Mayor Garcetti to join us Saturday, August 29

Climate Emergency Mobilization Office update

The Mayor's April budget eliminated the Office of Climate Emergency Mobilization, which was designed by community-based organizations that represent frontline communities of color to ensure that they have a voice in the solutions to the climate crisis, as those communities often bear the brunt of the impacts. Due in part to the hard work of our advocacy committee and many of you, the funding for the office has been restored, but funding for the accompanying Climate Emergency Commission, which was designed to amplify the voices of those frontline communities, has not. Wildlife Pilot Study update

Funding for the <u>Wildlife Pilot Study</u>, which was designed to help conserve and protect existing natural areas and wildlife habitats in the city and which was also cut from the Mayor's April budget, has also been partially restored. Thank you to those of you who chimed in and supported it.

ADAPT

The Bureau of Street Services (StreetsLA) repaves streets, and the Los Angeles Department of Transportation (LADOT) stripes them. ADAPT is an effort by StreetsLA to repave major streets while we have less traffic due to the pandemic. Sounds like a good idea, right? The problem is that LADOT can't move quickly enough to do the necessary community outreach and get the necessary political will to implement the Mobility Plan 2035. This means that streets on the mobility plan with bus and bike lanes are getting repaved and striped the same way they are now, the result being that although we will have smoother streets for cars, we are missing out on bike and bus lanes, and the City probably won't repave the streets again for another 25 years or so.
