Who can apply: They accept applications from organisations. International organisations can apply for projects that benefit practicing Australian artists or their work. Applications for funding to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander panel must come from Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander organisations.

Applications for funding to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander panel must come from Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander individuals or groups.

Supported activities must last no longer than two years from the proposed start date.

Partnership Development

Purpose: Develop Arts and non-arts partnerships that will enable future projects

Amount: Up to \$5,000

Closing Date: Ongoing Fund

This initiative provides seed funding to support the development of arts and non-arts partnerships that will enable future projects. Individuals, groups and organisations can apply. Partnership Development offers support of up to \$5,000 to undertake further development and/or extension of effective partnerships. Applicants need to carefully consider the scale and complexity of the partnership development when considering if the activity warrants going through a Partnership Development grant process.

Community Partnerships supports a number of priority areas that cover a range of geographic, demographic and social contexts. These priority areas serve to focus effective use of the resources of Community Partnerships and include regional Australia, disability, young people, cultural diversity, emerging communities, Indigenous people, remote Indigenous communities, and specific critical social and cultural issues requiring focused attention.

Performer's Trust Foundation Grants

Purpose: Grants to promote and encourage music and the performing arts Amount: Usually no more than \$2,500 for individuals and \$5,000 for groups Funding Provider: Phonographic Performance Company of Australia (PPCA)

Closing Date: Ongoing

All applications for grants are reviewed by the trustees and must be for **one or more** of the following purposes:

- Performances at concerts at or for charitable institutions such as hospitals or homes for the aged;
- Scholarships for the promotion and encouragement of musical and theatrical education;
- The promotion and encouragement of the performing arts to the general public;
- The aid or assistance of any beneficiary who is unable to adequately maintain herself/himself by her/his own exertions and other income

A grant under the PPCA Performers' Trust Foundation can be used for costs associated with the above, including:

- Tuition fees:
- Travel costs (hire, airfares, petrol);
- Accommodation;
- Venue hire/ PA hire

A grant cannot be used to cover wages, salaries, commissions etc.

Established in 1991, the Register of Cultural Organisations (the Register) assists qualifying cultural bodies to attract private support by enabling donors the incentive of a tax deduction.

The Register aims to strengthen private sector support for the arts and encourages Australians to contribute to the nation's vibrant cultural life.

Cultural bodies listed on the Register are able to receive tax-deductible donations to fund a wide range of activities in arts and culture. This may include the creation of a new theatrical work, the publication of a literary magazine or the building of a community arts centre

Business Growth Grant

Purpose: The Grant supports recommendations that improve the abilities and skills of

your business.

Amount: up to \$20 000

Funding Provider: Department of Industry

Closing Date: Ongoing fund

Business Growth Grant funding can be used to engage a consultant/s to make improvements to your business that were recommended by your Adviser or Facilitator.

Your Business Growth Grant project must address areas of expertise that demonstrate:

- the preferred consultant is bringing new areas of expertise to your business
- how the project will build the internal capability of your business
- the work involved is not part of the ordinary operations of your business

Your business will be reimbursed up to half the cost of engaging the consultant, to a maximum of \$20,000 (excluding GST).

Support Initiative

Purpose: Help innovative startups to rapidly transform their ideas into globally competitive businesses by giving them mentorship, funding, resources, knowledge and access to business networks.

Amount: up to \$500 000

Funding Provider: Commonwealth

Closing Date: Ongoing fund

The Incubator Support initiative provides funding through two components to deliver Incubator Support projects, both of which require matched funding from applicants.

The first is support for New and Existing Incubators:

- to help develop new incubators in regions or sectors with high potential for success in international trade, and
- to boost the effectiveness of high performing incubators, including funding support to expand their services and/or develop the innovation ecosystem.

The second is support for Expert-in-Residence:

 to provide access to top quality research, managerial and technical talent through secondments of national or international expert advisers who will improve their chance of commercial success in international markets.

Grant funding of up to 50 per cent of total Incubator Support Project Values will be available as follows:

- a minimum grant amount of \$10,000 and a maximum grant amount of \$500,000 for New and Existing Incubators per project with a maximum grant period of 24 months.
- a minimum grant amount of \$1,000 and a maximum grant amount of \$25,000 for Expert-In-Residence per project with a maximum grant period of 12 months

The JobAccess Employment Assistance Fund

Purpose: Encourage and support employers to employ people with a disability

The Employment Assistance Fund helps people with disability and mental health condition by providing financial assistance to purchase a range of work related modifications and services. Assistance is available for people who are about to start a job or who are currently working, as well as those who require assistance to find and prepare for work.

The Fund may reimburse the cost of work related modifications and services including, but not limited to:

- The cost of modifications to the physical work environment
- Modifications to work vehicles
- Adaptive equipment for the workplace
- Information and communication devices

- Auslan interpreting
- Specialist services for employees with specific learning disorders and mental health conditions
- Disability awareness training
- · Deafness awareness training, and
- Mental health awareness training.

Information, Linkages and Capacity Building Grants

Purpose: Providing grants to organisations to assist with Information, Linkages and

capacity building or ICL.

Funding provider: National Disability Insurance Agency (NDIA)

Amount: Undisclosed

The National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) has two parts:

- NDIS plans (sometimes known as individually funded packages) for eligible people with a disability, and
- Information, linkages and capacity building or ILC.

Both parts contribute to the overall goal of the NDIS to enable people with disability to live an ordinary life. You might not have heard much about ILC up until now. That's because ILC was not part of the NDIS trial period. But all that is about to change – we have started rolling out ILC around the country.

The focus of ILC is community inclusion – making sure people with disability are connected into their communities. ILC is all about making sure our community becomes more accessible and inclusive of people with disability.

We want to do this in two ways:

- Personal capacity building this is about making sure people with disability and their families have the skills, resources and confidence they need to participate in the community or access the same kind of opportunities or services as other people.
- Community capacity building this is about making sure mainstream services or community organisations become more inclusive of people with disability.

Unlike the rest of the NDIS, ILC doesn't provide funding to individuals. We provide grants to organisations to carry out activities in the community. Many of the activities that we fund in ILC will be available to both people with disability and families. Providing information about a particular disability or condition on a website or through a phone line, for example, will help both people with disability as well as family members. And the activities we fund to build the capacity of mainstream services and community activities to be more inclusive will benefit all people with disability, as well as their families and carers.

While we want ILC activities to help lots of people, we will also fund some activities that include people who do not have an NDIS plan so they can get the help they need.

Grants to End Homelessness

Purpose: The Mercy Foundation Grants to End Homelessness are available for seeding initiatives, services, projects, advocacy and research that will contribute to the goal of ending homelessness by supporting housing first and permanent supportive housing solutions.

Amount: Up to \$50,000

Funding Provider: Mercy Foundation

Closing Date: 9 October 2017

Projects that focus on chronic homelessness and women who experience chronic homelessness are currently priority areas for funding. These will generally be larger grants (up to \$50,000 for any one year) with grants likely to be averaging \$20,000 - \$30,000.

Chronic homelessness is defined as an episode of homelessness lasting 6 months or longer or multiple episodes of homelessness over a 12 month period or more. People who experience chronic homelessness are likely to have 'complex needs', which usually means that they have one or more of the following:

- developmental disability
- traumatic brain injury
- serious physical health problems
- history of abuse or trauma
- mental illness
- mental disorder
- psychiatric disability
- addictions.

Applicants must be able to specify measurable outcomes from the initiative. Those outcomes will need to show that the project has contributed to ending chronic homelessness or contributed substantially to increasing knowledge about the pathways into and out of homelessness – thereby increasing our understanding of how to prevent and how to end homelessness. All applications will need to outline their evaluation strategy and make clear how such outcomes will be measured.

Applicants must be a legal entity, such as an incorporated association or company. If not, the applicant will need to be auspiced by an appropriate organisation. Unfortunately at this time, the Mercy Foundation is unable to fund services or projects which require recurrent or indefinite funding. However, depending on the project and its assessed contribution to meeting the objectives of these grants, the Mercy Foundation could choose to fund a project again the following year (subject to a further application). This can only happen in very special circumstances and should not be expected, but if a solid case is made then it might be considered.

Seniors Celebration Donation

Purpose: Helps senior citizens' groups to cover the cost of activities such as social

outings and Christmas parties.

Funding Provider: Brisbane City Council

Closing Date: 3 October 2017

An applicant should be a:

- club or group providing activities for people aged 50 years and over that is not funded by other sources
- seniors' group that is part of other organisations.

Flying Start Programme

Purpose: To assist not for profit community groups in funding projects that will

enrich the lives of people in their local community.

Amount: \$30 000

Funding Provider: Jetstar

Closing Date: 30 September 2018

Entry is open to not-for-profit community groups and organisations of any size, who are seeking funding to help enhance the lives of people in their local community; and can be classified into one of the following categories:

- Charity
- Educational and Health Organisations
- Arts Group or Organisation
- Sporting Group or Organisation

Lord Mayor's Suburban Initiative Fund

Purpose: Supports community projects that build stronger communities in Brisbane.

Amount: \$250 - \$10 000

Funding Provider: Brisbane City Council

Closing Date: 15 June 2018 or when each ward has fully spent their allocated budget

(whichever comes first)

Projects must contribute to the <u>Brisbane Vision</u>, by helping to achieve the aspiration to be a friendly and safe, active and healthy, clean and green or vibrant and creative city.

Applications for funding can be made by community organisations for local projects, or by Councillors to support community events, activities or capital projects.

Local Sporting Champions Grants

Purpose: Support young people involved in sport

Amount: Up to \$3,000

Funding Provider: Australian Sports Commission

Closing Date: 31 October 2017

Young people find it difficult to meet the ongoing and significant costs associated with participation at sporting competitions, particularly those from regional areas.

The Local Sporting Champions program is an Australian Government initiative designed to provide financial assistance for young people aged 12-18 towards the cost of travel, accommodation, uniforms or equipment when competing, coaching or officiating at an official national sporting organisation (NSO) endorsed state, national or international sporting championships or a School Sport Australia state or national championships.

Steve Waugh Foundation Grants

Purpose: Provide Improve the quality of life of children and young adults affected by

rare diseases

Amount: Not disclosed

Funding Provider: Steve Waugh Foundation

Closing Date: 30 September 2017

The SWF is committed to a co-ordinated approach to the service, identification, treatment and research of rare diseases to improve the quality of life of children and young adults affected by rare diseases (0-25 years of age).

We recognise due to resources and financial limits we will not be in a position to support all individuals, family and community needs in the area of rare diseases. Our philosophy is to support the rarest diseases that are ineligible to get support from other sources.

Young Athletes Travel Subsidy

Purpose: Help alleviate the costs associated with attending championship events.

Funding Provider: Queensland Government

Amount: Up to \$40 000

Grant Closing Date: Currently open

The travel subsidy will allow up to a maximum of \$1,200 in financial assistance over the three event tiers, once every two calendar years. Eligible athletes and officials can apply for one event per tier once every two calendar years.

For example, if an applicant attends a state and international event in 2016, they do not need to wait two years to apply for a national event. Or, if the applicant applies for all three event tiers in 2016 they must wait until 2018 before being eligible again.

The following travel subsidy amounts are available under the three event tiers:

- state or state school event—\$200
- national or national school event—\$400
- international event—\$600.

Easy Grants

Purpose: Supporting local communities across Australia

Funding provider: BankWest Foundation

Amount: \$200 to \$1,000 Closing date: Ongoing

Applications accepted from all types of community groups such as sporting clubs, schools, scout groups, fire brigades, surf lifesaving clubs, dance schools, choirs... the list goes on. You will need to ensure that your group meets the entry criteria.

Some examples of grants include:

- New team uniforms or training equipment for a local sporting club.
- Provide a school award for a top performing student.
- AV equipment for a choir to run an annual performance.
- New training mitts and kick pads for a martial arts school.
- New rescue board for a surf lifesaving club.

The Easy Grants program is run in support of local community groups across Australia. This unfortunately does not cover charitable organisations such as those seeking donations or fundraising. Bankwest is currently supporting a number of charitable organisations through its existing relationships such as H.O.P.E Kitchen, Red Kite, Edmund Rice and the Royal Flying Doctor Service.

For all the applications received each month, twenty will be shortlisted by the Bankwest team. The public will be invited to vote for the group they believe should receive the grant. The three community groups with the most amounts of votes will be awarded with a \$1000 grant each, and the remaining 17 groups will receive a \$200 grant each.

ACF supports a range of charitable organisations and projects each year. Grants are made domestically and internationally through Australian registered charitable organisations for specific projects, or for purposes that support the ongoing activities of those organisations. With over 250 sub-funds, ACF provides over 500 grants annually that broadly fall into the following categories: arts and culture, community development and advocacy, community services and welfare, disability, training and employment, environment, health and medical research, education and overseas aid and development.

Within these categories, target groups are also supported, including Indigenous communities and refugee/asylum seekers.

ACF also administers a number of specific scholarships and awards to promote educational achievement.

Poverty and Disadvantage Small Grants Program

Poverty and Disadvantage Small Grants Program

Purpose: Supports strategies to benefit Australian communities Funding provider: Sidney Myer Fund &The Myer Foundation

Amount: up to \$50,000 Closing date: Ongoing

The aims are to:

- alleviate the negative effects of poverty and disadvantage;
- demonstrate new ideas about how to address poverty and disadvantage;
- strengthen communities' abilities to deal with poverty and disadvantage.

For the next three years this program will particularly prioritise the needs of asylum seekers living in the Australian community. Up to 15% of the total available grants pool will be available specifically for organisations and groups supporting and working with asylum seekers. Activities to be supported include health, education and employment initiatives,

housing support and material aid, social connectedness and community engagement programs, and individual advocacy and legal support.

The program will continue to support initiatives targeting the following groups:

- communities experiencing social and economic exclusion with particular emphasis on Indigenous Australians,
- asylum seekers and refugees, and people living in isolated rural and remote areas of Australia,
- children and young people from disadvantaged backgrounds who lack the opportunity to improve their wellbeing.

The program will support small, discrete projects that meet the needs of a community rather than supplementary funding for large projects. A small, discrete project will be considered to have a total budget of up to \$50,000.

The Poverty and Disadvantage Small Grants Program accepts applications on an ongoing basis, with no specific closing dates.

Eligibility for Organisations:

- Applications will be accepted for grants for charitable purposes from Australian incorporated organisations that have been endorsed by the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) as Tax Concession Charities (TCC).
- If you are unsure of your organisation's tax status, check with your financial advisor or the Australian Government's ABN Lookup website.
- If your organisation is not endorsed as a TCC, but you are an Australian incorporated organisation, you may still be eligible to apply as long as we can be satisfied that the nature of your project is charitable.

Rental Grants Program

Purpose: To help meet some of the costs associated with moving into private

accommodation and help people experiencing a housing crisis

Amount: No disclosed

Funding Provider: Queensland Government

Closing Date: Ongoing Fund

A Rental Grant is a once-only grant of two weeks rent to help meet some of the costs associated with moving into private rental accommodation. A Rental Grant helps people experiencing a housing crisis and does not have to be repaid.

You may be eligible for a Rental Grant if:

- you have not previously received a Rental Grant
- you're not currently living in the place the Rental Grant is for
- you're an Australian citizen, permanent resident, or have a temporary protection or bridging visa
- you don't own, or part-own
 - o a residential property
 - o a caravan, mobile home or live-aboard boat
- you have less than \$2500 in cash or savings between all the Rental Grant applicants (not including dependents)
- you don't have any outstanding debts with the department
- your combined gross (before-tax) income doesn't exceed the <u>income limits for Bond Loans and Rental Grants</u> (http://www.qld.gov.au/housing/renting/bond-loan-eligibility/index.html)
- you choose a place where the rent doesn't exceed 60% of the total household gross weekly income
- all applicants listed on the tenancy agreement (other than dependant children) are included as applicants for the Rental Grant

Active in Parks – Local Champions Grants

Purpose: Encourage community organisations to get active outdoors in their

communities

Amount: \$7,500 - \$15,000

Funding Provider: People and Parks Foundation

Closing Date: Ongoing Fund

Local Champions' grants support organisations to champion the messaging and philosophy of Active in Parks within their state or territory. What does being a Local Champion involve?

- Promoting Active in Parks across your state or territory through a range of networks to engage the whole of community
- Supporting your community to make sustainable moves to getting active outdoors
- Supporting organisations or groups in your community to take their existing programs into outdoor settings
- Holding your own Active in Parks events
- Working with Active in Parks staff to hold yearly forums in your state or territory to engage with interested organisations and community members.

If you are a Gold or White Card holder (with assessed need due to an accepted disability), you can access aids or appliances to help you maintain independence in your home through the RAP.

Aids or appliances prescribed through the programme can include:

- continence products
- mobility and functional support aids
- Personal Response Systems
- Home medical oxygen
- diabetic supplies
- Continuous Positive Airways Pressure (CPAP) supplies.

Medical Aids Subsidy Scheme

Purpose: Provide eligible QLD residents with permanent or and stabilised conditions or disabilities access to subsidy funding for the provision of MASS endorsed aids and equipment

Amount: undisclosed

The Medical Aids Subsidy Scheme (MASS) provides funding for medical aids and equipment to eligible Queensland residents who have a permanent and stabilised condition or a disability. The scheme helps people to live at home and avoid early or inappropriate residential care or hospitalisation.

Aids and equipment are subsidy funded on a permanent loan basis, through private ownership or the supply of consumables. If you pay for more than 50% of the cost for an item, you can choose to take ownership, rather than having a permanent loan. However, this means that you are responsible for all repairs to that item.

Medical Cooling and Heating Electricity Concession Scheme

Purpose: To assist low-income Queenslanders who have specific medical conditions to meet the electricity costs they incur through frequent operation of an air-condition

to regulate their body temperature

Amount: undisclosed

The Medical Cooling and Heating Electricity Concession Scheme helps with electricity costs for people who have a chronic medical condition, such as multiple sclerosis, autonomic system dysfunction, significant burns or a severe inflammatory skin condition, which is aggravated by changes in temperature. It currently provides \$320.97 (including GST) per year to eligible applicants (eligibility is reviewed every two years).
