

2019 HOUSING INVENTORY COUNT (HIC) OVERVIEW

Metro Denver Homeless Initiative



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As MDHI seeks to be the leader of community data on homelessness, we want to verify proper interpretation and reliable use of complex data. 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Summary of HIC

The Housing Inventory Count (HIC) is an inventory of housing conducted annually on the night of the Point in Time (PIT) Count and are available at the national and state level, as well as for each CoC. The PIT and the HIC data are both reported to Congress in the Longitudinal System Analysis (LSA) annually. This year, the PIT occurred on January 28, 2019. The reports tally the number of beds and units available on the night designated for the count by program type, and include beds dedicated to serve persons who are homeless as well as persons in Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) and Rapid Rehousing (RRH).

MDHI is required¹ to report on the HIC homeless projects that meet the following criteria:

- 1) The primary intent of the project is to serve homeless persons;
- 2) The project verifies homeless status as part of its eligibility determination; and
- 3) The actual project clients are predominantly homeless (or, for permanent housing, were homeless at entry)

Stakeholders should think of the HIC as the supply side compared to the demand side of people experiencing homelessness counted during the PIT.

As leaders, governments and advocates review the HIC dataset, the HIC can be used to answer a number of questions, including but not limited to:

- Identifying gaps in geographic coverage, such as ## of emergency shelter beds available for a population in a specific county.
- Understanding utilization of program types to see which are most accessible and successful for the broadest array of people seeking services, in conjunction with System Performance Measures
- Reporting on existing housing resources which help people exit out of homelessness, and who they are serving, such as ## of PSH units available for chronically homeless households.

Methodology & Limitation

MDHI collects information for the HIC from known providers that meet the criteria designated by HUD in the HIC annual guidance, and have either historically participated or newly opened and were operating on the night of the PIT. In 2019, MDHI contacted agencies to confirm the information reported as current and accurate, with agencies validating or correcting the data values on a survey prior to submission. A vast majority of providers responded, but some did not. For those that did not respond with updated information, MDHI used the most recent known bed capacity and population served. Any project with changes to their service population, capacity, location or other elements related to service provision are encouraged to reach out to MDHI via hmishelp@mdhi.org to update their information for future HIC reports.

Since MDHI also took over the role of Lead Agency for the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) in September 2018, MDHI sought to update information for each of the project and agency profiles to reflect the most up-to-date information. Historically, the HIC was reported on a

variety of source material, created in an Excel file. In 2019, the HIC was fully reported out of HMIS, even though a number of programs do not participate in HMIS, or cannot participate in HMIS in the case of victim services providers. The programs that do not participate were given placeholder profiles with the latest bed information available to MDHI. As HMIS utilization proliferates across the CoC, collecting the HIC will become more accurate and less burdensome on providers. In 2019 and beyond, MDHI will be verifying reported HMIS project profile information on an annual basis with HMIS participating providers and funders during scheduled site visits.

Definitions

For reference when reviewing HIC report spreadsheets and overviews.

Bed Type only applies to Emergency Shelters and is either Facility-Based (the majority of agencies), Voucher (such as if a project vouchers into a motel), or Other (beds located in a church or other facility not designated for use by persons who are homeless)

- A **Bed** is a for an individual human-being that is being served by the Project. If a project serves 50 individuals (such as 50 adults, or 30 adults and 20 children), they would have 50 in the Bed type.
- A **Unit** describes the total number of units available on the night of the Point in Time Count: Projects that do not have a fixed number of units (e.g. a congregate shelter program) may record the bed inventory. For transitional housing, units could be apartments or spaces where specific households reside. The Unit Count may or may not equal the Bed Count.

Chronically Homeless is a person who:

- A) Is homeless and lives in a place not meant for human habitation, a safe haven, or in an emergency shelter; and
- B) Has been homeless and living or residing in a place not meant for human habitation, a safe haven, or in an emergency shelter continuously for at least 1 year or on at least four separate occasions in the last 3 years where the combined length of time homeless in those occasions is at least 12 months; and
- C) Has a disability.

Emergency Shelter (ES) a project that offers temporary shelter (lodging) for the homeless in general or for specific populations of the homeless. In metro Denver, there are variations of shelter types, including family shelters where households may stay for 14-90 days on average, and nightly shelter for individuals which may be nightly only or longer term depending on the program. Victim service providers serving survivors fleeing domestic violence also fall into this category for the purposes of the HIC.

Geocode is a HUD-designated location based on the main location for the project or organization.

HMIS Beds are if agency staff actively use the Homeless Management Information System to report or manage the project's data.

McKinney-Vento Funded is for HUD funded projects via any of the following: Emergency Solutions Grant - ESG, Continuum of Care - CoC, Legacy: Shelter+Care -S+C, Section 8 Mod-Rehab - SRO, or Supportive Housing Program – SHP.

Organization is the name of an agency or the overarching collective for the project.

Other Permanent Housing (OPH) is a project with housing resources for people without supportive services, such as those living in project-based or scattered site apartments that are not defined as PSH.

Overflow Beds are available on a temporary or ad-hoc basis in response to demand that exceeds planned bed capacity.

Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) is permanent housing with indefinite leasing or rental assistance paired with supportive services to assist homeless persons with a disability or families with an adult or child member with a disability achieve housing stability.

Project Name is the name the project profile is setup within HMIS.

Project Type is the HUD-designated category of how a project operates. Project types include Emergency Shelter, Transitional Housing, Safe Haven, Rapid Rehousing, Permanent Supportive Housing or Other Permanent Housing.

Rapid Rehousing (RRH) emphasizes housing search and relocation services and short- and medium-term rental assistance to move homeless persons and families (with or without a disability) as rapidly as possible into permanent housing. It is important to know that for the purposes of the HIC, Rapid Rehousing is only reported for households that are currently enrolled in the project and are leased in a housing unit. This excludes people who are enrolled but still seeking lease-up, or who were enrolled in a program but are now housed and exited from the project.

Safe Haven (SH) is a project that offers supportive housing that (1) serves hard to reach homeless persons with severe mental illness who came from the streets and have been unwilling or unable to participate in supportive services; (2) provides 24-hour residence for eligible persons for an unspecified period; (3) has an overnight capacity limited to 25 or fewer persons; and (4) provides low demand services and referrals for the residents.

Seasonal Beds are typically cold-weather activated, operating only between certain dates, not year-round.

Target Population is either:

- DV (people who are survivors of domestic violence)
- HIV (persons living with HIV/AIDS)
- NA (Not Applicable, the majority of projects in the HIC)

Transitional Housing (TH) is a project that provides temporary lodging and is designed to facilitate the movement of homeless individuals and families into permanent housing within a specified period of time, but typically no longer than 24 months. In transitional housing, there are generally higher eligibility and program requirements than in emergency shelter. Participants may be asked to pay rent or fees to stay in these programs.

Regional Summary

MDHI reports permanent housing projects, regardless of funding source, at a regional level. Projects funded through HUD Continuum of Care (CoC) or Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds are required to use coordinated entry, locally known as OneHome, for housing placement. Since OneHome focuses on regional housing openings to expand opportunities for tenants, city and county boundaries tend not to apply to specific projects, even though they may be located in a particular city. Additionally, a number of scattered-site resources like PSH vouchers or RRH may be connected to an agency that serves regional tenants, so the address of the agency does not reflect the regionality of the service catchment area.

For the purposes of this report, MDHI is only reporting the Emergency Shelter (ES), Transitional Housing (TH) and Safe Haven (SH) project types at the county level, plus the City of Aurora due to its size and location in both Adams and Arapahoe counties. The category of Beds Filled reflects the number of beds filled on the night of January 28, 2019.

Housing Program Availability

Permanent housing resources are funded through a variety of Federal, State and local government dollars, along with private funding to create a pipeline of tenancy supports for permanent housing. Since many PSH and RRH projects utilize vacancies across multiple counties (scattered site) in addition to project based buildings (single site), MDHI is not sorting the list of permanent housing resources geographically. The lease-ups for scattered site resources vary month to month and so a county-based categorical overview would not be an accurate picture for the region annually. As HMIS enhances tracking for lease-up addresses in the future, there will be more opportunities to understand geographic trends such as client housing placements by county, or dedicated housing-resource heat maps.

The projects listed on the HIC are dedicated or prioritized for people experiencing homelessness but do not comprehensively list the ways that people experiencing homelessness gain housing stability. Many people in a housing crisis find housing opportunities through subsidized, low-income, supportive or mainstream housing resources. Public Housing Authorities, Low-Income Housing Tax Credit units, HUD 811/202 properties and the landlord community are vital partners in supporting tenancy for formerly homeless households and expanding the resource pool to address homelessness locally.
