## Jay Webber, Weak on Gateway Tunnel Critical to Region, U.S.

The \$30 billion Gateway Project and its proposed second Hudson River rail tunnel are crucial to the region and the nation – but Jay Webber rarely refers to it. He failed even to mention it on his website until Sept. 25, and then only as an afterthought. And Webber seems unconcerned President Trump rejected federal funds for the project.

- Trump, in fact, threatened a veto and **government shut down** if any Gateway money was in last March's government funding bill. He rejected President Obama's commitment to 50-50 fund sharing between the federal government and NJ and NY.
- Webber's <u>nonsensical</u> answer is to elect a Republican to NJ-11 because he could persuade Trump to restore the funding. Webber must have forgotten Rep. Rodney Frelinghuysen a Republican has represented the district for 24 years, chairs the powerful House Appropriations Committee, is a staunch Gateway supporter and failed to persuade Trump.
- Trump broke the Gateway agreement because Democrats refused to support funding for his border wall and spitefully, as many believe, because NJ and NY voted against him in 2016.
- The Gateway Project is "arguably the nation's most urgent infrastructure project," wrote Cameron Davidson for Politico Magazine. The project would include:
  - o building a second rail tunnel to connect NJ and New York City,
  - o renovating the current 106-year-old rail tunnel, and
  - o replacing the 108-year-old <u>Portal Bridge</u>, that carries trains over the Hackensack River and often fails, causing frequent delays.
- The consequences would be tragic if the current tunnel fails before a new one is built. It would cripple the region, disrupt the lives of 200,000 daily riders, and send NJ home prices falling.
- Webber errs in calling Gateway a "<u>regional priority."</u> No, it's a regional *and national priority*. It's critical to the U.S. economy because 20% of the gross domestic product runs through the Northeast Corridor, from Washington, D.C., to Boston, with NJ crucially in the middle.
- The tunnel is the linchpin to the corridor the nation's busiest passenger route. Its failure would cause an economic meltdown to the tune of \$100 million per day.
- When the *Morristown Patch* asked Webber for the "three top issues you intend to fight hard for ... if elected," he failed to mention the Gateway Project.
- Mikie Sherrill, his Democratic opponent, didn't hesitate to answer, in part, "Investing in our infrastructure ... Congress's refusal to fund the Gateway Project is not only a major setback to our region, but a threat to the national economy." She gets it.
