

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## FROM OUR CO-PRESIDENTS

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Dear League Members,

The willingness of our Board and all the other impressive volunteers contributing to the accomplishment of our mission is on display as we enter the run up to the midterm elections. Members of our League are working relentlessly on the compilation, printing and distribution of the Voter's Guide and also a series of forums which will present Baltimore County candidates for the County Executive, County Council and Board of Education. Spearheading much of this work is Jen Haire and the Program Committee, Barbara Crain who chairs our Voter Services Committee and Judith Miller, chair of the Education Committee. We are also grateful for contributions dedicated to the support for production of the Voter's Guide, including \$500.00 from Howard Bank and \$200.00 from the Resident's Council at Charlestown Retirement Community.



To date we are planning a County Executive Forum to be held on the east side of the County prior to the Primary. The forum will feature all the candidates, both Democrat and Republican. Separate forums will be held for the Board of Education candidates providing there are more than two in a Councilmanic District. These forums will be held within the District and will precede the Primary on June 27<sup>th</sup>. Once the primary is held and we know the final candidates another series of forums will be held. Needed are additional volunteers to assist in several roles essential to run a quality event. Please let one of the co-presidents know if you are interested in volunteering for such assignments, among others, as sorting questions, greeting guests, and time keeping.

We continue our regular activities such as voter registration, consensus meetings, program planning, and other educational activities. Our relevance increases with our visibility, our non-partisan philosophy, and our devotion to education. League members are speaking out on important issues when we have achieved consensus. a profoundly democratic process with knowledge and fairness at its core. Because of our recent program planning meetings with our membership, we have notified LWVUS that our local League endorses the elements of the Making Democracy Work campaign and ask that part of the LWVUS agenda focuses on abolishing the Electoral College in order to achieve the goal of one person one vote. Furthermore, we plan to review our action agenda for editing and updating.

We are at many crossroads regarding the law and policies of every level of government. The League of Women Voters has the history and reputation to have a positive effect in decisions and changes that will shape the future. It is up to each of us to contribute to this laudable effort.

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LWVMD continues to testify on issues like protecting our forests by creating stricter deforestation guidelines ([HB 766](#)), creating a task force to study and correct issues dealing with Medicaid ([SB 878](#)), and banning expanded polystyrene (EPS) foam food packaging ([HB 538](#))! Additional testimony will be posted throughout the session at <http://www.lwvmd.org/testimony>

Very soon Congressional Districts – Standards (HB 1022) will come for a vote. It calls for a state constitutional amendment mandating the same standards for Congressional districts that are in place for Legislative Districts. This bill has bi-partisan support and if passed, would provide a basis for challenging wildly drawn districts in court. Currently, the Maryland Constitution has no requirements for the shape of Congressional Districts. LWVMD agrees that Congressional Districts should consist of adjoining territory, be compact in form and substantially equal in population, and have due regard to natural boundaries and the boundaries of political subdivisions (such as towns, cities, and counties.) Please contact your Delegate to support HB 1022.

## CONSENSUS MEETINGS WRAPUP - LWVMD PRIMARY ELECTION STUDY

Thirty-eight members participated in a total of four consensus meetings on the State League study of Maryland's Primary Election system. We met in two sessions – one in November and one in January – so that we could have thorough discussions of this complex topic. Should we open our primaries to the growing number of unaffiliated voters? Should Maryland move from a plurality vote-counting system where the candidate with the most votes wins, or should we require a majority to win, as some states and jurisdictions do? These are two of the many questions we considered.

The State League study committee will now combine/tabulate the consensus reports of all Maryland local Leagues. In late spring we will learn whether we have to create a new position favoring more open primaries, a move away from the plurality vote tabulation or changes that would give non-principal parties and non-affiliated candidates easier access to the ballot.

Thank you to Laurie Davis, Judy Miller, Neilson Andrews and Angie Beltram for all their hard work making this consensus process go smoothly!

## MEMBERSHIP

### MOVING FORWARD WITH OUR MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

As a result of brainstorming during the initial Membership Committee meeting held January 4, 2018, several goals were identified for Committee action, including but not limited to: review how prospective members are identified; review how new members are identified and incorporated into our rolls, review how new members are welcomed to the organization (what information do they receive regarding LWV of Baltimore County members and activities); what do we currently do to mentor/help new members identify activities that may be of interest to them and committees that need volunteers; how do we communicate with the membership in general; what activities do we schedule annually to allow members to meet and mingle with one another; and most importantly, what can we do to increase membership with a focus on improving diversity: gender, age and ethnic backgrounds, including identifying other organizations to which we belong that may be a source for more members or assist in achieving our goals.

Committee members recognized there is a lot of work to do and look forward to finding ways to achieve our goals. The February meeting was canceled due to inclement weather and the next Membership meeting is scheduled for 12:45 pm Thursday, April 5, 2018 in the Conference Room of the LWV of Baltimore County office (Room 211, 6600 York Road, Baltimore). ### SEIZING OPPORTUNITIES!

One of the goals recently identified by the Membership Committee is to increase membership with an emphasis on improving diversity: gender, age and ethnic backgrounds. During our last meeting, Committee members brainstormed about ways LWV members can use other organizations to which we may belong to solicit new LWV members or obtain assistance in achieving Committee goals. Many LWV members also sit on other Boards or are active in other organizations. Because of discussions from that meeting, I approached contacts I have from serving on the Towson University Foundation Board.

I was delighted to learn that Towson University offers an undergraduate Marketing Class called "Marketing for Nonprofit Organizations". This class is taught by Prof. Rodney Stump, who has over 20 years of Marketing experience, including marketing for non-profits. Introductions to Prof. Stump and conversations with him resulted in an opportunity for us to be one of two non-profits that will be the subject of his Spring class

On February 12, 2018, Barbara Crain, Jen Haire, Betsy Sexton and I met with Prof. Stump and his class and provided them with a brief overview of our organization and answered questions from students about our goals. Prof. Stump advised us that his class would be divided into approximately 4 to 5 smaller groups of 3 – 5 students; two groups would be assigned to LWV of Baltimore County and the others to Volunteers of America Chesapeake. We were advised that one of the student groups assigned to us will prepare a

distribution plan to distribute Voter Guides for the 2018 Elections (Primaries and General) and implement Vote 411 (on-line voter guide covering local and statewide elections). The other group assigned to us will develop a marketing plan to increase membership with a focus on achieving greater diversity.

Prof. Stump explained that his students are expected to complete two interim assignments that will lead to a formal marketing campaign proposal. First, they must provide a situational analysis and abbreviated marketing audit; second, they are required to evaluate and project a target audience. As their final exam, the students are required to submit a written campaign proposal (including proposed campaign, time frame for implementation and budget) which is summarized orally to us on May 14, 2018. The students were enthusiastic and asked excellent questions. While the outcome remains to be seen and we are not bound by the recommendations that may be made, we feel this is a “win-win” for all! The Towson students have an opportunity to develop a plan for a highly regarded non-profit organization that is facing real challenges. Our League is obtaining valuable input from young people that may assist us in achieving important goals.

## EDUCATION COMMITTEE

### MANY COMPETE IN BOARD OF EDUCATION RACES

After a slow start all seven councilmanic districts have competitive races for the Board of Education position. This is the first year that Baltimore County citizens will have the privilege of voting for Board of Education candidates. Four additional candidates will be appointed by the Governor from a list of candidates submitted by the School Board Nominating Commission which will vet those seeking appointment. The Governor must make his decision from the list submitted by the Commission.

Our League is planning candidate forums in the four districts in which three or more candidates are running in the Primary Election. In the three districts where only two candidates are running, both candidates will automatically be placed on the ballot for the general election. A total of 29 candidates are running with two candidates in districts 2, 5, and 6; three running in district 7; six running in districts 1 and 4 and eight running in district 3. All Board of Education candidates will be running on a non-partisan basis. All voters—even those not registered in one of the two major parties--can vote for Board of Education candidates even in the primaries. Separate ballots will be provided to these voters at their polling places.

The education committee worked hard to publicize the new system to the County’s residents and to encourage interested citizens to either file to run or to apply for possible appointment. An article in the February 27<sup>th</sup> online edition of the *Baltimore Sun* mentioned League’s efforts and quoted Judy Miller, the education committee chairperson, who said, “We (LWVBC) hope it’s an honestly competitive race and that these candidates are all people who are concerned about the quality of education for our county....We hope this will draw attention to the Board of Education.”

The Education Committee is still concerned that many citizens are still unaware of this change of how the Board of Education for Baltimore County Public Schools will now be selected. The LWV Education Committee urges all members to help inform their families and friends about this change and encourage them to be sure to vote for a Board of Education candidate. This race will be listed last on the ballot. Information about the candidates will be available in the forthcoming candidates' meetings and voters' guides.

## SCHOOL BOARD NOMINATING COMMISSION UPDATE

The School Board Nominating Commission meetings are open to the public. Meetings are being held in Building E, at BCPS Greenwood campus. Remaining meeting dates are: April 2, May 7, August 6, September 14, October 1. More details were in the February/March Voter.

The Board of Education of Baltimore County (Board) is seeking public input relating to the next permanent superintendent of Baltimore County Public Schools.

The forum will be held on **Tuesday, March 13, 2018**, from **6:30 – 8:30 p.m.**, at **George Washington Carver Center for Arts and Technology**, 938 York Road, Towson, Maryland, 21204. Speaker sign up will be from 5:30 – 6:30 p.m. Each speaker will be allotted up to 3 minutes (depending on the number of speakers) to present their comments. The public forum will end at 8:30 p.m. Stakeholders will also have the opportunity to send comments electronically via the [BCPS website](#) beginning Wednesday March 7, 2018.

The Board is interested in hearing from the public as to the desired traits, characteristics, and priorities of the next superintendent who will lead the 25th largest school system in the nation. This forum is not intended to be an opportunity to discuss the current interim superintendent, but, instead, to seek input on the desired qualities of the next permanent superintendent.

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

#### Considering what you've experienced, what are the best ways for League members to make a difference in our democracy?

*Elizabeth* To league members and all citizens, the best way to make a difference is through personal contact with legislators and their aides.

*Carolyn* If LWV worked to ban assault weapons in Baltimore County and Maryland, we would have thousands ready to work with us for a ban.

Register voters, especially new citizens, as we are doing. Meet with legislators, council people, office holders, etc. Continue with our Voters' Guides. Run for office!

*Ethel* We need a diverse active membership to reflect the times we live.

*Kitty* Become involved!! Speak out with your family and friends about the importance of understanding the issues and voting. Find the issue that interests you the most and join that committee and be active.

*Repeated responses* 1. Speak up. Get involved. Build contacts with elected officials. 2. As individuals give money to candidates of your choice. 3. Promote voting – especially among young voters. 4. Assist schools in the teaching of civics. 5. Push states to mandate civics curriculum and include in state testing. 6. Specific projects are important to grow the league membership and make a difference.

**What issue, study, or LWV accomplishment do you most remember?**

*Kitty* My particular area of interest was Low Income Housing and I chaired that committee for LWV. I partnered with Ruth Chrystal from the City LWV to form the City/County Housing Committee and later the Baltimore County Housing Coalition. We had several large meetings with legislators and other housing organizations as well as go-see trips. I represented LWV on the Thompson v HUD Advisory Counsel.

*Carolyn* The Ladies of the League in Oshkosh, Wisconsin went to the mayor to demand he issue Bonds to install a sewer system. This was prior to 1946. There were cess pools in the city of 40,000! The LWV of State College, PA found a room and started a public library with volunteers. Prior to 1953 this town had no public library.

*Sarajane* Starting with our Speaker series, held at Towson University. It was a subscription series with wonderful speakers – so was a great outreach to the public as well as a good fundraiser, and way to get Leaguers involved. Now there are lots of speaker’s series: just like the Presidential debates, also started by LWV.

*Judy* Issue: Changing the Baltimore County Board of Ed from wholly appointed to a hybrid Board with 7 elected and 4 appointed members.

The basic issue involved transparency, citizen input and citizen access. LWVBC wanted a fully elected but our delegates - some - insisted on the hybrid with a Commission. Though it passed in 2014 and was not implemented until 2018 election, giving public time to forget about it. Passage caused the Board to be a bit more transparent event though the election has yet to occur. Whether the election will be successful still remains to be see as with the effects of hybrid board.

*Elizabeth* The study of solid waste. This is an ongoing issue for our society, and we are continuing to grapple with it. Recycling is one way to reduce the amount we discharge to our landfills.

*Ethel* The study on Russia and making Baltimore County a Charter is most remembered.

**How has League membership affected your life?**

*Judy* I have moved a number of times and have always found a “home” in each community’s LWV. Many, many of my dearest friends have come from the ranks of Leagues in the cities in which I’ve lived.

*Carolyn* In 1961 I moved to Old Riderwood, Walnut Hill Lane. Since I had 8 children under the age of 13 the Ruxton Chapter met at my house many times. Fine for me- no babysitter. At that time there were 40 in the Ruxton league and many times we would have 15-20 at the meeting. Perhaps in those days women didn’t feel a need for an exciting satisfying career?

*Sarajane* ...by educating me to how to get things done and how government works. Even being on the LWV Board helped me help other boards run better!

*Elizabeth* It has deepened my awareness of our political processes and how assorted issues dovetail. I appreciate conversing with league members as they tend to be articulate and well informed.

*Ethel* I’ve become much more interested in everyday politics.

*Kitty* I was a young wife with four small children when a neighbor took me to my first LWV meeting. There I met an outstanding group of strong, articulate and knowledgeable women who changed my life. I finally had something besides babies and housekeeping to think about. I agreed to help out in the office and set up a volunteer program to cover the phone and get the Newsletter out. This expanded as time went on and I took on organizing and keeping track of membership and financial matters as well as often taking on board positions. This then became a real job and I was hired and worked at the office for 30 years. The most interesting part of my job was the phone calls. I quickly learned everything I could about the County and the State legislature and the various county positions and activities. The phone calls covered a bit of everything from people wanting to know how to register to harassing calls. Not everybody liked our positions. I got to know everything that was going on in the county and was kept up to date by our outstanding board members. It wasn’t just a job, it was an education. I quickly learned that if a Leaguer told you she was going to do something, you could count on it.
