**I. General Views on Alcohol and Drug Disorders Policies to Address Stigma**

Alcohol and drug disorders have only recently become recognized as chronic diseases, much like diabetes or hypertension. Yet the stigma associated with them continues to persist and often prevents people from seeking the treatment they need, contributing to disease severity and adding huge costs to public programs.

Substance use disorder is common and treatable. Almost everyone knows someone experiencing this challenge. Yet for too long, administrative and financial barriers to care prevented people from getting treatments and services needed to survive and recover. These three bills amount to a crucial start in our effort to solve the overdose crisis and increase access to treatments that actually work in NJ.

S3491/A5457 revises and expands authorization for any person or entity to obtain, distribute, and administer naloxone. S3800/A5703 requires health insurers, including Medicaid, New Jersey FamilyCare and others to cover the cost of opioid antidotes - like Narcan - without prior-authorization requirements, expanding access to life-saving drugs. S3803/A5495 would permit certain paramedics to administer buprenorphine to patients who badly need it, allowing those with substance use disorder to immediately access science-based treatment and avoid a risk of relapse while waiting to access long-term treatment options.

I am very proud to have worked alongside the New Jersey Organizing project on community efforts to get these bills passed in NJ.

I look forward to continuing that effort
