMINISTRATION ACCOUNTABILITY:** First of all we have to give our administrators the authority to do their jobs without the threat of retaliation. For example: if a certain behavior warrants the student being suspended, then allow the administrator to his/her job. Having written that, I believe admin. accountability is driven by accurate data collection. Analyzing the data goes hand-in-hand with oversight and accountability.

State Questions

Question 1: Education Funding

Constitutional Amendment (Ch. 357 of the 2018 Legislative Session) Requiring Commercial Gaming Revenues that are for Public Education to Supplement Spending for Education in Public Schools

BALLOT LANGUAGE: The amendment requires the Governor to include in the annual State Budget, as supplemental funding for prekindergarten through grade 12 in public schools, the revenues from video lottery operation licenses and any other commercial gaming dedicated to public education in an amount above the level of State funding for education in public schools provided by the Bridge to Excellence in Public Schools Act of 2002 (otherwise known as the Thornton legislation) in not less than the following amounts: \$125 million in fiscal year 2020; \$250 million in fiscal year 2021; \$375 million in fiscal year 2022; and 100% of commercial gaming revenues dedicated to public education in fiscal year 2023 and each fiscal year thereafter. The amendment also requires the Governor to show in the annual budget how the revenues from video lottery operation licenses and other commercial gaming are being used in a manner that is in addition to the level of State funding for public education provided by the funding formulas established by the Bridge to Excellence in Public Schools Act. The State Constitution currently authorizes video lottery operation licenses for the primary purpose of raising money for public education.

(Amending Article XIX, Section 1(c)(1) and (g), and adding Section 1(f) to the Maryland Constitution)

CURRENT LAW: Maryland voters approved a constitutional amendment (Article XIX) in 2008 authorizing video lottery operations for the "primary purpose" of raising money for public education. The funds must be used to support programs in public schools, such as early childhood education, career and technical education, high school courses for college credits, training for public school teachers, improvement of school buildings, and capital projects at community colleges and state-supported colleges and universities.

PROPOSED CHANGE: This amendment would require that beginning in 2020, the Governor must include specified amounts from gambling revenues in the state budget for public education. These amounts must be in addition to, and not a substitute for, any other state funding for public education. The amendment would also repeal the provision that allows gambling revenues to be used for capital projects at community colleges and state-supported colleges and universities.

ORIGIN OF THE BALLOT QUESTION: The 2018 session of the Maryland General Assembly passed legislation (SB 1122) proposing an amendment to the Maryland constitution to add more specific requirements for how gambling revenue is used in the state budget to fund public education. A bill to amend the Maryland constitution does not take effect unless it is approved by the voters at the next general election.

ARGUMENTS FOR THE AMENDMENT:

- It ensures that gambling revenues are directed to public education as intended and approved by voters.
- It addresses concerns that the state was using gaming revenues to substitute for education funding that was already required by law, rather than increasing the total amount of education funding.
- It ensures that gaming revenues paid into the Education Trust Fund (also called a "lockbox") may be spent only in addition to other public education funding and cannot be used as a substitute for other funding that is already required by the Bridge to Excellence law

ARGUMENTS AGAINST THE AMENDMENT:

- The amendment would reduce the state's flexibility to use gambling revenues for other state programs.
- The amendment would reduce the use of gaming revenues to fund capital projects at community and public colleges.

constitution would be amended to specify that revenue from gambling be used to supplement other state funding for public education and cannot be used as a substitute for other required education funding.

A vote AGAINST the amendment means the current provision in the constitution would remain in effect, under which gambling revenue is used for public education but those funds may be in place of other state funding for schools.

Question 2: Election Day Voter Registration

Constitutional Amendment (Ch. 855 of the 2018 Legislative Session) Same-Day Registration and Voting at the Precinct Polling Place on Election Day

BALLOT LANGUAGE: Authorizes the General Assembly to enact legislation to allow a qualified individual to register and vote at a precinct polling place on Election Day. The current law requires voter registration to close before Election Day.

(Amending Article 1, sections 1 and 2, and adding Section 2A to the Maryland constitution.)

CURRENT LAW: Maryland law requires that voter registration close 21 days before an election. An exception allows people to register and vote in person during early voting at an Early Voting Center. They must provide proof of residence such as a driver's license or other specified identification. Under current law a person may not register to vote at a precinct polling place on Election Day and vote on the same day.

PROPOSED CHANGE: The Maryland constitution would be amended to authorize the legislature to pass a law permitting people to register to vote at a precinct polling place on Election Day and to vote on the same day.

ORIGIN OF THE BALLOT QUESTION: The 2018 session of the Maryland General Assembly passed legislation (HB 532) proposing an amendment to the Maryland constitution to allow people to register to vote on Election Day and to vote the same day. A bill to amend the Maryland constitution does not take effect unless it is approved by the voters at the next general election.

ARGUMENTS FOR THE AMENDMENT:

- Voting is a fundamental right that should not be lost due to failure to comply with a registration requirement.
- Same day registration and voting already takes place during early voting. On-the-spot validation of a voter's documentation is conducted before the voter is allowed to vote. These procedures could also be used for same day registration and voting on Election Day.
- Fourteen other states allow same day voter registration and voting on Election Day and have not reported problems.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST THE AMENDMENT:

- Permitting people to register and vote on Election Day could lead to voter fraud.
- Requiring people to register in advance is not burdensome, as the registration forms are readily available.

A vote FOR the amendment means that the constitution would be amended to allow the legislature to enact a law permitting people to register to vote at a precinct polling place on Election Day.

A vote AGAINST the amendment means that the constitution would not be amended and people would need to register to vote before Election Day.
