FROM OUR CO-PRESIDENTS

Dear League Members,

As I write the snow is melting and the ice is falling. It is winter in Baltimore County. We trust everyone is warm and safe from the cold and severe weather and thinking about the beauty of the Spring in Maryland.



The January Board meeting was cancelled because of snow. Nevertheless, the work of our League proceeds without interruption.

The 2018 Legislative luncheon took place on the sixth of January. We had perhaps seventy-five attendees including the state delegates and senators. Each elected representative presented their priorities within the structure of the Maryland League's 2018 legislative priorities. The presentations were followed by questions from the audience and answers. Remarkably, many of the questions focused on Protecting the Environment. Fewer questions related to making democracy work and promoting social and economic justice, though those subjects were covered as well. Board member Leslie Grant was a sophisticated and able moderator. The luncheon provided by our dedicated volunteer members was delicious and the organization of the tables and room allowed attendees to interact with their delegates and senators, an invaluable opportunity to talk and influence. This annual event is important as we work to advocate and carry out positions on items we have studied and achieved consensus. Thank you to Betsy Sexton, Neilson Andrews, Caroline Seamon, Barbara Crain and Camille Marx and all our members who participated and contributed to the success of this event.

Upcoming are two meetings to develop a consensus on the State League study of Maryland's Primary Election System. The meetings will be held at Broadmead on January 25 and Charlestown on January 26. The act of coming to consensus is very important in achieving democratic ideals. Without a broad consensus legislation is normally not possible, though our form of representative government does allow exceptions. The issue of redistricting is fundamental to fair and equitable government. If we want the best solutions to the problems and issues before the General Assembly and Congress, few issues are more important than redistricting.

On February 1, the Board will hold its winter retreat. We welcome comments from the membership and suggestions about how we can serve you better. Please email either Camille Wheeler or Camille Marx with your observations, questions and suggestions. We are dedicated to building a strong and visible League and having an impact on strengthening our democracy, a fundamental mission of the League. Hillary Clinton won 26% of registered voters, Donald Trump won 26% and 48% failed to vote. Making Democracy Work requires our inspiring and aiding those non-voters to return and exercise their most fundamental right and responsibility as a citizen, the privilege of the vote.

LWV STATEMENT ON THE PRESIDENT'S DISCRIMINATORY COMMENT

January 12, 2018

Washington, DC – League of Women Voters president **Chris Carson** issued the following statement in response to the reports of President Trump’s atrocious comments during a bipartisan meeting about immigration.

“We are appalled and disgusted by President Trump’s racist statement yesterday. Language and ideals like this have no place in our society, and certainly not in our White House.

“This administration has done little but implement policies that endorse discrimination against immigrants and communities of color. As a country of immigrants, we are made stronger by our diversity, and that we have crude and bigoted slurs emerging from the Oval Office is shameful.

"This, now denied, comment from President Trump occurred during a meeting around a bipartisan compromise to extend protections on the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA); a policy the administration called an end for last year. The League of Women Voters urges our leaders to pass a clean DREAM Act to protect, not turn away, the 800,000 young people who were brought to the United States as children. We support the Dreamers, who are Americans in everything but the name.

"We can, and we must do better to be vigilant about speaking out against racism. We must stand up as a nation and say this is unacceptable."

2018 LEGISLATIVE SESSION KICKS OFF WITH LWVBCO LUNCH

The League's Legislative Luncheon went off without a hitch on January 6 even as the temperature outside bottomed out at 18. We had a good turnout of both League members, guests and the Legislators. The committee would like to thank those who so generously brought salads and desserts and for the great job Leslie Grant did moderating.

Leslie called on each Legislator to speak for a moment on the LWVMD list of Legislative Priorities and their priorities for the 2018 session. It became obvious immediately that the override vote of the Sick Leave Bill is high on the agenda of the Democrats. Governor Hogan wants the Legislature to look at his compromise bill.

Senators Delores Kelley and Jim Brochin both spoke on the inequities in the juvenile arrest system currently in place and the need for treatment and programs rather than warehousing. Senator Kelley explained that many of these juveniles, who may not have any record, are housed with the general prison population until they are arraigned. Senator Brochin recommended a book titled *Last Chance in Texas*, which advocates for close monitoring and successful treatment. There is a successful program at the Giddings State School in Texas.

Delegate Adrienne Jones, who is speaker pro tem, spoke about the end of term audits which will determine which policies, passed during the term, were successful and which were not. She is particularly interested in determining where education dollars are needed to improve outcomes. She would also like to see control of the City Police pass back to the City from the State, so the DOJ Consent Agreement can proceed.

Delegate Benjamin Brooks again advocated for corrections in the State tax laws to both address the new federal bill and additional deductions for some self-employed individuals.

Delegate Dana Stein reminded those attending that current studies indicate that five percent of our state will be underwater due to Climate Change in the near future. He noted that Maryland needs to continue working for clean waterways for all. He is concerned about the EPA's attempt to open drilling throughout the country. He is advocating for the State to join the Paris Climate Agreement. Delegate Stein also noted that some of the best ideas come from constituents and it is important to stay in touch with the Legislators.

Delegate Terri Hill expressed concern about the ability, in the new federal tax bill, of parents to use funds from 529 plans to pay for private school. This would allow parents to use pretax dollars to pay tuition.

Maureen Authurs, Legislative Aide for Delegate Shelly Hettlemen, spoke for the Delegate who is supporting an increase in the minimum wage. The Delegate would like to see increased economic opportunities for the underserved.

Delegate Steven Lafferty thought that Maryland should consider a rule that voters must opt out of voting rather than opting in. This would mean that the Motor Voter initiative would be automatic when a citizen applied for a driver's license. He would also like to see an increase in the use of renewable energy especially solar panels throughout the state. He expressed concern about septic tanks in non-critical areas. The regulations need to be updated. Delegate Lafferty has supported Affordable Housing for many years, and he is now concerned about the houses originally financed as affordable housing that are aging out and can raise the rent.

Delegate Chris West advocated for the continuation of bi-partisan bills. He strongly feels that they are the best bills. He noted that he was the only Republican to vote for the Death with Dignity bill. Both he and Senator Brochin support the Governor's bill on redistricting, which would take it out of the hands of Legislature and put it in the hands of a commission. Delegate West thinks it is time to allow communities to refile new covenants that would eliminate racial restrictions even though they are not enforceable. He noted that Broadmead will soon have a light at their entrance.

There were many interesting questions from the audience, just a few of which are highlighted here. Carlton Sexton asked about Clean Water Ways and would it be possible to ban Styrofoam in the state. Delegate West concurred on the need and explained about the sewer pipe connection under Lake Roland where a 30" pipe feeds into a 23" pipe and then into a 15" pipe. Obviously, there is overflow.

Camille Marx asked about a study of students who use vouchers for other school programs; are they doing as well as the public-school children. Senator Kelley indicated that there is a review underway and she noted that it appears some students who received the vouchers are not using them.

Several people asked about problems in health care coverage at all levels. There was agreement that the State would have to do something if Congress is unable to fund the CHIP program. The lack of dental insurance at all levels was a concern. There was also worry about the people who cannot afford supplemental insurance for Medicare. Senator Kelley and Delegate West both thought a commission to study the effects of the stripping of the ACA was in order.

Public Transportation remains a concern among our members. Delegate Lafferty said that even though the new bus system is an improvement, a lack of transportation from the end of the line to the job remains a problem. He wants incentives for businesses to set up transportation to some of these areas.

OPEN PRIMARIES CONSENSUS MEETINGS - PART 2 (ALL ARE WELCOME!)

On **Thursday, January 25th** and **Friday, January 26th** we will reconvene to finish our consensus questions for the State League study of Maryland's Primary Elections.

This time, we will consider;

- ❖ Whether in primary and general elections with more than two candidate winners should receive a plurality (largest number of voters) or a majority of votes (50 percent plus 1).
- ❖ If a majority is required should it be reached by run-off or ranked choice voting?
- ❖ Whether taxpayer money should be available to fund primaries for all registered parties.
- ❖ Whether non-principal parties and non-affiliated candidates should have easier access to the ballot.

Directions to Broadmead and Charlestown

Broadmead is located at 13801 York Road in Cockeysville, ¼ mile north of the Shawan Road intersection. Turn right into the entrance on Broadmead Way. At the stop sign turn right and follow the perimeter road to the main entrance with **parking along the circle**. Check in at the desk and ask for directions to the Stony Run Board Room on the second floor.

Charlestown is located at 715 Maiden Choice Lane in Catonsville. From I-695 take Exit 12 B (east). Turn right onto Wilkens Ave. Proceed to the first traffic light and turn left onto Maiden Choice Lane. The Charlestown entrance will be on the right, just past a shopping center. At the gatehouse, ask for directions to the Charlestown Square. Check in at the Charlestown Square lobby, and someone will direct you to the Card Room.

**EDUCATION COMMITTEE****UPDATE: BCPS SCHOOL BOARD NOMINATING COMMISSION**

The BCPS School Board Nominating Commission has begun meeting. This commission is comprised of Baltimore County citizens appointed by a variety of organizations in the County plus eight members appointed by the Governor. Our LWV board appointed member Julie Sugar to serve on this Commission. Present members of the Commission are: Aaron Plymouth, Abby Beytin, Antonio Campbell, Douglas Elmendorf, Elisa Hartman, Julie Sugar, Lauren Taylor, Leslie Weber, Lila Merenbloom, Marietta English and Olivia Keithley. As of this writing, the Governor had not yet named his appointees. Aaron Plymouth has been appointed Chairperson of the Commission; Abbie Beytin is Vice-Chairperson and Julie Sugar is Secretary.

The purpose of the nominating commission is to vet individuals hoping for an appointment by the Governor to the Board of Education. The Governor, who will appoint 4 members to the Board of Education, must make his appointments from among the candidates recommended by the nominating commission. The Commission will be meeting in five different council districts. Individuals wishing to seek appointment must file an application to be interviewed by the Commission. Applications will be available soon.

The Commission has begun holding general meetings in Building E at the Board of Education on Charles Street. The public is welcome to attend to observe these meetings. The next meeting will be February 5th.

Potential candidates will be interviewed in April, May and June in various schools in five different council districts. BCPS is in charge of making arrangements for the Commission to function.

SCHOOL BOARD NOMINATING COMMISSION – KEY POINTS

- The Hybrid Elected/Appointed School Board taking effect in 2018 will consist of 7 elected members, one from each councilmanic district, and 4 at-large appointed members.
- The commission is tasked with recommending 8 at-large nominees to the Governor by October 1, after reviewing applications and conducting interviews.
- From these 8 nominees, the Governor will select School Board members for the four At-Large positions on the new Hybrid Elected/Appointed School Board.
- The commission is currently finalizing the application and application schedule. The tentative schedule is for the application to be available on February 1st with a March 2nd submission deadline.
- When available, the application will be available on the BCPS website (<https://www.bcps.org/board/bcsb-nominating-commission.html>)
- Applicants who seek to be appointed may not also file to run in the School Board election.
- The commission consists of 19 members representing stakeholder groups throughout the County.
- The League representative to the School Board Nominating Commission is Julie Sugar, who was asked to serve as Secretary of the Commission. Feel free to reach out to Julie at julie.sugar@verizon.net if you have interest in being nominated.

CONSIDERING RUNNING FOR BOARD OF EDUCATION? READ THIS

Beginning with the 2018 election, the Board of Education of Baltimore County will be partially appointed and partially elected. Four members will be appointed by the Governor from a list submitted by the Baltimore County School Board Nominating Commission established according to House Bill 88. This Commission will vet candidates applying for a position on the Board of Education via appointment. Candidates applying for appointment may not also file to run in the election.

At the November 2018 General Election seven additional members will be elected to the Board of Education—one from each councilmanic district. Depending upon the number of candidates who file to run in each councilmanic district, these candidates may also be required to run in the primary election.

If you wish to run for election or know others who would be good candidates and would consider running, following are the steps a potential candidate must complete to get on the ballot:

Before your name can be placed on the ballot you must fill out the following documents:

1. Statement of Organization.
 - a. Fill out and file with the State Board of Elections on-line at <http://campaignfinance.md.us/home/registercommittees>
2. Financial Disclosure Form
 - a. File with Baltimore County Board of Education Ethics Review Panel. The Board of Education Ethics Review Panel is located at 6901 Charles St., Bldg. C, Towson MD 21204. Phone #: 443-809-4138.
3. Candidate Information Sheet available on-line at MD State Board of Education site.

Next, phone the Baltimore County Board of Elections, 410-887-5700 to make an appointment. You must take the receipts indicating you have completed the three above-mentioned documents along with your Driver's License and a \$25 filing fee (check or cash) to the appointment with the Baltimore County Board of Elections—1112 Gilroy Road, Suite 104, Hunt Valley, MD 21031. The deadline for filing to run is 9:00 P.M., February 27, 2018.

A potential candidate must be a registered voter and live in the councilmanic district in which he/she runs.



SCHOOL TO PRISON PIPELINE AND RESTORATIVE PRACTICES

During the 2017 Legislative Session, [HB1287](#) was passed, creating the Commission on the School to Prison Pipeline and Restorative Practices.

The Commission is charged with studying discipline practices in Maryland public schools; focusing on Maryland data indicative of the School-to-Prison Pipeline; and examining best practices for implementation and training in restorative practices to eliminate the disproportionate treatment of students, with a focus on engaging parents. The work will culminate in recommendations on the establishment of a Collaborative Action Plan to redesign public school discipline practices.

You can get involved! Meetings are open to the public. While members of the public may not be permitted to speak at the meetings, they are able to observe the important work of the Commission as well as view presentations from various experts in policy and practice.

The next meeting is scheduled to take place January 22nd at 1- 4 p.m. in Annapolis.
