A Hui Taumata normally involves a range of speakers that will be invited to inspire a group into action. The key learning from this election is to identify how to reconnect to ourselves. Therefore, these sessions have been designed to help us talk to create the solutions and practical steps to support our passion for the kaupapa of our Party.

### **Session 1 – Electorate Feedback**

The electorates are the key to our party and we encourage electorates and the various branches to debrief and share concerns that can be brought to the AGM. For this hui, we ask that the electorate identify the top two learnings that will help us return to parliament in 2020. Due to time, could the General Electorates organise your feedback to connect with our local Māori Electorate and to come as a collective voice. The next three sessions are also a time where electorates can share further thoughts as to how to promote further kōrero from your electorate debriefs.

### **Session 2 – Connection**

The key message that has come through is the lack of connect the party has had with the voter and this is a chance to move past the party that has allowed individuals and their opinions to lead electorates and/or the party and to use empathy to help us revive the party.

### **Session 3 – Party Machinery**

Every time a new executive is confirmed, the baby is either deliberately or inadvertently thrown out with the bath water. In rebuilding the party, what can we revive from previous exec teams and is this a chance to discuss the sacred cows, ie: co-leaders, co-vice presidents.
