Before the Decision

- 30 states had rejected making abortion legal

In one sweep, Roe invalidated abortion regulations in all 50 states. Roe mandates that states may not prohibit any abortions before "viability." After viability, states may outlaw abortion unless it is necessary for the "preservation of the life or health of the mother"; however a companion decision, Doe v Borton, decided the same day as Roe, effectively gutted any restrictions. Regulations of the procedure are permitted throughout pregnancy.

Doe v. Bolton -- The Rest of the Story

In Doe v. Bolton, the Court defined health as encompassing "all factors—physical, emotional, psychological, familial, and the woman's age—relevant to the well-being of the patient." Therefore, under Roe and Doe, a woman must be permitted to obtain an abortion through all nine months if it is for her "well-being". The Court has never specifically ruled on whether laws prohibiting post-viability abortions are constitutional, and although many states have such laws, they are almost never enforced. Roe has been used to keep partial-birth shortions lead!

The Future of Ro

There are nine justices on the Supreme Court. Only three of those serving in 2004 would vote to overturn Roe. The President nominates new justices, but they must be approved by the U.S. Senate.

What Happens When Roe is Overruled?

- Fewer than 5 states have laws prohibiting abortion which could be enforced.
- 12 states have state court decisions which would permit abortion even if Roe is overruled.

 The rest of the states would either have to overcome significant barriers to enforce old laws or would have to enact new laws prohibiting abortion. If these states do nothing, abortion will remain legal.

Myths, Lies & How to Answer Them

"Roe v. Wade was what the American people wanted."

Not at all. Roe v. Wade subverted the democratic process. In Roe, the U.S. Supreme Court was willing to use its judicial power to trample the legislative power—and the voice of the people—of all 50 states. A majority of the states rejected making abortion legal. Public opinion was against it, t was a failed social experiment. Since democracy was not giving them what they wanted, pro-abortion forces turned to the courts. Abortion was forced on us by a Court in direct contradiction to the national will. That is why abortion still tears at our consciences and haunts our public policy.

"Women need abortion and Roe."

Not only has Roe not helped women, it has hurt them. Except for abortion, Roe has never been used as a legal basis for establishing any rights for women. Not once. It hasn't helped them in the workplace or with their families. Abortion exposes women to serious physical and psychological risks: breast cancer, miscarriage, perforated uterus, cervical laceration, infection, and post-abortion traumatic stress, to name only a few.

"Overturning Roe will force women to turn to illegal abortions, which will result in massive numbers of women dving from these procedures."

Overturning Roe won't make abortion Illegal—it will finally allow the American people to decide what the law should be. Plus, there is no evidence that banning abortion will lead to more deaths for women. Poland, a nation of 40 million people, got rid of legalized abortion in 1993. The number of abortions fell from an average of 150,000 per year under the Communists to 124 in 2001. Records of all deaths due to pregnancy, abortion, and childbirth indicate that the rate dropped from 70 in 1990 to 21 in 1999. With the exceptional level of medical care available in the US, there is no reason to think our experience will be worse.

"Criminalizing abortion will send women to jail."

Overruling Roe will not make abortion illegal, it will just send it back to the states for the people to decide. And no one is interested in sending women to jail. Pro-life people omen with unplanned pregnancies since

omen with unplanned pregnancies since the 1960's. It is the abortionist who makes his or her money by taking advantage of women's problems who belongs in jail, not the woman. The goal of the pro-life movement is to re-awaken America to the absolute value of each innocent human life and to help women and their families, now and always.

Embryonic Stem Cell Research Likely Won't Cure Any Diseases

Ian Wilmut, co-creator of Dolly the cloned sheep, wants your tax dollars to pay Big Biotech and their business partners in elite university life-science departments to conduct research into human cloning. Wilmut dropped this little bon mot to the London Telegraph while on his way to the United Nations to lobby against a pending international protocol that would outlaw all human-somatic-cell nuclear transfer (SCNT) cloning. He took the opportunity of being interviewed to grouse that America's refusal to publicly fund research into human cloning is stifling science and slowing the development of new medical cures.

Wilmut's complaint is part of an intense public-relations campaign intended to pressure federal and state governments to publicly fund human cloning. Yet only three years ago, during the great stem-cell debate of 2001, biotech advocates assured a wary nation that they only wanted taxpayers to pay for embryonic-stem-cell research (ESCR) that would be strictly limited to using embryos leftover from in-vitro-fertilization treatments. After a protracted political struggle, President Bush partially accommodated the request by allowing federal funding on embryonic stem-cell lines already in existence as of August 9, 2001.

But now, we are being told that ESCR alone won't lead to treatments for

President's Letter

IN MY OPINION

The presidential election is looming large on the horizon and a lot is at stake in terms of whether our country builds a culture of life versus a culture of death. John Kerry clearly has stated he will not appoint justices or support laws that protect our unborn brothers and sisters, even though he believes that human life does begin at conception. President George Bush has on the other hand nominated pro-life justices for lower

courts and has signed not only a ban on partial birth abortion, but also the Unborn Victims of Violence Act, and he has limited federal support of embryonic stem cell research.

For anyone who has worked to right the wrong of abortion for the past 31 plus years choosing the man for the Oval Office would appear to be a "no brainer;" however, an article from the Boston Archdiocesan newspaper, "The Pilot" (09-03-04) reported that 66% of "Catholic voters who have not yet made up their minds about the presidential race gave top priority to health care, followed by terrorism, Iraq and the federal budget deficit." Furthermore, among the swing voters, "abortion was named as a very important priority by 45 percent."

Health care, terrorism, Iraq, the federal budget, all of these are important issues. These issues need deep consideration and attention, but they do not overshadow the issue of abortion on demand, all nine months of a pregnancy and for any reason. Innocent human life is destroyed day in and day out through our liberal abortion laws in this country. No one can justify the brutal butcher of innocent school children in Chechyna by terrorists, nor should we ever be tempted to reduce the horror of abortion to economics or as just another social or political woe.

Simply because abortion on demand has been a legal part of our culture for the past 31 plus years, does not make it any less wrong or evil than it was the day the Supreme Court ruled on Roe v. Wade. degenerative diseases and disabilities such as Parkinson's, spinal-cord injury, Lou Gehrig's disease, juvenile diabetes, and the like. It seems that our bodies might reject tissues developed from natural embryos. Indeed, according to Robert Lanza, medical director of Advanced Cell Technology, writing in the May 24 Scientific American, the rejection issue is so huge that biotechnologists would require "millions of discarded embryos from IVF clinics" to create stem-cell lines with sufficient genetic variations to mitigate the problem through tissue matching.

Cloning proponents like Lanza claim that the solution to the tissue-rejection conundrum is to make a cloned embryo of each patient and extract the clone's stem cells for use in treatment, a process often called "therapeutic cloning." In theory, since the patient and the clone's DNA would be virtually identical, injected embryonic tissues would not be rejected and the patient would be spared from a lifetime of taking immune suppressant drugs.

If Lanza is right and cloning in fact leads to cures for hundreds of millions of people with degenerative conditions worldwide, there would seem to be no limit to the financial profits to be made in this area. Yes, investing in such research would be risky since human cloning is far from perfected. But venture capitalists have been taking substantial risks on biotechnological research for years now: According to the May 20 Wall Street Journal, investors have already poured \$100 billion into the biotechnology industry even though \$40 billion has been lost. Hence, even if therapeutic cloning is a long shot, cloning companies should still have to beat investors away with a stick.

But the contrary is true. According to several recent news articles, biotech companies hoping to strike it rich via human cloning are withering on the financial vine. It isn't that private capitalists necessarily have moral qualms about human cloning, though they should. More likely, their due diligence has convinced them that therapeutic cloning would be so wildly impractical and expensive to administer that investing money into developing the technology makes about as much financial sense as putting cash through a paper shredder.

These problems are many and varied, and most seem intractable. They include:

The human-egg dearth: Each attempt at somatic-cell nuclear transfer cloning requires one human egg. (In theory, animal eggs might also be used, but that would create human/animal combinations that in addition to being morally objectionable could also increase the likelihood of rejection.) The National Academy of Sciences has estimated that there are at least 100 million

people in America alone that could benefit from stem-cell therapies. Even if it only took one egg per patient, that would still be 100 million eggs. But it is utterly unrealistic to think that cloning will ever become that efficient. Indeed, an article published last year by the NAS (written by Peter Mombaerts of Rockefeller University) revealed that it would probably take about 100 human eggs per patient to make just one viable cloned embryonic-stem-cell line for use in "therapeutic cloning." If true, this means we would need a mind-boggling 10 billion eggs just to treat 100 million Americans — never mind the hundreds of millions of patients who would clamor for such care in the rest of the world. These staggering numbers almost certainly doom therapeutic cloning from ever entering medicine's armamentarium.

The unaffordable expense: The pro-cloning Mombaerts had more bad news for therapeutic-cloning proponents. At present, young women sell their eggs for use in fertility treatments for \$1000 to \$2000 each, Given this price. he concluded that the cost of obtaining one cloned human-embryonic-stem-cell line --- not including the expenses associated with doctors. hospitals, laboratories, etc. - would run in the neighborhood of \$200,000 just for the eggs, "a prohibitively high sum" that he predicted "willimpede the widespread application of this technology in its present form." Even this cost-prohibitive estimate is wildly understated because it doesn't take into account the exponential increase in demand for eggs that therapeutic cloning would cause. Thus, rather than filling investors' coffers, therapeutic cloning would be far more likely to bust the bank.

The problem of tumors: Embryonic stem cells often cause tumors in animal studies, making their use in humans highly problematic. Therapeutic cloning would do nothing to solve this significant safety problem.

The advances in adult-stem-cell research: Meanwhile, research into harnessing non-embryonic sources of stem cells for use in medical therapies is advancing at an astounding pace, both in animal studies and early human trials. Human patients with neurological conditions, heart disease, and other illnesses such as cyclecell anemia, have received substantial benefit in early human trials. Late stage juvenile diabetes in mice has been cured completely using human spleen cells. On June 1, Johns Hopkins Kimmel Cancer Center announced that bone-marrow stem cells helped rebuild damaged livers in mice. Recently, the European Journal of Neuroscience reported that dental pulp provides great support for nerve cells lost to Parkinson's. In Lisbon, Portugal, Dr. Carlos Lima has helped restore some muscular and biadder control to paralyzed

patients using olfactory nerve cells. If such breakthroughs continue at the current pace — and if no significant safety issues develop to stand in the way — within the decade embryonic sources for use in stem-cell therapy might become superfluous.

Venture capitalists have no duty to risk their money on technology that almost surely will never return a profit. Just because this starves Big Biotech of funds to pay for human cloning doesn't mean that society is obliged to fill the gap. Indeed, engaging in such blatant corporate welfare could actually delay viable medical therapies from reaching the medical marketplace, particularly if we divert funds that would otherwise have gone to adult-stem-cell research, which venture capitalists are investing in and which is already bringing such great hope to human patients.

In addition to being a research professor with the George Perkins Marsh Institute at Clark University in Worcester, Dr. Derr is also with the university's program in Ethics and Public Policy. He spoke of his interest and experience in medical ethics, abortion, euthanasia, and new reproductive technologies.

AUWL also offers educational programs and forums for women, with special interest in issues related to the sanctity of all human life from conception to natural death. Among the growing list of subjects addressed by these professional women are: adoption, stem cell research, cloning, end-of-life decisions, and legislative agenda.





Importance of retaining Hyde-Weldon Language in Labor-HS Appropriations Bill

Nationally abortion opponents are developing strategies to remove the Hyde-Weldon language (section 509d) from the Labor-HHS appropriations bill. A motion to this end could come very soon. The provision must be upheld because it provides consistent federal protection from government discrimination for other health care providers such as doctors, hospitals, and insurers who decline to participate in abortions.

Individuals who disagree with legalized abortion and work in the health care industry should be free from forms of discrimination. It is urgent that you contact your congressman and let him know that you oppose any efforts to strike the Hyde-Weldon language this provision is important. Understanding of Fetal Pain evolves into the Unborn Child Pain Awareness Act (S. 2466, H.R. 4420)

Increased awareness and the decision of Judge Richard C. Casey, who said in his ruling the Partial Birth Abortion Ban Act was unconstitutional expresses the need for a bill to help women considering abortion understand the pain such abortions cause the unborn child.

According to Dr. K. Anand who testified before Judge Casey in the court challenge to the Partial Birth Abortion Ban, human fetuses can feel "severe pain" at 20 weeks gestation and that the pain perceived by a fetus is possibly more intense than that perceived by a newborn or older child. Dr. Anand is a well-known neonatal pediatrician and pain expert.

He said that there is a higher density of pain receptors per square inch of skin at 20 to 30 weeks gestation. He testified that pain in the unborn child is further compounded by the fact that the insulation that protects human nerve fibers is not complete at this stage so that the pain is felt not only at the receptor site, but also along some of the nerve length.

On the federal level we urgently need Massachusetts congressmen to sign on as co-sponsors to the Unborn Child Pain Awareness Act (H.R. 4420). The bill would require every abortionist to provide, whenever a woman seeks an abortion beyond 20 weeks, specified information about the capacity of her unborn child to feel pain during an abortion.


After the woman receives the information she must either accept or refuse (by signing a form) the administration of pain-reducing drugs directly administered to her unborn child. The legislation is applicable to abortions beyond 20 weeks irrespective of which abortion method is employed. The expert testimony provided by Dr. K. Anand points up the need to introduce fetal pain legislation in Massachusetts. If we do get some of our lawmakers to sponsor the federal bill, it will most likely boost support for the state effort here.

Growing need for Massachusetts Residents to have Health Care Proxy — Will To Live Form

Recently in the news, a Massachusetts woman was severely injured when she was hit by a bus while crossing a busy street in Jamaica Plain. In spite of the circumstances her family remained optimistic. Andrea Etheart, never regained consciousness and ultimately was declared brain dead by medical officials.

Because Andrea Etheart did not have a legally designated proxy which would authorize the type of treatment she desired, her family was unable to intervene in matters concerning her health care. Under the Commonwealth's laws the hospital had the right to remove life support from Andrea irrespective of concerns voiced by family members that the hospital's action was premature.

There are countless situations like this happening all over the country. The need to sign a "Will to Live" today is paramount. This document allows an individual to designate a health care agent who will make health care decisions for you if you are considered incapacitated and cannot make decisions yourself. 

The program is aired over 8 stations that cover a population of over 40 million people. Additionally, Pastor Childress has hosted numerous workshops at the National Right To Life Convention.

BEYOND BELIEF

Speaking in the Catholic heart of Iowa this campaign summer, John Kerry announced, "I believe life begins at conception". He was quick, however, to point to his support for "abortion rights": six votes in favor of partial birth abortion, a special trip to Washington to cast one of his very few votes this session against the Unborn Victims of Violence Act, abortion as a litmus test for appointing judges, and his decades old consistent commitment.

There is something about abortion which encourages fuzzy thinking (maybe the need to deny what actually happens in an abortion). The fact that life begins at conception, and that it is human life if the parents are human, is not a belief. We do

not "believe" that life begins at conception, we know that it does. Science has proven that fact irrefutably.

Yes, beliefs are involved. Whether a society decides to protect every innocent human life at every stage of development is based on beliefs about the dignity of human life. Whether or not society decides to enslave, enfranchise, educate depends on whether or not its members believe that there are God given rights which must be protected.

Unfortunately, Senator Kerry has shown that he believes human life is not worthy of protection except under certain circumstances, that there are no immutable God given rights, but only those rights granted by the government.

Primaries: Complete Sweep for Pro life Incumbents

This year, the Democratic Primaries saw many contested races. In general, pro life incumbents were challenged by candidates put forth by NARAL Pro Choice Mass. In these districts, pro life constituents worked hard for the incumbents. All of the pro life incumbents won.

These pro life incumbents bested candidates who were endorsed by this and other pro abortion groups which contributed money and workers: Bruce Ayers (D-Quincy), John Frisolo (D-Worcester), Emile Goguen (D-

Fitchberg), and Timothy Toomey (D-Cambridge) won their primary races.

Edward Connolly (D-Everett) beat a challenger who was classified as "pro choice", but not endorsed by NARAL.

Pro life incumbents Colleen Garry (D-Dracut) and William Greene (D-Billerica) won against a challenger considered "mixed" by NARAL and one who did not answer the MCFL questionnaire respectively. Eugene O'Flaherty, who has a mixed voting record on the life issues, beat another NARAL endorsee.
