Since the late 1970s, cities and counties throughout the United States have implemented policies and practices to protect immigrants in their communities. Those that prohibit the use of funds or resources to enforce federal immigration laws are deemed “Sanctuary Cities.” This status, whether implemented through law or by practice, comes with challenges.

This session will address some of the most important issues facing law enforcement, the community and civilian oversight of law enforcement within the context of policing in sanctuary cities. An inquest, the process of investigating a police shooting to determine the facts of the incident, can be a valuable step in the aftermath of a police-involved death that few jurisdictions utilize. King County recently established a Working Group to review the county’s system for conducting Inquests in an effort to make the process a more transparent and fair process – one that instills confidence rather than distrust in the system. This panel will discuss key aspects of the inquest process including its purpose, whether or not it has been effective in its current form, and how Inquests fit into the constellation of police accountability. We will also report updates to the recommendations from the Working Group and next steps for King County’s Inquests.

Around the country, departments continue to hone systems for reviewing and analyzing uses of force utilizing both internal and external mechanisms. In the Pacific Northwest, processes for reviewing use of force have developed significantly, particularly with the influence of DOJ monitoring in Seattle and voter-mandated expansion of police oversight in King County. As the work is being to make this a more, transparent, effective, and fair process it is important to explore what is being done in agencies around the region and country to identify best practices. Panelists will discuss what has worked in their jurisdictions and try to answer the following questions:

- What are the developing roles of civilians in force reviews?
- What kinds of systemic reviews can shed light on uses of force?
- How are force reviews tied to determinations of officer misconduct?
- What is the appropriate scope of force reviews?
- What lessons can we learn from practices developed through the Department of Justice?
