In Brisbane, 30 000 trade unionists and their supporters marched on a number of issues with the number one being the Turnbull government support for the recent Fair Work Commission decision on penalty rates which attacks the

rates of pay on some of this Nation's lowest paid workers.

It delivers in one, rotten, foul swoop the single, largest wage cut since the Great Depression of the 1930's.

The MUA contingent, 300+ strong, had as its main rallying cry,

“SOLIDARITY” as the great Harry Bridges who led the US West Coast Longshore Workers for four decades said, “is the single most important word in the language of a worker.”

Some members have asked me about the quote on the back of the May Day Shirt, “to be truly radical is to make hope possible, rather than despair convincing.”





The quote comes from the work of the outstanding British Marxist thinker, writer and cultural critic, Raymond Williams. Raymond was the son of a railway worker and his writings have been enormously influential on the left. A fine man who left an important body work for all there on the left who want to develop a dignified and fairer society free from domination and exploitation.

Anger still simmers on slashed penalty rates

HUNDREDS of workers took to the roads yesterday to stand up for what is fair. Families, young children, union members and even their dogs marched in protest of fair work rates including penalty rates. Australian Workers Union (AWU) member Greg Shields said the loss of penalty rates would create a dire future.

"We don't want to lose penalty rates," Mr Shields said. "Once it starts it keeps going."

Mr Shields said the cuts to penalty rates did not just impact hospitality workers, but spread across all industries including tourism at Byron Bay.

"Lots of people don't realise it's a lot of other things too, not just coffee and small shops," he said.

"There are low penalty rates, there's not much left is there?"

AWU member Bruce "Binks" Bickell said penalty rate cuts could be fair for flat rate workers who worked Monday to Friday.

"We work shift workers, public holidays and get shift rates... it's a big chunk of your income rate," he said.

"They don't imagine the community where they're working and they treat us like slave labour."

Electoral Union (EU) member Robert Chard said the May Day march was important to give all the workers a voice.

"Everything from holidays, four weeks annual leave, sick leave... all the things people take for granted," Mr Chard said.

"Nothing was ever given to any worker just because it was generous."

Because of the idea that Australians live in a constantly open community, Mr Chard said that justified the decision to cut penalty rates. "Now they're taking

penalty rates some people are losing the distinction, everything there we're a 34% increase," he said.

"There needs to be some harsher time there."

"Just leave penalty rates alone, just leave them alone. It's so simple as that."

ALP Task Force Public Hearing in Kallangur Queensland

TUESDAY 2 MAY saw an Australian Jobs Task Force hold a public hearing and was held and hosted by the Hon Susan Lamb, MP for the Federal Seat of Longman at Kruger Hall, Kallangur. Among the vast range of Unionists present were QCU Secretary Mike Clifford, three employer personnel and four MUA members, Glen and Harlen Frew, Dale Eaton and Mike Barber. Also in attendance was Federal ALP Hon Justine Keay, MP from the Tasmanian Seat of Braddon whose father was a seafarer.

Focus was mainly upon the devastating personal impact and struggle of those no longer employed and other issues around the ongoing struggle to defend worker's conditions and workplaces. Ways to enforce accountability and monitoring once EA's were in place, became the central discussion concluding with demands that State and Federal Governments implement and reinforce those aspects when licensing work or workplace EA's.

Glen and Harlen spoke about their respective industry sector, including the dangers associated with Partnership Agreements. Harlen spoke about his frustration of being highly trained and no work available after training. Dale spoke on his personal situation since his brutal removal from the MV Portland. Mike spoke about the illegality of 'Partnerships' under the Fair Work Act, uncovered by the vigilant Queensland Branch of the MUA.

Mike concluded that the trade union movement is best suited at what it does, protecting and defending workers, including the *High Court decision on "our right to work in our own country."* Also, including a demand that "a Federal ALP Government when elected, remove 45d and 45e, secondary boycott legislation and all other Federal and State Anti-Union legislation. It includes reintroducing the "right to strike" as prescribed in UN Human Rights conditions. Mike Clifford QCU, supported such a demand, and added that "an ALP Government remove all barriers to trade unions doing their job."

May Day in Brisbane has seen yearly increased participation with over 30,000 marchers in Brisbane. Let us not forget the words in the song "Solidarity Forever." "In our hands is placed a power greater than their hoarded gold, greater than the might of armies magnified a thousand-fold. We can bring to birth a new world from the ashes of the old, FOR THE UNION MAKES US STRONG." *Mike Barber - Queensland Branch Member*
